Gatica qualifies for state in mile run

After four trips to the State U.I.L. Cross-Country Meets, Lockney High School senior Mark Gatica is preparing for his first trip to the State U.I.L. Track and Field Meet, May 12. His latest effort came Saturday in Abilene at Regionals where he finished 2nd in the mile run with his best time of 4:36.

Gatica has earned approximately 60 medals over the last four years from

cross-country meets and track meets where he specialized in the two mile and mile runs.

As a freshman, Mark became interested in long-distance running with his friends, Eddie Garza and Cory Luna. These friends were members of the cross-country team of 1985-86 who had won the State Competition.

Coached by Patti Purser, the cross-country team during Mark's freshman year again earned the right to be called

State Champions! This team consisted of Gatica, Luna, Garza, David Rodriguez, Albert Martinez, Javier and Jorge Bernal.

"I remember being very nervous and excited," said Mark of his first competition.

Knowing that this would be his last chance to run at the high school level, Mark was elated to make it to state in the mile. He had consistently gone to Regionals all four years in the mile but

State had eluded him.

"This is the first time I've seen Mark show that much emotion at the end of a race," remarked James Poole, Lockney High School Principal.

Felipe and Estephan Gatica, parents of Mark, have tried to attend most of Mark's track meets. Continued encouragement and praise from his parents have kept Mark setting goals. "We are very proud of him," Felipe said. "It is hard to keep in shape many times when you run by yourself."

Mark hopes to land a track scholarship in order to continue his education and to fulfill his goals.

The young ladies are chosen each year by the faculty. The guidelines used in selecting the girls are scholarship, citizenship, character and leadership.

Shea Jackson is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donnie Jackson. Shana Stapp is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rodger Stapp. Cindy Cook is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Cook. Valency Zumwalt is the daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Perry Zumwalt.

The young ladies and their mothers were treated to a salad supper in the home of Merle Mooney. The members of the study club provided the salads.

Following the meal Merle Mooney asked those present to introduce themselves and then she expressed her pride,

that that of the study Club, in the young ladies for being selected as the 1990 honorees.

Mrs. Mooney then gave a brief history of the Citizenship Girls. She stated that the Citizenship Girls selection began in 1953 by the Business and Professional Womens Club. That organization disbanded in 1987 and the El Progreso Study Club took over "with great pride" the tradition of honoring four outstanding members of the graduating class.

For the past thirty six years four senior girls have been honored annually. During the first two years an eighth grade girl was also honored. That practice was discontinued after the second year.

Including the 1990 honorees, 148 girls have been honored as Citizenship Girls. Mooney commented, "It is an honor to be selected as a Citizenship Girl, and we are very proud of you four who this year have been added to that long list."

Mooney had also researched through the record of past honorees and had found that several of El Progreso's members had daughters who were honored in the past. These include Arla Copeland's daughter, Frances, who was among the first honorees in 1953. Alice Mitchell and Faye Ferguson's daughters Shirley and Debra, were honored in 1959. Dimon Schach's daughter, Nancy, was chosen in 1961. Faye Ferguson's second daughter, Jonita, was selected in 1964. Kathleen Thornton's daughter, Patricia, was honored in 1965 and Linnie Abbott's daughter, Linda, was chosen in 1966. Mooney's daughter Debby, was selected in 1968 and in 1969 her step daughter, Debbie, was selected.

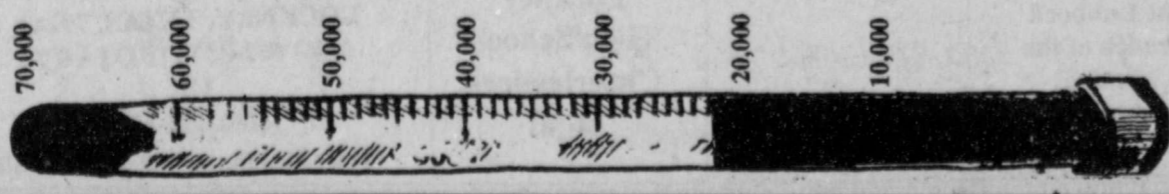

She told an interesting story of the first plaque. The plaque from 1953 and 1954 was misplaced and had not been seen for several years. "How it got there and why it was put there may never be known; however we are very glad that it has been found and is now hanging in the library with the others."

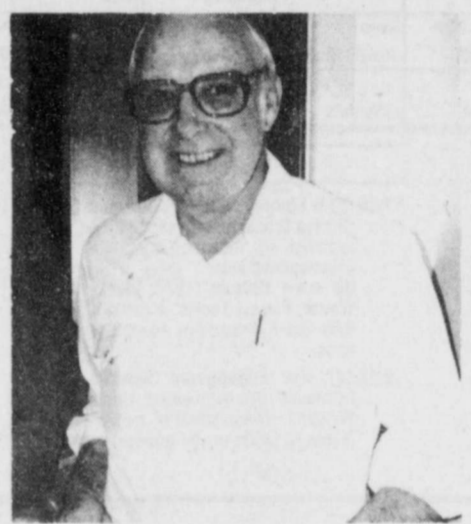
