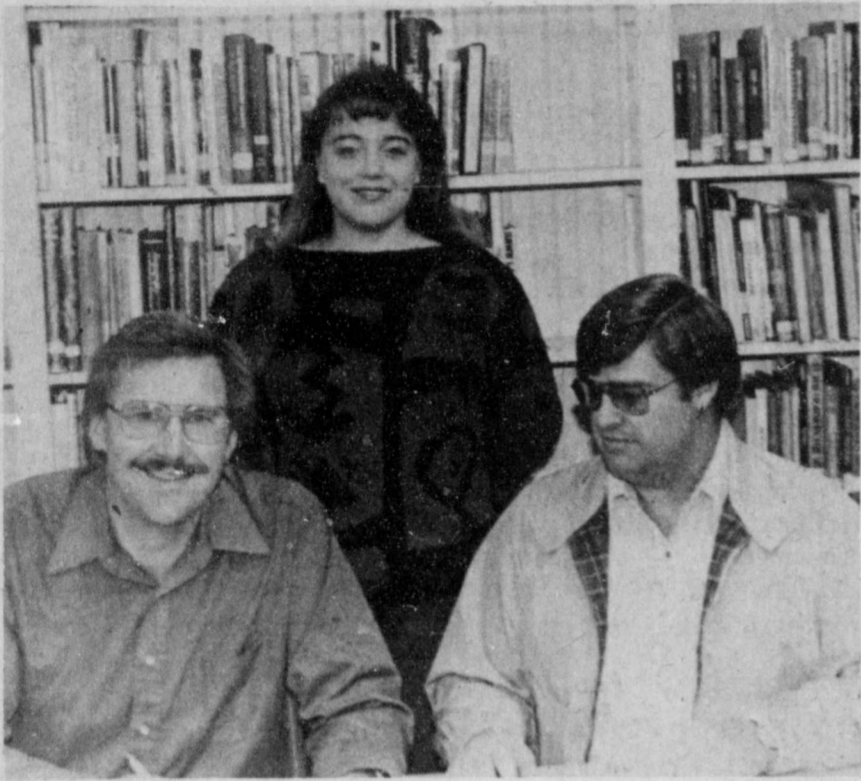


## Lockney prepares for 'Red Ribbon Week'

The community of Lockney will be fighting a local war on drugs the week of October 20-27th. Red ribbons will be worn by citizens throughout the community to show their support for Red Ribbon Week and a drug free society.

Red Ribbon Week is the local effort that runs in conjunction with National Drug Awareness Week, which is sponsored by the American Federation of

Parents for Drug Free Use and the Texas War on Drugs.

Lockney's Drug Free School Committee is organizing the local project. Sponsoring organizations are: The PTA, Lockney's community churches, Lockney Chamber of Commerce, El Penseroso Study Club, Lockney Jr. High Student Council, Region 17 Service Center and the Lockney 4-H.

Red ribbons will be passed out at the

elementary school, junior high school, the football game, various churches, downtown businesses and at Lockney's First National Bank.

The First National Bank will also have drug-free projects on display in the lobby that K-12 students have been working on the last six weeks.

Various activities will be planned throughout the week to support Red

Ribbon Week. The motto of the program is "The Choice For Me - Drug Free." Citizens are encouraged to wear red ribbons during the week, and to include the red ribbons with your red clothes at the football games.

The Drug Free Committee is also asking people to display ribbons on their houses, cars, and trees to encourage a drug free community.

## Horns defeat Owls 39-6

The Horns came out tasting victory Friday night in their first District game against the Hale Center Owls. Horns won 39-6.

Horns scored on their first drive. QB Louis Perez threw a 42 yard pass to Juan Vargas catching the Owls off guard. Joe Louis Guerrero's kick was good.

Lockney continued to dominate the Owls scoring on their second possession as well. A pass from Perez to Guerrero captured a first down which set up the next TD. Perez on an audible scored on a 20 yard run. Kick was good. Lock-

ney was on top 14-0.

The Horns defense contributed to the win holding the Owls on fourth down and one helping set up the next Lockney score.

Late in the first quarter, J. Perez came down with a 50 yard reception gaining a first down and more Horn momentum. Daniel Martinez taking advantage of the momentum snuck in for a one yard Lockney score. The half ended with Horns on top 21-0.

Hale Center turnovers played a key part in the second half. Horns W. Teeter and Johnny Perez recovered fumbles and L. Perez caught an interception which later played a key role in a Horn

TD.

Horn Michael Monroe came out of the fieldhouse in the second half like a bolt of lightning scoring two TD's and gaining 150 yards on 11 carries.

In the third quarter, Hale Center scored on an 8 yard pass. The two point try failed.

Horn Juan Vargas answered back and scored on an 86 yard kick-off return.

The Horns won the district opener 39-6.

"I was very pleased how the guys played Friday night," Head Coach Jim Clark said. "This is the first game all season that the team played consistent all four quarters. They came out playing hard and ended playing hard. The boys really wanted this win and got it. And they sure deserve it."

Player of the week was Juan Vargas. Defensive player was Wesley Teeter and offensive player was Michael Martinez.

## City sales tax rebates still on the increase for 1989

October's sales tax rebates to cities and counties continue to tell the story of an economy steadily growing. Lockney received a sales tax increase of 71.27 percent over the \$4,320.44 they received for the same period in 1988. The check amounted to \$7,399.80.

"Consumers have more money to spend and they are doing just that," stated state comptroller Bob Bullock. Checks totaling \$71.9 million were sent to 931 cities that have a local sales tax of either 1 percent or 1.5 percent.

October's checks represent taxes collected by businesses in August and reported to the Comptroller's office in September.

Lockney has received checks totaling \$58,520.91 to date in 1989. At this same time last year the city had received checks totaling \$40,460.60, a change of 44.64 percent.

Floydada received a check in the amount of \$7,917.69 for their August taxes returned. The change from 1988 was down 3.24 percent. The city of Floydada has received \$92,877.33 to date, which is up 6.79 percent over their 1988 total of \$86,973.11.

Floyd County has received a payment of \$15,317.49 for this period. The total is up 22.51 percent over the amount received for the same period in 1988. The

checks in 1988 totaled \$12,503.00. The county has received a total of \$151,398.24 in 1989 as compared to \$127,433.71 received in 1988. That total is up 18.81 percent.

Silverton, in Brisco County, has received a check in the amount of \$1,164.13, up 2.37 percent over the \$1,137.14 they received in 1988. They have received a total of \$14,596.92 for 1989.

Crosbyton, Crosby County, has received \$4,944.14 for this pay period. Their check was up 44.12 percent over the last pay period. They have received a total of \$43,742.33 payments to date.

Matador, Motley County, has received a payment of \$1,251.70. The amount is up 61.53 percent over the \$774.90 they received last pay period. The amount they have received to date is \$18,140.90. In 1988 they received \$18,753.10.

Tulia, Swisher County, received \$14,105.18 as their payment for their August sales tax. They are up 24.17 percent over the \$11,359.23 they received for the same period in 1988. To date they have received \$173,318.25. This amount is \$164,940.91, up 16.90 percent over the \$148,266.43 they received in 1988.

Plainview, Hale County, has received

\$196,475.46 for this pay period, up 42.59 percent over the amount they received at the last pay period. They have received \$1,709,458.11 to date. This amount is up 22.16 percent over the \$1,513,345.48 they received in 1988.

Pallbearers were Richard Brannan, Steve Campbell, Stan Brannan, Larry Nipp, Randall Stapp, and Rudy Zachary.

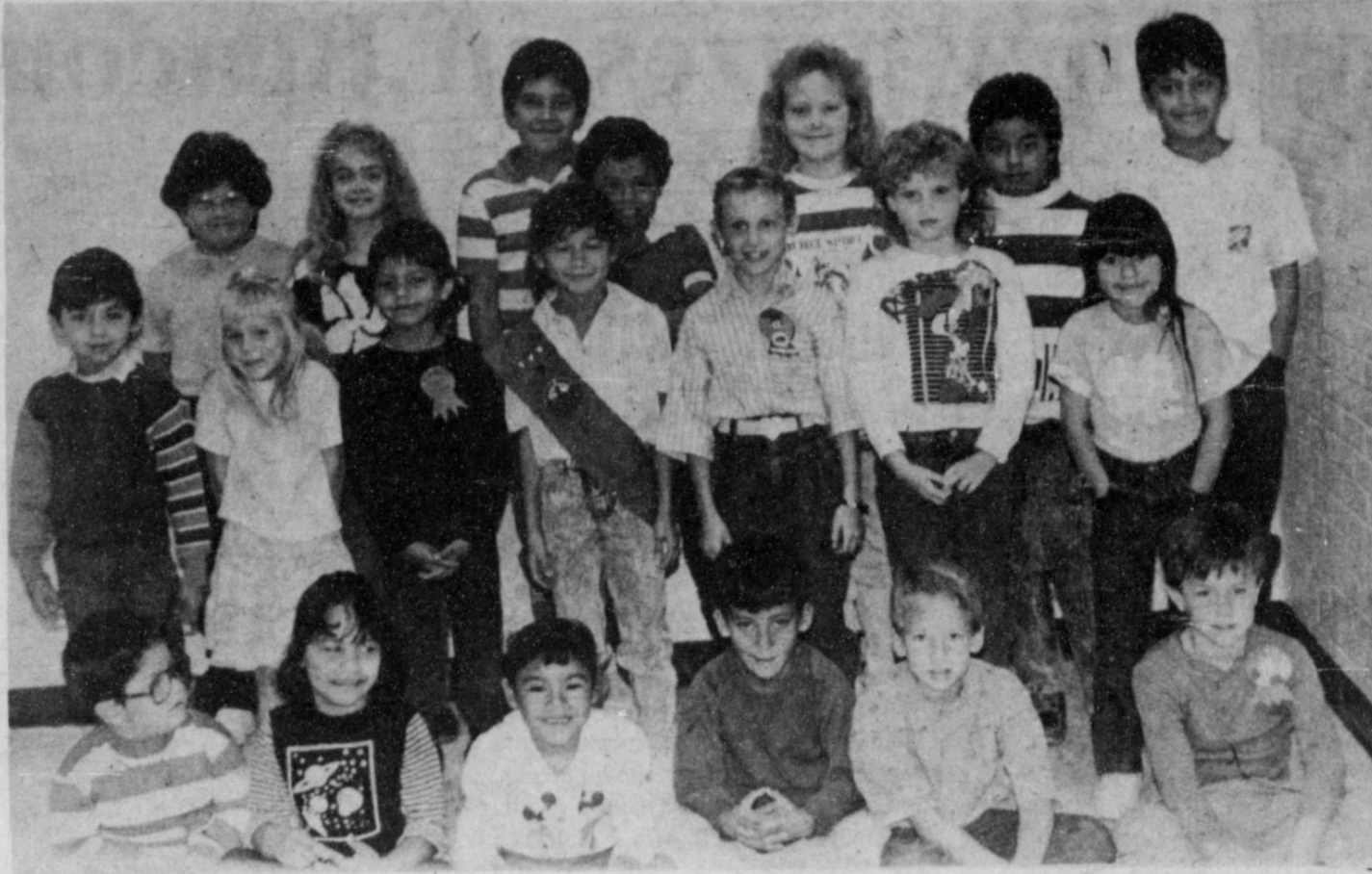
**JIMMY CECIL COLSON**

**Snacking provides necessary nutrition**

Now that school has resumed, families with teenagers may notice their snack supplies are usually low. Teenagers seem to eat constantly.

However, because teenagers also are growing constantly, they need the vitamins, minerals and protein they get from meals and from snacks, said Dr. Mary Kinney Sweeten, a Texas Agricultural Extension Service nutrition specialist.

Nutritionists admit that snacking or grazing is important to today's lifestyles, Sweeten said, citing a recent FDA Consumer article by Cheryl Weinstock.

However, getting into good snacking habits is critical for teens to benefit from snacking.

"Teenagers often fall into the habit of eating the same foods all the time," Sweeten said. "And sometimes the

snacks they choose may not provide the variety of nutrients these youngsters need."

Sweeten pointed to an example from Weinstock's recent article: The soda that replaces milk at lunch may reduce the calcium in the diet. Weinstock suggested that teenagers replace the calcium by adding cheese to their hamburger they eat with the soda.

"Weinstock also cited a slice of cheese pizza as an item popular with teenagers that also is a good source of calcium," Sweeten said.

Another good choice for teenagers is high-fiber foods, said Weinstock. They stimulate salivation, which helps wash away excess sugar from sugary snack foods. The nutrients provided by foods such as popcorn, fruits and vegetables are a welcome addition to the young-

sters' diet.

Although snacking can be an asset, it becomes a liability if it results in more calories than the teen needs, Sweeten said.

"Obesity commonly starts during the teenage years," she said. "So, sensible snacking habits should be encouraged."

Weinstock said that nutritious snacks frequently are not as tasty and satisfying as the traditional candy, potato chips and sodas. However, there are methods to satisfy both the sweet tooth and still hold down the calories.

Sweeten said, "If you gave a craving for sweets, a bite-sized candy bar or half a popsicle is better than a regular-sized candy bar or a whole popsicle."

Nutritional literacy and simply paying attention to foods they choose is the best way for teens, or adults, to develop good snack habits and to make eating between meals work to advantage.

The popcorn sale is one of the main fund-raising activities for the local Cub Pack, according to popcorn chairman Chuck Aulfil.

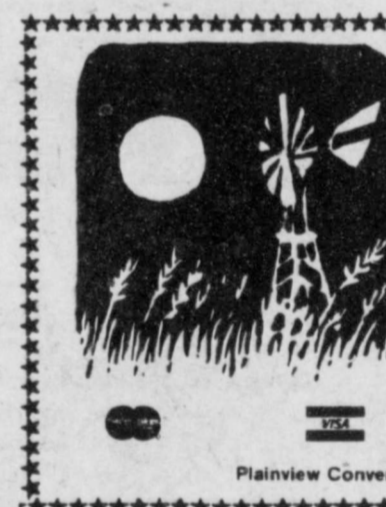
"Money from the popcorn sale is used for Scouting activities right here in

and add 13 points to her score. Pam Fulton also correctly picked the winners of thirteen football games. Her tie breaker score was 27 and it was good enough to give her the second place

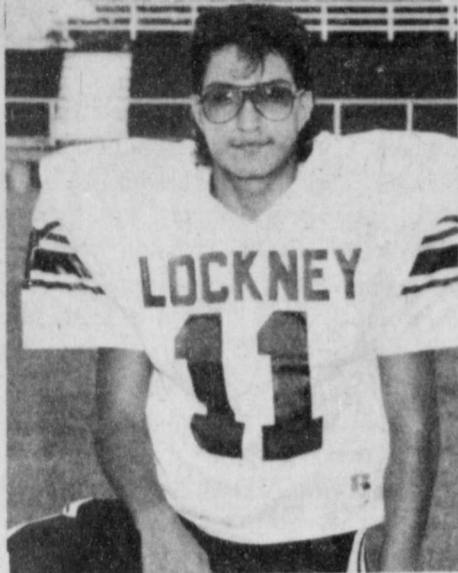

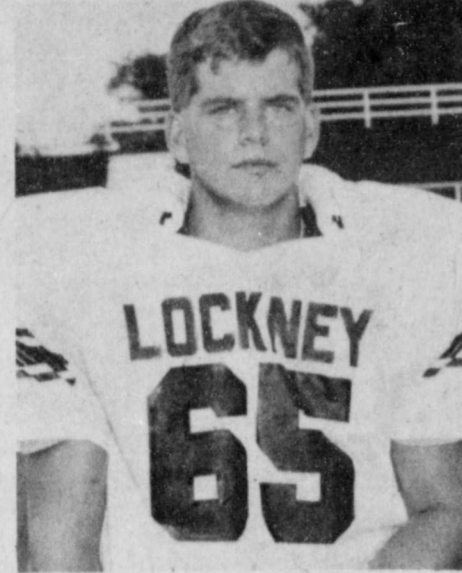

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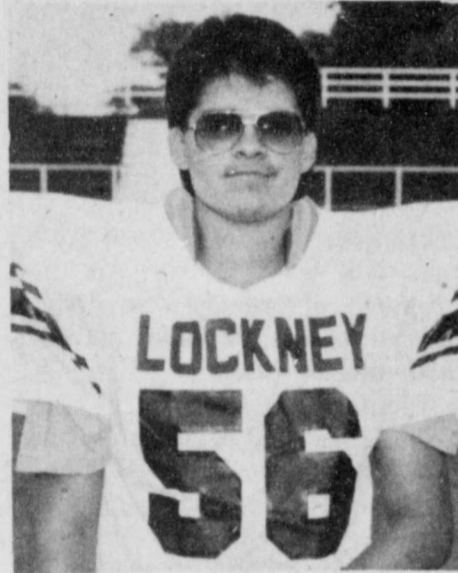
