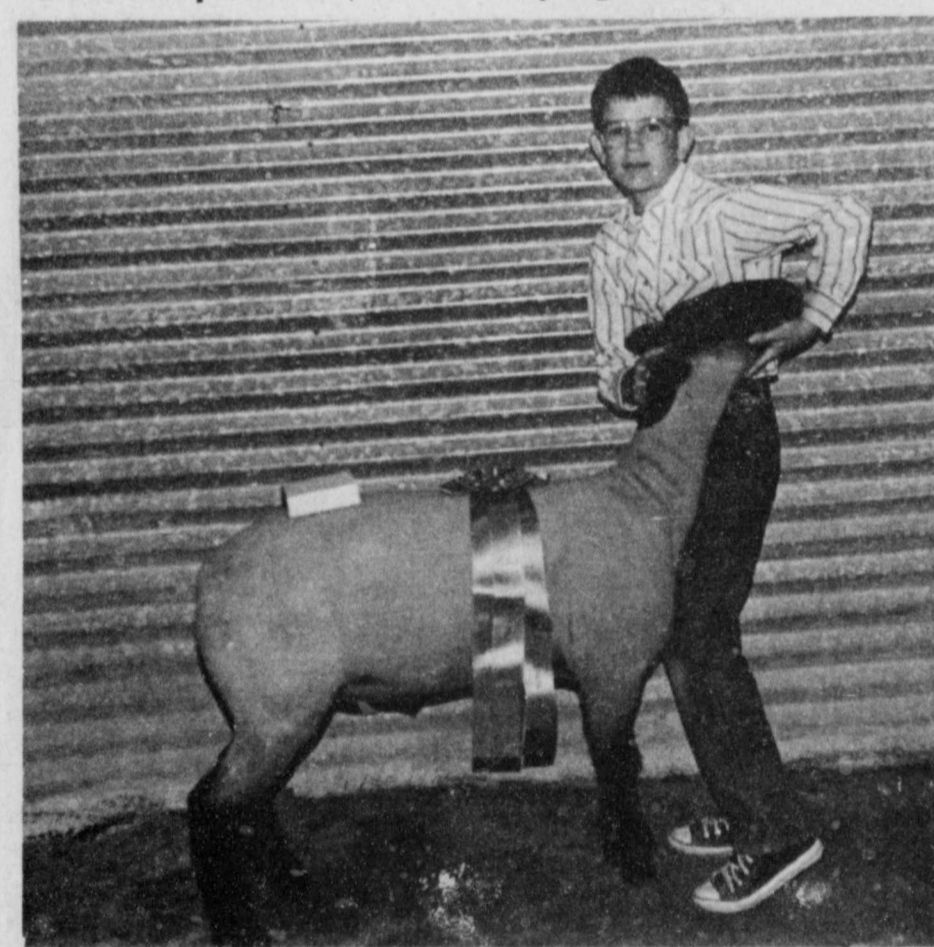

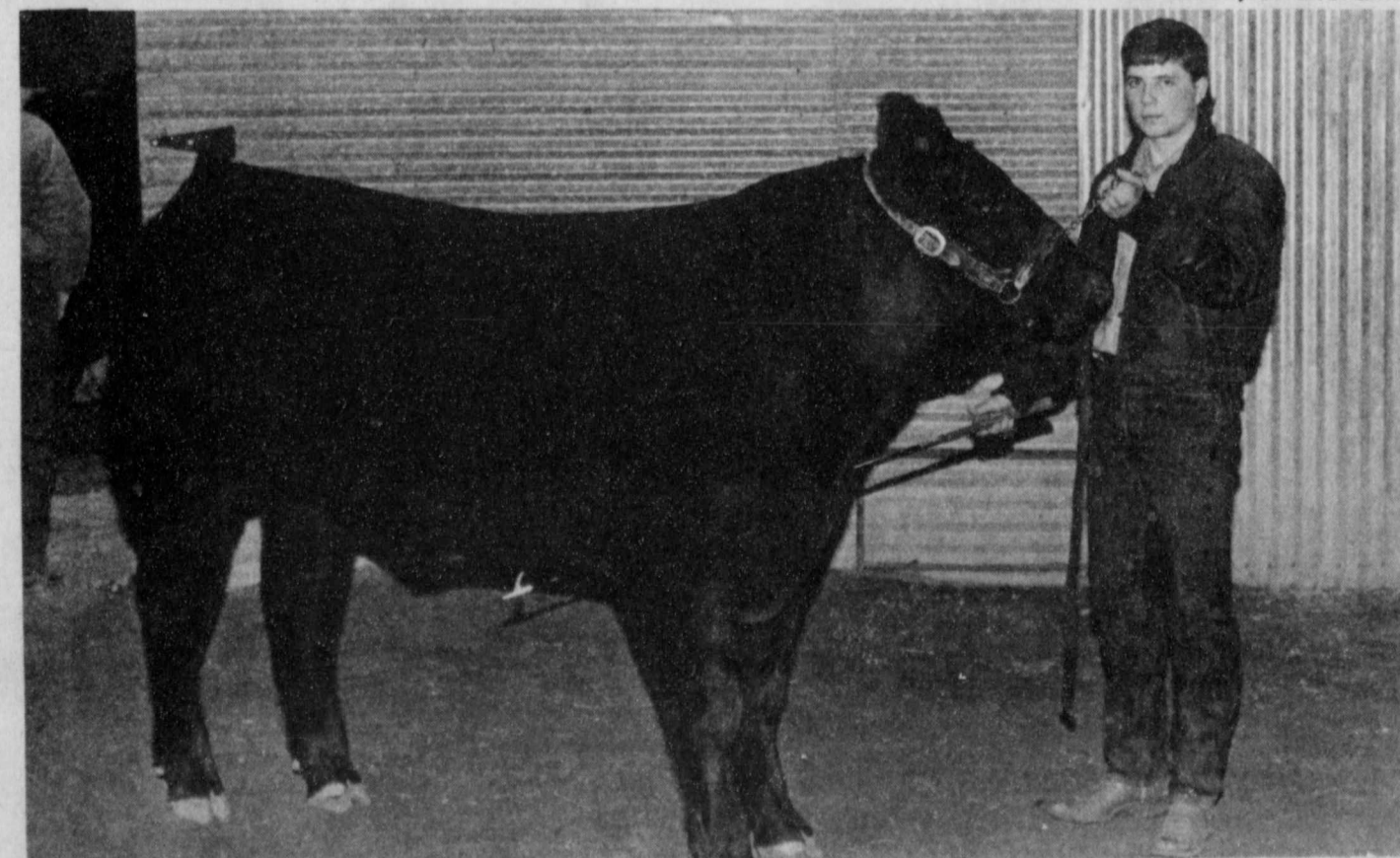

## Governor urges citizens to register and vote in the March 13 primary election

Secretary of State George Bayoud announced that Gov. Bill Clements has signed a proclamation urging Texans to register and vote in the March 13 primary elections.

In the proclamation, Clements urged Texans to support Secretary Bayoud's VOTE '90 registration/education campaign, and he reminded Texans that Feb. 11 is the last day to register to vote in the March 13 primaries.

"I deeply appreciate the governor's interest in VOTE '90 as shown by his willingness to get involved in this non-partisan, statewide effort to promote voter registration and participation," Bayoud said.

Earlier, Clements signed an executive order urging all state agencies and institutions of higher education in Texas to participate in the VOTE '90 drive.

The main goals of VOTE '90, Bayoud said, are to register new voters and increase turnout. Of the state's currently estimated 12.4 million eligible voters, about 8.2 million, or 66 percent, are registered. Nationally, about 68 percent

of eligible voters are registered.

"It is the fundamental responsibility every Texas to participate in the electoral process by exercising his or her constitutional right," Clements stated in the proclamation.

The VOTE '90 effort runs throughout the year, culminating Nov. 6 when Texans elect a U.S. senator, governor, lieutenant governor and hundreds of

other statewide and local officeholders.

To obtain a voter registration application, call your local voter registrar or the Secretary of State's office at 1-800-252-VOTE (8683).

The VOTE '90 campaign includes a series of public service announcements produced for radio, television and newspapers. The campaign's slogan is "VOTE '90. Every One Matters."

U.S. Rep. Bill Sarpalius' mobile office will be in Lockney at the First National Bank on Monday, February 5 from 3:00 - 4:00 p.m. and in Floydada, on the same date, at the Courthouse from 1:00 - 2:00 p.m.

"I have always believed that to be an effective public servant you have to go to the people and hear their wants and needs," Sarpalius said. "I was elected not just to represent you, but to serve you. That's why I have this mobile office."

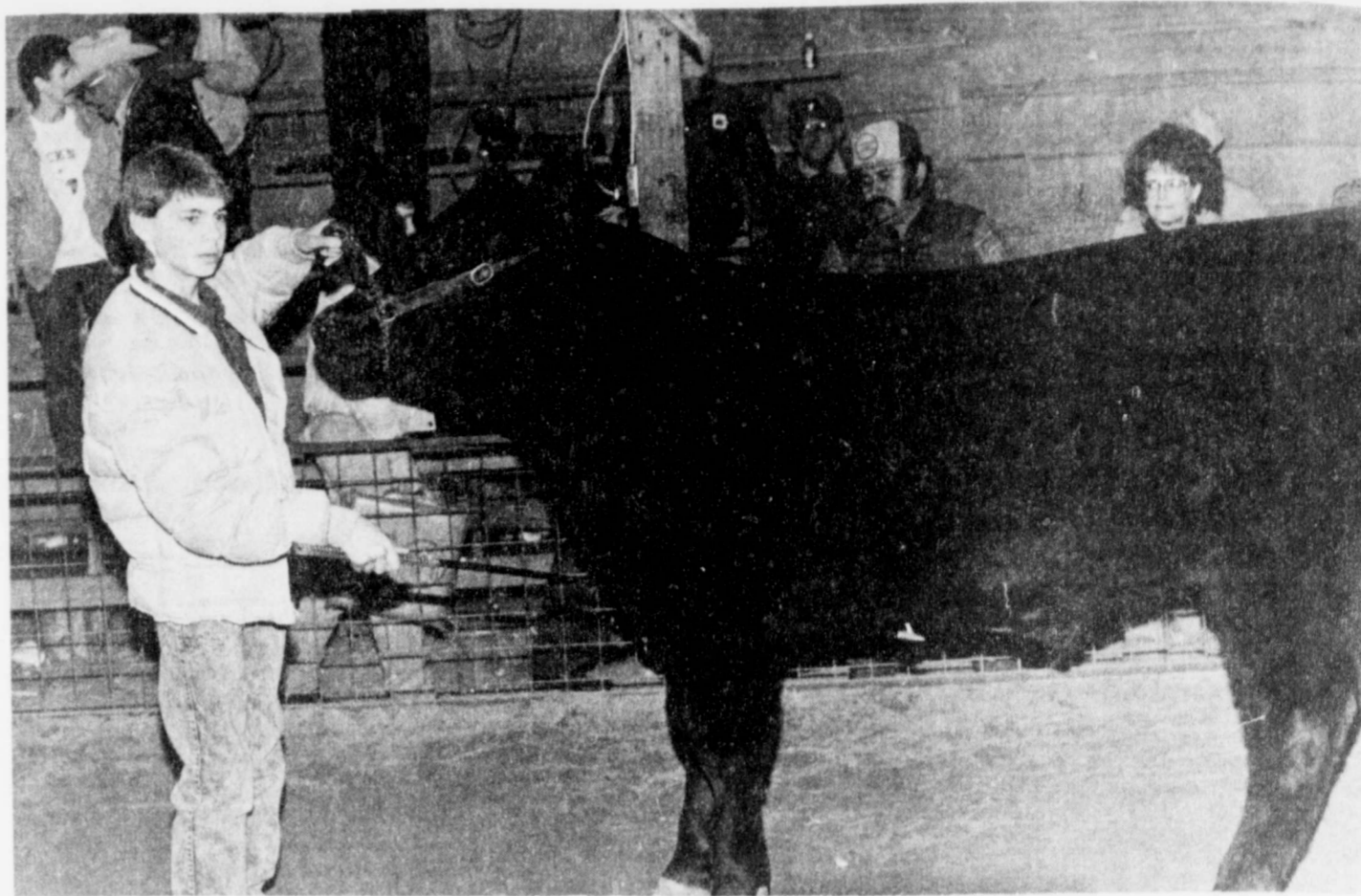

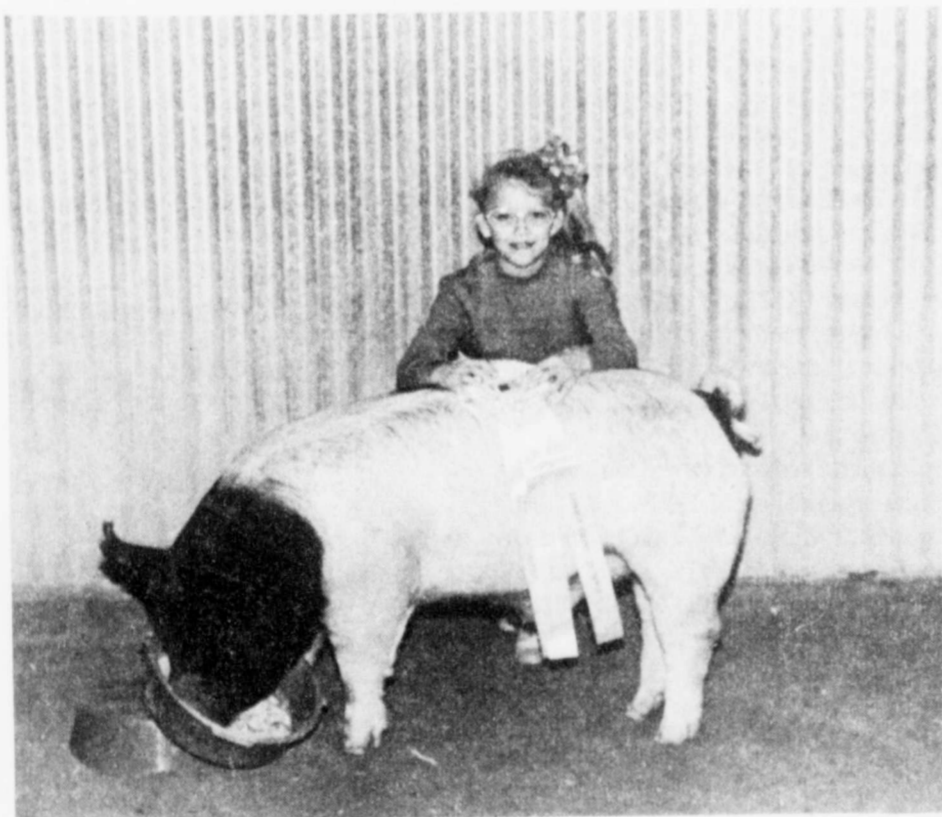

## Lockney sales tax rebate increases 33.49 percent

The sales rebate check that the city of Lockney receives back from the state as their share of the one percent sales tax collected in Lockney was up 33.49 percent from the amount of taxes received in 1989 at this same time.

The amount of the check was \$4,068.69 and reflects taxes collected in the month of November, 1989 and reported in December, 1989.

According to the state comptrollers office, "Sales tax is up almost ten percent over last year's figure and Texan's continue to be optimistic about the state's economy. This month's healthy payments are proof of the consumers confidence."

The check Lockney received in January 1989 totaled \$3,047.95.

Floydada received a check totaling \$7,707.79 which is up 21.66 percent over the \$6,335.28 that they received in January, 1989.

Crosbyton received a check totaling \$3,911.82 which is up 35.94 percent over the \$2,877.57 that they received in 1989.

Plainview received a check totaling \$144,785.38 which is 11.45 percent over the \$129,909.65 that they received in 1989.

Matador's check was in the amount of \$1,330.46 which is 56.74 percent more than the \$848.83 that they received in 1989.

Tulia received \$15,653.67 which is up 29.77 percent over the \$12,062.37 that they received in 1989.

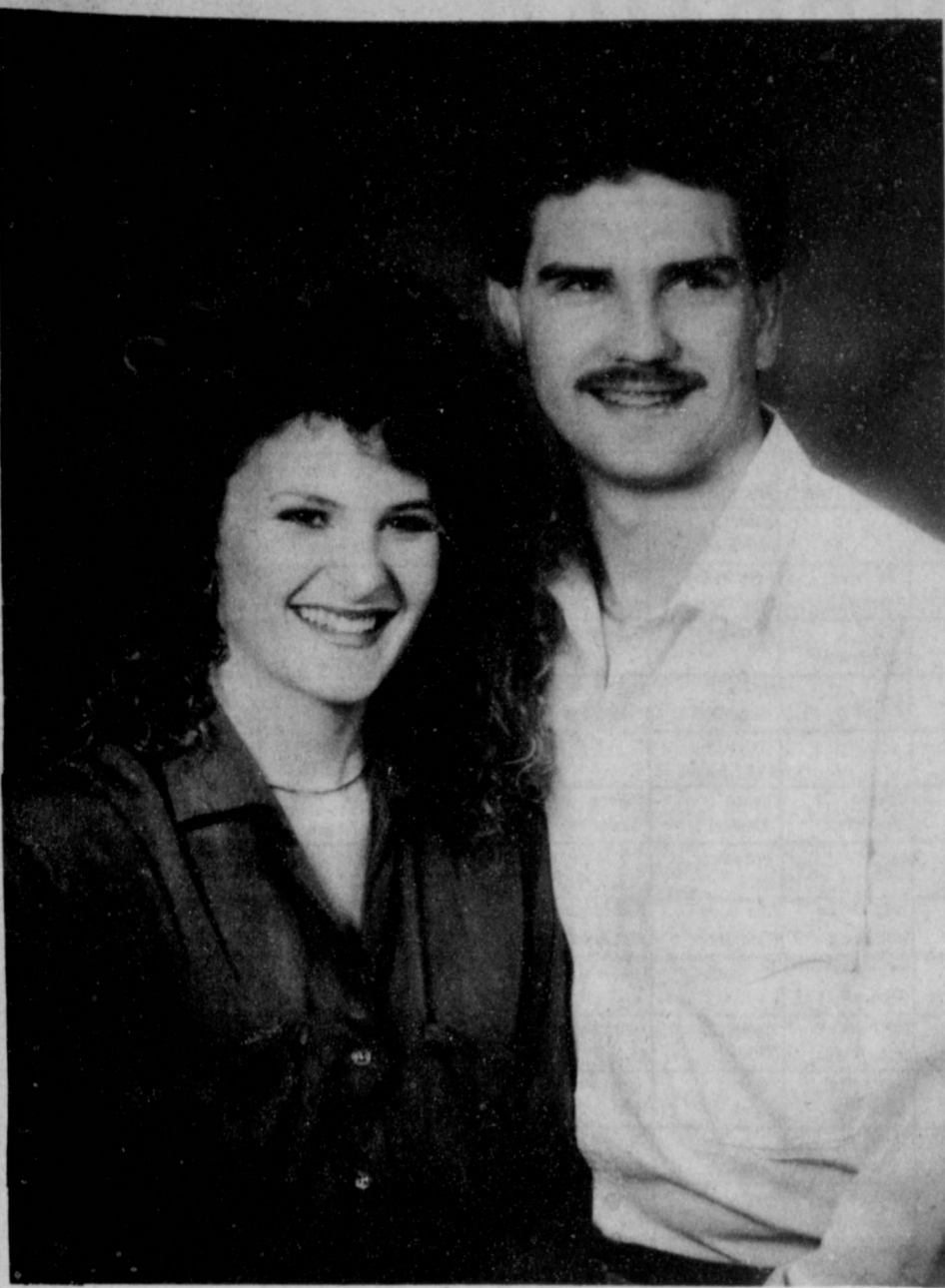

Leading scorers in the game were McDonald with 12 points, Fortenberry with 9 points Blanco with 4 points and Kellison with 2 points.

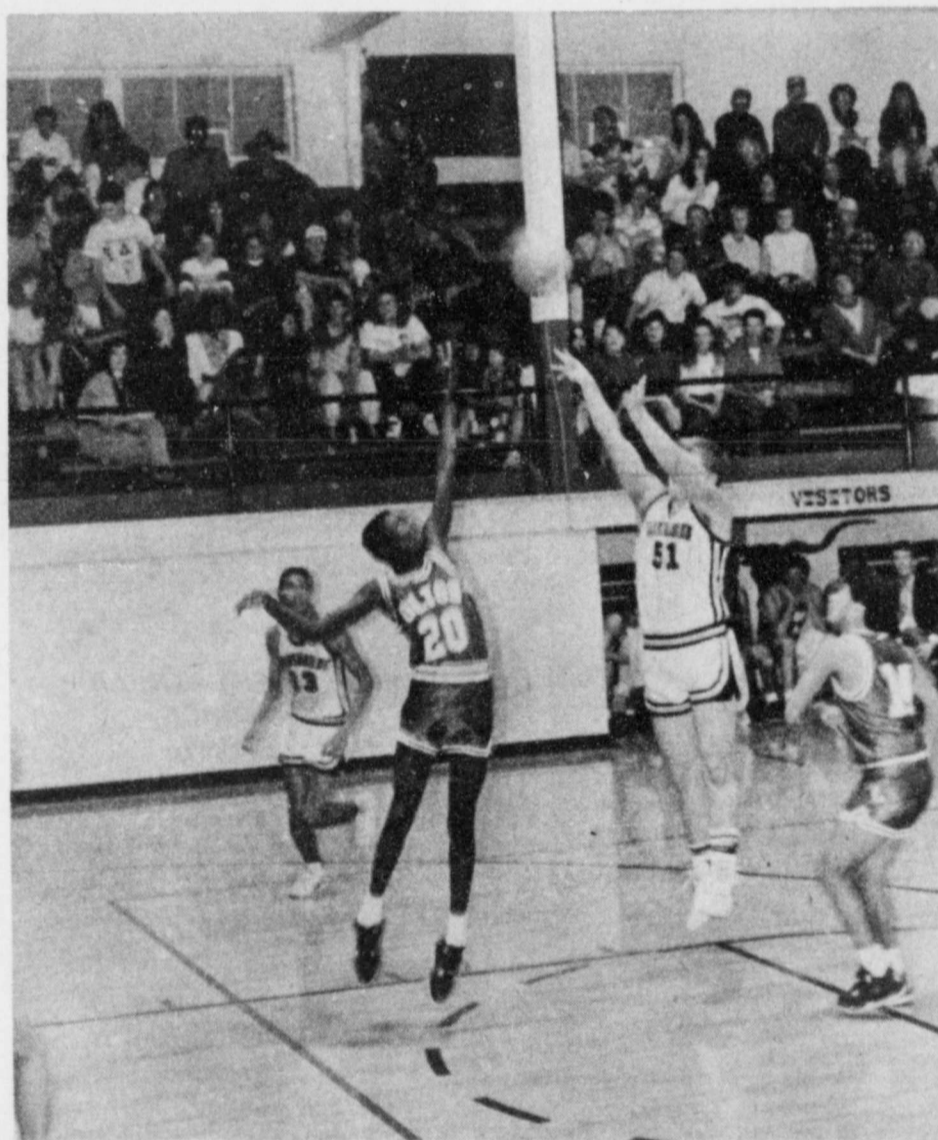

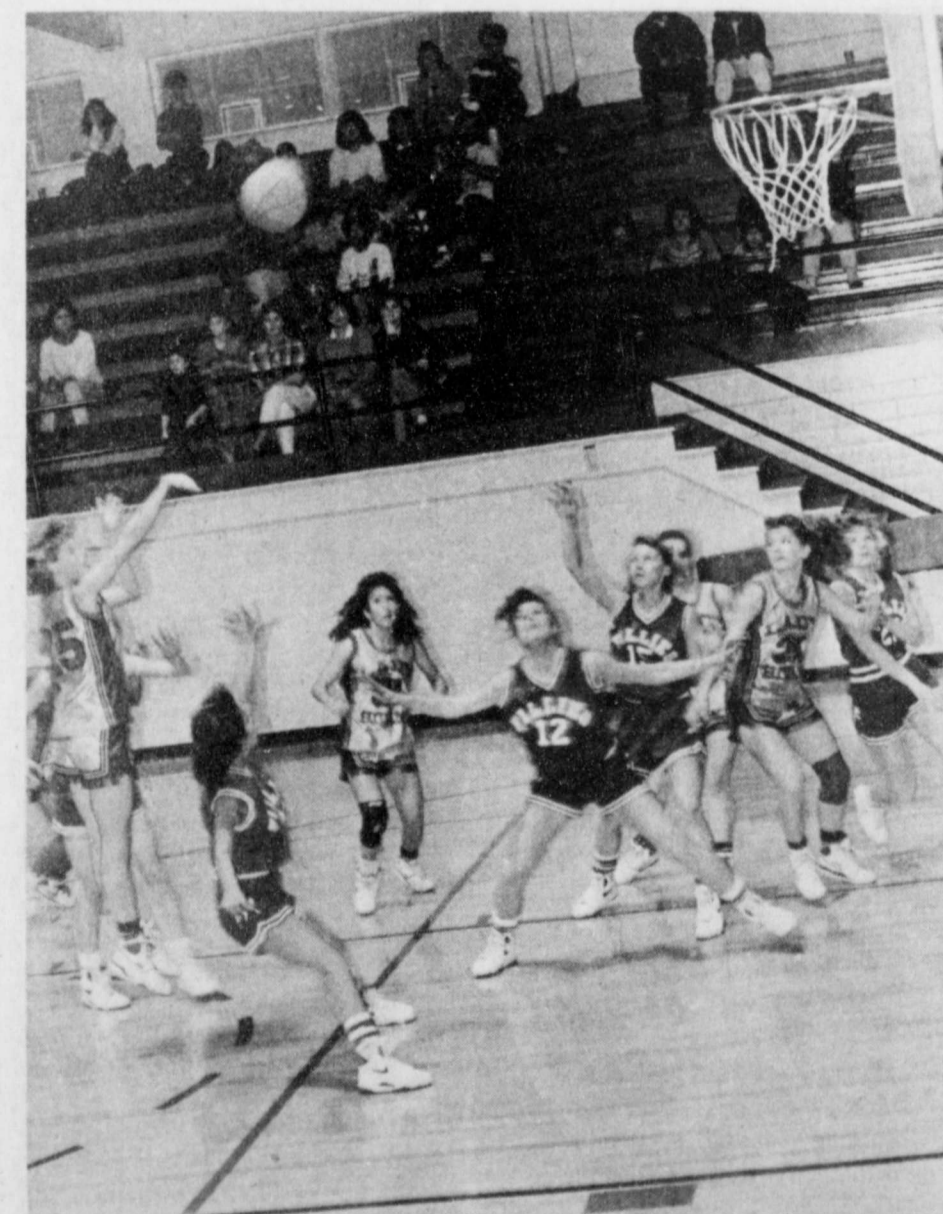
