

Political candidates meet the public during Thursday forum

Lockney Elementary Cafeteria was the setting for a local political forum on Thursday, April 27, at 7:00 p.m. The forum which was sponsored by the Lockney Chamber of Commerce, and hosted by Deputy Ellis Butler, was attended by candidates for mayor, councilman, and hospital board.

Candidates came prepared to answer questions that were to have been submitted earlier by citizens of Lockney. But there were very few questions submitted to Chamber President Jim Bob Martin. Deputy Butler apologized to those who attended the forum and said he was disappointed in the lack of questions.

Each candidate was given five minutes to speak. The questions were reserved until the end. Butler first introduced the candidates for mayor, who were: Mayor Dan Smith, Wanda McLendon and Ray Sissney. First to speak was Wanda McLendon.

"I just want to see Lockney grow," said McLendon. "I would like to try and beautify Lockney. I want to see more shrubs and trees. I just want to take care of business, and that's about it."

Ray Sissney was next on the podium. "I have been a citizen of Lockney or the surrounding area since 1948," said Sissney. "I retired in 1985 and made the decision that I wanted to make Lockney my home for the rest of my life. I feel like we have a pretty good little town here, but I feel like it might be in the process of backsliding. I'd like to see that reversed. I feel with long range planning and leadership and more understanding and cooperation between city council and county officials we can achieve that."

Mayor Dan Smith was last to speak and reviewed the years he has spent in office. "In the last 2 years a lot of good changes have happened in the city of Lockney - coming from a lot of hard work from your city council," said Smith. "When I took over the job as mayor 2 years ago we had finished the fiscal year with a \$70,000 deficit. After my first year we ended with a \$24,000 had to be raised but prices were raised on what we were being charged. A lot of in surplus. This last fiscal year we ended up with a surplus of \$14,000."

"A lot of things came up during the year that we had to buy and repair. If we hadn't had to spend money on those unbudgeted items we would have been in the black over \$50,000. True taxes depth management has been done to keep your city on the solid ground it is

now. "As far as livestock, junk cars and dilapidated building ordinance. I'm very proud of that. It took the city council a lot of guts to enforce that. What I'm most proud of, is keeping it enforced. We're gonna clean this town up. We're not done. It will take a period of years."

"I want to make this a place to be proud of...." "We have to consider the senior citizens. They didn't have to retire in Lockney. They did because they wanted to. Lockney has a lot of senior citizens and I think that speaks well of this town. It shows they wanted to come back here and I'm proud of that."

Candidates for city council were introduced next. Candidates present at the forum were Sam Fortenberry, Conrad Henderson and Arvie Newton. Incumbent Councilman Kenneth Wofford was not present. First to speak was Sam Fortenberry.

"I've been here all my life," said Fortenberry. "I don't have any idea of leaving. I have a meat business here, I farm and ranch here, and I have my auction service here."

"I don't want to take a stand here on anything tonight, because there is no way I could possibly answer questions that would be one sided either way because I don't have those figures in front of me. Everything you get if your not in that council meeting or in the county meeting is second hand when it comes out. By the time it goes through 3 or 4

people you can form different ideas. The only thing I want you to understand is that I will do what I think is right at the time I feel it is right."

C.L. Henderson spoke next and simply said, "If I have any management ability I'll give it to you for free. That's all I've got to say."

Next on the podium was Arvie Newton who said, "I had no intention of running for city council, but I was approached by so many people urging me to run. I feel like if all of ya'll believe in me I'll put my best foot forward and I'll do the best I can for the city."

"I've been here a long time and I've seen some grave mistakes from the city council and the mayor...What happened to the water coming through from Plainview. We had the opportunity to get on and didn't. Then we had to go up here and build a lake and your grandchildren and great grandchildren will be paying for the water out of the lake."

Municipal elections are Saturday

Elections for mayor, city council, school board and hospital board have been set for Saturday, May 6 from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

City elections will be held at Lockney City Hall. Election judge is Willis Reynolds.

"I think I can do a good job if you'll support me. I'll do the best I can."

All Hospital Board candidates were present. Each is running unopposed. Attending the forum were Claude Brown and Jack Covington, incumbents, and Hubert Frizzell who is seeking a return to a seat on the board. Speaking first was Claude Brown.

"I have already served two years on hospital board," said Brown, "and I'm willing to serve another term. I'd appreciate you all getting out to vote and showing your support for the hospital."

Jack Covington spoke next and stated, "I consider it an honor running for hospital board, because the hospital is such an important institution here in Lockney. It has made great strides." Covington continued to praise the hospital, particularly Administrator Terry Keltz, who he said has "worked very very hard to turn things around."

"I've served two years already," said

Covington, "and I have one more term to serve. I would appreciate your vote."

Hubert Frizzell spoke next and continued his praise of the current hospital administration, but he also paused to speak of Director Chester Carthel who died last week. "Speaking on the present board, we lost a great man in Chester Carthel...If there was ever a man who lived by the Golden Rule, it was him."

"The men now serving have the capabilities to serve on any hospital board. They will face tough problems in the next 3 or 4 years, and I believe we will stand the test. I believe the whole community should turn out and vote to show they are supporting the hospital."

After all the candidates spoke, Butler again apologized for the lack of questions. Of the few questions turned in, Butler felt the candidates had answered most of them in their opening remarks. He asked only one question of all the mayoral candidates: "If elected as

mayor what changes, if any, would you make?"

Wanda McLendon was asked the question first and replied, "I'd like to see something done for the elderly. I see too many of them come out of the stores after shopping and there are no benches to sit on. The steps are too high on the curb, and there are no railings for them to hold on to. We have no handicap places for them to get out."

"I'd like to see something done for our youth. I'm tired of the pool hall. I'm tired of seeing youth out on our streets not doing anything but loafing up and down the street. There is nothing for them to do here. I propose building a recreation center for them and getting them off the street."

"I'd like to see more flowers and trees and an industry come into this city. I want to see my city grow. I want to see my young people stay here."

Ray Sissney answered the same question by saying, "I'm not on the inside of the city business. I have never attended

Fifty-one fish in 2nd Charles Ball Fishing Tournament at Makenzie

Despite cold weather 51 fishermen from Lockney took part in the second annual Charles Ball fishing tournament held Saturday, April 29 at Lake Mackenzie.

First place winner was David Frizzell. He caught two black bass that

weighed a total of 4 pounds 5 ounces. His share of the prize money came to \$127.50 and he was the recipient of the traveling trophy.

Charles Dipprey caught a catfish, crappie and bass to put him in second place. They weighed a total of 4 pounds

3 ounces. He earned \$76.50.

Coming in third was Don Auffill. He caught two black bass that weighed 3 pounds and 11 ounces. His share of the prize money was \$51.00.

Kenneth Holt caught the largest single fish. It was a black bass and weighed 2 pounds and 12 ounces. \$255.00 will be used for a scholarship to be given to a high school senior who will be attending a technical or nursing school. The scholarship will be presented in the name of Charles Ball.

The scholarship committee consists of Billy Turner, Pat Frizzell, Claude Brown, Bill Race, and Eddie Teeter with the help of the high school administration.

The tournament started at 7:00 a.m. and the men fished until weigh-in time of 6:00 p.m. R. W. Johnson stated that it was chilly and that he did not take his coat off until about three o'clock.

After the weigh-in the board considered several proposals for next years tournament. They discussed using all of the entrance fee for the scholarship and foregoing the prize money. It was brought up that others than Lockney fishermen be included and discussion was held on holding the tourney the third week in April to help out the farmers in the group who are in the midst of planting cotton.

Rodriquez heads for state

Andy Rodriquez, a member of the Lockney Longhorn track team, turned in the fastest time in the 400 meter run at the track regionals held in Abilene on Saturday, April 29. A time of 52.6 gave him first place in the meet and qualifies Rodriquez for the state track meet.

Other team members traveling to Abilene for the regionals include: Wesley Teeter who placed 8th place overall in Discus with a throw of 133'4"; George Bernal ran the 800 meter race with a time of 2:07.0; Mark Gatica placed 8th overall in the 1600 meter run with a time of 4:47.16; Lori Gonzales ran in the 1600 meter run and had a time of 6:07.27; and Sundai Workman threw the shot, 27'9" and the discus, 81'.

Lockney tied with Morton for 14th place in the regional meet. There were 33 teams represented.

The state track meet will be held May 12 and 13 in Austin.

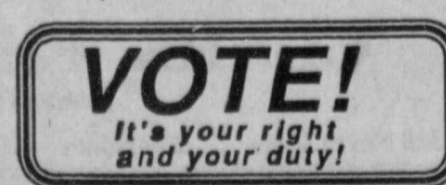
The shop is warmly decorated in fabric and antiques. Many of the antiques are for sale.

Lorenzo landfill to close

Lorenzo City Manager Leon Moore said that the city owned landfill will be closed by August 1990 to avoid harsh new laws requiring new equipment at the landfill site and daily maintenance.

He said it would be costly because the landfill would have to be covered daily with at least three feet of soil, and test wells would have to be installed in the corner to monitor the possible groundwater contamination. Also an impervious concrete pit would be required to prevent seepage and a vent pipe would have to be installed.

In addition Moore said, the city

Continued From Page 1 a city council meeting. One of the major changes I would attempt to make if elected would be to get on better terms with county commissioners as to grading our dirt streets in East Lockney and maintaining the landfill.

"We have a bad problem with that now, not only with people in town who have dirt streets but also with people living outside the city limits - the farmers...who this town has to live on.

"What if the farmers quit buying pump engines, tires, batteries, gasoline, diesel...what if they quit bringing a bale of cotton into the gins here and shut us out from their trade. It's imperative that we get on better terms with the county so they can maintain our streets and get on

better terms with our farmers around town."

In answer to the same question, Mayor Smith said, "We've already made so many changes in the last two years that have set the course for this town. It's going to be hard work to keep going like we are, which is in a good direction. I can't say there are going to be any major changes, but I would like to talk about the landfill and the dirt streets.

First - the county has always taken care of the maintenance of our dirt street. The county now decided they needed to draw up a contract - which was fine. There was nothing wrong with the contract they presented us except that it asked us to assume their liability. We didn't mind assuming liability for broken utility lines, but that was all.

After talking to them about it they said that was all they wanted us to do, but we had to delete a paragraph (on the advice of our city attorney) where we wouldn't be responsible for all liability. I believe it is what the county wanted too. The city has signed the contract. I believe it is a very small matter. The commissioners will probably act on it at their next meeting, and we should hopefully start getting help on our dirt streets.

"The city has tried for 5 years in a row to get some of those streets paved in East Lockney - namely 6th street. I have made 3 trips to Lubbock to go before the SPAG loan board to try to get a grant to do this. We tried for 5 years and failed. That's all we can try for (the SPAG loan).

"We're hauling in dirt now to build up the road. Maybe someday we can put caliche on it, and culverts. I'm sorry but the city is doing the best they can.

"Now on the landfill. Don't think your city council didn't agonize over that a long time. But we went back and read the oath that we swore to that office - to protect the interests of the citizens of Lockney. Don't think we don't know there wouldn't be a Lockney if it weren't for the farms out here.

"The county commissioners are responsible for not only people in town, but also for those outside town - and that is where the majority of their work is done.

"The city felt that we shot them a fair deal. They feel like they shot us a fair deal. We disagreed. We couldn't work it out, the city revoked their privileges.

"We have given in a little bit now and have sent them a contract the next time they meet I'm sure they'll discuss it. I hope they sign it. Nothing would make you city council happier than to open that landfill. We don't like what happened anymore than anybody else - in fact we probably hate it worse. But we had to stand our ground for the city of Lockney. We know what we are doing is right."

Because of the lack of questions there were none asked of the city council candidates.

All the Hospital Board candidates were asked: "What can the entities do to try and save little hospitals?"

Claude Brown replied first and stated, "We are very fortunate here. We have a good administrator and we have 3 doctors. We will have another doctor in a year. Our finances are in good shape. Our auditors tell us that we are in better shape than most small hospitals around. I really don't think we have a problem. Our hospital is going to stay open."

Answering the same question, Jack Covington said, "Our overhead has gone up a tremendous amount because Medicare has forced it up. We will have to raise taxes. We think the overhead will go up \$150,000 because of Medicare. In this community, Medicare is absolutely necessary." He agreed with Brown in that the hospital has a good administrator and good doctors with another one coming. "We are looking good. We have been very busy last month. We are being used. People are coming from all over - from every direction."

Jack Frizzell endorsed what Covington and Brown said when he answered the question, and stated, "We are facing difficulties but the auditor tells me Lockney is the example that can be set for the small hospitals throughout the state of Texas. It is something to be proud of. We have a lot to be thankful for."



Poole won first with one routine in her division and was second runner-up with another. She was first runner-up with a total high point score of all the talent acts performed.

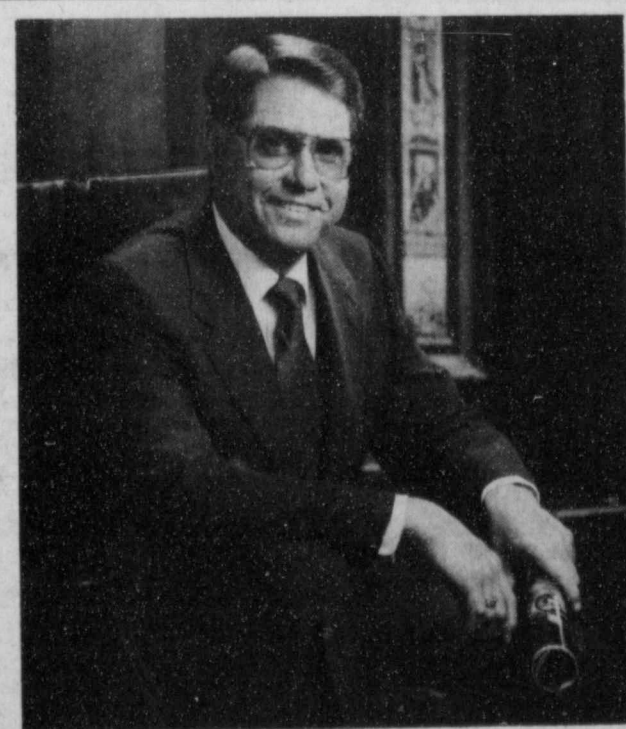
There were approximately 200 competitors entered in the talent search.
