Lenora Lena Pratt was born February 14, 1888, in Edgar County, Ill. The first child of H.A. and Olive Keys. She came to Texas with her parents and three brothers in April of 1910. She married Ed Pratt, in 1916. They had one child, a daughter, born in Lockney, Texas, in 1920. She was named Gladys and was called Bobby. Lena was a petite, well mannered young lady whose cheerfulness was infectious. She was a fastidious housekeeper and an inviolate cook.

The family lived south of Lockney in the Pleasant Valley community where they purchased land and farmed. Mrs. Pratt still owns the land and it is farmed by James Hall Ferguson.

After her husband's death, she moved to Brownsville to be near her daughter. While residing in Brownsville she was

very active in Past Patrons Club, Civic League, A.A.R.P., D.A.R. and Senior Citizen Organization. She was very active in weekly bingo and covered dish affairs at the center. She held leading positions in all affairs in which she was affiliated. Ten years ago she suffered a broken hip and went to Arizona to spend the time with her granddaughter, Katherine Shaler, she remained there until later part of 1989 when she came home to the Lockney Care Center. Other relatives of Mrs. Pratt in the area include: Arch Keys of Plainview and June Keys Weaver of Levelland.

Area adults have chance for learning

Persons in Floydada and Lockney that are 16 and older can attend a new adult education program. Anyone in this age group can study to improve their basic reading and/or math skills, learn English or study for their General Education Diploma (GED).

The South Plains Community Action JTPA 123 Program is an individualized computer-based skills training program and is being coordinated through the local school districts. The program is offered free of charge to persons who meet J.T.P.A. guidelines.

There are 31 different courses designed to meet a variety of individual needs in math, science, reading, language skills and computer education. The English as a second language program includes Spanish, Mandarin Chinese, Arabic, Italian, Hmong, and Japanese first-languages.

Lockney ISD organization and management detailed

EDITORS NOTE--This is a continuation of the series of the Lockney Independent School District Annual Performance Report for the 1988-89 Academic Year.

ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF
Lockney ISD has three administrators and a counselor, all of whom have masters degrees.

W.H. Hallmark has been a superintendent in Lockney for 13 years. Holding a masters of education, Hallmark has 30 years experience, with 21 of those years in administration.

Joyce Evans has been elementary principal for Kindergarten through fifth grades for three years. She holds a master of education with 16 total years experience. She has been in administra-

tion 10 years.

Junior High principal for grades sixth through eighth, Terry Ellison has 19 years experience. He has been in the administration capacity for 12 years, with four of those years in Lockney. He also holds a master of education.

High school principal for grades nine through 12, James Poole has been with Lockney schools for 12 years. He has 23 years experience with 13 years in administration. He holds a master of education.

Charlotte Mitchell, owning a master of science, is school counselor for all students, grades kindergarten through 12th grade. She has served in this capacity for 1-1/2 years. She has eight years of experience.

Lockney Public Schools consists of a high school, junior high, elementary, and vocational building. Several years ago, the Lockney School Board put in force a plan for continuous upgrading and renovation of our buildings.

LOCKNEY HIGH SCHOOL

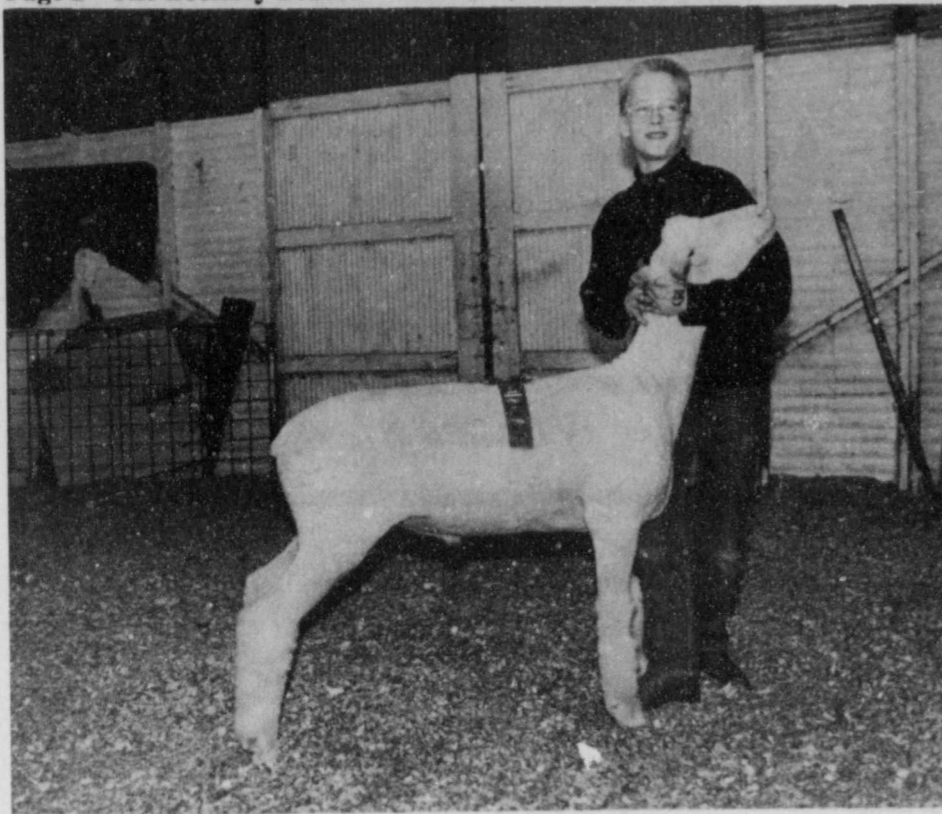
Lockney High School is a two-story building that was completed in 1929. This building can comfortably serve 350 students. For the school year 1988-89 there was an enrollment of 165 students. The decline in enrollment is attributed to the depressed agriculture economy. The high school building has had a complete face-lift over the last several years and is centrally heated and air conditioned. Classroom renovation

for high school was accomplished during the 86-87 school year.

LOCKNEY JUNIOR HIGH

Lockney Junior High was completed in 1957. This building is connected to the high school. This building consists of classrooms, a gym, and a band hall. The gym and band hall are used by both high school and junior high students. Like the high school, junior high has had a complete face-lift. Junior high was built to serve approximately 300 students, and for the school year 1988-89 enrollment averaged 180 students. Junior high also has central heat and air conditioning. A continued effort has been made to improve building and

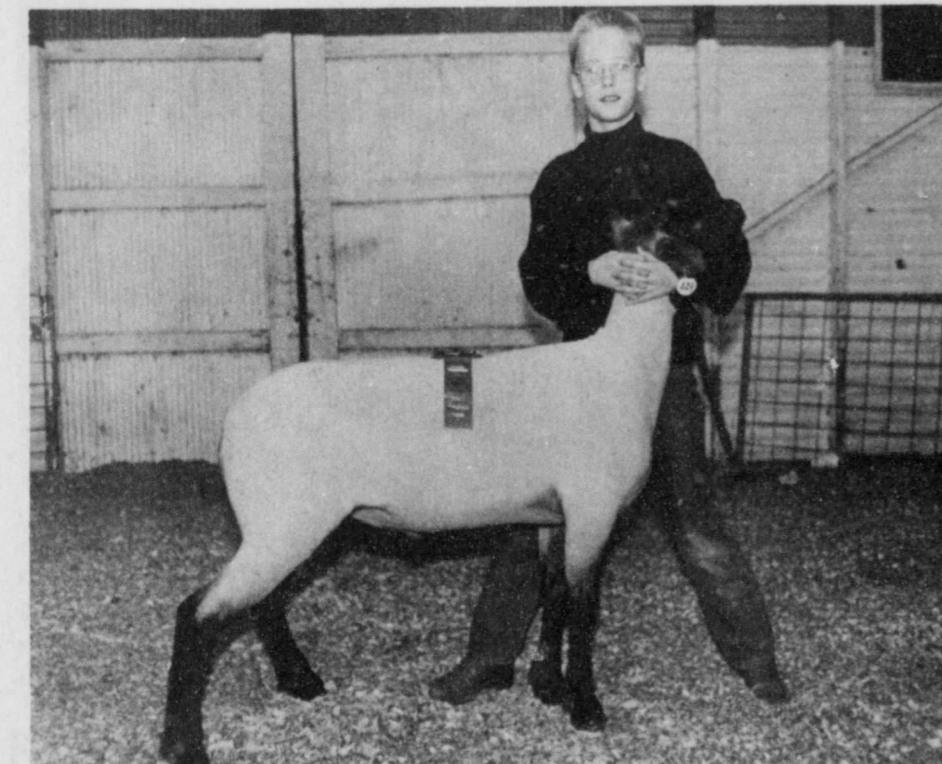

These 4-H and FFA exhibitors compete in one of two divisions of the Houston Livestock Show - the junior show division. The other division, the

open show, attracts its exhibitors from the world's agricultural industry, primarily professional breeders and ranchers.

Entries in both the open and junior shows combine with horse show entries to make the Houston Livestock Show the world's largest.

Representing 841 Texas 4-H clubs and FFA chapters, the junior show is expected to exceed 12,000 entries this year. A variety of animals are shown in the junior show division: market steers, market swine, market sheep, market poultry, beef and dairy heifers, breeding sheep, goats, commercial steers and breeding rabbits.

The four market animal categories represent animals raised by the exhibitor as food sources. Top animals in each of these categories are eligible for their individual market auctions. Total money paid in 1989 at the four junior

show auctions exceeded \$4.5 million.

"Our Show, the world's largest livestock show, attracts some of the finest breeders and ranchers from throughout the world. Yet during the second week of livestock show competition, the young 4-Hand FFA exhibitors take over the Astrohall. We feel these outstanding youngsters exemplify the purpose behind our event - to benefit youth and support education," said Steve Woodley, Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo assistant manager.

All net proceeds from the annual Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo provide funds for scholarships and research projects throughout the state. Currently, more than 1,000 students receive some form of Show-sponsored financial assistance, with 30 research projects funded. More than 6,500 volunteers ensure the success of each year's event.

LOCKNEY ELEMENTARY
Lockney Elementary, the newest of the facilities, was completed in 1964. This building was built to serve approximately 400 students. For 1988-89, the enrollment averaged 406 students. This building consists of classrooms, a cafeteria, gym and music room. Central heat and cooling is also in the elementary building.

TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM
The Lockney Public School transportation system consists of seven (7) bus routes. All buses are kept in top condition. Our bus drivers are extremely safety conscious, and this is indicated by our safety record. It has been six years since we have had any type of accident.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENTS
Improvements to the school during 1988-89 were a fifty by fifty metal storage building with a concrete floor and parking lot paving at the elementary and high school buildings.

PAPERWORK REDUCTION
With all of the new requirements of HB 72 came an increase in the amount of paperwork required of the school and faculty. The administration conducted in-service with the teachers to explain ways to make lesson plans and document mastery of essential elements with the least amount of paperwork. With the help of the aides, the office staff and the building principals monitoring and constant reminder of what was necessary, paperwork was held to a minimum. Continued effort will be made to minimize the paperwork burden.

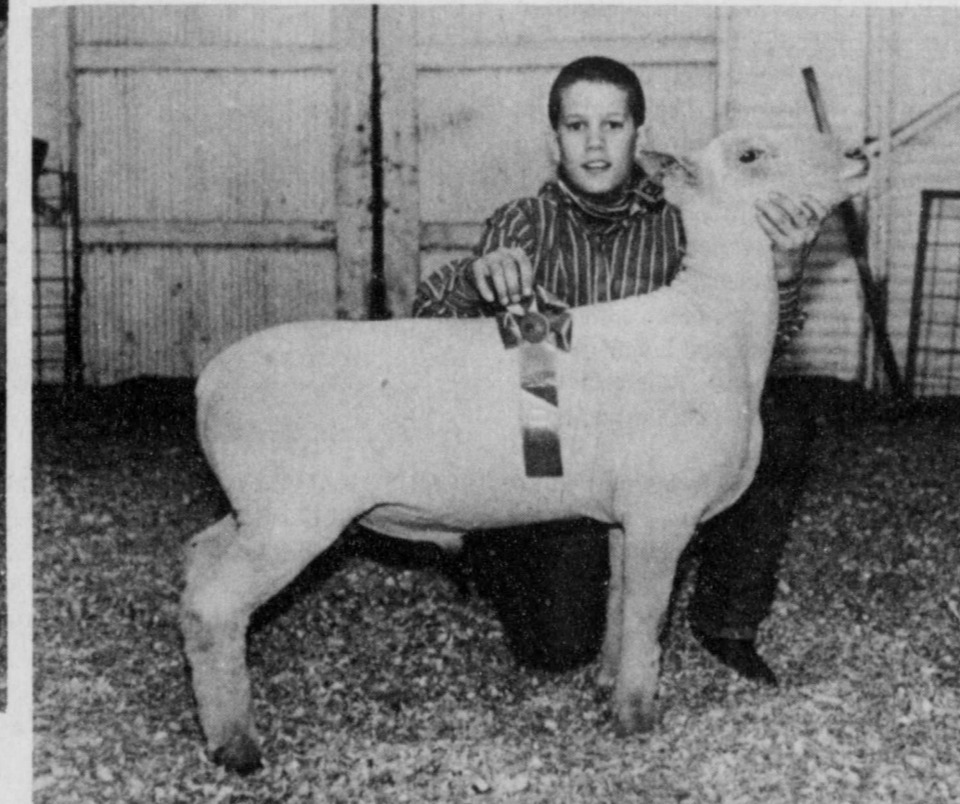

Texas has child passenger safety awareness week

What most people do not know is that the most common form of child abuse is the neglect of a parent or guardian to allow a child to ride in an automobile unprotected.

More children are killed in automobile crashes than by any other cause, including other accidents, diseases, and child abuse. Texas has a law which requires children under the age of four to ride fully protected in a car by either a child safety seat or a safety belt. Nevertheless, less than half of Texas children ride restrained.

The week of February 11-17, Governor Bill Clements has proclaimed National Child Passenger Safety Awareness Week. This week provides a special opportunity to focus attention on the child safety issue in every community across the country. Under the slogan "Buckle Up for Love!" this year celebration is designed to encourage parents and others to correctly protect their children in child safety seats and belts on every trip.

'Buckle Up For Love' this Valentine's

As Valentine's Day approaches, our thoughts turn towards finding ways to show our loved ones how much we care about them. Flowers, cards, chocolates, words are only one-time gestures. This year, try giving the gift that keeps on giving - buckle your children into child safety seats and safety belts whenever they ride in cars. And remember to buckle up everyone else, too.

Each year, several hundred children are killed in highway crashes because they are not fully protected. In too many cases, children were told to get in the car and sit down. Some drivers even had a child safety seat in the vehicle, but either forgot to use it one crucial time, or didn't

anchor the seat correctly. The results were tragic.

Why do people buy safety seats and not use them? They may purchase a seat because it seems like a good idea at the time, or because using it is the law in all 50 states and the District of Columbia. Maybe the safety seat was a gift. But after a while, the well meaning parent may start to believe that the safety seat is too uncomfortable for the child, too bulky or heavy, or perhaps the instructions are too complex to follow. It may not seem "worth all the bother" to use a child safety seat, because the likelihood of being in a crash seems very remote to most people.

The flaw in that logic is that it takes only one unexpected crash or sudden stop to make you regret our decision not to buckle up. In a split second, your regrets can literally fly out the window. Every child has the right to be as safe as possible in a car. Every person who drives with children is responsible for protecting their lives, even if it may seem inconvenient or costly.

Using a child safety seat need not be a burden. Before buying one, go to stores

and look at the variety of seats available. See the features each seat offers and decide which are most necessary for you. Take your child (or a lifesize doll) with you and test the seat's comfort, convenience and compatibility with your vehicle. Some aspects of a safety seat are not obvious until you begin to use it.

Another hint is to look at the instruction manual before you buy the seat. If the instructions are confusing or the diagrams not clear to you, ask the sales clerk to demonstrate how to install and use the seat you want. Don't make the mistake of buying something that you won't use after you leave the store.

Finally, remember that your child not only needs protection for his or her life, but your child needs you, too. Remember to buckle up yourself and everyone in the vehicle. You're a great role model. Buckle up for love! Buckle up for life.

To be selected for the President's Honor List, students must maintain a 4.0 or straight A grade point average while carrying a minimum of 12 semester hours.

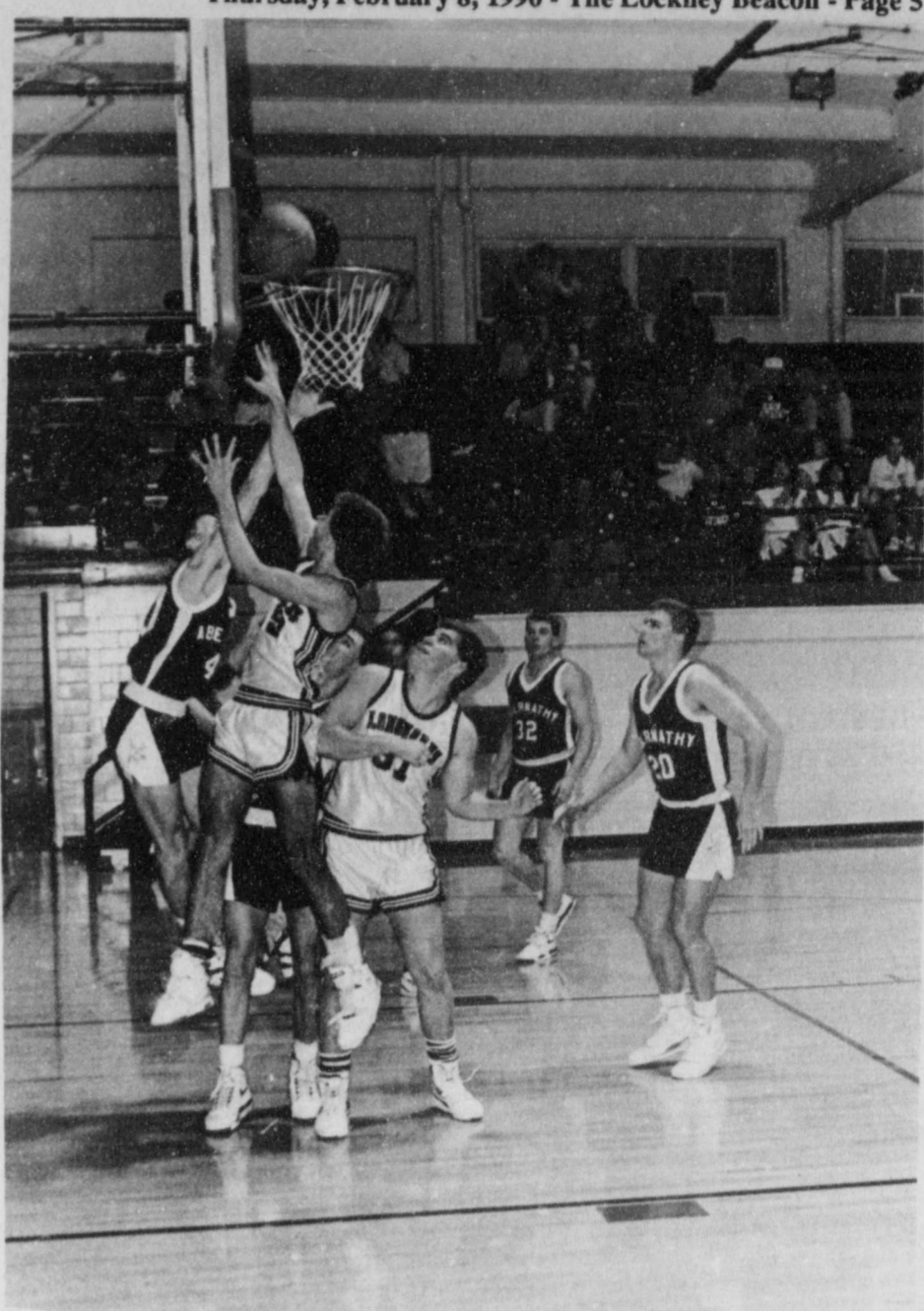
Honor students selected to the Dean's List at SPC have maintained a minimum 3.25 grade point average in their studies.

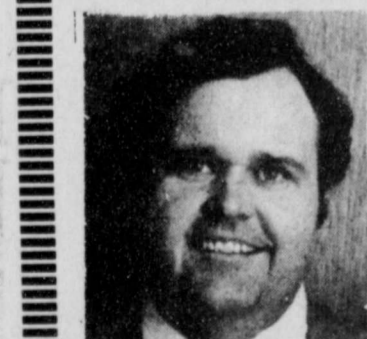

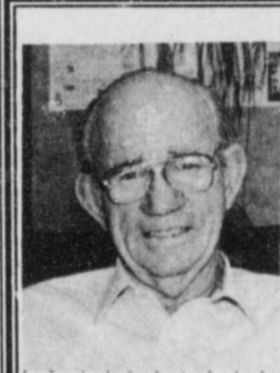

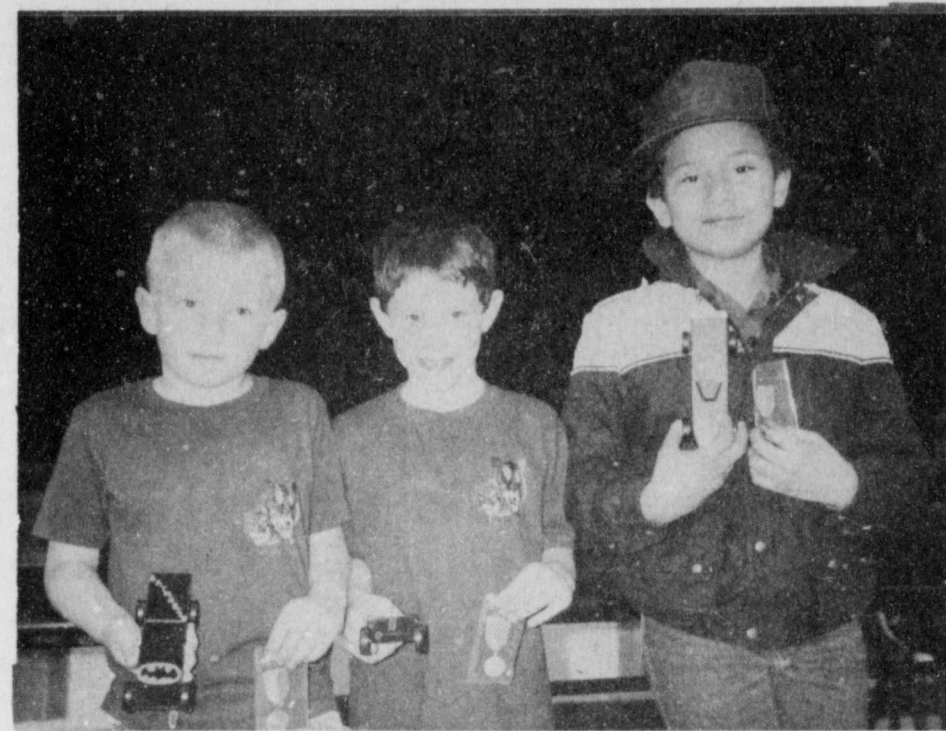

Tyson McDonald's car was judged "best looking." J.J. Gonzales was second in the appearance contest. Abel Rosales won the "Cubby Car"

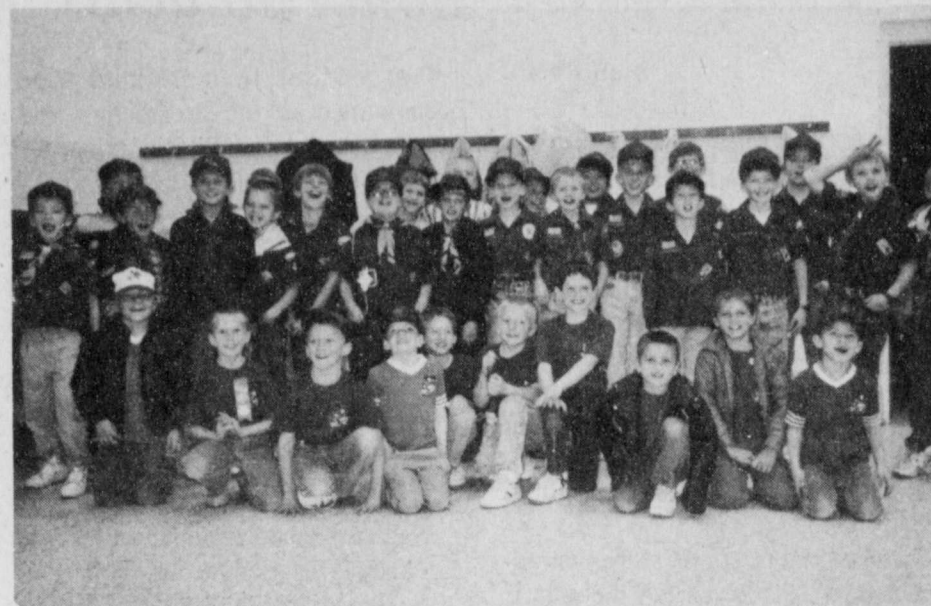
award. Chuck Aufill had the fastest car in the Dads' competition.
