Those attending will be able to ask

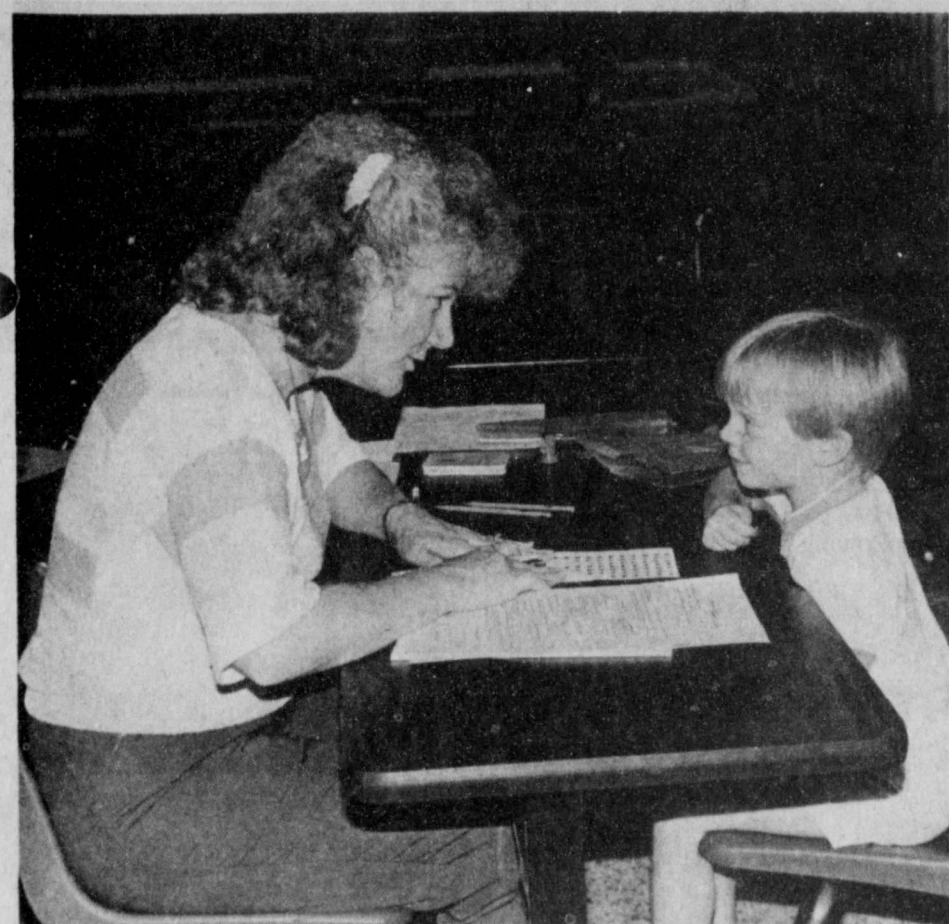
any question they may have to any candidate. According to Jim Bob Martin "In order to make the meeting go smoother, anyone with questions is asked to write them on a piece of paper and present

City Council handles street contract during called session

The Council met in a called session on Friday 21, 1989.

Mayor Dan Smith updated the council on the status of the landfill. He reported the county commissioner's court had not met to consider the proposed contract from the city. All councilmen agreed that they were anxious for the court to approve the contract so the landfill could be reopened for county residents' use.

The council voted unanimously to approve the street maintenance contract with Floyd County. The contract states that the county will assist the city in maintaining dirt streets within the city. If any utility lines are broken, it will be the responsibility of the city to repair or replace them. One paragraph was deleted which stated that the city was liable for all actions of the city of Lockney to assume such infinite liability. City Attorney Paul Lyle had also advised the council not to sign the contract with this clause in it. The city's liability insurance covers all actions except broken utility lines.

City engineer A. C. Bowden of Lubbock met with the council to present the 1989 sealcoating proposal. He reported several streets were in need of resealing at a cost of approximately \$20,000. However, the 1989-90 budget only allows \$15,000 for sealcoating. After discussing the need to stay within the budget, the council asked Mr. Bowden to write bid specifications for only the streets in greatest need of sealcoating. Vote was unanimous to call for bids on sealcoating.

The Council agreed that the intentions of the council should be clarified in the minutes regarding the computer system recently purchased. They purchased a computer that could be upgraded and converted to a multi-user

system.

Alderman Wofford made motion to grant West Texas Exteriors a permit allowing them to go from house to house for five (5) days to take orders for steel siding, storm windows, metal roofs and carports. Alderman Johnson seconded the motion and all were for.

Present were Mayor Smith, Councilmen Aston, Wofford, Johnson, and Copeland, City Secretary Erma Lee Duckworth and City Engineer A. C. Bowden.

CONTRACT

This contract entered into by and between the City of Lockney, and the County of Floyd, as follows:

Whereas, the City of Lockney is in need of assistance in the maintaining and grading of dirt streets within the city limits of Lockney (but not the alleys), and the City of Lockney has requested such assistance from the Commissioners Court of Floyd County, Texas.

Now therefore, the City of Lockney and the Floyd County Commissioners Court agree as follows:

1) The City Council of Lockney here now request and give their consent for the Commissioners Court of Floyd County and its employees, to assist with any work on dirt streets in the City of Lockney in maintaining and grading said dirt streets only, as here now stated in this contract.

2) The Commissioners Court of Floyd County agree to assist in such

work on said dirt streets only upon the following terms:

a) Any work done will be at the convenience of the County Commissioners, and the county employees, and when the equipment is not needed at some other place in the county and is available.

b) The City of Lockney shall furnish city equipment and city employees to assist in doing the work requested.

c) The City of Lockney shall furnish an employee and/or representative to be present at all times to help supervise in any such work, and to point out and identify any underground pipe lines and boundary lines, and to explain what they want done.

d) In the event of any damage to underground lines of any kind, or overhead lines of any kind, it is understood that Floyd County will not be responsible to repair any of said damaged lines, due to the use of any Floyd County equipment by any Floyd County employees, agents, or representatives.

e) Any material used on said streets to be furnished by the City of Lockney.

3) This contract shall terminate upon 30-days written notice given by either the City of Lockney of the County of Floyd. Such notice may be given by the County Judge to the Mayor of Lockney, or by the Mayor of Lockney to the County Judge, or by notice given to the City Council of Lockney, or by notice given to the Floyd County Commissioners Court.

LHS athletes advance to regional track competition

Four boys and two girls will represent Lockney High School in the Regional Track competition in Abilene Friday and Saturday, April 28 and 29.

Competing in the boys events will be Wesley Teeter, discus; Andy Rodriguez, 400 meter run; Mark Gatica, 1600 meter run and Michael Monroe in the high jump.

In the varsity girls district track events Sundai Workman placed first in both discus and shot. In shot she threw 29'7-1/4" and in discus she threw 85'6". Lori Gonzales won first in the 1600 meter run with a time of 6:11.48.

The track preliminaries for both the boys and girls will get underway Friday, April 28 at 6:30 p.m. at the Abilene Christian University track. Finals in the field events begin at 9:00 a.m. Saturday, April 29 and finals for the running events begin at 2:00 p.m.

Better Business Bureau issues caution on magazine sales

Last week the BBB/South Plains started receiving calls from the public about UNION CIRCULATION out of Las Vegas, Nevada, selling magazine subscriptions door-to-door. The Lubbock Police Department became involved when a consumer complained about an over-zealous salesperson touching her. Company representatives are allegedly requesting payment by check made out to CASH. The Bureau

advises consumers to never make checks out to cash or anyone but the company. Also, the salespeople are asking customers to sign a waiver of

their rights to the 72-hour cooling off period law. The Federal Trade Commission has advised the BBB that such a waiver may not be legal. That law allows consumers to cancel contracts with peddlers for up to three days following

the transaction.

BBB/Las Vegas reports that the home office is located in San Diego, California, and numerous complaints have been filed regarding non-delivery of merchandise. This company does not meet the BBB/Las Vegas standards of business practice because of one or

more unanswered complaints.

The BBB/South Plains reminds consumers to be alert to peddlers selling magazines, home improvement, books, etc. door-to-door. If they cannot identify themselves to your satisfaction, call the police department or sheriff's office immediately.

Resignations were accepted from Kathy Becker and Karen Quebe. Quebe has been hired as diagnostician for the Special Education Co-op and she will serve Lockney, Floydada and Petersburg.

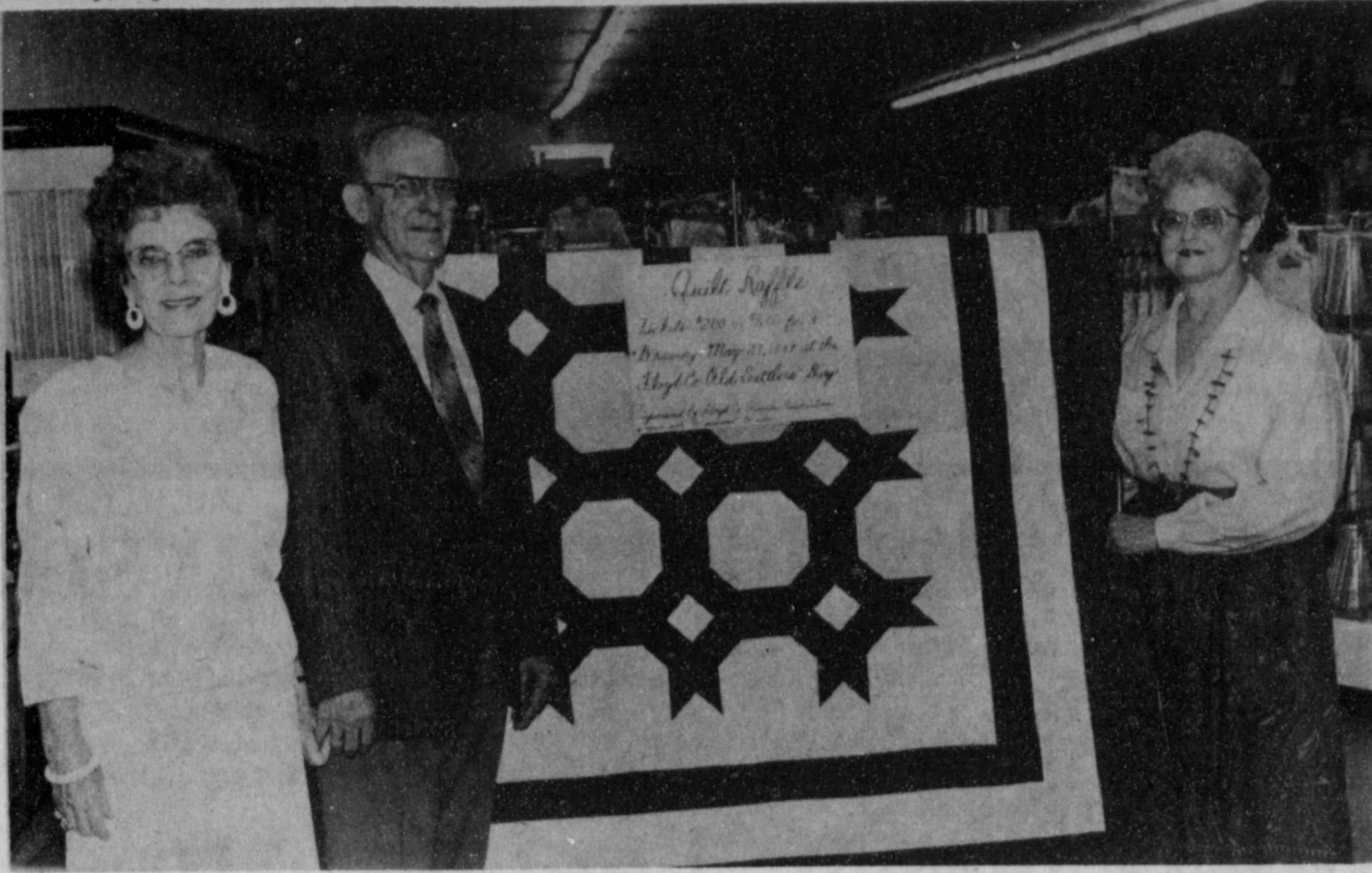

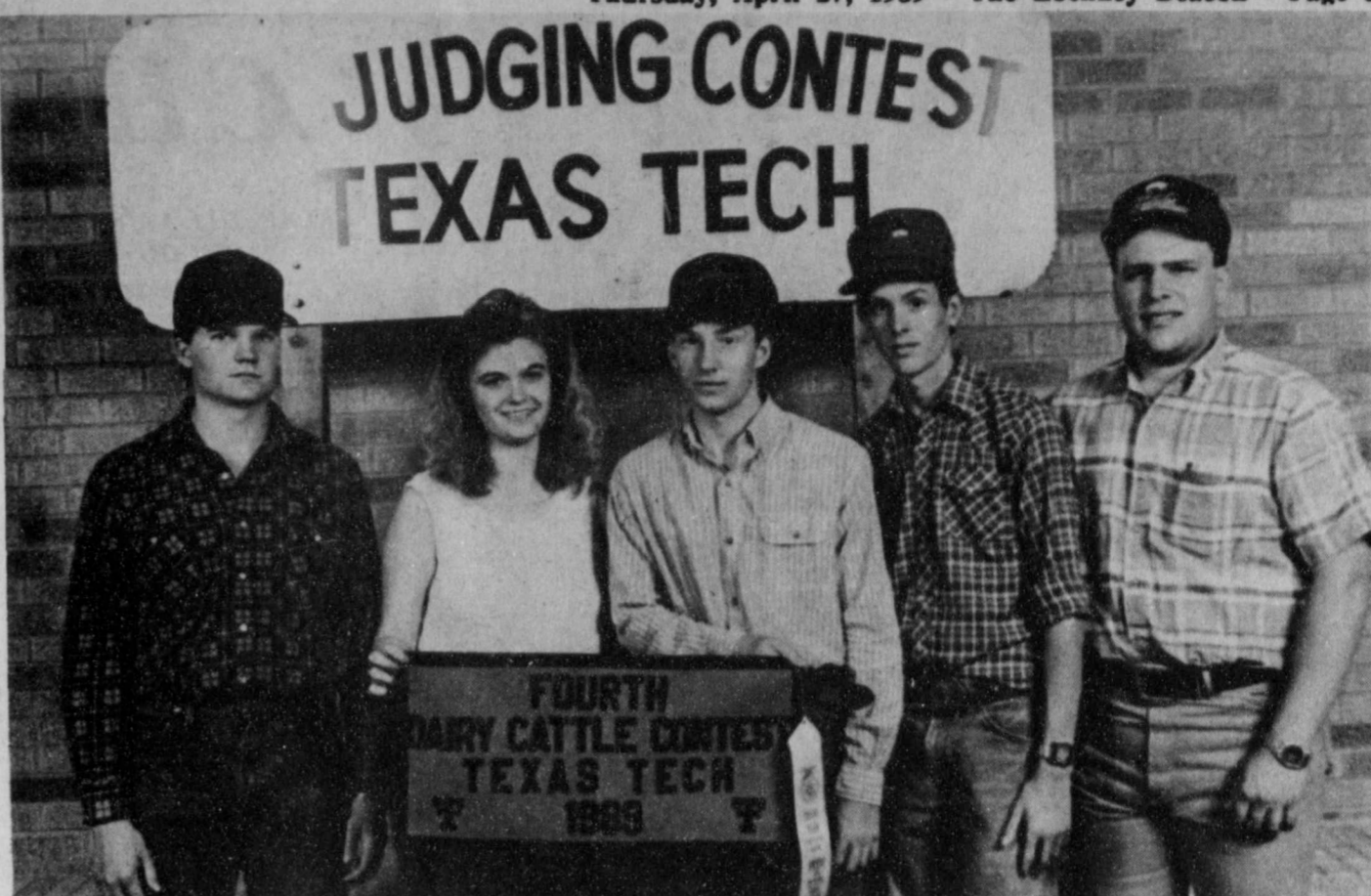

Some SPS customers may receive credit on their bills

Beginning this week, Texas retail customers of Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) who live outside city limits will receive on their bills a credit related to a 4.3% reduction in electric rates.

"These customers have been billed at the new, lower rate since December," said Jerry Diller, SPS Group Manager of Rates and Regulation. "On April 19, the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) finalized the lower rate. This decrease was made possible primarily by lower federal income tax rates on corporations and SPS's ability to hold down other costs."

The electric-rate decrease was first agreed to by SPS, the PUCT staff and others on July 8, 1988. The finalization of the rate allows SPS to credit customers' bills as though the new rate had been in effect beginning July 8.

"The credit will be based on the actual amount of electricity each customer used between July 8 and the date interim lower rates began," Diller said. "These one-time credits total \$3.4 million and average about \$13 for a residential customer outside city limits."

SPS's Texas retail customers inside city limits received a 3.1% rate reduction on March 28, 1988. They soon should receive an additional 1.2% reduction to match the amount of decrease for customers outside city limits. They also will receive a credit as if the addi-

tional reduction had been in effect since July 8.

"When the cities approved the rate reduction last year, we planned that if the PUCT approved a larger decrease, SPS would match the decrease for customers inside city limits," Diller said. "We expect to implement the additional decrease in each of the 74 affected cities within the next 60 days, with a one-time credit to follow shortly thereafter."

The staggered effective dates are the result of the regulatory process in Texas, in which cities regulate rates within city limits and the PUCT regulates rural rates.

"When it's all said and done," Diller said, "rates inside and outside city limits will be identical and all SPS's Texas retail customers will have received an average 4.3% rate reduction. In all, the actions amount to a \$20.6 million reduction in SPS's Texas retail rates."

The 4.3% rate reduction which has been in effect equals a decrease in the monthly electric bill of \$3.84, from \$73.51 to \$69.67 for a residential customer who used 1,000 kilowatt hours of electricity.
