LISD sets tax rate at 75 cents

Lockney School Board met on Monday, August 28, for the purpose of setting the tax rate and amending the 1988-89 budget.

Board members were called to order at 7:30 p.m. and adopted a resolution raising the tax rate from 72 cents to 75 cents. The 75 cent tax rate will generate \$557,002.00 in local tax dollars for the school system.

The newly approved tax rate is 6.67% above the effective tax rate which would have meant \$530,344 in usable funds for the district.

Expected expenditures for the 1989-90 school year are \$3,003,269. These expenses include replacing the heating and air conditioning at the elementary

school. The total local and state revenue is estimated at \$2,699,598.

1988-89 BUDGET AMENDED

After adopting the increased tax rate, board members closed the special called meeting and reconvened at 7:45 p.m. to amend the 1988-89 budget.

This budget, which ends August 31,

1989, was amended to a total of \$2,905,996 including \$253,070 in federal program expenditures.



Aston and Ellison attend inservice

Treena Aston and Julie Ellison, teachers at Lockney High School, participated in the State Inservice Conference for the professional development of vocational home economics teachers in Dallas August 14-17, 1989, at the Hyatt Regency DFW Hotel. More than 2800 teachers from school districts all across the state attended the three-and-one-half day conference.

The conference, coordinated by the Vocational Home Economics Education Division of the Texas Education Agency, focused on new content in the home economics program as set forth in the Master Plan for Vocational Education. Twenty-nine concurrent sessions provided teachers with the foundation to effectively include the new concepts in all areas of instruction in home econom-

ics education. Content, approaches, background, research and strategies for teaching were covered by well-known experts from across the nation. Topics addressed included innovative ways to help students develop a healthy self esteem; developing a work ethic among young people; the impact of marketing programs on buying practices; computerized design and production of apparel; the consumer in the marketplace; prevention of illness through good nutrition; successful programs for the handicapped; child care training; impact of Texas family law on the family; working with school-age parents; strategies for teaching money management; matching teaching styles to learning styles; future projections related to housing; and positive outcomes with the at-risk student.

Nationally-known speakers highlighted three general sessions. Topics included an address on changes impacting the family and its members and how these changes are impacting education and society by Dr. Victoria Bergin, Deputy Commissioner, Texas Education Agency. Sandy Queen, Founder and Director of Lifeworks, Columbia, MD., forcefully brought home the message "you've got to reach them to teach them." Stress management experts Bob and Jane Handy, of Dallas, discussed the balanced approach teachers must

have to their own lives in order to provide what students need to see and experience for productive learning. Closing the conference Don Reynolds, founder of 21st Century Forecasting, looked into the future at the world in which today's students will be living and the skills they will need.

"Vocational home economics hardly resembles the homemaking classes of just a few years ago," said Bobbye Dennis, president of the vocational Home Economics Teachers Association of Texas (VHETAT). Dennis said that today's vocational home economics includes courses in life management skills, advanced food science and nutrition, apparel design, consumer economics, interior design, family finance, parenting education, child development, to name a few of the areas of instruction. In addition, vocational home economics teachers train students to enter the working world by giving them skills in jobs such as fashion design, hospitality services, child care, and entrepreneurship. Students also learn how to manage the dual role of wage earner and homemaker. Vocational home economics teaches "Skills for a Lifetime." A video by the same title, "Skills for a Lifetime" has been produced by the VHETAT to help the public better understand the new face of home economics.

TDHS surveys need for health, human services

The Texas Department of Human Services is conducting a survey to help identify the health and human service needs of Texas residents.

The survey, known as the 1989 Special Texas Census, is being conducted by mail and involves more than 38,000 households, including more than 11,000 Spanish surname households. In addition to basic demographic data such as age, sex and race, the survey collects information on each respondent's income, health insurance coverage, employment status, child-care needs and disabilities. The results will be used to support the department's budget and planning process and ensure more efficient use of tax dollars.

Households to be surveyed received letters from Governor Bill Clements the week of August 21, announcing the survey and requesting prompt return of questionnaires. Follow-up efforts by the department's Budget and Data Analysis Division will also encourage households to complete and return their questionnaires to ensure a representative sample. The sample is designed to provide valid data statewide, regionally and in selected metropolitan areas.

Data collection will continue through October. A toll-free number is provided for respondents to get further information or help with filling out their questionnaires.

The survey is similar to one conducted in 1985. The information gathered then was widely used for department budget and planning purposes, including preparing a legislative appropriation request and supporting the need for health and human services. The data was also used by many other state agencies and legislative task forces.

Focus on parish activities

The focus has been placed on four areas of parish activity. They are the Sunday Mass Celebrations and a prayer network, large group events, take home activities for families, shut-ins, etc., and small sharing groups.

Heading the PARISH RENEW CORE GROUPS will be Libby Delgado and Sr. Marilyn Rose, as chairpersons, they will implement the RENEW program at San Jose de Calasanz. Heading the various groups with them will be the core group of the parish and committee leaders. The leaders are Maria Elena Arellano, Prayer Network and Sunday Liturgy; Fela Castro, Take Home Materials; Efrén and Maria Perez, Large Group Activities and Sign-up Sunday; Key to the RENEW program, and as a result of early tests of both concept and materials, is a Small Group coordinating committee headed by Lupe and Pat Gonzales. This committee bears the overall responsibility for the selection, composition, and training of small group leaders.

Recruitment for participants will be the responsibility of the Telephone, Sign-up Sunday, and Home Visit Committees. Telephone and Publicity






