## Fast action key to treating poison

About 100,000 children are poisoned each year in Texas. Many of these accidental poisonings could have been prevented if adults had taken steps to poison proof their homes.

March 18 through 25 is National Poison Prevention Week, and the Methodist Hospital Poison Control Center urges parents to follow these guidelines to prevent accidental poisoning.

**\* Read and heed labels and precautionary statements on containers.**  
**\* Store potentially harmful products and drugs out of the reach of children.**

**\* Dispose of unused portions and empty containers.**

**\* Train children to stay away from storage areas and medicine cabinets.**

**\* Avoid buying over-the-counter medicines that are animal-shaped or look like candy.**

"If you suspect poisoning, you should call your physician or the Poison Control Center immediately," said Linda McCleard, R.N., head nurse in Methodist Hospital's Emergency Room.

Methodist Hospital serves as the Poison Control Center for Lubbock and the South Plains. The center is staffed 24 hours a day, and its telephone number is (806) 793-4366.

While on the telephone with the center, have the empty container handy and the child nearby. Stay calm while talking to the center staff person, and be ready to answer questions about the poison and the child's age and weight.

Follow all center instructions exactly, and ask questions if they are unclear. Do not make the person vomit, unless told to do so. Have syrup of ipecac available if vomiting is required. This medicine, which makes a person vomit, can be purchased in any pharmacy without a prescription.

"To ensure quick action, parents

should have next to the telephone the numbers for their physician and the center," McCleard said.

## Broseh named to Dean's List

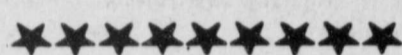
### 4-H sponsoring blood drive

# Cargill celebrates 125th anniversary

Cargill Inc. spent the past 125 years expanding from a grain warehouse in Iowa to a major international marketer, transporter and processor of agricultural commodities, with some of its roots firmly planted in the Texas Panhandle.

The company, headquartered in Minneapolis, will celebrate its 125th anniversary with 53,700 employees in 800 offices and facilities in 55 nations. About 3,750 of those employees work in 22 offices throughout the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles and southeast Kansas, said Greg Lauser, public affairs director.

Cargill first entered the Panhandle in the late 1950s, when it purchased an elevator in Plainview. It made its move into Amarillo with the purchase of the Burrus Milling Co. elevator in 1972, said Brannon Darnell, Commodity Marketing Division area manager in Amarillo. Darnell is formerly of Lockney.

The company no longer owns that Plainview facility, but the Commodity Marketing Division has spread to offices in Amarillo, Hart, Plainview, Hooker, Okla., Elkhart and Liberal, Kan.

Through its seven elevators - two in Plainview - Cargill's Commodity Marketing Division has the capacity to create and market approximately 25 million bushels of corn, milo and wheat annually in the Panhandle.

Trading activities, headquartered in Amarillo, add another 25 million bushels a year to the grain handling and trading total for the area, Darnell said. It employs about 90 in its division.

By far the largest Cargill employer in the Panhandle area is Cargill's two Excel Corp. packing plants, Lauser said. Total employment of 3,330 people and a payroll of \$41.8 million a year is fairly

evenly divided between the two beef slaughter and boxed-beef processing facilities in Plainview and Friona.

Each year the plants provide markets for 1.6 million Panhandle cattle worth approximately \$1.3 billion, he said. Excel serves markets from California to Florida and the East Coast from its Texas facilities.

The plants were built in the late 1960s and early 1970s and have been constantly modernized to improve efficiencies, Lauser said.

A newcomer to Amarillo, but not a newcomer to the Panhandle, is Caprock Industries Inc., which moved its headquarters to the city last year, said president Zay Gilbreath.

Caprock employs 240 people in Texas, with its Amarillo office coordinating the marketing and services of its six Texas Panhandle feedlots in Amarillo, Bovina, two in Gruver, Dalhart and Lockney.

These lots have the ability to feed and market 186,000 cattle at one time, Lauser said. To feed those cattle to a market weight of about 1,100 pounds. Caprock buys 17 million bushels of grain a year. The Texas lots, and one in Leoti, Kan., annually manage about 550,000 cattle, with an average market value of \$425 million.

Caprock Cattle Management Services, a Caprock subsidiary with three employees, provides cattle feeding economic analysis and risk analysis services for custom cattle feeders, he said.

ACCO Feeds Inc. also makes its home in Amarillo, with a feed mill that has a production capacity of more than 60,000 tons a year. The feed operations employ 40 people.

The Amarillo feed manufacturing mill produces and markets a complete line of livestock and poultry feeds, pet foods, and specialty products directly to feedlots, dairies, ranches and through a network of 80 independently owned farm stores in the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles, New Mexico and Colorado, Lauser said.

ACCO Feeds has served the area since 1964 and was acquired by Cargill in September 1987, he said.

Cargill also owns Cargill Hybrid Seeds, with facilities in Aiken and Dumas. Research, production and processing for commercial sales of cottonseed and sorghum are centered in Aiken, with field production operations in Dumas.

Cottonseed is marketed under the Paymaster and Lankart brands, with sales of corn, sorghum and sunflower hybrids and varieties under the Cargill Hybrids brand, Lauser said.

The operation's 40 employees annually produce and market about 650,000 50-pound bags of all types of seed a year, with a market value of about \$20 million, he said. About half of that is sold in Texas.

Cargill Agricultural Credit Corp., a five-person unit of Cargill Leasing Corp., offices in Amarillo and provides lending arrangements for cattle feeding to people seeking financing.

A fertilizer division is operated in Dalhart, offering a full range of custom-blended dry and liquid fertilizers, anhydrous ammonia and crop-protection products to customers within a 50-mile radius of Dalhart. It has nine employees. Marketing headquarters for the Molasses Liquid Products division is lo-

cated in Amarillo, with terminal operations in Dimmitt and Stratford that provide molasses blends and more complex liquid-protein suspensions to feedlot customers within an 80-mile radius of each terminal.

The division's 15 Panhandle employees, under manager John Hall, furnish about 750,000 head of feedlot cattle in Texas, New Mexico, southeast Colorado and southwest Kansas with molasses liquid products.

Hall said his department is planning an expansion in the next 90 to 120 days people on staff in a geographic management office that will be decentralized and freestanding from the Minneapolis office.

Through the many divisions, Cargill provides a direct market to the expanding global market for the producers of the area, Darnell said. Agricultural now is a worldwide business and Cargill will have to operate differently than it has in the past 125 years.

"Cargill plays a vital role in agriculture," Darnell said. "It's involved in almost all aspects and we want to be a leader in environmental, safety and all issues of the future. We're here to service customers and we want to do a quality job."

**Social Security in Floyd County**

Self-employed people will find significant changes in computing their 1990 Social Security taxes. Both the social security tax rate and the formula used to compute the taxes changed this year. The 1990 tax rate for self-employed people is 15.3 percent, up from 1989's 15.02 percent rate. In 1989, a 2 percent credit reduced the effective tax rate to 13.02 percent. Beginning with the 1990 tax year, the credit has been replaced by two new deductions which reduce the tax liability for the self-employed. The new deductions are designed to treat the self-employed in much the same manner as employers and employees are treated for tax purposes. For many self-employed people, the result will be lower taxes than in previous years. Internal Revenue Service PUBLICATION 505, Tax Withholdings and Estimated Tax, provides detailed information on the change in computing 1990 self-employment social security taxes. Contact the Internal Revenue Service for copies of this publication. Call 1-800-2345-SSA (1-800-234-5772) and ask for Fact sheet Number 4, if you're self employed.
