## Lockney council votes to sign landfill contract

The Lockney City Council unanimously voted to sign the landfill contract with the Floyd County Commissioners' Court during the city council's regular meeting on June 8. Mayor Dan Smith read the letter that he had written that accompanied the contract. Also read was the contract and the minutes of Commissioners' Court concerning the contract.

The council discussed the fact that the commissioners had changed the terms for paying the annual fee. The contract called for an annual fee of \$2,000 and the lump sum payment was changed to twelve monthly payments of \$166.67.

Mayor Dan Smith called Judge Bill Hardin and asked him why the change had been made. Hardin told Smith that the commissioners had decided to do so because there was a possibility that the Lockney landfill would be closed when the new state health department regulations go into effect in 1991, and that the commissioners felt it would be better to pay on a month-to-month basis.

After the phone call there was more discussion on the contract. The city council had been told by the commissioners numerous times that they would only agree to sign the original contract, and that they could only agree to do for Lockney what they did for Floydada. However, when the City of Lockney gave in to all the county's demands, the county still did not live up to their agreement. The contract now reads that the Commissioners' Court will pay Lockney monthly payments whereas Floydada receives yearly payments.

In order to finalize the landfill controversy once and for all the city council voted unanimously to accept the commissioners' latest demands. The council voted to pass an ordinance permitting only trash generated inside the City of Lockney to be placed in the dumpsters (see ordinance elsewhere in Beacon).

Complaints have been made that grass is being dumped in the dumpsters without being bagged and everyone is reminded that the ordinance calls for all trash to be bagged.

In the next item of business, A.C. Bowden, representing A.C. Bowden Construction, came before the board to give the engineering report on the paving of Lavada Street in southwest Lockney. He gave a breakdown on the price per lot. The board was told that the spec

called for triple service rather than hot mix to match what has been used on the portion of the street that has already been paved. Bids will be called for prior to the July 6 meeting and those received will be opened at the July 6 meeting of the city council. The property owners will pay for the paving of the street and the city will pay the engineering charge of \$2,200.

Jerry Johnson met with the council and was presented a plaque for the years he served on the council.

Johnson presented a proposal on the 9-1-1 emergency system.

He asked that a resolution be passed authorizing the Southwestern Bell Telephone to begin charging their telephone customers fifty cents per line per month for the installation of the 9-1-1 system in Floyd County.

This system will cost approximately \$24,600 initially and when the money is collected, the system will be installed. The system is expected to be installed in 1991.

Johnson showed the council a map detailing the areas to be covered. They include Floyd and Motley Counties.

Emergency calls will ring in the sheriff's office in Floydada. The phone will be monitored 24 hours a day. The caller's phone number will automatically come up on the screen and will stay there until the dispatcher disconnects it. In case of prank calls, the number will be locked in on the screen until it is traced.

Calls that originate in the Lockney area will also ring on the Lockney Fire Department phone.

The council was in unanimous agreement that the resolution be passed.

Two buildings have been moved into Lockney which do not meet building codes. The individuals will receive a letter from Paul Lyle, City Attorney, stating what has to be done to bring them in compliance with city ordinances.

The council agreed that permits will be issued for the pouring of foundations and the building to be moved in must meet the building inspection code before it is moved onto the location. Trailer houses must meet the building inspection code before they are moved onto the lot.

A request was made for a street light at the corner of College and Third Street (Third Street does not go through, making it a long block.) The council voted to

## Father's Day traditions observed

June is the month of graduations and roses, and it is also the month in which we honor fathers. Father's Day is popularly celebrated in the United States and Canada with special greetings and special gifts.

The idea of Father's Day was suggested 80 years ago by Mrs. John Bruce Dodd, who felt that men like her own father deserved a day of recognition and gratitude. Her father, William Smart, a Civil War veteran, had been widowed when his daughter and five sons were very young. Realization of the difficulties he must have had raising his young, motherless family on a farm in eastern Washington and appreciation of his constant devotion to his family, sparked Mrs. Dodd's desire to honor all fathers.

As a joint venture between Mrs. Dodd, the Spokane Ministerial Association, Spokane Ministers Alliance and city YMCA, the first Father's Day was celebrated in Spokane on the third Sunday of June - the month of her father's birth - in 1910. The actual date for the first Father's Day observance was June 19.

Among the first notables to endorse Mrs. Dodd's ideas was the orator and political leader William Jennings Bryan. He complimented her on the inspiration of Father's Day and remarked that "too much emphasis cannot be placed upon the relationship between parent and child."

The observance of Father's Day did not spread rapidly, but as celebrations were increasingly publicized, a growing number of cities and states began observing the event and a national movement was formed to have Father's Day

proclaimed a national holiday. In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson took part in a Father's Day celebration by pressing a button in his Washington office that unfurled a flag in Spokane.

Congress did not give Father's Day national holiday status until 1972, when President Richard M. Nixon signed a congressional resolution establishing Father's Day as a national holiday to be

celebrated on the third Sunday in June each year. Father's Day is also celebrated in at least 20 foreign countries, although not necessarily on the same day as in the United States.

The rose is the official Father's Day flower. A white rose for remembrance and a red rose as a tribute to a living father.

This year, Father's Day is June 18.

## June sales tax rebate posts decline

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that local sales tax allocations to cities, counties and transit authorities across the state increased 14.2 percent during the first half of 1989, compared to the first half of 1988.

Checks totaling \$66.3 million were sent Friday to 875 cities that impose local sales tax at either one or one and one-half percent, Bullock said.

Bullock added that the June 1988 monthly allocation was unusually large, so this month's payments compared to June 1988 payments may appear to be slightly lower than they actually are.

"The best indicator of sales tax rebate trends is the year-to-date totals. One payment won't give as accurate a comparison as six payments," Bullock said.

June's checks represent taxes collected in April by monthly fliers and reported to the Comptroller's office by May 22.

Floyd County's 1989 total payments to date are \$95,782.15, and increase of 28.01 percent over 1988 payment to date of \$74,821.45.

Lockney's net payment this period is \$2,762.50, a decrease of -35.36 percent over the \$4,273.62 of last year at the same time. The 1989 payment to date of Lockney is \$38,989.84; an increase of 58.03% over the 1988 payment to same date of \$24,672.85.

Floydada shows a net payment this year of \$8,265.46 compared to \$6,728.26 last year same time. This represents an increase of 22.85 percent. 1989 payment to date for Floydada alone is, \$56,597.31; an increase of 13.25% over 1988 payment of \$50,148.60.

Crosby County had a county wide total decrease of -2.14 percent from the 1988 payment to date of \$66,286.36 to the 1989 payment of \$64,864.62. The net payment this period from Crosby County was \$6,259.81, a drop of -45.79 percent from 1988 net payment of \$11,548.18.

Hale County also showed an increase of 23.60 percent for the payments to date. The 1988 payment to date was \$860,956.26, and the 1989 payment to

date is \$1,064,106.29. There has been a drop in the net payment this period compared to the same time last year. The county dropped -8.24 percent from the 1988 net payment of \$143,461.30 to the 1989 payment of \$131,643.47.

Along with Floyd County, Swisher County showed an increase all the way around. The 1989 payment to date is \$157,831.32, an increase of 59.31 percent from the 1988 payment to date of \$99,071.57. The net payment this period for Swisher County was up 14.63 percent; from the 1988 net payment of \$12,619.45 to the 1989 net payment this period of \$14,466.13.

Lubbock County showed an increase of 10.21 percent. The 1988 payment to date was \$7,038,073.53 compared to 1989's \$7,756,557.08. The net payment this year for Lubbock County was \$1,001,438.26, up 3.49 percent, from 1988's \$4,238.49.

check the location and install the light. Kenneth Wofford reported that the water line had been laid on Lavada Street at a cost of \$3,110.00.

J.D. Copeland reported that the access road to the landfill needed to be repaired. All agreed.

It was brought to the council's attention that the roof of the Community Action building had received hail damage. The insurance adjuster adjusted the claim to \$797.00. The councilmen voted to call for bids on repairing the damage to the roof and the interior of the building.

A letter was read from the Floydada Development Corporation on submitting a proposal for a 1000 bed minimum security prison to the Texas Department of Corrections.

The prison would generate approximately 260 jobs and have a monthly payroll of \$460,000. The council will be considering sites between Floydada and Lockney.

Mayor Smith stated that he was pleased that Lockney had been asked to join in the planning.

Councilman Copeland made the motion that Lockney take part in the venture. The motion passed unanimously.

The Council heard the reading of the minutes and the financial statements. A report was made on problems with the computer and Erma Lee Duckworth reported that a representative of the company was coming to check on the problem. Bills were paid and the meeting was adjourned.

### ORDINANCE NO. 260

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LOCKNEY, TEXAS, PROHIBITING THE USE OF CITY OWNED OR PROVIDED TRASH CONTAINERS FOR THE DEPOSIT OF TRASH NOT GENERATED WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY AND NOTICE.**

**WHEREAS**, the City of Lockney contracts with an independent contractor for the providing throughout the city of trash receptacles for use by citizens of Lockney as a means of disposing of trash; and

**WHEREAS**, it is the purpose and intent of the City of Lockney that said trash receptacles by use exclusively for the deposit of trash generated or that originates within the city limits and not for trash brought into the city for the purpose of deposit into said trash receptacles; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council of the City of Lockney deems it to be in the best interest of the citizens of the City of Lockney to prohibit the use of said trash receptacles by persons who bring trash into the city for the purpose of depositing same in city trash receptacles;

**NOW, THEREFORE**, be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Lockney, Texas that:

**Section One.** For purposes of this ordinance, "trash" means all trash, refuse, garbage, and the like, as those terms are generally understood, and as they are defined, used or referred to in other ordinances of the City, including, but not limited to, other ordinances specifically dealing with the use of trash receptacles provided by the City. Trash "generated" within the City or that "originates" within the City, shall mean all trash except that trash brought into the City limits for the purpose of being deposited in trash receptacles provided by the City. "Receptacles" referred to in this ordinance means those trash containers or receptacles, also known as "dumpsters", placed throughout the City by the City, or its independent contractor, for the purpose of receiving trash.

**Section Two.** It shall be a violation of this ordinance for any person knowingly to bring into the City any trash for the purpose of depositing the same into City trash receptacles.

**Section Three.** It shall be a violation of this ordinance for any person to deposit into City trash receptacles any trash not generated or originated within the City limits of the City of Lockney, when such person knows, or in the exercise of ordinary care should know, that such trash was not generated or originated within the City of Lockney, Texas.

**Section Four.** Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction, shall be subject to a fine of not more than \$1,000.00

**Section Five.** It is hereby declared to be the intention of the City Council that the sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses, and phrases of this ordinance are separable, and, if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or section shall be declared unconstitutional or invalid by the valid judgement or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality or invalidity shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, or sections of this ordinance, since the same would have been enacted by the City Council without the incorporation in this ordinance of unconstitutional or invalid phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, or sections.

**Section Six.** This ordinance shall be held and construed to be cumulative to all other ordinances dealing with the same subject matter, except in those instances where the provisions of this ordinance are in conflict with the provisions of ordinances heretofore passed, and all ordinances or parts of ordinances, in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are expressly repealed.

**Section Seven.** This ordinance shall take effect upon its publication in the newspaper as required by law.

## Lyme disease on the rise

Lyme disease, caused by the bite of a deer tick, has captured the attention of health officials and researchers nationwide.

In 1988, the number of Lyme disease cases increased to over 5,000 more than double the number reported in 1987. Now, the disease has spread to 43 states.

Deer ticks infected with a spiral-shaped bacterium, or spirochete, are the problem. The spirochete is transmitted to humans and animals while the tick is attached to the host to get a blood meal.

The tick can only transmit Lyme disease when feeding, usually in the mild weather during spring, summer and early fall.

Unlike some biting insects, the tick doesn't fly, jump or drop onto prospective hosts; it simply stays at the end of tall grasses or other vegetation waiting to encounter a suitable host.

Prevention of Lyme disease remains the most important step in curbing its incidence until a vaccine is discovered. Dr. Roger Grothaus, medical entomologist and head of the OFF! Biting Insect Team, emphasizes, "There is certainly no reason to panic. Outdoor lovers should continue to enjoy warm weather activities, but they should take some simple precautions to help protect themselves." Since the tiny size of the tick can make detection difficult, use the following prevention routine to keep ticks from attaching themselves to your body:

\*Wear light-colored clothing that makes the dark ticks more visible.

\*Tightly woven clothing makes it more difficult for ticks to hold onto you.

\*Wear a collared shirt with long sleeves tucked into pants and long pants tucked into high socks to keep ticks from crawling under your clothing when spending time in woods or areas with tall grass.

\*Hunters! Wear a hat, gloves and

boots, and tape your boots to your pants for extra protection.

\*Protect any exposed skin by applying DEET-containing insect repellent thoroughly (avoiding lips and eyes). DEET (N-diethyl-metolouamide) is the only repellent effective against ticks that can be used both on skin and clothing. Thorough spreading increases its effectiveness.

\*Use a DEET-containing insect repellent spray labeled effective against ticks such as Deep Woods OFF! to help keep ticks off clothing. (Avoid spraying synthetic fabrics). Treat clothing openings such as cuffs and arm holes.

\*Check frequently for ticks while outdoors. After an outing, look for ticks on your clothing or gear. You should also take a shower or bath and examine your entire body, especially hair, scalp and back of neck.

\*Check pets carefully. They carry ticks into the home.

Sometimes, despite every precaution, Lyme disease strikes. In many cases, the first sign of infection is a rash appearing after a tick bite. It is usually bright red and circular, accompanied by headache, fatigue, low-grade fever and aching muscles and joints. If any of these symptoms occur, consult your physician. Most cases are treated successfully with antibiotics.

### Insect Zappers

Researchers have discovered that many plants have insect-zapping capability. *National Wildlife* magazine reports members of the sunflower family, including daisies and marigolds, produce chemicals that are poisonous to insects. When these chemicals sop up sunlight they become highly toxic. But their poison loses its punch in the dark. One plant pesticide is more toxic to mosquito larvae than the outlawed chemical DDT.

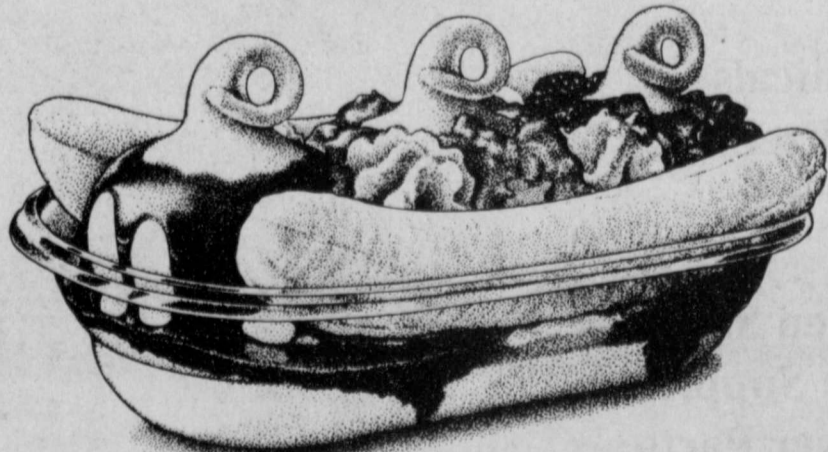

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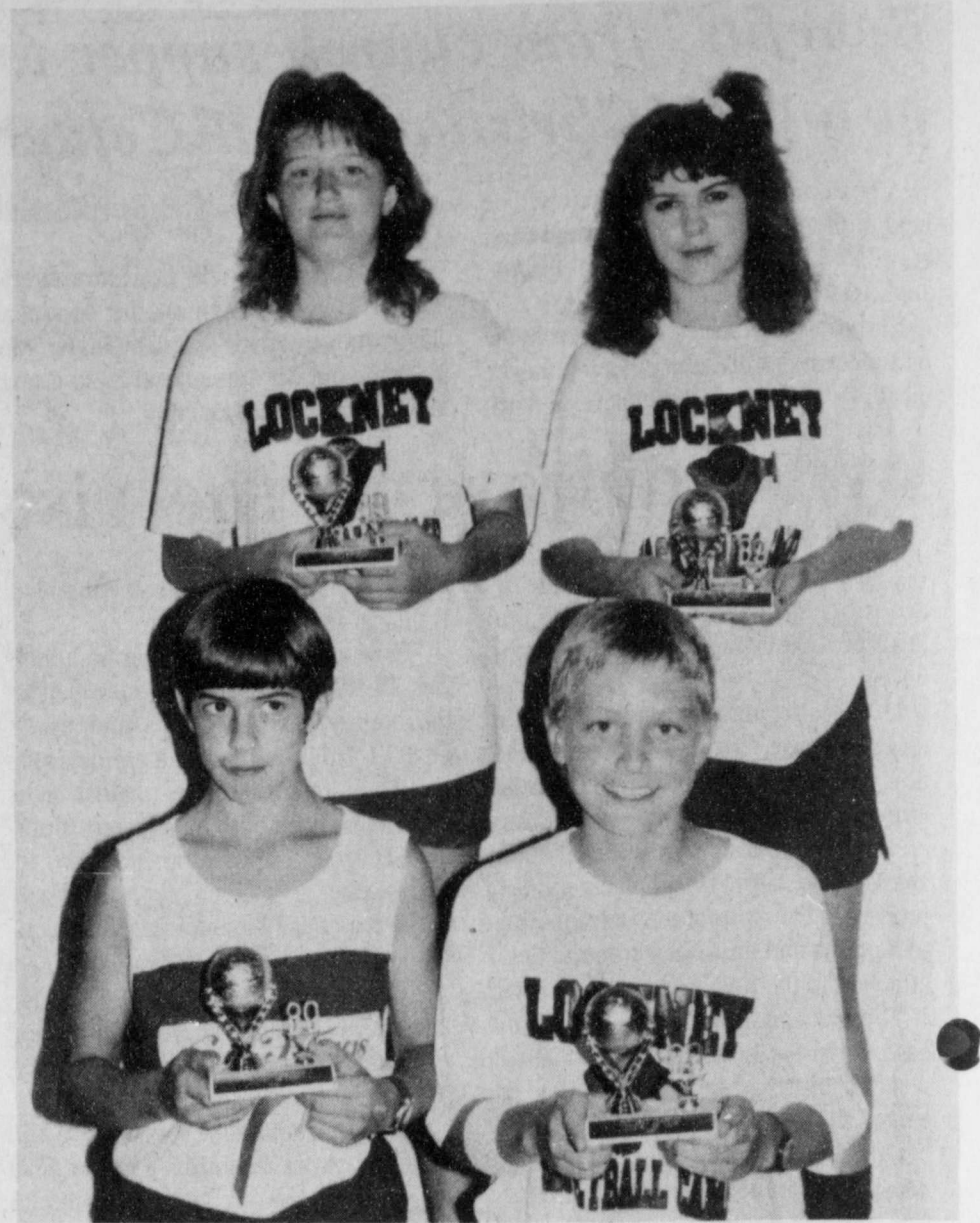
