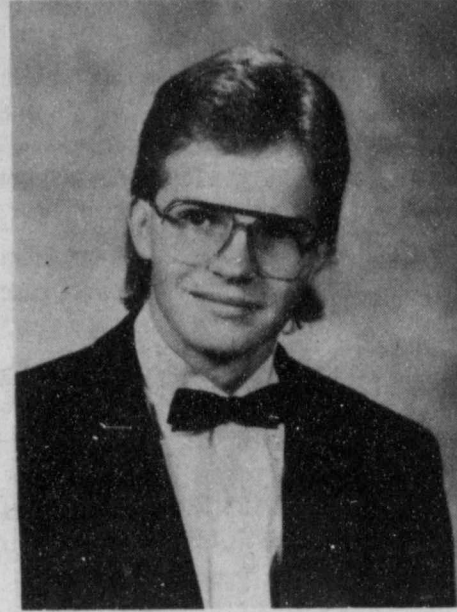
A reception will follow in the church parlor.

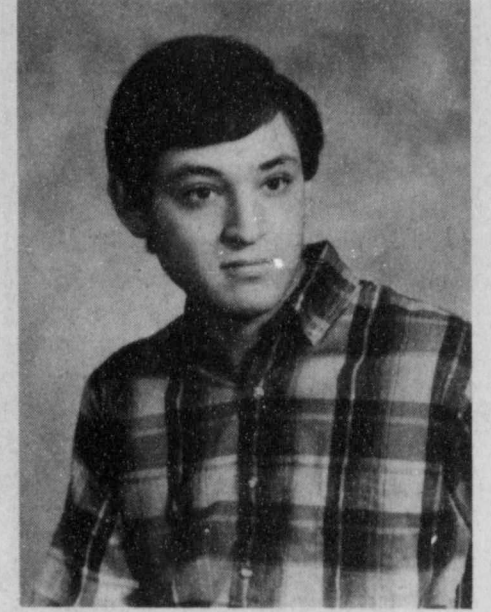

## Juvenile arrested twice for thefts

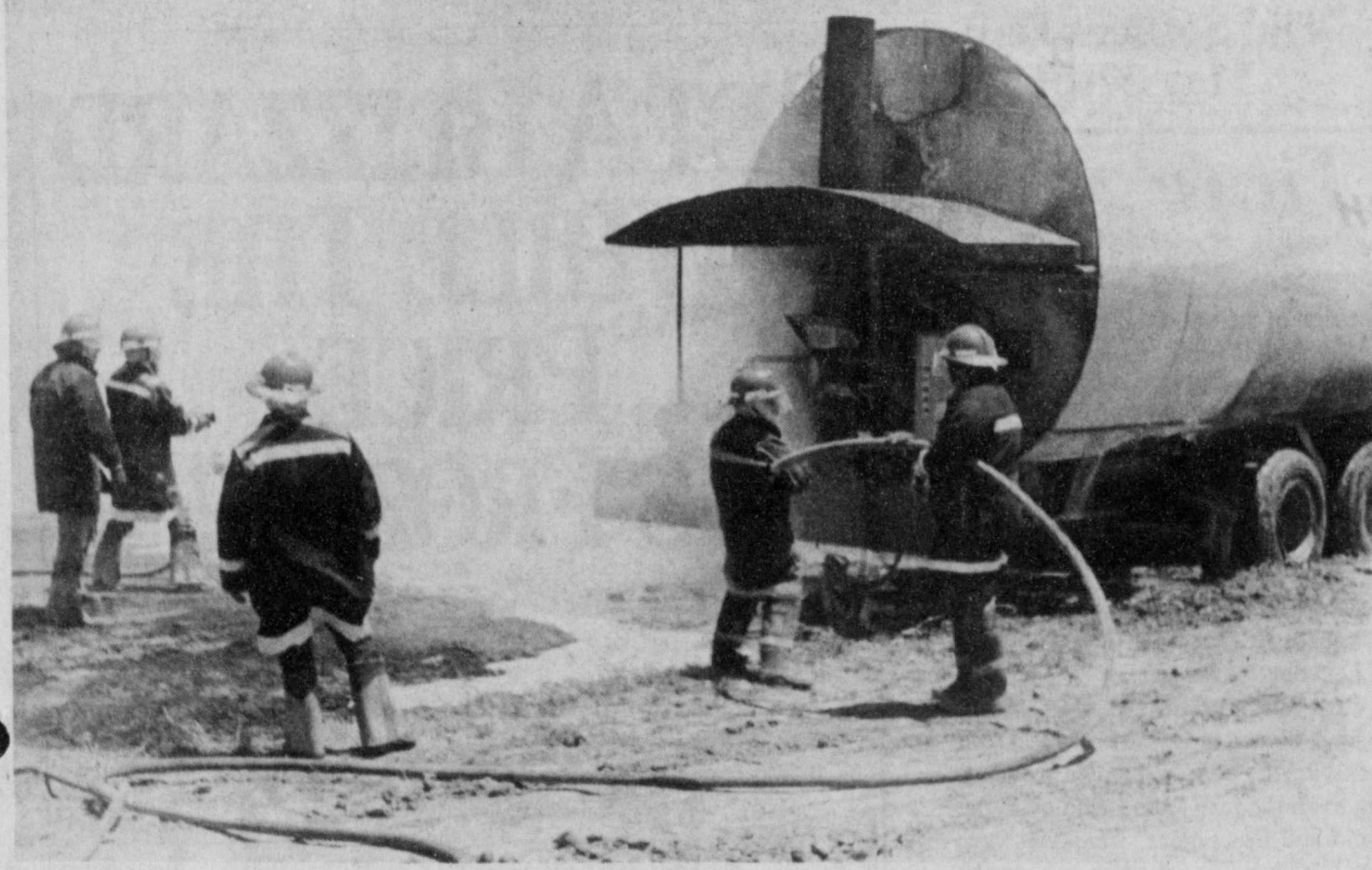

## Mitchell reports on TEAMS test results

Charlotte Mitchell, counselor for the Lockney school system reported on the TEAMS test results to members of the school board at their last meeting and they were very pleased with the results. Each class was up as a whole and in almost every area of testing. The greatest improvement was made in the area of writing. This years results are compared with the results of 1987 to show where the same students now stand.

The 3rd, 5th, 7th and 9th grades took tests in Math, Reading, and writing.

Grade 3 scored 100% in 1989 on the Mathematic section of the test. Ninety six percent of the students mastered the reading section and 77% of the third graders mastered the writing test. The students scored 81% in Math and 54% in Reading in 1987. The scores on all tests taken by the third grade showed a 77% mastery. The scores jumped from the 50% mastery in 1987. Scaled scores for the third grade in 1989 were 898 in

Math, 877 in Reading, and 740 in Writing for a total of 838 for all tests.

Students mastery results in grade five jumped from 53% in 1987 to 70% in writing. Scores dropped to 95% in Math in 1989 from 98% in 1987. In 1987 the students scored 98% in Math and 98% in Reading. The fifth grade students stayed even with their score in 1987. Both scores were 55% mastery. Scaled scores for the fifth grade were in 1989 were 828 in Math, 775 in Reading, and 723 in Writing, for a total scaled score of 775.

Grade seven showed a marked improvement in Writing. Seventy percent of the students mastered the writing section of the test which was up over the 53% mastery in 1987. Ninety five percent of the students mastered the Math portion of the test and 70% mastered the Reading section. Sixty three percent of the students mastered all three sections of the test. This percentage was up from

51% in 1987. Scaled scores for grade seven were 818 in Math, 748 in Reading, and 758 in Writing for a total of 775.

Ninety five percent of the students in grade nine mastered the Writing and Reading portions of the test. Ninety one percent mastered the Math portion of the test. The writing portion of the test was up from 81% in 1987. There was an 88% mastery of all three of the test taken by the ninth graders. Scaled scores for the ninth grade were 825 in Math, 812 in Reading and 868 in Writing for a total scaled score of 835.

All of the grade levels taking the test were up in writing and the teachers feel that with a good mastery of writing that reading and math will come easier. Teachers, aides and administrators are aware of the importance of improvement in the TEAMS scores and extra work has been incorporated into the classes to fulfill this plan.

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## "... And our flag was still there..."

Every time I see our flag, I see the blood of our soldiers, airmen, sailors and Marines — blood spilled for freedom yet caught within its blazing field. I see their valiant spirits reflected in its many stars. On Memorial Day, I see in our flag what I can never forget — their sacrifice.

Yet, more than a symbol of their deaths, it stands for their fighting spirit. It is the spirit of men I served with. They are men who didn't come home — a sergeant, a commanding officer, a friend — men who I'll never forget.

It's a fighting spirit so valiant, so unbreakable, it inspires poetry and song.

Now, I'm no poet — but inside, I too, feel the pride which inspires a poet to write a tribute to our fighting men — a poet like Francis Scott Key.

In 1814, Francis Scott Key watched as the hopelessly out-gunned and out-numbered men of Fort McHenry, Baltimore, were bombarded by the British Fleet. The battle raged through the night. It wasn't until the morning sun broke through the mist that he knew our men had survived the vicious attack.

There, caught in the gleam of dawn's early light — as if to mock the enemy — was the American flag still flying high and proud over the fort. Francis Scott Key was so inspired, he wrote a poem in tribute to the brave men of Fort McHenry. It's a poem in which he stated:

"... And the Star-Spangled Banner in triumph shall wave..."

These words are as true today as they were when he wrote them. Thousands of young men and women wear the uniform of our Armed Forces. They too are prepared to defend this country and all that it stands for. And tragically, they too, have spilled their blood.

Some months ago, 47 sailors aboard the Battleship Iowa paid the ultimate price for our freedom. Do not let their sacrifice be for nothing. Help our young to understand that the flag is not just an interesting exhibit in a museum. Help them to see that the power and beauty of our flag extends beyond an abstract idea.

Past or present, those we honor on Memorial Day purchased freedom. It's important that we mourn them, I know I will. But it's more important that we honor their service and the lessons they taught.

Francis Scott Key understood this, to make his voice heard he wrote a poem. It speaks of the American flag and how it embodies the American spirit.

He wrote a poem that is heard around the world as America's National Anthem. On Memorial Day, let's use that gift to both honor our fallen and to teach those for whom our defenders gave so much.

May sales tax (Lockney High School, Class of '89) rebate received at city offices

Statewide sales tax rebates for the month of March, 1989 are up 11% over last years tax allocations for the same period. 1989 sales tax rebates were up 77.59 percent over rebates in 1988 for the same time period.

May's check represents taxes collected by monthly filers in March and reported to the Comptroller's office by April 20.

A recently issued report concerning sales and use tax analysis shows a decrease of 9.84 percent for the City of Lockney.

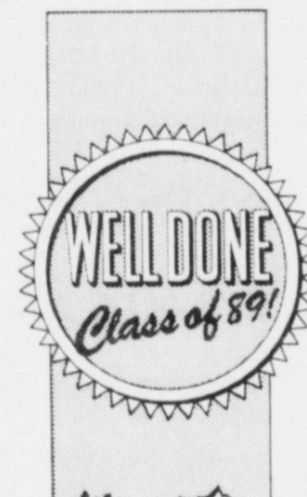
Lockney received a rebate check in the amount of \$5,577.46 for the one percent city sales tax levied on sales during the month of March. The amount received last year was \$6,186.49.

Total rebates to date in 1989 amount to \$36,227.44, a 77.59 percent increase over the \$20,399.23 collected last year.

Floydada's rebate for the period was \$13,717.48 for an increase of 6.12 percent over the \$12,926.50 collected for the same time period last year. They have received \$548,526.85 in 1989 as opposed to the \$43,420.34 received in 1988.

Rebates returned in the surrounding communities include:

- Crosbyton (Crosby County) - \$8,144.47, a 22.83% increase. Matador (Motley County) - \$3,265.25, a 8.26% decrease. Silverton (Briscoe County) - \$2,363.04, a 15.00% decrease. Tulia (Swisher County) - \$26,060.16, a 13.85% decrease. Plainview (Hale County) \$222,238.29 an 8.62% increase.

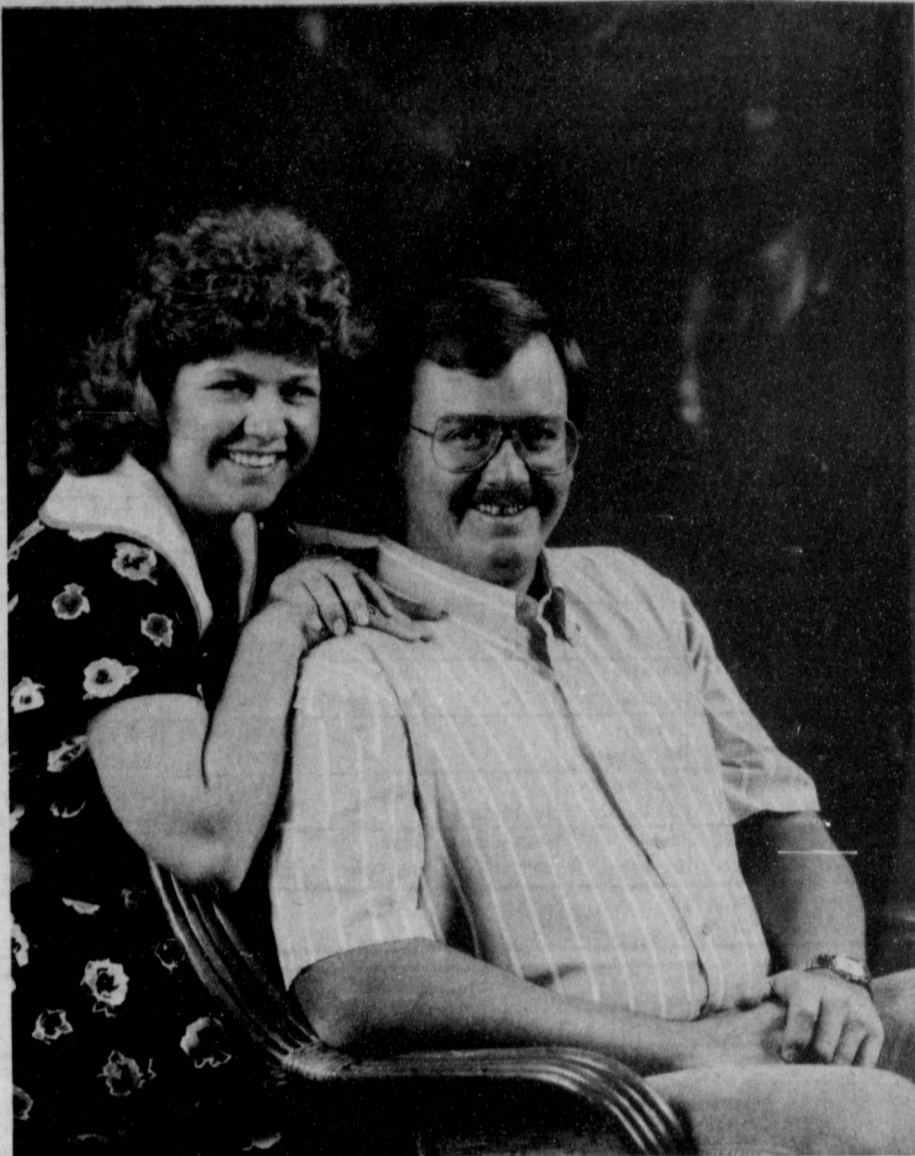

## Misleading information on labels increases sales

Label jargon can be misleading to consumers who base buying decisions on information found on product packages.

Dr. Mary Kinney Sweeten, a registered dietician and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said the Food and Drug Administration requires a food label to state the name and address of the manufacturer and to list ingredients in descending order of weight.

"Calorie information is optional," she said. If included, the label must give the serving size; per-serving amounts of calories, protein, fat, carbohydrate; and the percentage of the recommended daily allowances of five vitamins, two minerals and protein.

She said labels get confusing when terms such as "lite" or "light" that have no standard definitions are used to appeal to consumers.

"Lite can refer to color, taste, texture, calories, or weight," Sweeten said. "Consumers should look at the ingredient list or nutrient chart to determine why a product is lite."

This list of possibly deceiving terms was published in the American Institute for Cancer Research Newsletter to help consumers make informed food choices when reading labels.

\* Lean: No more than 10 percent fat by weight — not by calories.

\* Extra Lean: No more than 5 percent fat by weight — not by calories.

\* Leaner: At least 25 percent less fat (by weight) than the original product.

\* Dietetic: One or more ingredients has been changed, substituted or restricted. Not necessarily low in calories.

\* Sugar-free/Sugarless: Contains no sucrose; might contain corn syrup, fructose, honey, sorbitol or other sweeteners. Not necessarily low in calories.

\* Sodium-free: No more than 5 mg sodium per serving.

\* Very Low Sodium: No more than 35 mg sodium per serving.

\* Low Sodium: No more than 140 mg sodium than the original product.

\* Reduced Sodium: At least 25 percent less sodium than the original product.

\* No Salt Added and Salt Free: No salt added in processing. Can have natural sodium, or sodium from other sources such as soy sauce.

\* Low in Calories: Less than 40 calories per serving.

\* Reduced Calorie: One-third fewer calories than similar product. Meat and poultry must contain 25 percent fewer calories than similar product.

\* Enriched: Replacement of nutrients lost in manufacturing.

\* Fortified: Addition of nutrients to foods that did not originally contain them.

## SPS sponsors program

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) and the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (IBEW) local #602 have implemented a community-watch program designed to assist children who are lost, hurt or feeling threatened.

Through the "Kid Care" program, a child needing assistance can go to any utility truck bearing the distinctive SPS logo. These vehicles are equipped with radios allowing SPS employees to contact a company dispatcher with a request for help.

The dispatcher, in turn, notifies the appropriate medical or law-enforcement agency, and the SPS employee remains at the site until help arrives.

The police or other authorities will handle the situation reported by the child. SPS employees have been instructed only to relay requests for help.

"I think there's a natural inclination to try to help a kid in trouble," said Clayton White, business manager for IBEW Local #602. "We're just asking our people to remember that they're utility workers, not policemen or paramedics, and they should let the authori-

ties handle any Kid Care situation that comes up."

Posters featuring large white trucks with SPS's orange-and-black logo have been placed in elementary and middle schools throughout the company's 52,000-square-mile service area. Principals and teachers at these schools will help educate students about the program, and parents will be encouraged through flyers and other materials to discuss the Kid Care program with their children.

"Kid Care is a natural addition to SPS's existing community service programs," said Laura Dudley, SPS communication specialist for community programs. "SPS employees already act as 'Partners on Patrol,' watching for suspicious activities or fires, through the company's 'Gatekeeper' program, our employees also keep an eye out for elderly persons who might need medical, financial or some other type of assistance. The Kid Care program offers SPS employees yet another way to serve the communities in which they live and raise their families.

## 'Au Pair' companion program is announced

A new nationwide child care program which will provide U. S. families with live-in Family Companions from Texas, has been announced by the American Institute For Foreign Study (AIFS).

The Family Companions, who will be recruited initially from the West and Midwest, will join the 2,500 foreign child care providers currently participating in the AIFS Au Pair in America program in more than 100 communities. The first Family Companions will be placed in June.

"This is a tremendous opportunity for a young person to see what life is like in another part of the country," says Henry C. Kahn, president of the international exchange organization which has provided educational travel and cultural opportunities for 325,000 students since 1964.

"This is the very first program which enables a young woman from a small town to live with a family in a large U. S. city or suburb and meet, on a regular basis, with her counterparts from France, England, Germany and other countries," says Kahn. The Greenwich-based organization received U. S. Government approval to operate the foreign Au Pair program in 1986. The program received a two-year extension in September and is one of only two nationwide programs to have governmental approval.

Family Companions will receive a

minimum of \$125 per week, medical insurance, a two-week paid vacation, private room and board and the services of a local Community Counselor who supervises the Companions and arranges for social and cultural activities. The Community Counselor also interviews and screens host families. The Companions may take college courses paid for in part by the host family. They also receive a \$750 completion bonus or a free trip to Europe.

"The completion bonus will enable the Family Companions to broaden their horizons," says Kahn. "They can visit their new friends, the foreign Au Pairs, in their native countries or use the money to help finance their college education."

Family Companions must be 18 years old, have a drivers license, child care experience and be a high school graduate. They must be willing to make a one year commitment.

"This is not a traditional nanny program," says Kahn. "The interaction with foreign Au Pairs, educational component and European trip plus the support services of the Community Counselor make this a unique experience."

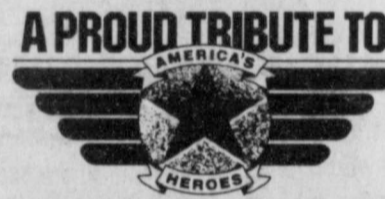

## Perez graduates from maintenance course at Shepard

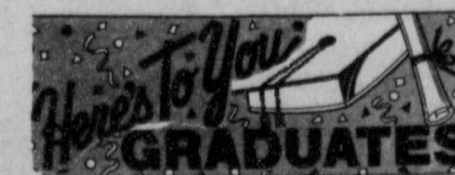
Airman Efrén Perez Jr. has graduated from the U.S. Air Force aircraft maintenance course at Sheppard Air Force Base, Texas.
