Students tour fire station during fire prevention week

Eighty first grade students from used according to instructions. Lockney elementary school were given a guided tour of the Lockney Fire Station on Monday morning. The tour was a learning experience for the students. They were told about fire prevention and safety rules.

The tour was a part of Fire Prevention Week which was proclaimed by the governor for October 8-14.

The Lockney Fire Department is a volunteer department with its members giving of their time to be of service to the posed of. community.

At the present time the volunteers are aking part in EMT classes at the fire hall on Thursday nights. These classes will continue until December and will better equipt the members when they are called out to emergencies.

The firemen come from their working places when the fire whistle blows or out at night when the fire phone rings. They not only go to fires but also to wrecks and medical emergencies. Often they are called on to transfer patients from their homes to the hospital.

FIRE PREVENTION **GUIDE LINES**

The State Board of Insurance, State Fire Marshal's Office offer the following guidelines for practicing fire prevention in the home:

1) Keep matches and lighters away from small children.

2) Do not use gasoline or flammable liquids for cleaning in the home. Do not use them to start or freshen a fire for heating or cooking.

3) Provide proper ventilation for portable gas and oil heaters or fire places. 4) Do not smoke in bed.

5) Before going to bed, check upholstered furniture to ensure that smoking materials are not lodged in the furniture.

6) Dispose of smoking materials safely. Store them out-of-doors in a metal container and immerse them with water to make sure that they are completely out.

7) Make sure that heating and cooking appliances are properly installed and

8) Make sure that all electrical cords are safe. Electrical cords should not be placed under rugs, over hooks, in door openings or other traffic paths. Check cords routinely for wear. Do not puncture cords with tacks, nails or other sharp objects and do not use cords which appear to be cracked, pinched, punctured or otherwise damaged. Electric cords that are worn or damaged should be disconnected and immediately dis-

9) Use only the correct size fuses in fuse boxes.

10) Keep basement, closets, attic and garage cleared of combustibles such as papers, cartons, old furniture, clothes or oil-soaked rags.

11) Store gasoline and other flammable liquids in closed containers away from heat, sparks and children, preferably away from the house. Never store flammable liquids in glass jugs, old bleach bottles or makeshift containers.

12) Keep paint stored in closed metal containers and discard paint-laden brushes.

13) Furnaces, stoves and stove pipes should be kept well away from combustible walls and ceilings. These appliances should be installed and maintained by qualified service people.

14) Heating equipment should be checked yearly by a qualified service person.

15) Do not overload electrical circuits with too many appliances.

16) When adding electrical wiring or appliances, have a qualified electrician do the installation.

17) Only special circuits should be used for heavy-duty appliances such as air conditioners.

18) Plan ahead.

a) Purchase a smoke detector with a nationally recognized testing laboratory label and install one or more at least outside the sleeping areas of your home. Check your detectors every week to make sure that they work properly. Clean the detectors according to manufacturers instructions. If detectors are

battery powered, put in new batteries at least yearly.

b) Determine at least two means of escape from each bedroom. One will be the normal exit from the house or apartment. The other can be a window or a second door between bedrooms. Consider installing an escape ladder from windows.

c) Draw a floor plan to indicate the location of doors, windows, stairs and roof tops that can be used for escape. Always keep escape routes free from obstructions

d) Agree on a warning device to be used when a fire is discovered. Set a meeting place outdoors for a head count of occupants.

e) Practice escape procedures: - Sleep with your bedroom door

closed. It could increase escape time. - If you suspect fire, test the door. If it is hot, do not open it because the area on

the other side of the door is too hot to enter safely.

- If you think it is safe, brace your shoulder against the door and open it cautiously. Be ready to slam the door if heat or smoke rush in.

- Practice escaping and meeting outdoors at an assigned spot."

- In case of fire, call the fire department from a neighbor's phone.

TEXAS FIRE DATA FACTS 1988 Fire departments in Texas reported 102,849 fires which killed 299 people, injured 2,476 and destroyed more than \$346 million in property during 1988, according to data submitted by Texas fire departments through the Texas Fire Incident Reporting System (TEXFIRS).

When compared to fires reported in 1987, the number of fires increased nearly ten percent in 1988 and property loss increased by a little over one percent.

Residential properties suffered the most damage from fire. Of the 25,419 building fires reported in 1988, 18,870 or 74 percent occurred in residences. In addition, more people were killed (175

fatalities), and injured (935 injuries) in residential fires than in any other type of occupancy. The major cause of fires and fire-

related injuries in residences last year was careless cooking. More than 4,000 residential structure fires involved cooking appliances. These fires resulted in at least 206 injuries, nine fatalities and an estimated 13.8 million in property damage.

Fires of an incendiary or suspicious nature ranked second among known causes of fires in residences, resulting in **Continued on Page 5**





Serving at the bride's table were Sidney Jackson and Shanna Jackson of Lockney.



by careless smoking. Careless smoking caused 1,046 residential fires which resulted in 25 fatalities, 85 injuries and an estimated \$8.5 million in property damage. Incendiary and suspicious fires ranked second as the cause of fatal residential fires with 19 fatalities. Heatingrelated fires ranked third among fatal residential fires with 11 fatalities, 104 injuries and more than \$15 million in residential property damage.

Among all fire-related fatalities reported last year, young and old people were more severely affected than people in other age groups, according to data

among the leading causes of accidental deaths of children in that age group. Adults aged 60 and over made up 40.8 percent of all fire deaths but only 13.9 percent of the state population. Among the leading causes of accidental deaths, fires ranked fourth for people in that age group.

Together, children aged 14 and under, and adults aged 60 and over accounted for more than 201 fatalities, or 67 percent of all fire-related fatalities in Texas last year, even though people in those age groups only comprise 33.9 percent of the state population.

Texas Farm & Ranch Safety Council search is underway

The search is under way for the rural hero for 1989, according to Ben Bullard, president of the Texas Farm & Ranch Safety Council which presents the annual rural heroism award.

The 1989 recipient will be announced March 12, 1990, at the 51st annual Texas/Southwestern Safety Conference and Exposition to be held at the Hyatt Regency Downtown in Houston.

Deadline for submitting 1989 entries will be Feb. 9, 1990, Bullard said. Send all nominations to the Texas Farm & Ranch Safety Council, P. O. Box 2689, Waco, Texas, 76702-2689.

To qualify for the honor, a candidate must have performed a heroic act of human-lifesaving within Texas during 1989. Preferably, it should be related to farming and ranching, Bullard said.

The 1988 winner was David Roberts of Morton, who rescued his younger brother, Dakota, from an electrical wire near their home in June of 1988. David received his award at Dallas last March.

Nominations should include a written account of the incident and the names, addresses and telephone numbers of all persons involved. Newspaper clippings and photos should also accompany when available, Bullard said.
