Careless smoking caused 1,046 residential fires which resulted in 25 fatalities, 85 injuries and an estimated $\$ 8.5$ million in property damage. Incendiary and suspicious fires ranked scond as he cause of satir atsi-
dential fires with 19 fatalities. Heatingrelated fires ranked third among fatal residential fires with 11 fatalities, 104 injuries and more than $\$ 15$ million in residential property damage. Among all fire-related fatalities reported last year, young and old people
