## Comptroller says permits needed for tax free diesel purchases

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday reminded Texans buying diesel fuel tax-free that state fuels tax permits are needed to comply with the law.

Bullock said that some customers can

buy diesel fuel tax-free in Texas by signing a statement saying that they don't own or operate any diesel-powered vehicles driven on Texas roads. The Comptroller's office provides the

printed statements.

Purchases made in this way are restricted to 2,000 gallons or less at any one time with a monthly limit of 10,000 gallons or less.

The statement becomes invalid if the customer buys or uses any vehicles powered by diesel fuel on Texas highways but taxpayers have a couple of options if that happens, Bullock said.

First, they could pay the fuels tax of 15 cents a gallon and file for a refund with the Comptroller's office. Refunds are given for tax paid on any diesel fuel that wasn't used on Texas roads.

Or, they could prepay the tax to the

Comptroller's office for vehicles weighing 10,000 pounds or less. The cost is based on the vehicle's that weigh more than 10,000 pounds, owners need a bonded user's permit. For this they must maintain records and file quarterly reports with the Comptroller's office. They may also need to post a bond with the Comptroller's office.

Bullock cautioned fuel suppliers to keep a copy of an up-to-date permit or a signed statement from each customer before selling any diesel fuel tax-free. To order forms or for more information, call the Comptroller's office at 1-800-252-5555.

## Late September is critical time for development of High Plains cotton

Weather conditions from now until the end of September will pretty well tell the fate of this year's cotton crop on the Texas South Plains, says a cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

A week of cool, wet weather which "We started off September in very good fashion. We had good, open conditions and temperatures were running somewhat above normal," he said. This helped the late-planted crop and was conditioning the early crop for maturity and termination.

began September 9, wasn't what was needed on the approximately 2 million acres of cotton in the 25 counties around Lubbock. This area normally produces about half of the state's \$1.3 billion cotton crop.

Roughly one-third of the standing crop is irrigated cotton planted in late April to mid-May, said Dr. James R. Supak, cotton agronomist. "Most of that survived the adverse conditions we had in late May and early June, and is now our best cotton," he said.

"Much of that crop is nearing maturity, and in another week to 10 days should be pretty well out of harm's way. In fact, much of it will be ready for crop termination work with harvest-aid chemicals," Supak said.

The remainder of the crop is either dryland or late-planted irrigated cotton.

"The majority of the dryland crop went through severe drought stress during the year and consequently its yield potential is very limited," the Extension Service specialist said. There will be some dryland production, he predicted, since some of these areas had scattered rains which permitted a reasonably good fruit set.

But recent rains are actually hindering, causing the plants to resume growth at a time they should be devoting their energy to maturing the bolls. These plants are setting additional fruit that has no chance of maturing, Supak said.

The late-planted irrigated crop made pretty good progress during August and is generally carrying a heavy fruit load, he said.

"But its main problem right now is that the fruit is immature and we're fast running out of growing season," Supak said.

But on September 9, the first of the seasonal fronts rolled in. The area stayed cloudy and cool for about a week.

"Beginning September 13, the temperatures actually dipped down into the 40s," Supak said. "We had very low readings again the mornings of the 14th and 15th and this really slowed crop development."

Most physiologists think it will be several more days before the crop gets back to a normal productive mode, Supak said.

"I think we're fortunate in that we're probably going to come out of this cool spell without too much foliar damage," he said. "That is, the leaves will stay in pretty good shape and be capable of carrying on photosynthesis."

"But the most critical aspect is that we lost 10 days to two weeks of time during a very critical period of crop development, he noted. Late September is traditionally when night temperatures begin to dip into the 50s and crop boll development gets very slow, he said.

"Unless we end up with a very good, open fall for the remainder of the year, the prospects for the crop are going to be limited, both in terms of yield and quality," he said.

The recent rains also have encouraged regrowth in the plants, which will slow down boll development and complicate harvesting, he said. It will build a large plant that will be more susceptible to barking—causing unwanted bark and stem tissue to be picked up by harvesting equipment—and reducing the turnout of lint during harvest, he said.

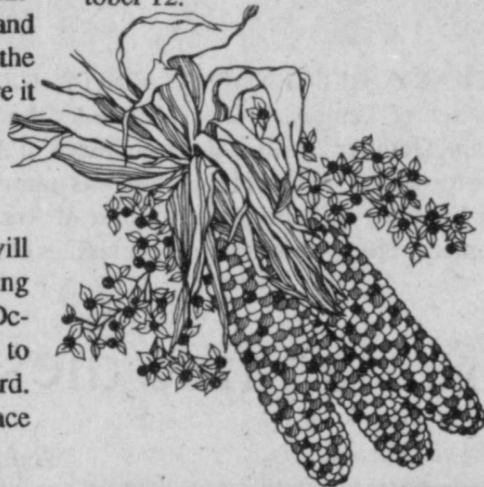

Monday we went on our weekly bus ride. Nine residents and I went to Plainview. McDonald's treated us to ice cream. Thanks a bunch!

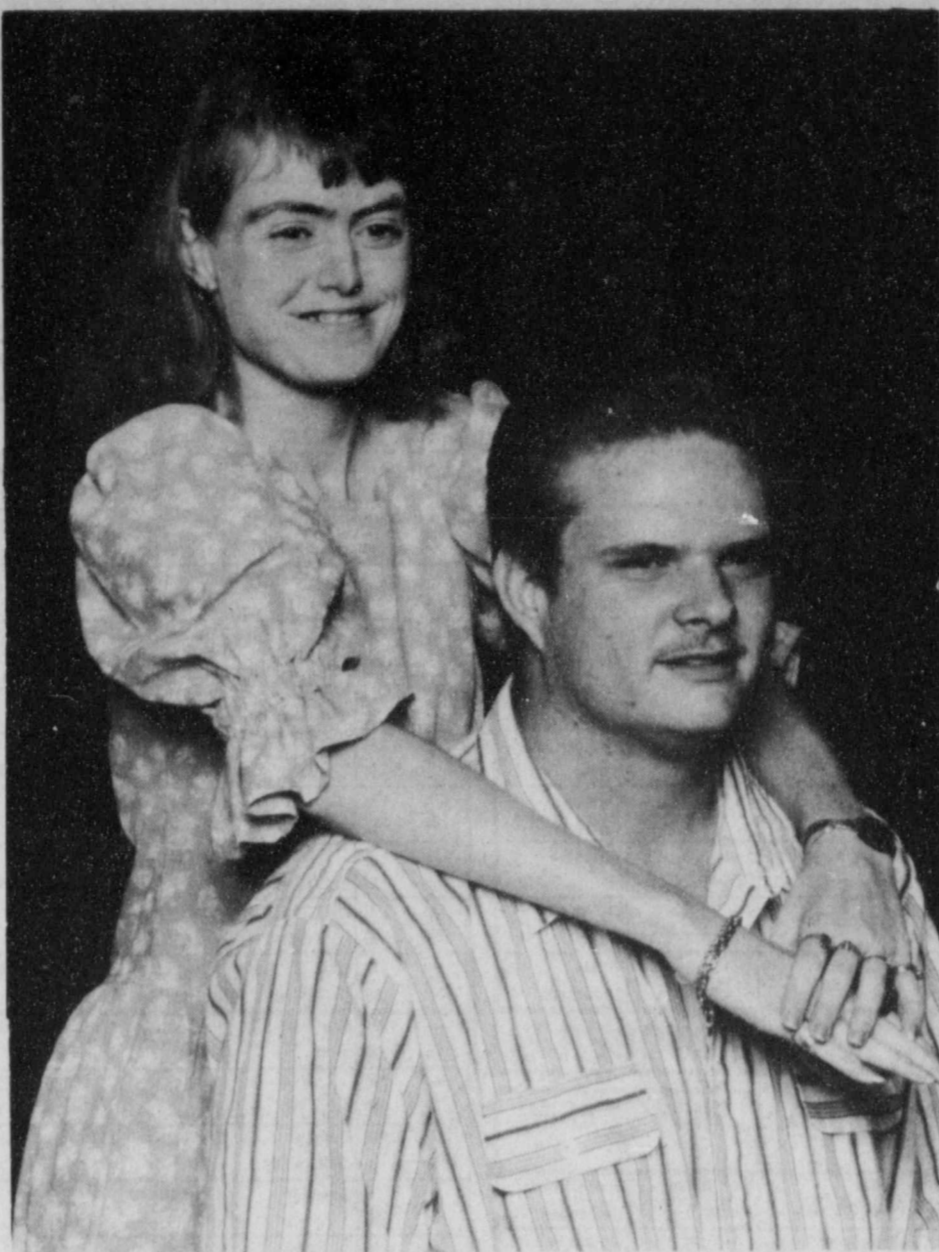

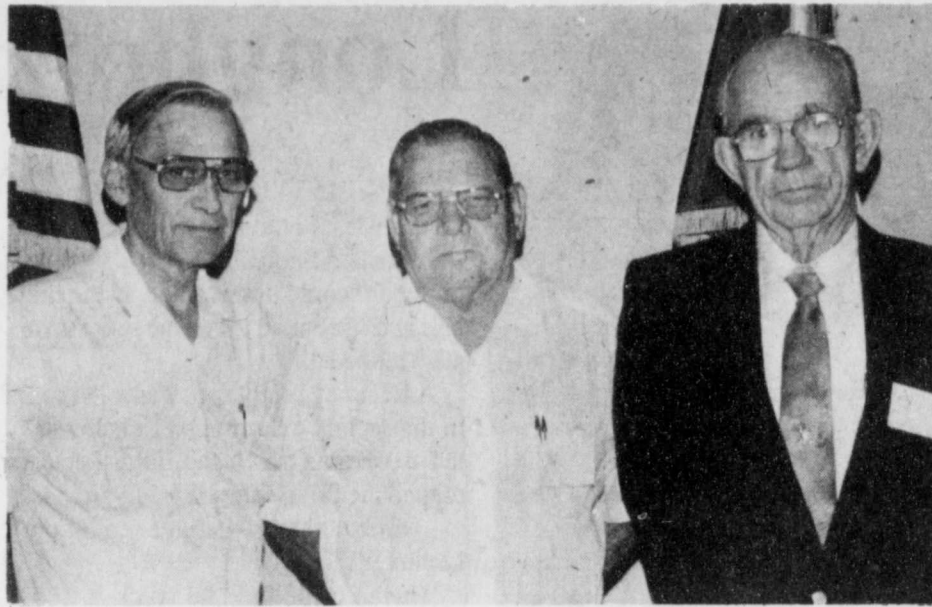
## Williams' post win at fair

## "From Pigskin to Bacon"

It's the season of sacks, drives, punts, kickoffs and fumbles as football frenzy reigns throughout the country. Whether it's a classic NFL clash or a friendly touch football game among friends, America's passion for the "pigskin" is in full force.

While pigskin has given way to leather in today's football, the pig still plays a very important role in other areas. In fact, more than 670 million hogs are raised on farms throughout the world, primarily for their great-tasting meats. Almost one-third of them are raised in China, with Russia and the United States both contributing about 10% of the hog population.

While most hogs in the United States are raised in the Midwest, Iowa is the number one hog-producing state. And, about one-quarter of the meat eaten in the U.S. comes from hogs, including bacon, ham, sausage and pork chops.

In fact, bacon is one of the most popular of the meats from pigs. It takes only the tempting smoky aroma of bacon frying to set many mouths watering. With a "sizzling" 1.5 billion pounds consumed per year, it's easy to see that America really is "bringing home the bacon!"

This common simile for material success has two reputed origins. One theory stems back to the monastery of

Dunmow in Norman England. Monks gave a flitch (side of the hog) of bacon to any man who knelt before the church door and swore that he had been happily married for a year. But another theory contends the expression is derived from the "greased pig" competitions at country fairs when the winners, greasy but exultant, literally brought home the bacon.

Fortunately, you don't have to go to a monastery or a country fair to bring home the bacon today. All it takes is a quick trip to the supermarket meat case! While bacon adds its delicious flavor to almost any dish, it's also ideal to serve at any meal. It's great with cereal and toast for breakfast, in the classic BLT (bacon, lettuce and tomato) sandwich for lunch or generously mixed in a salad for dinner. And, of course, thanks to its history, bacon is perfect to serve when watching the "pigskin" being passed during football tailgate parties.

Bacon also has been served in at least one truly unusual way. A Los Angeles librarian had to revoke a man's library card when her letters, telephone calls and face-to-face pleas to him failed to break him of the peculiar habit of using strips of raw bacon as bookmarks!

Although bacon wasn't suitable for this literary endeavor, it always scores big when part of the mealtime game plan, whether it's "pigskin" season or any season of the year.

- \* Cover no more than three to five main points in the body of the speech.
