Stress is a necessary ingredient in everyone's life. Without stress, life would be dull and unexciting. Stress in the form of challenge or competition keeps the body performing to its poten-

Too many demands, however, can cause serious mental or physical damage if a person does not know how to deal with them properly, said Katie Goar, community education coordinator at Methodist Hospital. Chimneys need checking

By Brent Crossland

With cold weather expected in many parts of the state soon, homeowners should check out their chimneys before using them.

Wood-heating accounts for more fires, more fire deaths and greater property damage than any other type of heating fuel, the Consumer Product Safety Commission has reported.

Most wood heating fires involve ignition of creosote inside the chimney, said Brent Crossland, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The agent said creosote is a black

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tar-like substance that builds up inside the chimney in normal use.

"While most of these fires are contained within the chimney and cause no damage to the house, there's still much cause for concern since a potential hazard exists," said Crossland.

Homeowners who have a woodburning stove or fireplace should check the chimney for any damage that may have occurred in the past heating season, said the agent. A local "chimney sweep" or dealer can help with this effort. Have any damage repaired.

Crossland said causes of some fires involving chimneys can be avoided. They include:

* Improper chimney installation too close to wood framing. * Installation of thermal insulation

too close to the chimney. * Improperly passing the stovepipe or chimney through a ceiling or wall,

causing ignition of wood framing. * Structural damage to the chimney caused by the ignition of creosote.



Alzheimer's patients and families benefit from grant

Alzheimer's disease patients and their families can benefit as a result of a \$4.1 million grant made by the National Institutes of Health (NIH) to the Department of Neurology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

The NIH funds will establish one of three new centers in the nation from research in clinical approaches to Alzheimer's disease, a degenerative affliction of the central nervous system.

Victims of Alzheimer's disease suffer from gradual loss of memory, impairment of judgment, disorientation, changes in personality, loss of language skills and deterioration in the ability to perform routine tasks.

"Baylor is already part of a network of Alzheimer's centers," said Dr. Stanley H. Appel, professor and chairman of the Department of Neurology. "This NIH grant is a recognition by our peers of the level of excellence of our research and clinical programs in neurology, especially in Alzheimer's disease," Appel said.

He described the new center as "a really valuable resource for not only the Houston community but also for Alzheimer's patients and their families in many areas." Baylor already attracts Alzheimer's patients from throughout Texas as well as from Louisiana, Arkansas and Oklahoma.

"We want to get the word out to doctors in all these areas they can be interacting with this program. Also, we want the patients throughout these areas to know this resource in available," Appel said.

"From the patients' point of view, what we're trying to do is to get them diagnosed and then provide support to them and to their families and to get them involved in our ongoing basic science research projects," he said.

Dr. Warren Strittmatter, a Baylor associate professor of neurology and the executive director of the 'Alzheimer's center, said, "Right now there aren't adequate facilities for taking care of Alzheimer's patients on an ongoing basis, but we're planning to identify what community resources there are, such as in-home care and nursing-home

Once identified, such facilities can serve as resources for the families, Strittmatter said.

Services to be provided under the NIH grant will include counseling, group support and drug research. Counseling will include working with families as individual problems arise, Strittmatter said.

The five-year NIH grant also provides for basic scientific research into the disease which afflicts as many as 3 million people in the United States. Researchers will seek to learn, among other things, the role of genetics and environment in the development of the disease, Appel said.

The Baylor College of Medicine clinicians and scientists who will study





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What parents can do Young Children and Drugs

Editor's Note--This is the first in a series of articles on drugs and alcohol and how families are affected. These articles were furnished by the local Parent Teachers Association.

"My son is only 7 years old - I don't have to think about drugs yet, right?"

WRONG. As early as fourth grade, your children may have some knowledge of the drug scene, says the National Institute on Drug Abuse. Children feel pressure to use drugs and drink alcohol by the fourth grade, says the White House drug Abuse Policy Office.

YOU CAN DO SOMETHING ABOUT IT NOW, says the National PTA.

Why do young people use alcohol and other drugs? The reasons are complex and varied. Your challenge as a parent, however, is to try to keep your children from using drugs in the first place. You have a lot more power to prevent your children's future use and abuse of drugs than you may think. The time to begin is now, whether your child is 5 or 7 or 10 years old. Here are some ideas to help you raise strong, healthy children who won't abuse drugs.

TEACH YOUR CHILDREN TO FEEL GOOD ABOUT THEM-**SELVES**

To build a strong self-image, children need to learn:

* HONEST COMMUNICATION - Children need to learn how to express their feelings such as anger, joy, love, and fear, and they need to believe it's safe and appropriate for them to do so. Since children learn by example, you must also learn to express your feelings honestly. Get in the habit of asking your children how they feel, especially if you know something is bothering them or if you have just scolded them. Be open about your feelings as well. Be a good listener yourself and teach your children

* COOPERATION - Children must learn to cooperate, negotiate, and put themselves in another person's shoes so they can get along with others. Practice these skills by negotiating about what TV programs to watch or where to go on vacation. Praise your children for cooperating, especially when they don't get what they want. When they do get what they want, make sure they are considerate of those who did not.

* PERSONAL RESPONSIBIL-ITY - Teach your children to take responsibility at an early age, and gradually increase their responsibilities to help them build a strong self-image. Give your children meaningful tasks that demand the use of their mental and physical abilities - tasks for which they are ultimately accountable. Make sure they are capable of doing the tasks, and help and encourage them along. Children know when they're being given only meaningless work, and they resent

* THE ABILITY TO MAKE JUDGMENTS AND DECISIONS -These are valuable tools in helping your children resist the crowd that offers them drugs. Children learn these skills by being with mature people who make judgments and decisions. In making judgments or decisions, create opportunities for your children to think through what they would do in the same situation. Also, let your children practice making judgments and decisions often. Urge them to think of the various choices they have and the consequences

* THE ABILITY TO GIVE AND RECEIVE UNCONDITIONAL LOVE - Love your children for who they are regardless of what they achieve or how they perform. Even if they anger you, let them know that you still love and respect them as persons. When your children are angry at someone, help them separate their anger from their good feelings for that person.






