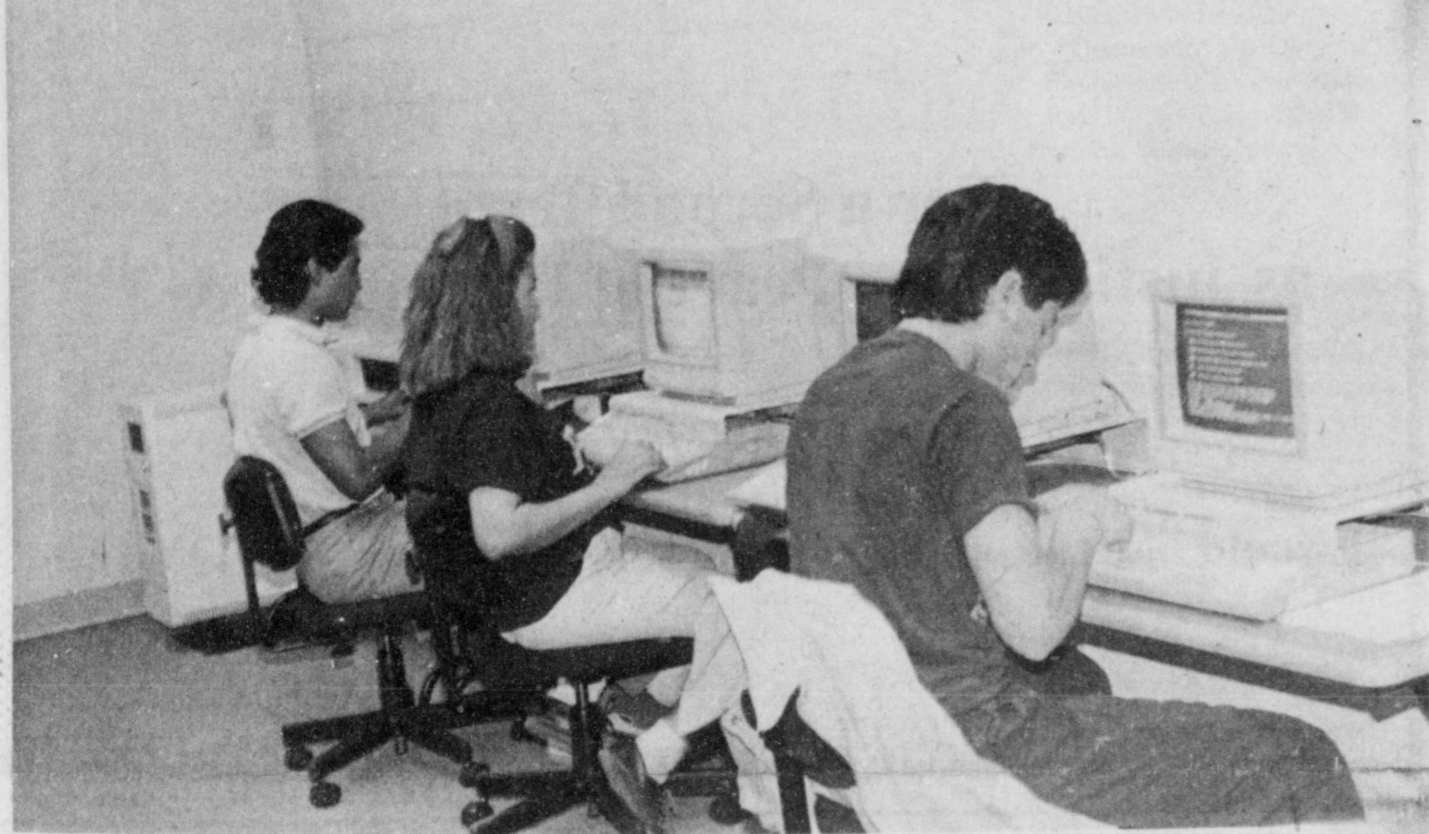

Office environment in computer lab

Lockney High School has refurbished a room on the first floor and turned it into a computer lab with an office environment. It was finished in December.

The school purchased twelve IBM Personal System/Model 30 Computers for the Computer Math and Programming Class taught by Mrs. Ladora Aull.

Peggy Hallmark, Mrs. Aull and others looked at several computer rooms at various schools when trying to decide how to set up the classroom.

Mrs. Hallmark said, "We looked at a

1989 building permits up 45%

Residential building permits in Lockney, increased by 45% in 1989, totaling \$400,689.74. Total dollar value of permits in 1988 was \$219,369.00.

Thirty-six permits were issued for 1989. These included two new homes, totaling \$250,000.00; 13 for moving in trailer homes, houses and storage sheds, at a total of \$72,419.74; and 21 for additions and remodeling, totaling \$78,270.00.

In 1988, there were 14 additions and remodeling permits issued, 12 move-in permits, and one new home. The total amount of permits issued in 1988 was 27.

The dollar total for residential permits in 1989 was the highest for the past seven years. The totals for the past seven years are: \$144,493 for 1982; \$152,365 for 1983; \$962,382 for 1984; \$122,585 for 1985; \$188,445 for 1986; \$252,245 for 1987; \$219,369.00 for 1988; and \$400,689.74 for 1989.

bunch of computer rooms in other school districts to see how we wanted to set ours up. We didn't find any that we liked, so we set up our own the way we felt it was best suited for our needs. It looks like an office environment, and that is the way we wanted it. We want the students to act like office employees when they enter. This environment has really made a difference."

Mrs. Hallmark added, "We will eventually teach typing strictly from computer."

Classes now taught in the computer lab are typing, accounting, computer programming and at a later date science and history will be added to the list of classes.

Students at Lockney High School needing additional help in some areas of the classroom can now find it in new Computer Assisted Instruction (CAI) classes, taught by Zelda Zumwalt.

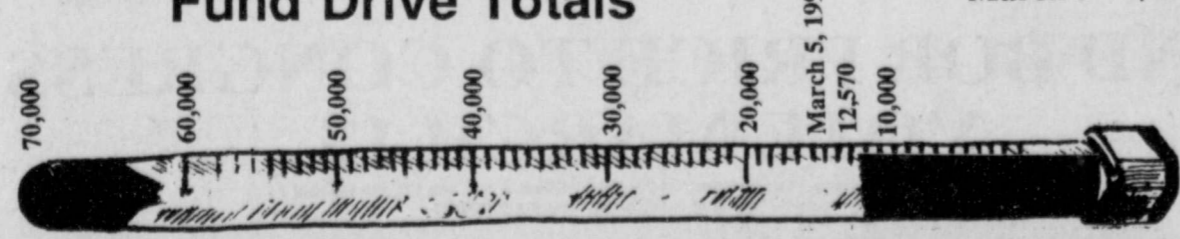
Fourteen students have already enrolled in the lab and the program is only three weeks old. More students are expected to join the program soon.

The computer lab is being used as a supplement to assist in math, writing, language arts, reading, algebra, computer education and science. This lab does not take the place of regular classroom work, but will be used to tutor those who may be having trouble in those classes.

"We hope to have the courses open for adults also," said Mrs. Zumwalt. "It would also be good for adults trying to prepare for GED. Any adult who is interested can call the high school and leave your name and number so we can get back in touch with you."

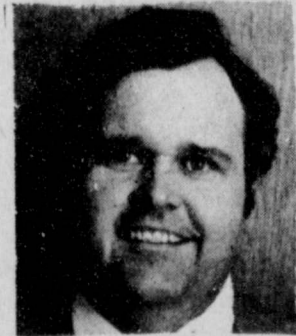

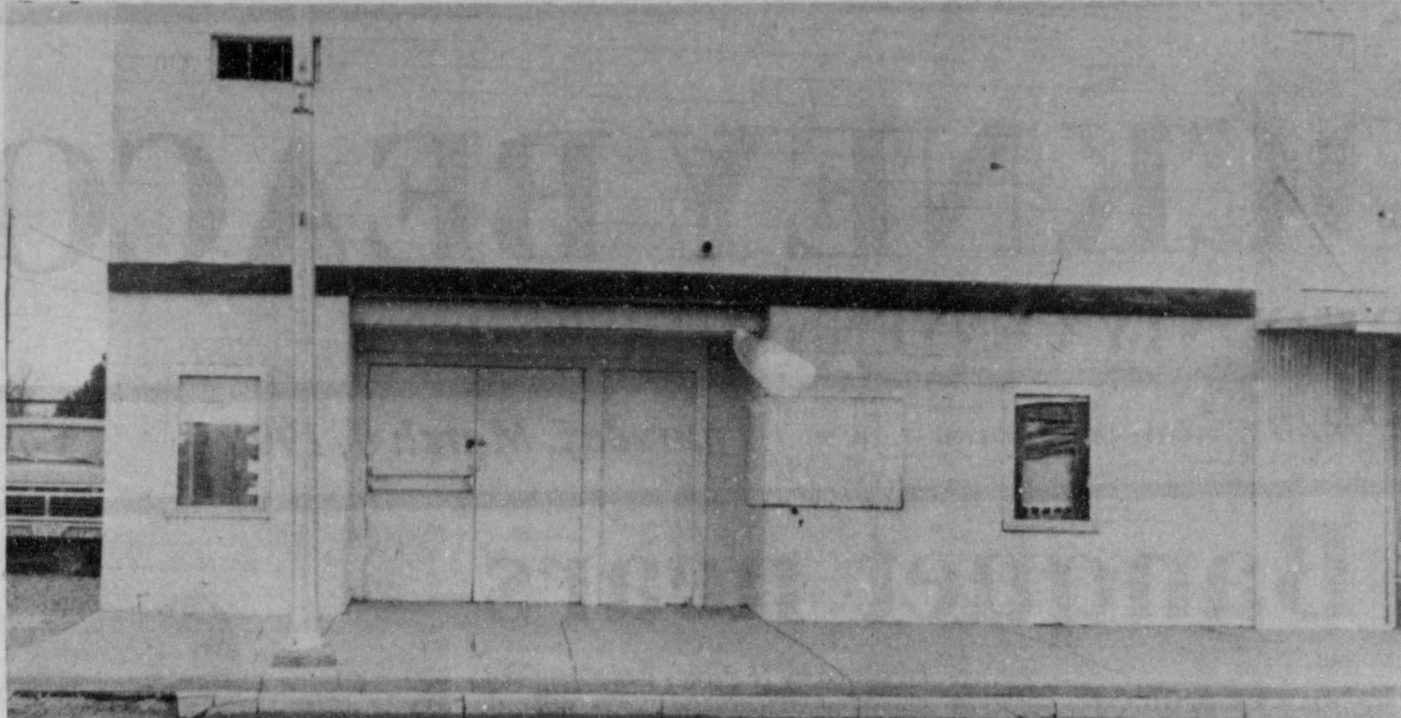

LISD financial condition addressed in report series

EDITOR'S NOTE: This article is a continuation of the series on the Lockney Independent School Districts Annual Performance Report for the 1988-89 Academic year.

Lockney ISD can take pride in its financial condition. The school board has always been conscious of its responsibility to the student body as well as to the taxpayer. With the help of the new finance bill passed by the legislature, the financial condition has improved even more than anticipated.

State aid will increase or decrease based on enrollment. A three-year example indicates the amount of state aid received, number of students and the amount of state aid received per student.

In the 1987-88 school year the average daily attendance was 703. The budget expense amounted to 2,439,689, and the amount per student is 3,470.39.

In the 1988-89 school year the average daily attendance was 713. The budget expense amounted to 2,698,664 and the amount per student is 3,784.94.

The district has been fortunate to maintain a fund-balance—the board has seen the need to provide a safe balance for emergency situations. A

two-month operating fund balance has been the rule of thumb to try to maintain. Because of increased state funding, our fund balance has grown. The extra funds are being used to upgrade staff development and programs offered. Listed below are the fund balances for the last three years.

1987-88	1988-89
\$1,092,361	\$1,022,428

All services for taxes and collections are completed by the appraisal district. The budget for tax collections is \$127,061. Lockney's share of that budget is \$20,978. The tax base for Lockney ISD is approximately \$76,212,786 with a tax rate of 72 cents.

The wealth of the district will increase or decrease on agriculture production, businesses opening or closing, and new construction. District wealth per student population based on the tax base indicated above is \$103,300 per student. Based on this figure, our district wealth is below the state wealth per student.

Because we fall below the state wealth per student, we qualify for extra state funds called Equalization Aid. These extra funds are used to provide students with opportunities similar to those provided by the most affluent districts.

R.C. PHILLIPS

Funeral services for R.C. Phillips, 80, were held at 11 a.m. Monday, March 5,

at Lemons Memorial Chapel with the Rev. A.C. Hamilton, pastor of Finney Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in Lockney Cemetery by Lemons Funeral Home.

Mr. Phillips died at 8:55 p.m. Friday, March 2, 1990, at Lubbock Methodist Hospital following a short illness.

Born May 9, 1909, in Parker City, he moved to Lockney when he was 9. He attended school in Providence. Mr. Phillips moved to Long Beach, Calif., in 1936, and joined the Army in February 1942. He served in the South Pacific, being discharged in September 1945. He returned to Floyd County and farmed north of Lockney.

Mr. Phillips married Alva Jo McDonald on September 4, 1946, in Amarillo. They moved to Plainview in 1954. He retired from active farming in 1962.

He was a member of Date Street Baptist Church, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans, and Plainview Senior Citizens.

Mr. Phillips is survived by his wife; a brother, Oscar Phillips of Lockney; and several nieces and nephews.

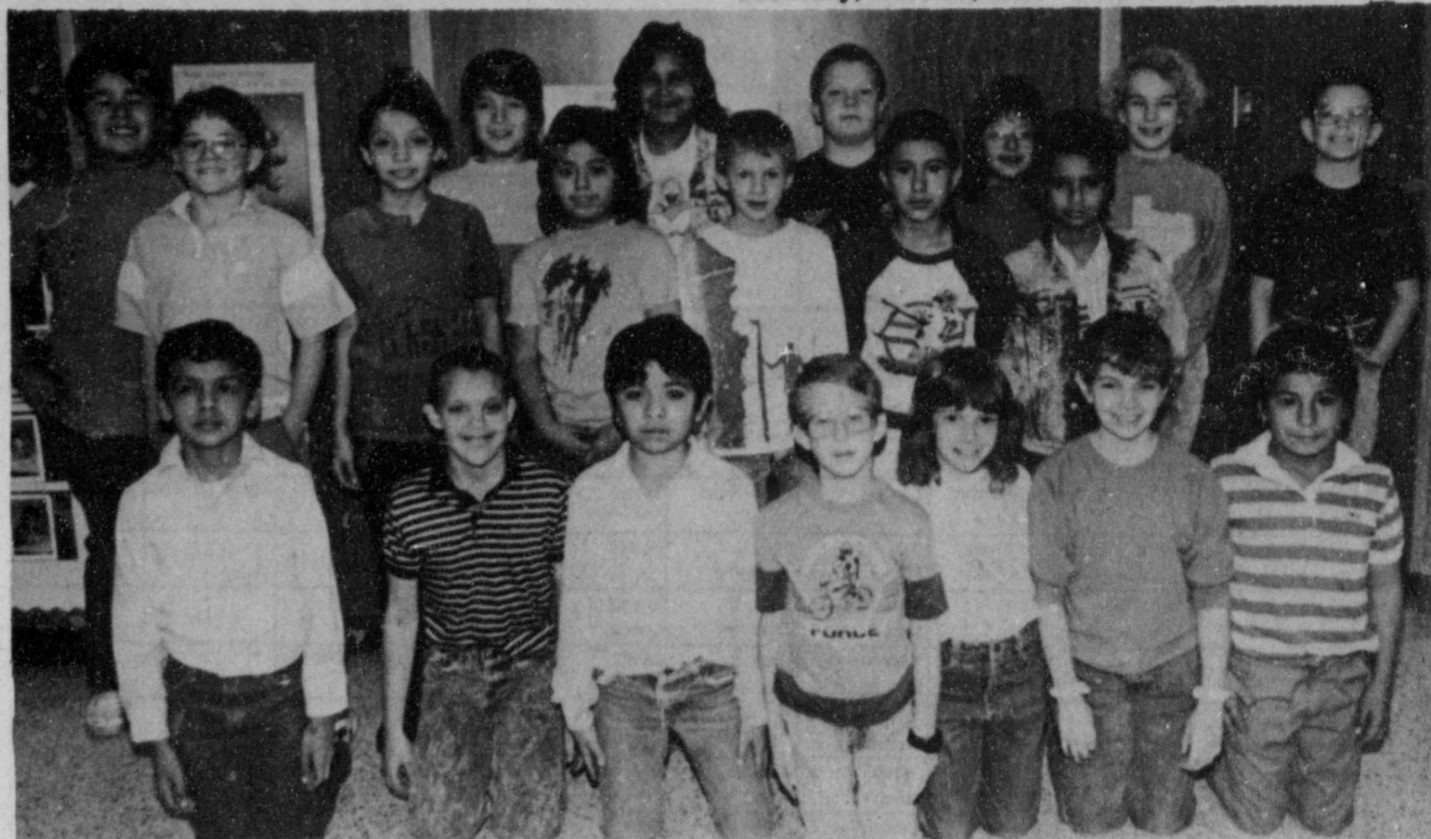

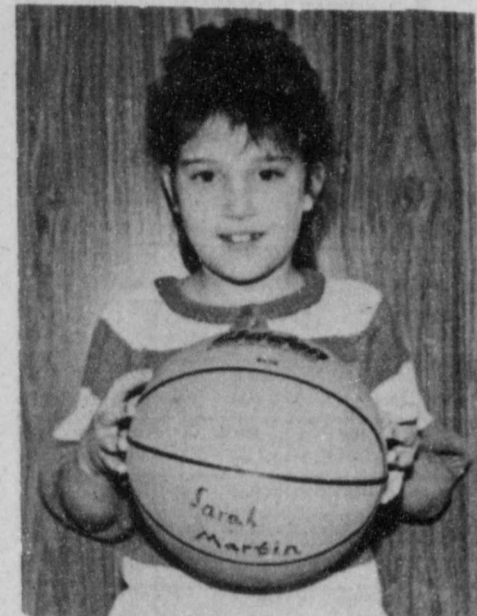


During the three and one half years that I have served as your District Judge I have made a diligent effort to be worthy of the trust and confidence that you placed in me when you first elected me to this office.
