Lockney High School presents play

The UIL contest will be March 29, in Olton. Actors will include: Cindy Cook, Lila Booker, David Perez, Kema Blanco, Ignacia Luna, Eric Humphreys, Chad Cook, Valency Zumwalt, Chad Golden, Robin Marks, Clay Golden, Cody Jackson and Amanda Henderson. "Painted Face" was originally produced by the youth theatre in association with the Catawba County Council on Adolescents, on March 18, 1988. It was

used to promote awareness of teen suicide as an important social issue requiring the development of on going preventive measures.

The main character, Khaki Manders, is a 17-year-old girl. She is pretty, smart and unusually talented. Her parents are

well off, supportive and very proud of their daughter. She lacks nothing materially, academically, socially or professionally.

She is fully aware of her attributes, as are those around her, but she is full of despair. She is suicidal.

Painted Face is the story of a young girl who is overwhelmed with expectations; those she has of herself, and those others have of her.

The play is designed to open the door to discussion, build awareness around the issue and bring light to preventive measures.

Rodriguez receives CARE Award

Christobal J. Rodriguez, son of Mr. and Mrs. Toribio Rodriguez, of Lockney, was awarded the "Clean Aircraft Require Effort (CARE) Award, by the Air Force. Rodriguez is stationed at Shaw Air Force Base, in South Carolina. Rodriguez's parents were informed of his award through a letter from the Department of the Air Force. The letter explained that the purpose of the CARE Award is to foster pride among the dedicated and assistant crew chiefs. Keep the appearance of the 77F-16C/Ds at the highest standards, and reward those who excel. "Our crew chiefs are "dedicated" to a particular aircraft tail number and launch their chief and his aircraft readily shows through by the care and attention

that the crew chiefs give their pride and joy, especially since their name is painted on the aircraft." In deciding the CARE Award winner, the judges look at the interior/exterior appearance of the aircraft, the condition of the aircraft forms, and the military bearing and appearance of the dedicated and assistant crew chiefs. Points are then awarded for each category of competition (1=good, 2=excellent, and 3=outstanding). Competition among the 102 crew chief teams is tough, as noted by the last-minute preparations to present the perfect aircraft. 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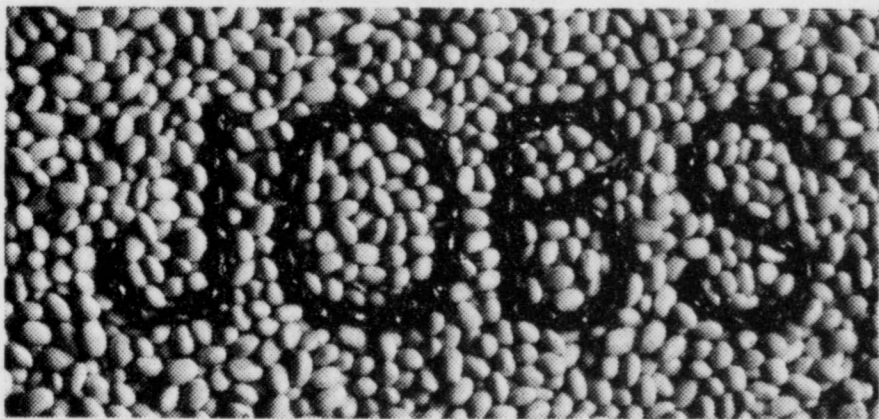

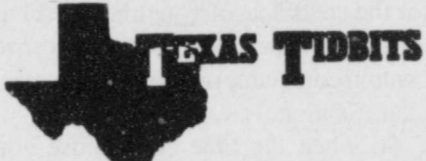

duced and each gave brief biographical histories and their reasons for seeking the respective offices. Congressman Bill Sarpalus, seeking re-election in the 13th Congressional District, was represented by Aaron Alejandro. Sarpalus is unopposed in the March 13 Democratic Primary.

State Representative, Dick Waterfield of Canadian, Republican candidate for the 13th Congressional seat, was represented by Jim Newberry. Former Congressman Bob Price of Pampa, Waterfield's opponent in the March 13 Primary, was unable to attend. In lieu of a surrogate for Mr. Price, Bill Gray gave a biographical sketch of that candidate.

Alejandro noted that in his first Congressional term, Bill Sarpalus was appointed to the agriculture and small business committees as well as a Select Committee for children, youth and family. Jim Newberry, speaking on behalf of Waterfield, explained that his candidate was a farmer-rancher and not a professional politician. "At President George Bush's request, Waterfield entered the Republican Primary, seeking the Congressional seat now occupied by

Sarpalius," according to Newberry.

Other candidates attending the session were David Cave, who is seeking re-election as judge of the 110th Judicial District, and Randy Hollums, the opposing candidate for the seat. Cave cited his record for the past three years as his strongest qualification for retaining the seat. Hollums stressed that his 13 years experience as District Attorney provides him the valuable trial experience necessary to serve the position of District Judge.

David Cave and Randy Hollums responded to several queries pertaining to the office of District Judge. Both pledged their belief in fairness and swiftness in the judicial process.

Additional candidates for the March 13, Democratic Primary included: Barbara Edwards, District Clerk; William D. Hardin, Floyd County Judge; Margaret Collier, County Clerk; Floyd Jackson, Commissioner Precinct #2; and Mike Mooney, Justice of Peace, Precinct #2 and #3.

Also appearing were Howard G. Bishop, G.L. Fawver, and Delfino Pesina, all candidates for Precinct #4 Commissioner in the Democratic Primary.

Written questions were submitted from the audience to moderator Becky McPherson.

Bishop, Fawver, and Pesina were mostly in agreement on the answer to a number of the questions concerning the commissioners post - none had served in the position and could only give their personal opinion on some of the issues.

Numerous questions were asked of the candidates, with the majority of them being addressed to the candidates for commissioner. A few of those questions are highlighted below:

One of the questions asked of the candidates was, "How do you feel about combining the Sheriff's office and the city police departments?"

Commissioner Floyd Jackson stated, "Becky, the way I feel...it's too difficult

Another interesting race for this area will be that between State Representative Dick Waterfield of Canadian and U.S. Rep. Sarpalus of Amarillo. We are assuming, of course, that Waterfield will beat Bob Price in the Republican primary and go on to oppose Sarpalus in the General Election in November.

If Waterfield wins the Republican Primary and goes into the General Election against Sarpalus, he will have far more Democratic support throughout the 13th District than would be usual for an identified and identifiable conservative Republican. He is receiving support from Democratic State Rep. Warren Chisum, who represents this District in the Texas Legislature. (Chisum knows both Waterfield and Sarpalus, and he knows the reputation both have down in Austin, where all three have served in the State Legislature.) That combined with Waterfield's support from his home base in the northern and western part of the District, is likely to make him a formidable candidate indeed. We also expect the race to be heavily contested, even heated at times.

And still closer to home the contest between incumbent District Judge David Cave and former District Attorney Randy Hollums is drawing Democratic primary voters' attention. Up to now that has been a low key contest. But as everyone in this judicial district knows, Judge Cave can be an exceedingly active campaigner. This time, however, he is the incumbent, and that calls for a different approach. Mr. Hollums, on the other hand, has always struck us as a sort of laid-back campaigner. So all the earmarks are there, in both camps, for a quiet, one-on-one campaign. Still, who knows?

and I feel that each one should take care of their own business. But, it any event that they want to work together, then it's something that should be talked about."

Howard Bishop replied, "I personally think that someday it's something that should be considered and looked into."

"To tell the truth about it," said G.L. Fawver, "I really don't know what ought to be done. But, it they can get along, then each one should work by themselves."

Delfino Pesina answered, "On this question...I think what we should do is work together a little more, but still keep the cities and county separated."

The question was asked, "What would you do if an industry such as Campbell Soup Company came to Floyd County and wanted to build a 3 million dollar facility on the condition that the county would give them a 10-year tax abatement? And do you have any plans to attract industry to the county?"

G.L. Fawver said, "We need some industries here, but I don't think we should give the whole ten (years abatement)...we might give five. If we can get some industry here, we ought to give them consideration. I would do all I could to help bring industry (to the county)."

Howard Bishop said, "I think we definitely would have to negotiate the taxes over a period of years...we would have to talk about a tax abatement."

Delfino Pesina said, "Well, I'm very much for attracting industry for the county. When I ran for commissioner four years ago, one of my basic points was to try to encourage industry to the county."

G.L. Fawver said, "It would take some negotiating, but I can't hardly say tonight."

The commissioners were also asked, "Are you in favor of hiring a road superintendent to oversee all road repair and maintenance?" Would that cause the commissioners to have to take a cut in pay?"

Fawver said, "I wouldn't object, but I don't see how one man could cover the whole county."

Bishop said, "This issue...it keeps coming up and there seems to be a constant debate about it. It is something that should be looked into in the future and decide one way or another...to forget it or go for it."

Pesina said, "Well...on this question...to cut from four foreman to just one in the county...I just don't know. We could try two, and if that didn't work, to back to the original operating ways with the four foreman. If we were going to cut expense, we could cut to two...but not one."

Also asked was, "Are you in favor of a substantial pay raise for the county law enforcement officers?"

Bishop said, "I haven't been on the commissioners court yet...I just better not comment on that. I am not aware of what they are making."

Fawver said, "I don't know what they're making. If the money's there, then perhaps they should get a raise."

Becky McPherson then asked, "What about a cut in something else to make the money available?"

Fawver said, "I wouldn't answer that question...that's a big problem as to what would be cut."

Pesina said, "At this time, I don't think it would be wise for a pay raise. I'm not saying this because I'm not on the county payroll. At one time I was a county jailer. If I still was a county jailer, I would go for it, but I wouldn't go for it as a county commissioner."

The forum adjourned at approximately 9:00 p.m. The Avance/Advance organization is planning on having more political forums throughout this election year.



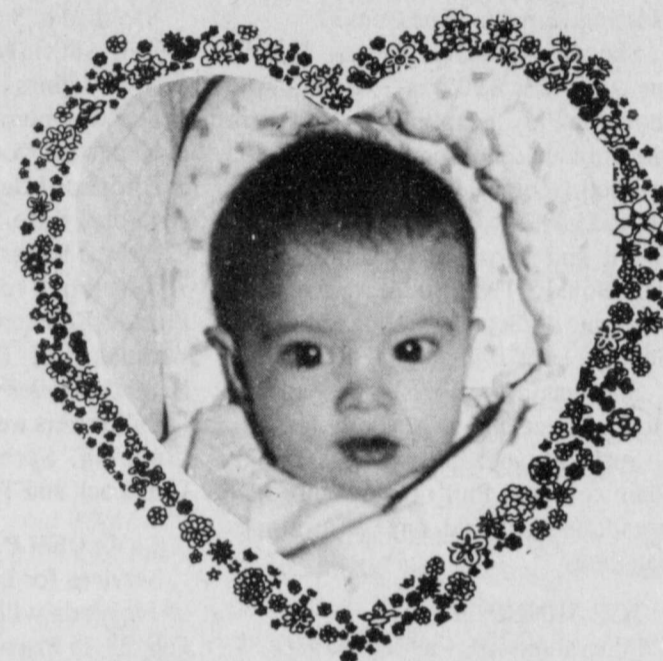

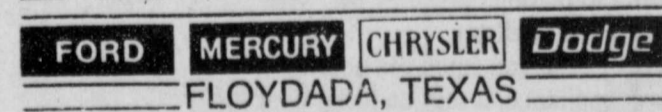

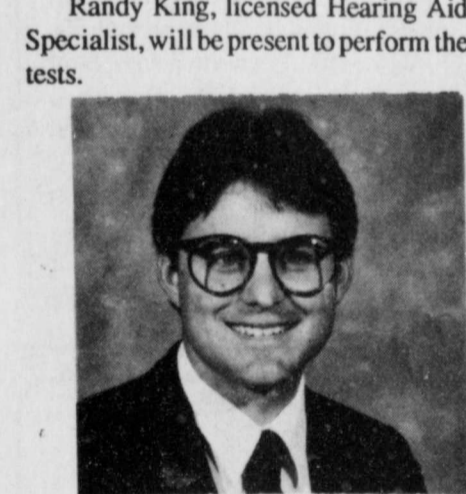

1. ALL CIVIL CASES APPEALED HAVE BEEN UPHELD ON APPEAL.
2. ALL OLD CASES HAVE BEEN DISPOSED OF.
3. EVERYONE RELEASED ON BOND HAS RETURNED TO COURT FOR TRIAL.
4. CONSIDERATE OF THOSE WHO NEEDED TO BE EXCUSED FROM JURY SERVICE.

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
