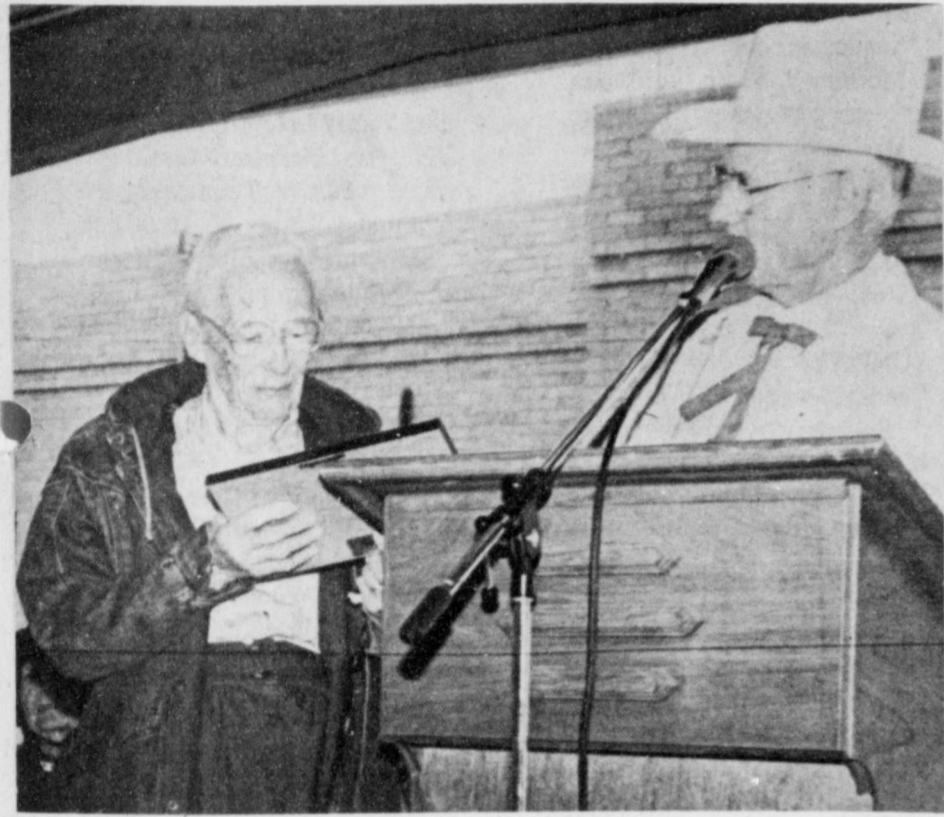


## Mary Lou Bollman named Pioneer Woman of the Year

Mary Lou Bollman was praised as "A true pioneer who has given a large part of her life in working for the welfare of other county residents." Boyce Mosley voiced this tribute during the presentation of the award for Pioneer Woman of the Year at Saturday's Pioneer Reunion in Floydada. Bollman was escorted to the podium by her daughter Nancy Graham to receive a plaque commemorating the honor.

Born Mary Louise Hammond on September 9, 1909, eight miles south of Lockney, Bollman was reared in Floyd County. The family moved into the City of Lockney when she was a young child of four or five years old.

Bollman was well educated, graduating first from Lockney High School in 1929 and from Texas Women's College in 1934. Married to Henry Bollman in 1939, the couple enjoyed more than 40 years of marriage before his death in 1981.

The family produced two daughters, Nancy Elizabeth Bollman Graham and Mary Louise Caroline Bollman Burton, and two sons, Wiley Edwin Bollman and William Charles (Bill) Bollman. Progeny of the family also includes six grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Always active in the community, Bollman is a member of the Buffalo Grass Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, serves on the board of directors of the Floyd County Historical Museum, is a member of the Floyd County Historical Commission, the South Plains Genealogical Society of Lubbock, the Hi-Plains Genealogical Society of Plainview and the Night Writers of Plainview. She was selected as the Lockney Chamber of Commerce Woman of the Year in 1985.

Among her more noted accomplishments is the fact that she has spent literally years in mapping and identifying

the graves in the Lockney Cemetery. She has also been instrumental in locating lost graves in other cemeteries. Her efforts are especially valuable as many local records were destroyed by fire.

Bollman has the distinction of being the person responsible for locating 30 Civil War Veteran graves in the Lockney Cemetery. She undertook the verification of the 30 graves after a report that there were no Civil War Veterans buried in the Lockney Cemetery.

An avid researcher, Bollman has spent many hours of her life in pursuit of geneological information not only for herself, but for anyone who as enlisted her assistance in tracing their ancestry or family tree.

During her travels in the ongoing search for this information, Mary Lou Bollman has served as an excellent ambassador for both Lockney and Floyd County.

## Churches plan summer activities

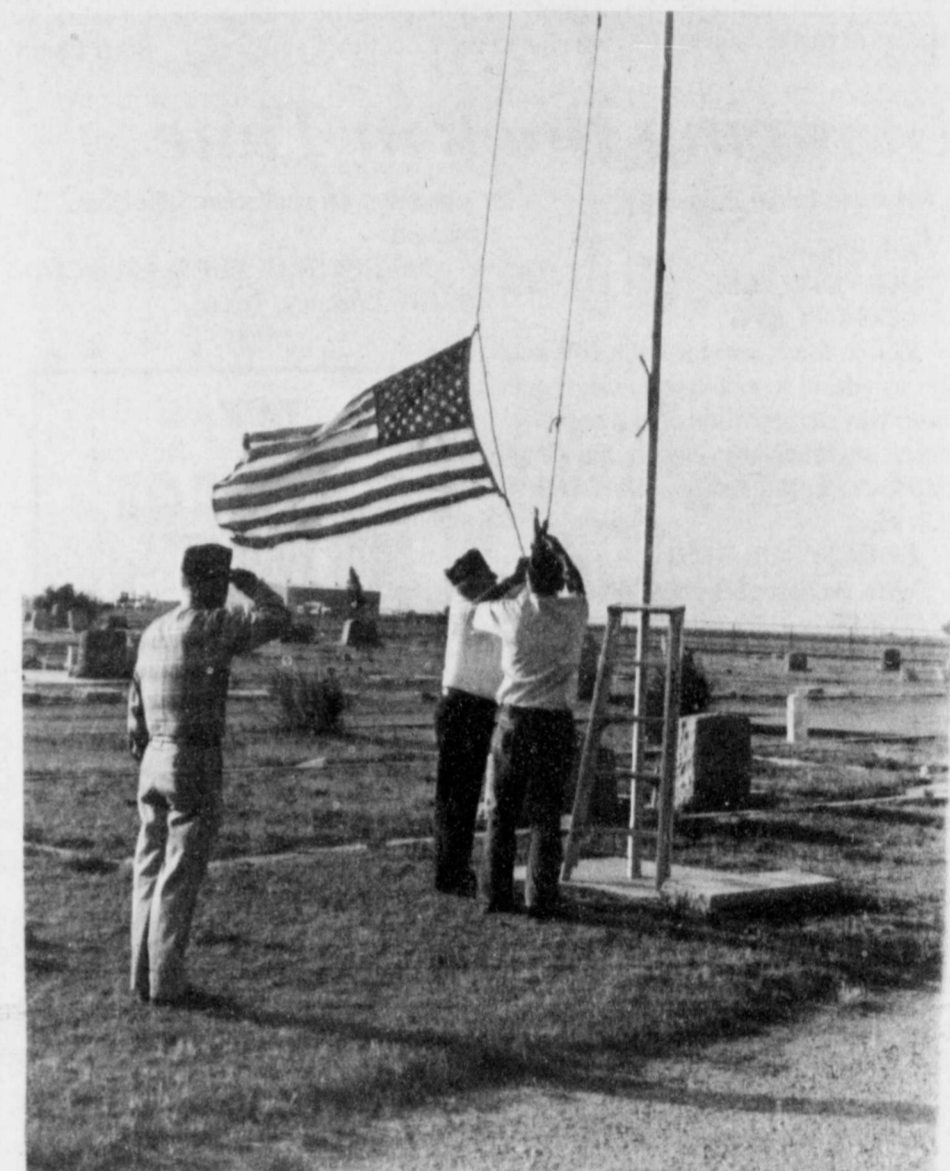
Several local churches have started summer activities for the young people of the community.

## Glancing Back

The following excerpts are taken from a February and a March, 1942 issue of the Lockney Beacon. They had been cut up into a bodice pattern for a dress, as was the custom in the past when paper was hard to come by.

### AMARILLO BOXERS INVADE LOCKNEY, MARCH 27

The Lockney High School boxers will face the most formidable challenge of 10 years ring history March 27 when the star studded Amarillo Golden Sandstorm fistic mandarines blow into the local arena for a sixteen bout joust with the locals. The Lockney boys will carry into the dual match an undefeated record of two years duration during which some of the better teams of the Panhandle and South Plains have been defeated; however in the Sandstorm fighters they face a more serious threat than any team yet subdued.

The Amarillo contingent will be studied from stem to stern with seasoned performers no less than four of whom topped the Amarillo district for Golden Glove honors. In the great little 118 lb. Dean Webb the Sandies boast one of the sensations of the state tournament who swept to the semi-finals before being eliminated. The gallant little newsboy southpawed his way from the ranks of the unknown to menace the circle of the charmed is one of the hardest hitters in bantamweight Golden Glove history. Other district champions who will menace the Lockney fighters are J.C. Oakley, middleweight; Hoy Marcum welterweight; and Dwight Hoskins, light heavyweight.

Against Amarillo, Lockney will pit such seasoned performers as the slender undefeated Byron Ford; Chester Pyle, fly-weight; Delbert Dagley, capable southpaw featherweight; hard hitting Melvin Visage, welterweight; and the greatly improved Dunae Byars, light

### WPA WORKERS TO BE USED ON FARMS

No man or woman who can earn a living as a farm laborer will remain unemployed on a WPA project in Texas, H.P. Drought, State Administrator declared yesterday.

"This year with the inroads which have been made in the farm labor supply by the draft and defense industry employment, farmers are already anticipating shortages in many parts of Texas. This agency is on the alert more than ever to make every man, woman and child on our rolls instantly available for farm work." WPA's Texas employment quota has been reduced this month to 53,500 workers in Texas and another 28,600 persons are destitute, unable to find jobs, and waiting assignment to WPA projects, he reported. Every man and woman among these 28,600 persons who is physically able to make a living on a farm is available right now and will continue to be available as long as he or she is registered with WPA.

"All that a farmer has to do to get as many of these workers as he can use is to apply to any WPA administrative or supervisory official in his vicinity or the United States Employment Service representative in his county.

Declaring that it has been the well known policy of the Works Projects Administration since its inception that no person can be given employment by WPA if he refuses a reasonable offer of employment from any other source. Drought pointed out that entire projects have been shut down when necessary to furnish farm workers in the past and that this will be done at any time that the need for such action is demonstrated. \*\*\*\*\*

"Reading Roundup." This was done to promote reading and using the Library. The Elementary Library was presented a check from P.T.A. for the number of books read.

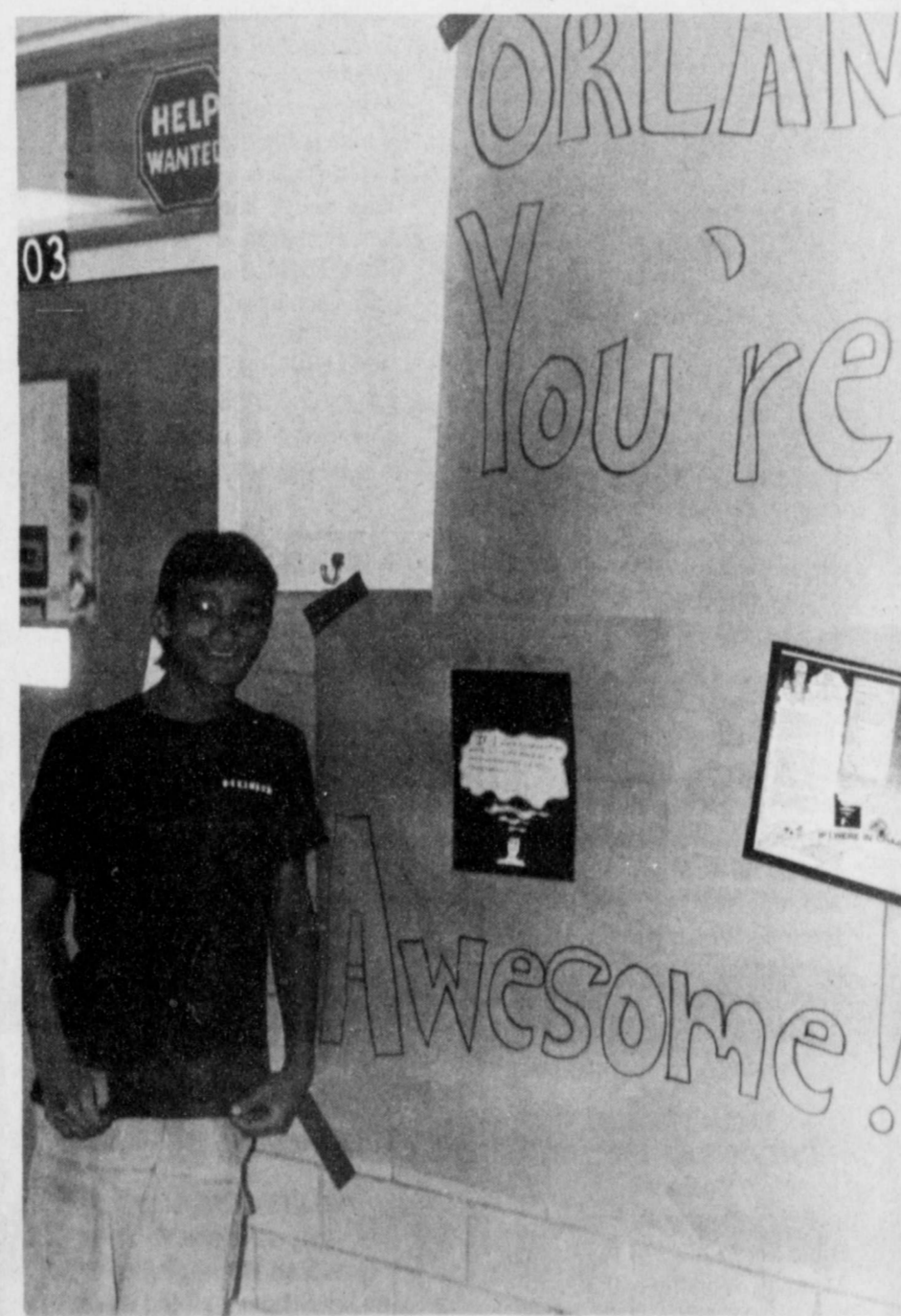

Five posters were selected to be included in the Gallery of Winners. There were over five hundred entries sent in for judging.

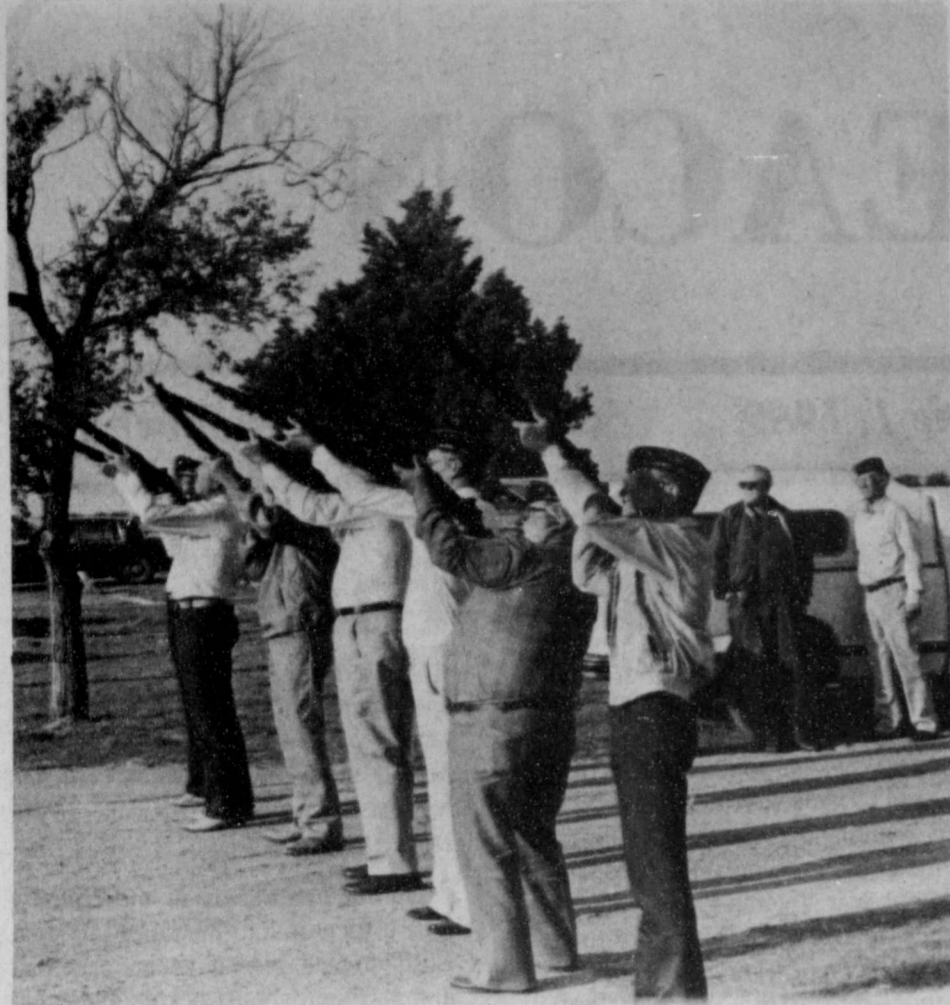

## Comprehensive health bill passes Senate

A comprehensive health care bill designed to address a desperate situation in the state's rural areas has won overwhelming approval from the Texas Senate.

House Bill 18, sponsored in the Senate by Sen. Chet Brooks and myself, contains a number of important measures stemming from a study by The Special task Force on Rural Health Care Delivery that was created in June 1987. The study concluded that health care in Texas is in crisis, and the situation is getting worse.

HB 18 is a big step in addressing the problem, and is undoubtedly the most comprehensive rural health care bill ever approved by the Legislature.

Senate Bill 1107, another rural health initiative I sponsored, was included under HB 18.

Inclusion of the SB 1107 provision means that physicians and hospitals can obtain enhanced Medicare and Medicaid reimbursement by taking advantage of the federal Rural Health Clinic Services Act passed by U. S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen.

Comptroller Bob Bullock has estimated at least \$4 million per year in additional Medicare funds could flow into Texas once this Act is imple-

mented. This increase in federal funds would not require additional state expenditures and would go directly to clinics and other service providers.

Also under this provision, clinics may become certified in areas where no health care now exists.

Some of the other vital measures included in HB 18 are provisions that allow for creation of a center of rural health initiatives at the Texas Department of Health, measures that address emergency hospital transfers and provide liability relief to physicians, and a provision requiring medical schools to incorporate a clerkship in family practice during the third clinical year.

HB 18, which is supported by the Texas Medical Association, Texas Nurses Association, Texas Rural Health Association, American Association of Retired Persons, Texas Association of Community Health Centers, and many others, now goes to the governor for his signature.

## Beware of heat exhaustion during summer activities

When temperatures begin to rise, many sports enthusiasts like to get outdoors and enjoy the sunshine. However, over-doing it in hot weather could cause a potentially dangerous condition known as heat exhaustion. Heat exhaustion occurs when the body loses essential fluids faster than it is able to replenish them.

Rick Hartwig, director of the Cardiac Rehabilitation Centre at Methodist Hospital, offers the following tips on how to avoid heat exhaustion. First, drink plenty of fluids while exercising outdoors. If you are sweating profusely, you should drink a mixture of equal parts of tomato juice and water. This combination not only replaces water that the body needs, but also replenishes salt and other fluids the body requires to function properly.

In addition, Hartwig advises wearing clothing which allows the body to "breathe," such as cool cottons.

Symptoms of heat exhaustion include:

- \* a throbbing headache
- \* nausea
- \* pale skin color
- \* chills
- \* unsteadiness
- \* fatigue
- \* "clammy" feeling skin
- \* profuse perspiration
- \* hair erection on chest and upper arms

If any of these symptoms develop during or after physical exercise, you should seek medical attention, Hartwig said.

## Reading Laboratory schedules summer sessions at Tech

Summer sessions for the Reading Laboratory, a program that offers assessments of reading difficulties and individual tutoring, begins June 8. The lab is a sub-division of the College of Education at Texas Tech University.

The lab is for students in grades kindergarten through 12 who have reading problems or who need additional reading motivation. Students who have been diagnosed as learning disabled or dyslexic also may be admitted to the program.

An initial mini-diagnosis is required of all new clients who have not attended tutoring sessions during the prior six months. The series of tests identifies specific reading problems, strengths and weaknesses. An individual tutoring plan is developed based on the results of the tests.

Tutors for the sessions are graduate students or advanced undergraduate students in reading education. They evaluate a student's particular need and utilize a teaching technique that is best suited for that child.

Director Lester Butler said that in addition to developing reading skills, the Reading Lab emphasizes building students' self-confidence as readers and developing a love of reading.

The Reading Lab operates during two summer sessions — June 8-July 13 and July 19-August 17. Scheduling options include: Monday through Thursdays, Mondays and Wednesdays, or Tuesdays and Thursdays. Four time options are available: three in the morning and one in the early afternoon. Tutoring sessions are in the Administration/Education Building, Room 223.

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## Home improvement con-artists hit South Plains

One or more teams of the "Irish gang" of home improvement schemers are operating in the South Plains area. These professional con-artists travel the country taking consumers for hundreds of thousands of dollars each year. Operating from mobile home parks, the gang seeks out victims for their asphalt driveway scam. They approach the target and state that they have an extra load of asphalt that they will have to haul off unless they can unload it locally. In order to avoid having to haul the material off, they are willing to give the

consumer a "great deal." This great deal costs the consumer from \$2-4,000. The workmanship and materials are reportedly very sub-standard. Most of the victims have been seniors, especially widows.

Another similar scam operating locally involves painting contractors using watered down paints. Consumers that are approached or that have had dealings with the gang are asked to contact either the Attorney General's office (747-5238) or the Better Business Bureau (763-0459 or 800-692-4466).

## "Extended warranties" may only extend your costs

The Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division has received numerous complaints about "extended warranty" contracts on new and used cars. Complaints include the following:

\*Slow service. Extended warranties often involve a "warranty company" that must approve claims for major repairs before the work is done. Sometimes it takes days for the claims representative to inspect the automobile.

\*Claims denied for technical reasons. Claims have been denied because the repairs, although covered by the warranty, were completed before they were authorized by the warranty company's representative. In other cases, covered repairs have been refused because they were not reported within the time required by the contract.

\*Limited coverage. Some extended warranties cover only very limited parts or problems.

Despite these problems, comprehensive extended warranties issued by reliable dealers can help make repair costs more predictable. Before buying an extended warranty or service contract, consumers should carefully consider the cost, what is covered, and how claims are paid.

### Buy What You Need.

\*If the car comes with a warranty, an extended warranty or a service contract may involve a costly duplication of coverage. Carefully compare both contracts before buying a second one.

\*If you are buying a used car, watch out for a clause saying that only defective parts are covered. Chances are that all defective parts were replaced under the original warranty. To be worth much, the "extended warranty" must also cover the failure of non-defective parts.

\*An "extended warranty" may cover only specific repairs. Without some coverage of major mechanical repairs, the policy may not be worth the cost.

### Read The Fine Print.

\*Does the extended warranty cover what the dealer promised? If not, do not sign it. Get all promises in writing.

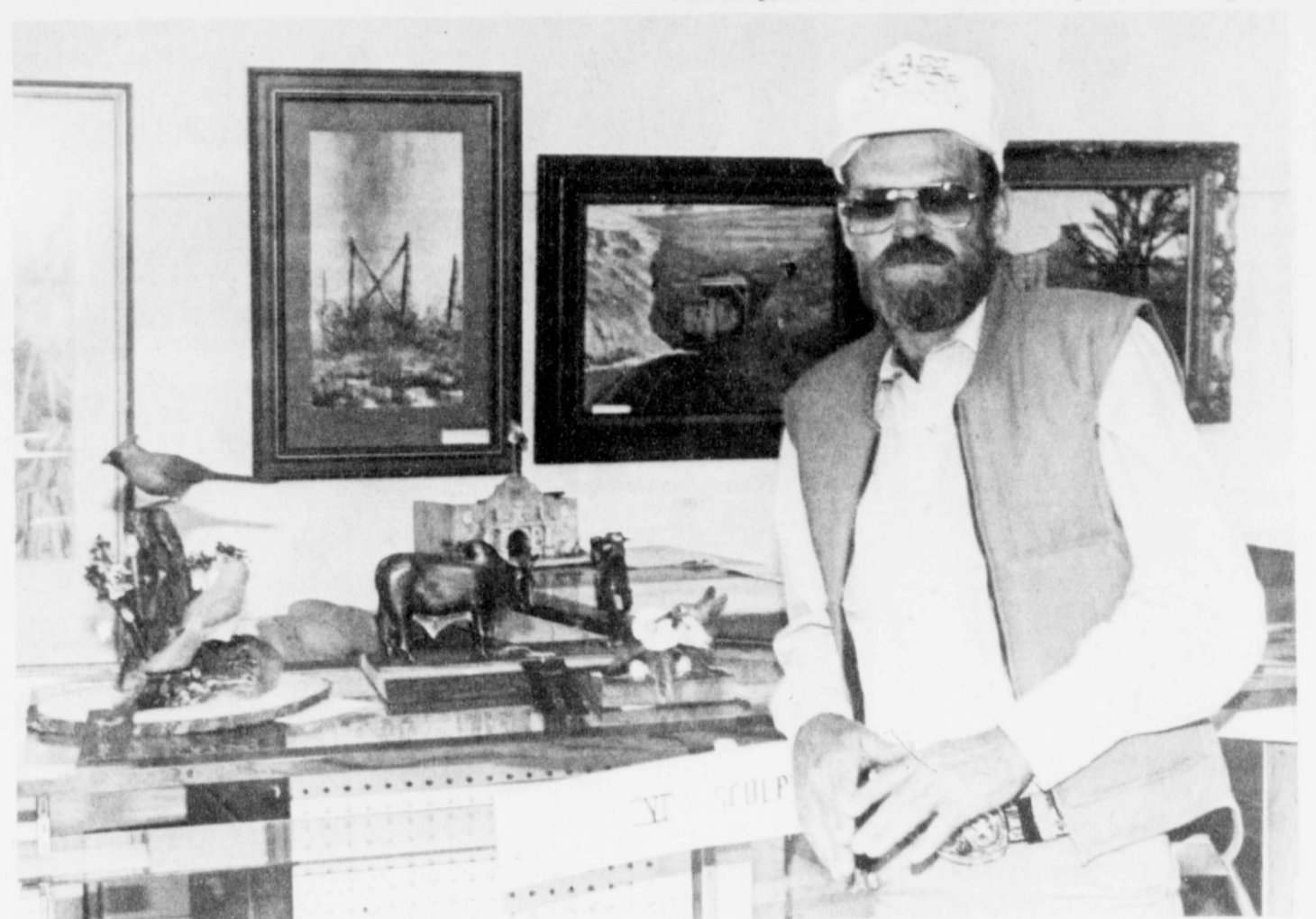
\*Many "extended warranties" are actually service contracts between you and your dealer. If the "warranty company" does not pay a valid claim you should look to your dealer for payment and repair.

\*Extended warranties often have "deductible" amounts. Some have a charge for each service visit and may not completely cover towing or rental car expenses. There may be transfer and cancellation charges.

\*There may be consumer requirements. Some dealers refuse to honor a contract if the car owner doesn't have receipts to prove the car had regular maintenance. Extended warranties will not pay claims caused by misuse and negligence.

\*Some contracts require that all repairs and services be done by the dealer who sold the car. Consider the possibility that problems may develop while you are traveling or after you move from the area.

If you have a complaint about an extended warranty or any other consumer problem, call your nearest Consumer Protection Office in Austin, Dallas, El Paso, Houston, Lubbock, McAllen, or San Antonio. The Attorney General's Office is the people's law firm. We're here to help you.

## Texas starts new quest for "One Deathless Day"

Every day for the past 12 years, somebody has died in a Texas traffic accident.

George R. Gustafson, a spokesperson for the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts and president of Texas Safety Association, wants to break that record in the summer of 1989.

"May 27, the Saturday before Memorial Day, marks the beginning of the 101 Driving Days of Summer," Gustafson said on May 26. "We want to see at least one day without a traffic death before the summer ends on Labor Day, September 4."

January 5, 1977, was the last time Texas made it through a day without a single traffic fatality, according to Department of Public Safety records.

"We tried to break that losing streak last summer with our 1988 "One Deathless Day" campaign," said Gustafson. "We didn't make it, so we're trying again."

Part of the challenge of "One Deathless Day" in Texas is the sheer size of the territory. Residents and visitors travel over 150 billion highway miles each year. "We're a high-traffic state, which puts us at high risk. But we still are not doing everything we can to minimize that risk," Gustafson said.

"Last summer, we had three days with only three deaths apiece. That was as close as we got to a deathless day," he said. "We had a total of 982 fatalities for the entire 101 days — an average of 9.7 deaths per day!"

"Faced with these figures, it's hard to imagine why 40% of our drivers still don't wear safety belts, almost half of

our infants and toddlers ride unprotected, and people still drive under the influence of alcohol and drugs," said Gustafson. "However, reports from Texas Transportation Institute and the DPS indicate this is not the case."

The coalition spokesperson noted that these are areas where individual Texans can make a difference, simply by chang-

ing their own habits or talking to their families and friends.

"The Texas coalition is part of the '70 by 90 Accord,' a group of organizations striving to achieve 70% correct use of safety belts and child seats by 1990," he said. "We have only seven months to go. If we can reach our 70% usage goal during the 101 days of summer, we may still see that deathless day."

## Children and how they handle grief

When a family member dies, children react differently from adults.

Preschool children usually see death as temporary and reversible. Children between the ages 5 and 9 begin to think more like adults about death, yet they still never believe it will happen to them, according to Dr. Alex K. Munson, chief of the Psychiatric Section at Methodist Hospital.

Adding to a child's shock and confusion at the death of a brother, sister or parent, is the unavailability of other family members who may be so shaken by grief that they are not able to cope with the normal responsibility of childcare.

Parents should be aware of normal childhood responses to death in the family, says Munson. During the weeks following the death, some children feel little immediate grief or persist in the belief that the family member is still alive. But, long-term denial of the death or avoidance of the grief is unhealthy.

Munson advises that a child who is frightened about attending the funeral not be forced to go; however, some

service or observance is recommended, such as lighting a candle, saying a prayer or visiting the grave site.

Once children accept the death, they are likely to display their feelings of sadness on and off over a long period of time. Munson advises that the surviving relative spend as much time as possible with the child, making it clear the child has permission to show his/her feelings openly.

Munson also adds that the child who has lost someone close to him/her may show anger as a natural reaction. The anger may be revealed in boisterous play, nightmares or irritability. Often the child will show anger toward the surviving family members.

Danger signals to watch for in a child whose close relative has died are:

- \*An extended period of depression in which the child loses interest in daily activities and events;
- \*Any inability to sleep, loss of appetite, prolonged fear of being alone;
- \*Acting much younger for an extended period;
- \*Excessively imitating the dead per-

son or repeated statements of wanting to join the dead person;

- \*Withdrawal from friends;
- \*A sharp drop in school performance or refusal to attend school.

These warning signals indicate that the child may be having serious problems as a result of a death and professional help is advised.
