

Centennial sunrise Easter service attended by many in Floyd County

Cars, pickups and busses came in streams from the north, south and west. Their headlights and taillights lighting the way for others. Lucy Dean Record played prelude music on the piano as the group quietly gathered on the grass. Young and old alike sat in quiet reverence as the sun came up in the east signaling the beginning of Easter Sunday.

Approximately two hundred Floyd County residents visited the Eddie and Cheryl Teeter farm at sunrise on April 15 to take part in a sunrise service celebrating the resurrection of Our Lord Jesus Christ.

"He is Risen" was the theme of the service which had also been designated as a Floyd County Centennial event.

As the sun rose in the east Reverend Bruce Adamson, pastor of the Trinity Lutheran Church at Providence, came forward to give the welcome.

The Whirlwind Brass, representing several churches in Floydada, played the call to worship and Reverend Garry Higgs, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Lockney gave the opening prayer. He thanked the Lord for this day that he had given us and for His Son who died on the cross so that we could be forgiven for our sins.

The congregation rose and sang "Christ The Lord Is Risen Today". The song echoed into the pink and red clouds which were gathered on the horizon.

LaVada Garrett, a member of the First Assembly of God Church of Floydada, made her way to the podium and the congregation was spellbound as she sang "Were You There When They Crucified My Lord". Her voice carried across the landscape as if on wings. She

was accompanied on the piano by Dell Gray of Floydada.

"The Holy City" was played by Bobby Rainer on the saxophone. His rendition was soft and gentle. He is a member of the First United Methodist Church of Floydada and he was also accompanied by Dell Gray on the piano.

The congregation rose to sing "I Serve a Risen Savior" and again the music pealed forth in the spirit of the occasion.

Garry Higgs came to the microphone and sang, "Jesus, Lord to Me" His voice carried out into the crowd and led the congregation into the mood of the sermon.

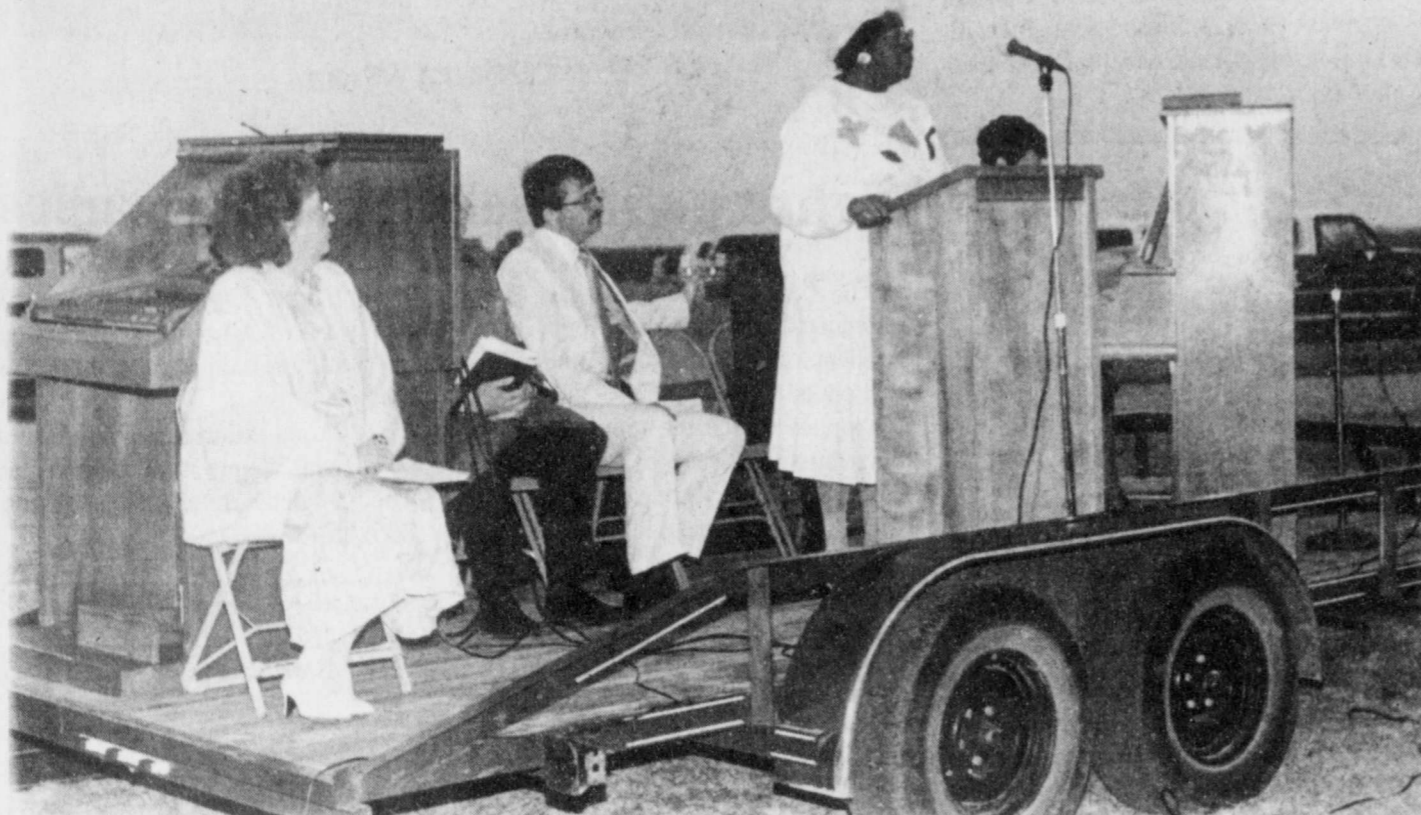
Hal Farnsworth, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Floydada, told the story of the crucifixion. He explained to those present that the stone was rolled from the opening of the tomb so that the women who had come to prepare the body of Jesus could get in, not so that Jesus could get out. "He Is Risen" was the title of the sermon and was taken from Mark 16:1-8.

After the sermon Robert Kirk came and sang "Because He Lives", and those in the audience joined in on the chorus. Those present had no doubt that Jesus does live and will forgive our sins if we ask him.

The congregation stood once more and joined together singing "Low In The Grave He Lay".

Bill Wright, pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Floydada led the benediction and encouraged those present to tell their face that they were happy and to put on a smile. He concluded, "Smile and act so happy that others will wonder what you are up to."

The congregation gathered around the chuckwagon for coffee, doughnuts and visiting with fellow Floyd County worshippers. Soon the roads were filled with cars on their way home. Some to Sunday school and church and others to celebrate the day with their family and friends. Each went back to their niche feeling closer to nature, their fellow human beings and to their Lord.

Third annual Charles Ball Fishing Tournney is slated

The third annual Charles Ball Memorial Fishing Tournament, for Lockney area fishermen, will be held at Lake Mackenzie on Saturday, April 21.

The tournament will start at 7:00 a.m. and weigh-in time will be 3:00 p.m. The person catching the largest number of pounds of legal fish will be declared the winner. There will be a \$15.00 entry fee per person which includes a cap. The fee is payable at Consumer's Fuel beginning on Thursday, April 12 and before 4:00 p.m. on Friday, April 20.

Beginning this year the total money collected for the entry fee will go towards the scholarship fund. The first place winner will receive a plaque and the traveling trophy and other winners will receive plaques.

A scholarship, or possibly two scholarships, in the name of Charles Ball, will be presented to a senior boy or girl who will be attending a technical or nursing school. The scholarship committee consisting of Pat Frizzell, Claude Brown, Billy Joe Turner and Eddie Teeter will select the honoree with the help of the high school administration.

Despite the cold weather a total of fifty-one fish were caught in last years second annual tournney. Last years first place winner of the fishing tournament was David Frizzell with two black bass that weighed a total of 4 pounds and 5 ounces. Charles Dipprey caught a catfish, crappie and bass weighing a total of 4 pounds and 3 ounces to give him second place. Don Afill came in third

with two black bass weighing 3 pounds and 11 ounces.

According to Eddie Teeter the tournament is being held a week earlier this year than it was last year in hopes of having good weather.

Mark Gatica will be participating in two events, the Mile and 2 Mile.

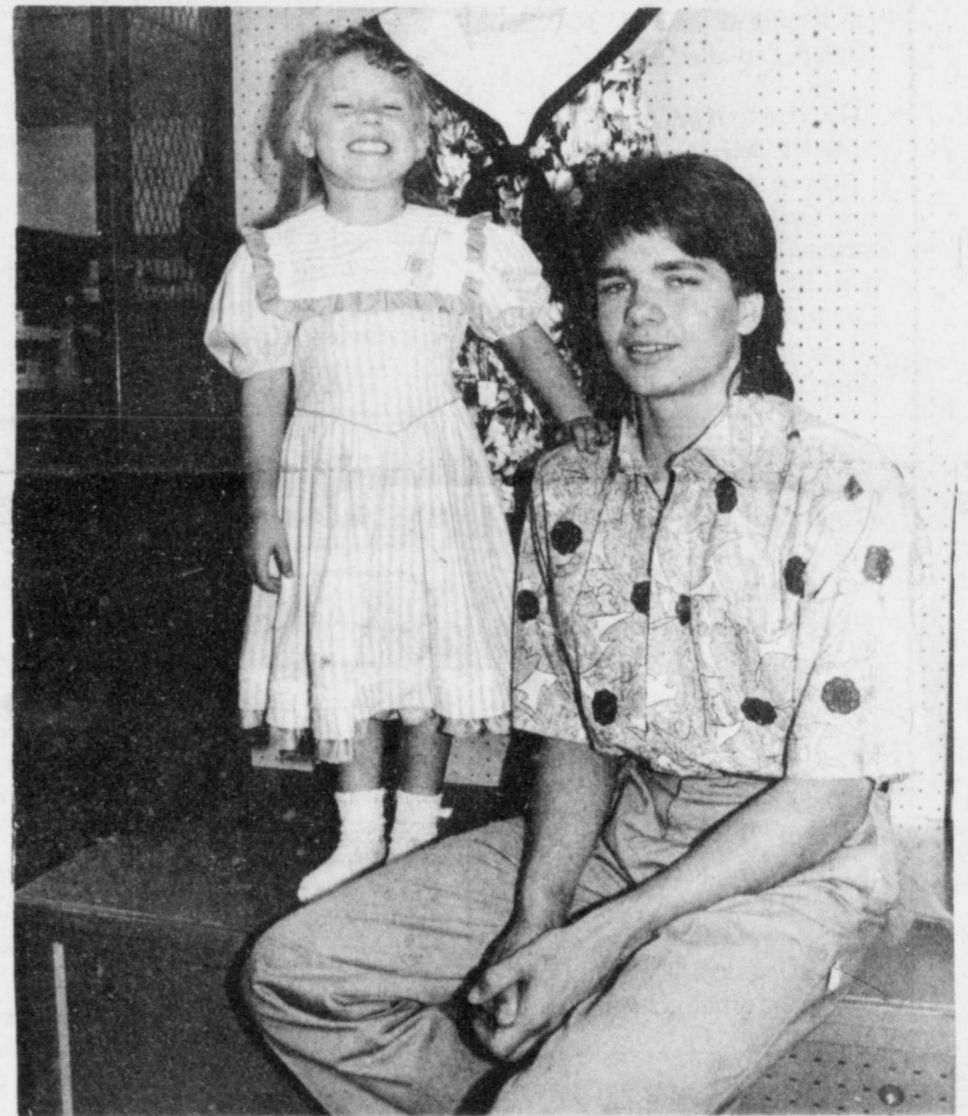
Louis Perales will compete in the 100

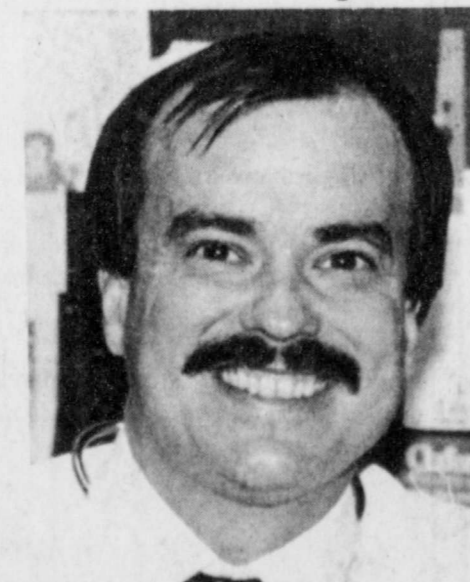
SCHOOL BOARD

The First National Bank in Lockney will have a showing of Kenneth Wyatt paintings. The exhibit is scheduled to open on May 1 and continue throughout the month. The paintings will be on display in the bank and the public is invited to come by and enjoy the work of this western artist from Tulia.

Wyatt is well known for his western paintings and real life sculptures done in bronze and pewter. He is sought as an after dinner speaker and is an author with several books to his credit.

Currently he is painting the twelve Apostles, along with Jesus and Paul. This series entitled "Offer Them Christ" was commissioned to commend the church for 200 years of Methodism in the United States.

His models for the painting have been found in various places around the country. Wyatt found the Apostle Thomas in a cafe. He was a trucker from Hart and his wife convinced him to sit for Wyatt one afternoon as a model. This painting was loaned to the St. Thomas Catholic Hospital in Nashville, Tennessee. There officials from the foundation for evangelism saw the portrait and the idea for the series was born.

His subject for Paul was found in Plainview and Matthew on the Texas Sesquicentennial wagon train. Other models are from Amarillo, Canyon, El Paso, New Orleans, Florida and Ohio. Jesus was the most difficult subject. The man chosen for the model finally said that he would model for the painting only if his name was not disclosed.

As his next project Wyatt plans to paint fourteen women of the Bible.

Wyatt's oil painting and watercolors are characterized by his attention to detail, feeling of intense emotion and the depicting of realistic western scenes.

His books are filled with paintings and poems and his sculptures feature the

western way of life.

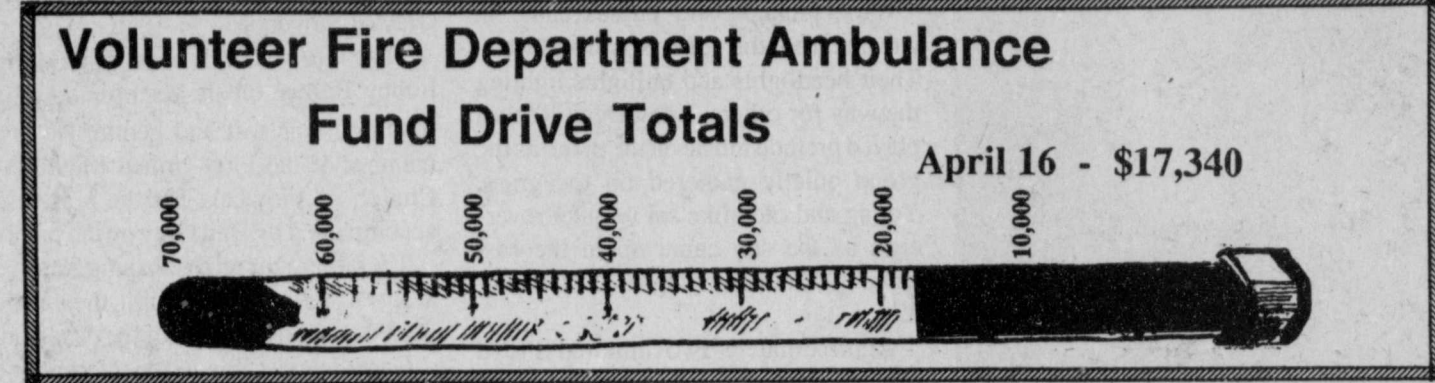
Wyatt turned to painting after 32 years as a Methodist minister. He was 14 years old when he pastored his first church. He became an ordained Methodist minister in 1944 at Stephenville. In 1956 he became an ordained deacon and in 1958 an ordained elder.

He graduated from Stephenville High School, John Tarleton Junior College in Stephenville, McMurry College. He did his graduate work at Baylor University and received a Doctorate of Fine Arts from McMurry College.

Wyatt and his wife Veda Mae are parents of a son Mark and a daughter Jill. They reside in Tulia and often open their home for exhibits.

GARY MANGOLD

Gary Mangold is seeking a second term on the Lockney school board. He is a lifelong resident of Lockney, except for the time he was away at college and during his residency in Fort Worth, and was graduated from Lockney High School in 1970.

Mangold attended Texas Tech University doing both undergraduate work and medical school before serving his residency at John Peter Smith in Fort Worth.

He has served three years on the Lockney School Board. He has also served on the Floyd County Child Welfare Board and was the District Medical Supervisor for the American Cancer Society. He is a past president of the Hale, Floyd, Briscoe Medical Society and is currently on the Texas Academy of Family Physicians.

Mangold has practiced medicine in Lockney for the past 11 years and is an active member of the Lockney Parent-Teacher Association.

He and his wife Brenda are members of the Main Street Church of Christ. They have three daughters, Allison; Lauren, and Erin.

BIL ANDERSON

Bil Anderson has announced his intention to run for the Lockney school board.

Anderson and his family moved from Gruver to Lockney in 1987. He is the Yard Superintendent for Caprock Industries.

He was raised on the farm and is a graduate of Spade High School. He is also a graduate of South Plains College and has a B.S. degree from Texas Tech University and a Masters Degree from Texas A. & M. He served in the United States Air Force.

Anderson's wife Ann works in the insurance department at Lockney General Hospital. They have three daughters, Melissa, 19, a student at South Plains College; Jennifer, 14 and Amy 10.

"I would like to be of service to the community. I basically believe that education is one of the things that we need to do for our children and this is where I feel my qualifications lie," Anderson stated.

He continued, "I am well versed in project cost analysis and accustomed to working with large budgets."

MIKE MATHIS

Mike Mathis is entering the political arena for the first time. He is running for a position on the Lockney school board. Mathis is a 1975 graduate of Lockney High School and he attended West Texas State University before coming back to Lockney to farm.

He and his wife Ginger have three children, Kaci, 11 and in the fifth grade; Lindsey, 6 years old and in the first grade; and Garrett who is 5 and will be in kindergarten next fall.

They are members of the West Col-

lege and Third Church of Christ and are involved in the Floyd County 4-H and FFA Livestock Show and many other activities.

Mathis states "I will have three kids in school and I believe it is time that I got involved. We have a good school district and I would like to help keep it a good district or make it better if I can."

JOE FRANCO

Joe Franco is a candidate for the Lockney School board. He has lived in Lockney since 1989, and has been employed by the Texas Employment Commission in Plainview for the past five years.

Franco is currently attending Wayland Baptist University where he is majoring in Political Science with a minor in sociology. He hopes to continue his education then enter law school upon completion of his B.A.

He has been married to his wife, Ymelda, for 15 years. They have four children: Billy Joe, 11; Judy, 8; Derrick, 2; and Joe Angel who was born April 10, 1990. Billy Joe and Judy both attend Lockney Elementary School.

Franco has been active in the community of Plainview. With the school system there he has served as a member of Parent's Advisory Committee, Adult Education Advisory Council and Hale County Resource Network. He belongs to the Church of Christ in Plainview.

When asked why he was running for school board, Franco said, "Education has in the past few years come to the forefront as one of the most important issues in our society. And it is not hard to see why, when we see the results of being under-educated."

"I believe education is the key that will open the future doors to our young people. There was a time when education was a luxury and now it has become a necessity."

"Our young men and women must not only receive a degree, but must get a quality high school education. It would be a great privilege to serve the people of Lockney with the same dedication, prudence, and success that I have enjoyed in other tasks I have undertaken."

Census still seeking temporaries

Estate planning saves taxes and frustration

"A properly drawn estate plan may save many farm and ranch families up to \$200,000 in estate taxes." This statement made by Wayne A. Hayenga, Texas Extension Economist and Attorney, assumes a lot of information: a married couple who "like each other" and want to care for each other, who have a farm or ranch worth \$1 million or more, and want to pass it on to their children.

This is an eye opening fact for many farmers and ranchers. In fact, many people only worry about estate planning if they hear of a friend's "problem" in settling an estate or paying estate taxes. "But," Hayenga continued, "for many families the estate tax savings are not as large—if they have smaller operations. In fact, for many farm/ranch families, the income tax savings of a properly prepared estate plan can be greater than the estate tax savings."

Three two-day seminars talking about these complicated tax topics will be held at: San Angelo, May 8-9, 1990; Waco, May 15-16, 1990; Harlingen, May 22-23, 1990.

The program is structured to help farmers and ranchers learn how to lower their tax burden and ease administrative burdens that affect passing their estates to their loved ones. In addition to discussing estate planning systems, tax savings possibilities will be discussed from corporations, partnerships and trusts when family members are involved in the business.

Making gifts to avoid estate taxes will

be discussed also. "There are two problems with making excessive gifts—the first is dying poor; the second is the adverse income tax consequences the gift can cause the recipient. A properly planned estate can save many dollars in income taxes for the heirs."

Two problems that affect family operations—planning for inflation and growth of the business will be discussed. Another topic, how to be fair among all children when one child is interested in the family business and others are not will be addressed.

This seminar has been conducted 48 times and attended by over 2200 people in the state. At the last four seminars, over 40% of the participants were there for the second time to increase understanding of this complicated but crucial subject for their families.

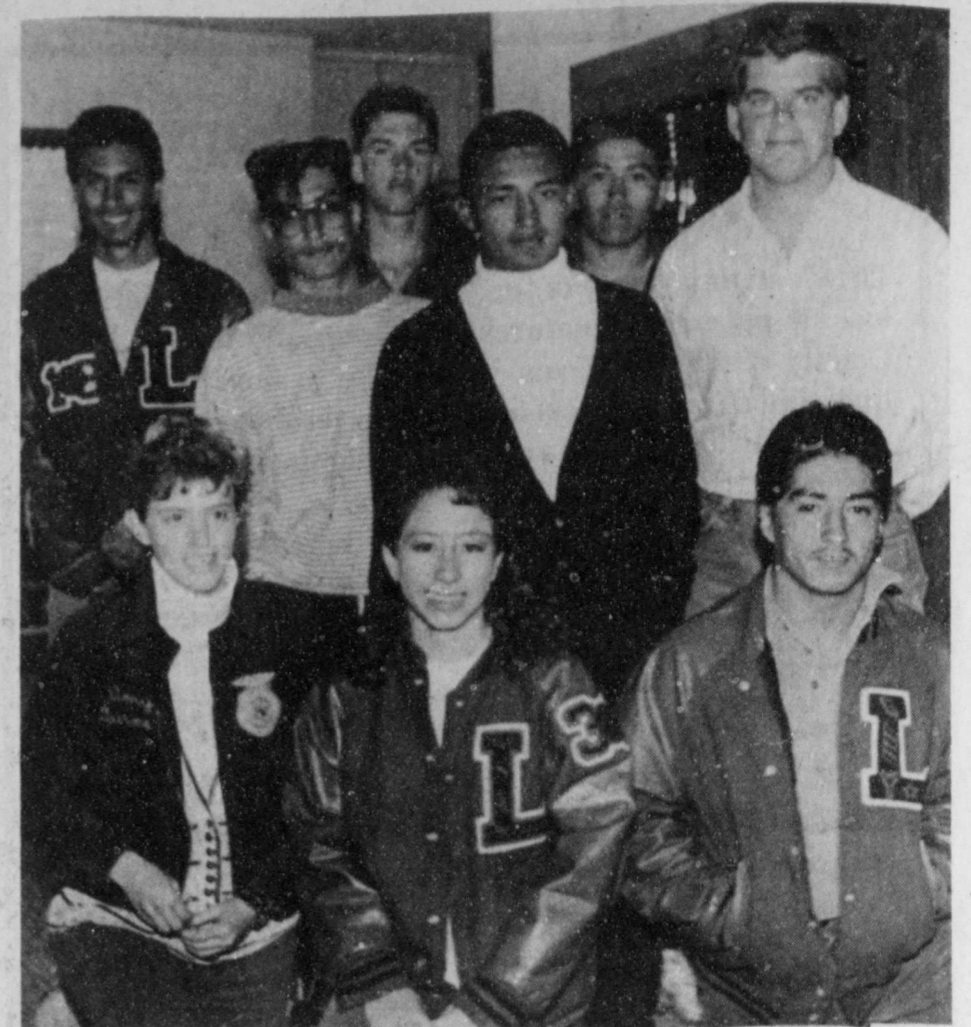

School board hears reports

The Lockney Independent School Board met April 12 for a regular session, starting at 7:30 p.m.

The meeting began with the reading and approving of the previous minutes and the payment of bills.

The board of trustees approved the early dismissal of school at 1:30 p.m. on April 13, followed by In-Service for teachers. The Inservice would cover "Tactics For Thinking," and would be given by a consultant from Lubbock.

The principals of the schools gave their reports and informed the trustees of upcoming school activities and students accomplishments.

School Counselor, Phil Cotham, informed the trustees of the upcoming SRA testing (achievement testing) that will be taking place for all grades next week.

The school board members voted to hold the last board meeting, with the

present school board members, on May 5, with a meal.

A citizen appeared before the school board to voice his concern over the management of the Little Dribblers. The board took no action due to the fact that Little Dribblers is not a school sponsored activity.

Trustees voted to approve Service Center Contracts for the year 1990-91 in the areas of Chapter I (migrant and reading), Media and Inservice. "The Service Center can offer us materials and training that we don't have available here," said Superintendent Hallmark. "They have a large film library for training and education purposes. The State also requires the teachers to have four days of inservice training and the Service Center will provide excellent consultants for two of those days."

G.B. Johnston, the election judge, recommended Cathy Rosales, Kenneth

Wofford and Molly Huffman as election helpers. The trustees approved.

All auxiliary personnel were re-hired by the board, for this year. They include: library aides, class room aides, lunchroom workers, custodians and bus drivers.

The board also approved the Special Education Cooperative Guideline changes. The cooperative consists of Lockney, Floydada and Petersburg.
