

Shaw elected to Wayland board

A Lockney resident was elected to a major position on one of the Texas Baptist Boards during the annual meeting of the 2.4-million-member Baptist General Convention of Texas (BGCT) in Lubbock, November 7-8.

Elected to serve on the board of trustees of Wayland Baptist University, Plainview, was Kelton L. Shaw, president/owner of Patterson Grain Co.

Institutions of the BGCT include eight universities, two academies, seven hospitals, four children's homes, four homes for the aging and Hispanic Baptist Theological Seminary, San Antonio.

Besides the institutions, the convention helps support worldwide missions causes including 7,500 missionaries in the United States and more than 110 foreign nations.

During department reports Mayor Smith told the councilmen that a new structure was being erected by L.V. Harris in the southeast part of town. The building does not meet city building codes, nor has a building permit been obtained.

"Chief Gilroy has informed Harris that he cannot build this structure," said Smith. "We just have to wait and see what becomes of it now. It is something we should keep on top of."

The financial statement was reviewed by councilmen, all bills were paid and the previous minutes were read and approved. Attending the council meeting were Mayor Smith, City Secretary Erma Lee Duckworth, Aldermen Aston, Marr, Copeland, Sam Fortenberry and Wofford. Also in attendance was City Attorney Paul Lyles, Dickie McCarty, Dale Widener, Chief Gilroy and The Beacon reporter.

Mayor Dan Smith read a letter to the council from the Texas Department of Health, concerning items of non-compliance. "They came and inspected our ground level water tank and our water tower," said Smith. "They told us our ground level tank was OK, but now it must be equipped with a check valve. Dickie said that was no problem and he could install it."

"Next thing is - they want us to build a new water tower. They said ours does not have enough reserve storage capacity. It will take about a quarter of a million dollars to build a new one. "If you all remember, two years ago they said ours was O.K."

The council decided to take no action at this time.

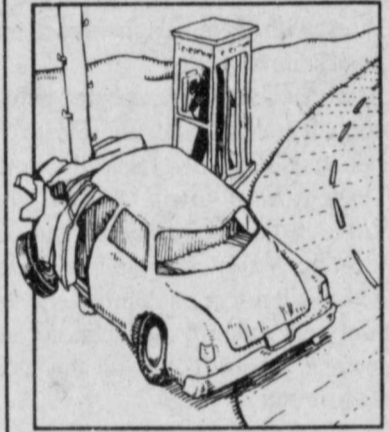

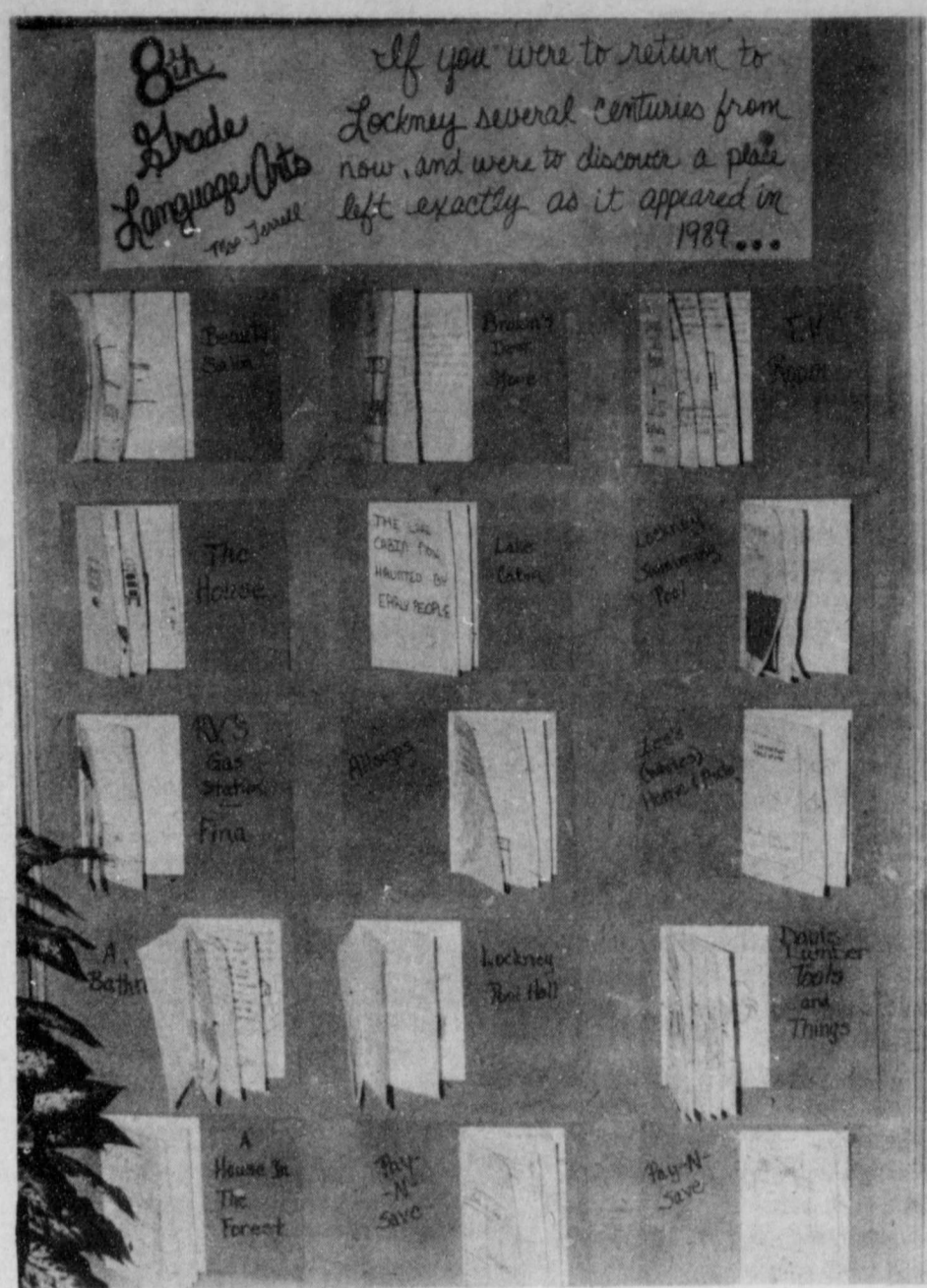

Silverton couple receives music award

John T. and Maebelle Francis of Silverton, Texas, have been honored with a Special Recognition citation in the American Music Conference's 1989 "Amateur Music Family of the Year"

award. Each year AMC, a national non-profit organization dedicated to encouraging amateur music participation, honors families who best represent the

country's 57 million amateur musicians.

The Wallace DePue family of Bowling Green, Ohio, was named National Award recipient. Receiving regional awards were the Roger Ruckman family, Kensington, Maryland (Eastern Region); the Vernon J. Martin family, West Bend, Wisconsin (Central Region); the Robert C. Sloan family, Salt Lake City, Utah (Mountain Region); and the Robert Woodward family, Roseville, California (Pacific Region).

Award judges cited John T., 55, and Maebelle, 52, for special recognition because of their "overflowing schedule of sharing their music with others in their community and as an outstanding example of how playing music together keeps their 'empty nest' filled with joy."

"With our family being grown and away from home now," says Maebelle Francis, "music surely fills our time to where there's no 'empty-nest syndrome.' We have a togetherness most older couples don't have, as we have one common goal, and that is to bring much joy to those less fortunate than us."

John and Maebelle play together at home almost every day and for community organizations and events about twice-a-week. The couple plays a variety of music, including country, pop, bluegrass, gospel and "mild-rock." Collectively, they and their three children (Lori, 33, Lesa, 30, and Dave, 28) play four instruments: piano, keyboard, guitar and harmonica.

The Francis' share their music with others in their community through per-

formances at church, nursing homes, reunions, musical jamborees and even Christmas caroling, to name but a few of their activities. They come to the Lockney Care Center on a regular basis.

"We get much more out of music than we put into it. And when our kids and grandkids are home, we play and sing with them and it gives us all something to bond us as a family," says Maebelle Francis. "With music, you can let your inner emotions flow from you that you may not release with just talking."

The Francis' other interests and activities range from John's work with the local school board, farm organizations and his duties as a church deacon, to Maebelle's poetry, volunteer work at a local nursing home and her interest in fancy script writing for friends and special occasions.

"I've always liked music. I'm not a great musician, but I had enough in me to just keep trying," says John Francis. "Playing and singing with my wife and children is a great joy. We can do something together a lot of families can't. That means a lot to me."

Young Children and Drugs

Editor's Note -- This is the second in a series of articles on drugs and alcohol and how families are affected. These articles were furnished by the local Parent Teacher Association.

Children imitate the adults around them. Your children will feel good about themselves if YOU feel good about yourself. Positive role models will help your children gain healthy habits and attitudes. The examples you set will also help your children resist pressures to use alcohol and other drugs - pressures they receive from television shows and movies, commercials, and perhaps from their friends.

Try to lead a healthy lifestyle that your children will imitate. This includes:

*** Exercise and good nutrition** - Get regular exercise that you enjoy and will continue. Eat balanced meals and keep snacks and junk food to a minimum.

*** Positive relationships** - Maintain supportive, positive relationships with your spouse, children, and friends.

*** Stress** - Learn to recognize stress and handle it in constructive ways.

*** Minimal use of alcohol and other drugs** - Avoid using drugs to relieve tension, stress, unhappiness and boredom.

CHILDREN NEED SPECIAL TIME WITH PARENTS AND FAMILY

In their search for identity, children need to feel special as individuals. Help them feel special.

*** Spend time with each child alone** - It doesn't matter what you do, as long

as it helps to renew the bond between you.

*** Listen to what your children say** - Help your children to talk with you freely, without fear of judgment or reprimand.

*** Ask each child's opinion about family problems and decisions** - Even five-year-olds have a lot to offer if you give them a chance.

*** Do not talk down to your child** - Although a parent is older than a child, you are equals as human beings and deserve mutual respect.

It is equally important to spend quality time together as a family. Family traditions, meals, and other activities are important. Keep TV time to a minimum, and make time for play, general discussion, and family business. Consider having family meetings to discuss plans, share feelings, and air grievances. Let each family member take turns being in charge of the meeting. Many family members get so wrapped up in their own

outside projects and relationships that they take their family relationships for granted. Don't let this happen to you! Give family members the love and attention they need.

SET FIRM LIMITS WITH YOUR CHILDREN

Children need to be clear about what is expected of them and the consequences of acting otherwise. Firm, reasonable limits help children believe that their environment is dependable and secure. Limits also help them understand how their actions affect what happens to them.

Teach your children to set their own limits, as well. For you, this means a gradual release of the reins. Praise them when they have done something well. Explore how things can be improved. Above all, focus on their learning rather than on your frustrations with their stumbling.
