

Police investigating several Lockney business burglaries

Lockney merchants were victims of a burglary rampage, Tuesday night, September 19, or early Wednesday morning. Five businesses were burglarized on or adjacent to Main Street and a reward is being offered for information on the crimes.

At approximately 4:45 a.m. Lockney police received a report of an alarm at Davis Lumber, located at 102 E. Shurbet being activated. Sgt. Jerry Edwards, with Lockney Police Department arrived within a couple of minutes and found the back door open. Edwards felt

the burglars may have still been inside the building and called for assistance from Floydada police to help search the building. No one was found inside during the search. "I feel like Sgt. Edwards came very close to catching them," said Police Chief Leonard Gilroy.

There was nothing missing inside Davis Lumber, but police reported that an attempt was made to get into the safe. The office and file cabinets were also ransacked. Entry was made into the building by prying open the back door.

It was not until later on in the morning, as Lockney businesses opened their doors, that police discovered that there had been several burglaries during the night.

One after the other, calls starting coming in to police. Four other businesses, besides Davis Lumber, had also had their doors pryed open and their offices ransacked. Also burglarized were: Mission Cable, 116 S. Main; SPS, 112 N. Main; Lambert Feed & Seed, 720 S. Main; and Kountry Video, 101 S. Main. Kountry Video was the only businesses that appeared to have nothing disturbed inside.

"It appears the burglars were only interested in cash. Nothing was taken from any of the businesses," said Edwards.

"A reward of up to \$400.00 is being offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible for these burglaries," said Chief Gilroy. "Burglary is a 2nd degree felony. Each offense can carry a sentence of not more than 20 years confinement in TDC and not less than 2 years. Also a person can be punished by a fine not to exceed \$10,000 on each burglary."

LISD board given enrollment figures for 1989-90

The Lockney Independent School District met for their regular monthly meeting on September 21, at 7:30 p.m.

An enrollment report was given by the principals of each school. Seven hundred and fifty-nine students have enrolled in Lockney schools this year. This is an increase of 27 students over the 1988-89 year.

An ethnic breakdown by campus was also provided to the school board. It is listed as follows:

LOCKNEY ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

A total of 409 students. Thirty six percent of the student body is anglo, 58% are Hispanic and 6% are Black.

A total of 186 students enrolled. Thirty two percent of the student body is anglo, 63% are Hispanic and .04% are Black. There is one student classified as Asian in the sixth grade and another in the seventh, comprising .01% of the student body.

One hundred and sixty seven students are enrolled. Seventy-two percent of the student body is anglo, 88% are Hispanic, 3.4% are Black. One student in the senior class is classified as Asian, representing .6% of the student body.

Board members also approved the ESL (English as a Second Language program) report. Twenty three students, K-12 grade students were identified as limited English speaking. The school is required to provide ESL assistance to anyone in this category.

A progress report was given on the heating and air-conditioning work being done at the elementary school. As of Thursday, more than three-fourths of the system was in operation and should be completed by the end of the week. The roofing on the elementary school should also be done by the early part of the week and then the roofers will move to the junior high and high school.

Superintendent Hallmark informed the board members that HB 82 was passed in the last legislative session and the bill sets up new criteria for taxing personal property. From now on public hearings will have to be set instead of simply passing a resolution as has been done in the past. The hearing on taxing personal property will be held in January. Personal property includes vehicles, travel trailers, boats and airplanes.

"We have already been taxing these items," said Hallmark. "The taxable value of personal property in Lockney ISD is \$4,357,403. If Lockney ISD did not tax personal property, they would lose a little over \$32,000 in actual tax dollars, and we would then have to make it up some place else."

Because of football season, the board members decided to change the time of the monthly board meetings to 8:00 p.m., instead of 7:30 p.m. They will continue to meet on the second Thursday of each month.

Coach Fortenberry came before the board and explained the off season training of the varsity girls basketball. All board members were supportive of the program. Zane Polson, the band director, reported to the directors that the band trip will be held in San Antonio in May. The band will compete in a concert contest.

The resignation of Ann Lee, a junior high classroom aide, was accepted. Laura Wilson was hired to replace Lee.

The school board approved a request from the County Juvenile Department for \$500.00 to help in their administrative costs.

Superintendent Hallmark also informed the school board that they are now required by law to test all the water in the water fountains to make sure there is no lead in the water. The testing will begin soon.

The school board approved the sale of property and will be advertising for bids. Present for the meeting were: Superintendent Dub Hallmark, President Eddie Teeter, Lisa Mosley, D.K. Three contestant correctly selected eight games; they are Dr. Gary Mangold and girls, Wesley Teeter, and Arturo Gonzales.

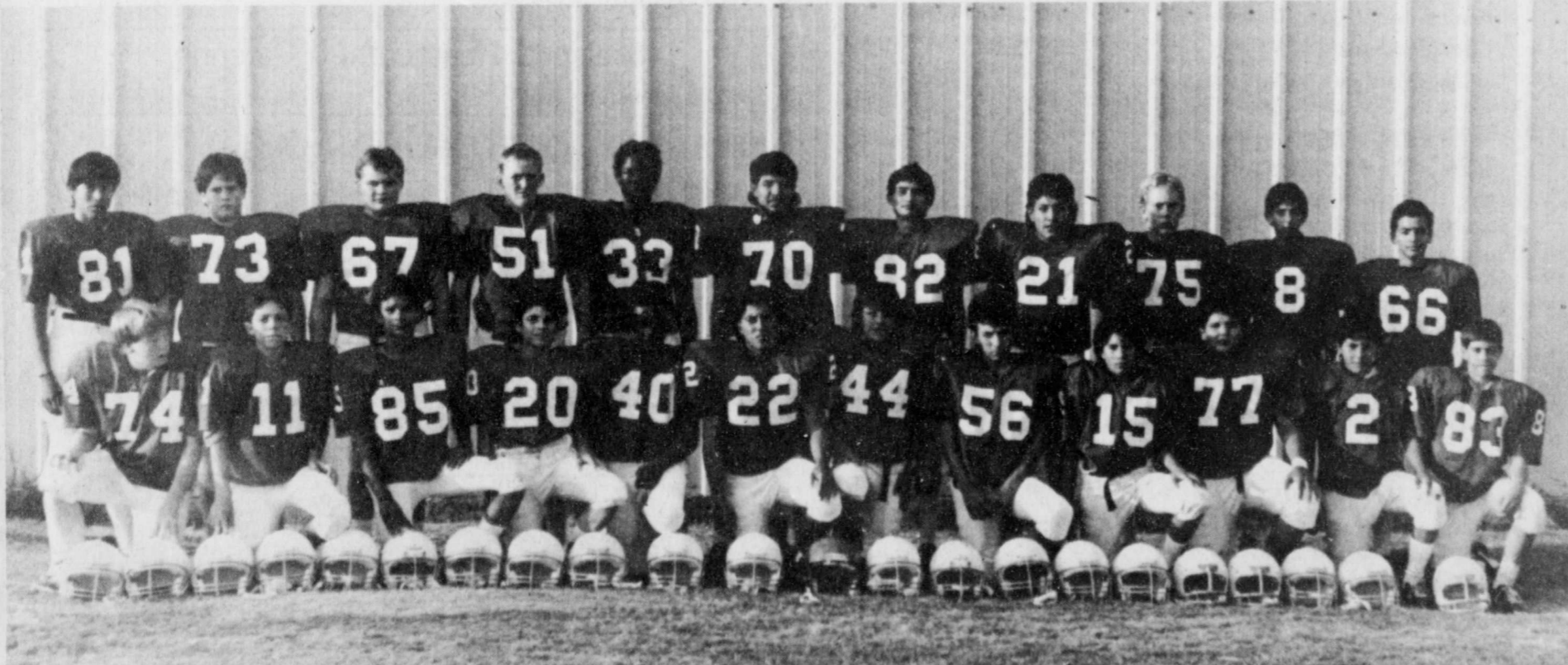

Private endowment to strengthen ag science and FFA programs

Sponsors of an endowment fund to provide private support for agricultural science education in Texas high schools are asking for help, says Brent Crossland, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University.

The Texas FFA Foundation has created an "Endowment for Excellence" to strengthen the agricultural science and FFA leadership programs in the state's high schools. Interest from the fund will provide technical support, scholarships and supplemental materials to expand the classroom course work.

"It sometimes takes just a few special

things to make an already strong program an outstanding one," Crossland said.

The educational base is what has made American agriculture the best in the world, he said.

Each year the high school agriculture programs provide some 60,000 young Texans training in the sciences involved in food and fiber production and environmental concerns, the FFA Foundation reported.

The Texas FFA Foundation is composed of citizens who support the agricultural sciences and FFA leadership training in the secondary schools. Chairman of the

foundation's board is Jerry Clark of Austin, director of legislative affairs for Associated Milk Producers, Inc., and a former state president of FFA.

Chairman of the endowment fund drive is Charles G. Scruggs of Austin. A cattleman with ranches in Texas and Kansas, he is the retired editor-in-chief of "Progressive Farmer" magazine and Progressive Farmer radio network. He is a former state FFA president.

County FFA members and vocational agriculture teachers, along with alumni of the program, will lead the campaign to enroll 250,000 Texans in support of the FFA Endowment for Excellence.

4-H trains youth for leadership roles

Youths across Texas have many opportunities to observe and study others in leadership roles, as well as performing as a leader and role model for other young people.

Among some of these challenging potential leadership assignments are

showing an avid interest in 4-H Club activities and serving as a club officer, said Brent Crossland, county 4-H program coordinator with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

As 4-H members advance through various projects and activities, many

also will have an opportunity to serve on a county or district 4-H Council and later compete for an officer position with one of the youth councils, said Crossland.

At the state level, some 32 youths serve annually on the Texas 4-H Council, which guides and coordinates activities across the 14 districts of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Each year, a new set of young leaders is elected to represent the state's 388,493 4-H Club members.

"Thus, a young person can set a goal to excel in leadership and be a part of some of these exciting efforts," said Crossland.

The Texas 4-H program is the youth leadership development organization of the Extension Service.

Lung Association supports raising age limit to buy tobacco

The American Lung Association of Texas said the law that raises the age to buy tobacco products is the most significant to date that protects young people from the health dangers associated with smoking.

The new law which became effective September 1, prohibits the sale of tobacco products such as cigarettes and chewing tobacco, to persons under the age of eighteen. It changes a law that for ninety years allowed the purchase of tobacco by customers as young as sixteen years of age. It also complements a law in effect for two years that bans student tobacco use of any kind in all Texas public school campuses and at school sanctioned functions.

"Raising the age makes tobacco products less accessible to children," said Edward Carter, managing director of the American Lung Association of Texas. "Making them less accessible protects our children from taking up an addictive habit that is life threatening."

"Ninety percent of all adult smokers today began their nicotine habit by age 16 so this law should have a significant impact on the health of our young people," he added. "Adolescents are not aware of the serious health damage they are creating for themselves when they take that first puff."

The Texas Department of Health recently issued signs to be displayed at points of purchase to remind customers about the new law. These signs have been mandated by the law to discourage violations by merchants and consumers. Lung Association officials hope it will discourage young people from beginning a cigarette habit.

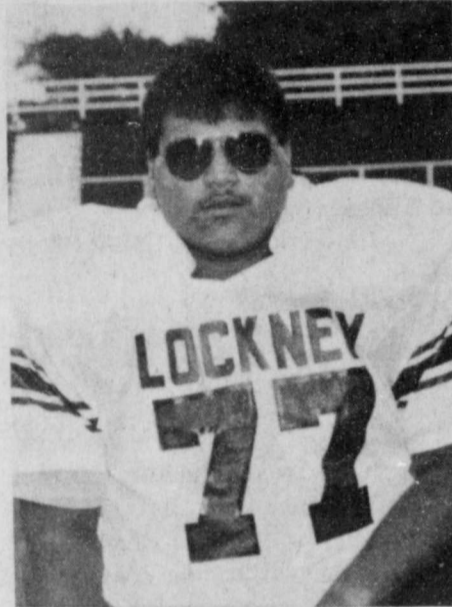
