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Hart Potato Shed Spurs New Crop

Castro County's newest crop—potatoes—began paying dividends Monday when the 1952 harvest started.

Already almost five carloads per day are going through processing at the Hart Potato Shed, completed this month. There they are graded into two sizes and get government inspection.

After washing, sacking, and loading on refrigerator cars, the spuds go to big-market wholesalers.

Most of the produce comes from four charter members of the Springlake Potato Growers Association—J. B. Williams and James H. Dear of Springlake, Rex McFadden of Olton, and Muri Pickrell of Hart. They contract with the shed for the processing job.

Phil Barkley, long-time resident of Hereford, owns and operates the plant. He has had similar sheds on the west coast and in Hereford.

Barkley employs about 30 people. The shed is near the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad.

Frio Wheat Growers See 60, 70 Bushels per Acre

Two Frio wheat growers expect to approach bushels-per-acre records for this area.

Jay Boston, with 88 acres split between Wichita and Westar varieties, predicts 70 bushels per acre for his plot. Thurman Cole feels his 150 acres will average 60 bushels. Both started harvesting June 22.

Boston's land made a 70-bushel average in 1948 but dropped to 36 the next year. He planted it in Sudan in 1950 and summer-fallowed it in 1951.

In mid-September last year, Boston planted 90 pounds of seed and applied 200 pounds of 16-20-0 fertilizer on each acre of the tract. Later he found the fertilizer was too hot for the seed and had to water them.

'You Can't Lose,' Richardson Tells Progress Contestants

About 30 people from 10 Panhandle communities heard T. C. Richardson explain the Texas Rural Neighborhood Progress Contest in Dimmitt Monday.

Farm people from Castro, Deaf Smith, and Parmer Counties attended. Representatives of Rance, Sunnyside, and Jumbo communities showed high interest.

After a movie about Tin Top community, last year's contest winner, Richardson launched into a spirited promotion of the program. He is co-sponsor, along with the state extension service.

"The basis of this program is the pioneer virtue of self-reliance and initiative in individual farms and whole communities," he said.

"In any community there are the resources to solve its problems. We just have to find those resources," he continued.

Richardson pointed out that 200 communities have participated in the contest in its five years.

"You can't lose," the sponsor emphasized, "You have the improvements whether you win prizes or not." He told of contests inspired cancer control pro-

grams which had saved two women's lives.

The speaker made an eloquent tribute to pioneers of this region. "They did the best they could with what they had," he argued, "and we have a great heritage of roads, schools, and the like."

Under questioning later, Richardson told of home demonstration clubs' parts in the contest. "They have sponsored it more than any other group," he said. "But they are just a part of it."

As to the recommended size for a neighborhood entered in

the contest, the sponsor stated that twelve or fifteen families are usually as few as can "make a showing."

"The size of the neighborhood depends on what the people want," he explained. "We like to get all the people who want in and then draw the boundary around them."

March 1, 1953, is the deadline for reports of the year's progress, Richardson said. Each family gets an individual report form.

The speaker urged neighborhood organizers to enlist the aid of everyone in their areas. "Everybody can do something. And the community spirit is what we care about more than material progress."

Curtis Massey of Hereford, formerly of Tin Top, told the audience he has a copy of the Tin Top film. "I'd be delighted to show it anywhere," he said.

Edd C. McLeroy, Castro County extension agent, made a short talk in behalf of the program. He offered his services and those of Mrs. Roberta Vann, home demonstration agent, to any interested neighborhoods. He also has all necessary information.

Harold LaForte, candidate for state senator, spoke briefly.

Ray Bearden of Dimmitt led the group in several songs.

Water to Be Conserved One Day Each Week to Fill Swimming Pool

A plan has been approved by the City Commission to make it possible to change the water in the Dimmitt swimming pool one time each week for the remainder of the summer, or until the city water supply is increased. The water conservation plan calls for the cooperation of all city residents from 10:00 a. m. Friday to 7:00 a. m. Saturday of each week when water will be used only for home necessities. During the specified hours all watering of lawns, and other use of water that can be avoided, will be discontinued.

During that time the swimming pool will be drained and refilled.

It has been pointed out that swimming pool water serves a two-fold purpose. After it is used as long as it is deemed safe by the swimming pool management it is then pumped on the school grounds and football field, thus effecting a saving in the beautifying of the school property.

All city water users are urged to remember the set date for conservation of swimming pool water as it will only be possible through that method for the pool to operate during the summer months.

Public Warned That This Is Undulant Fever Season

Austin, June 5.—This is the season when an increase of undulant fever may be expected, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

An undulant fever patient suffers from chilly sensations, or severe shaking chills, sweats, and high fever. The patient loses weight and becomes weak. If the illness is of a mild type, the patient may find it hard to remain in bed, but if he tried to keep on with his work he finds he has not sufficient energy.

Symptoms often continue for a number of weeks before recovery occurs. Fortunately undulant fever has a low death rate. Body temperature may reach a higher mark each day than the day before for some time, and then gradually return to normal over a period of several days. Fever may be absent for some days and come back again in the same way as before, registering higher each day and then gradually going

WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

THE THINGS YOU HAVE TO WATCH IN LEGISLATION: During the amendment period of the Defense Production Act (this is the price and wage control bill) an amendment was offered by Mr. Potter (R), Michigan, which would in effect put into the law the Executive Order which provides for the declaration of certain areas as "Surplus Labor" areas. Such a declaration means that the manufacturing concern in those areas can obtain government contracts on a negotiated basis rather than on a competitive bid basis even though the cost of such manufactured product would be substantially more than if it were produced in another area. The purpose of such an amendment is to insure employment in areas where there is a surplus of labor. The effect of the amendment would be to penalize the American taxpayer and take away from him millions of dollars in taxes that could otherwise be saved. It would also promote inflation. One of the prime causes of inflation is excessive government spending. Therefore when the government pays more for an article, as it would under the Potter amendment, than the same article could be purchased under competitive bid contracts, the result is simply excessive spending and fuel on inflationary fires. The amendment is also discriminatory in that it would favor thickly populated areas and penalize the South, the Southwest and a great portion of the West. Such an amendment would also favor big industry and discriminate against small industry and small manufacturing plants and contractors. The manufacturing concerns in such designated areas can effectively control business growing out of government contracts, and the ones who get hurt are the small manufacturing plants in districts such as ours, as well as the laboring people in those districts and the American taxpayers. Mr. Lanham (D), Georgia, introduced a substitute amendment which would in effect prohibit such practices. The House voted on the Lanham amendment first, and the vote was tied 114 to 114. This meant that the Lanham amendment was defeated because the proposed amendment must receive more yeas than nay votes in order to pass, and a tie vote does not meet those requirements. However, the Potter amendment also failed by a margin of approximately twenty votes. We of the South and Southwest had hoped that the Lanham amendment would pass as it would have fixed a policy and would have sharply curtailed the practice that is going on now. We are happy that the Potter amendment failed and hope that this is an indication that such practices will stop. One manufacturing concern in the Middle West, and I presume others, sent out a form letter to all of its salesmen advising the salesmen to keep a sharp lookout for all possible contracts because this manufacturing concern was located in one of these surplus areas. The letter outlined the greater benefits accruing to the manufacturing concern by being so located, and instructed the salesmen that their Washington office could bring the proper pressure to bear in Washington to ob-

tain contracts at higher prices than under competitive bidding. It was a strange coalition that voted against the Lanham amendment and for the Potter amendment. The coalition was made up of conservative Republicans from the Middle West and East along with big city Republicans and Democrats who have followed New Deal philosophies. The ones responsible for defeating the Potter amendment were the members of Congress from the South, the Southwest and the West. If we can stop these practices in government spending, we can save the taxpayers millions of dollars and help in the fight against inflation.

HIDDEN BALL PLAN ON TIDELANDS NIPPED IN THE BUD: A plan was afoot between the Secretary of the Interior and the President to by-pass Congress and seize the tidelands in the event the veto of the Holland bill was sustained by Congress. Under the present situation the Executive Department has no authority to lease the tidelands. Even if the Senate should uphold the President's veto of the Holland bill, the Executive Department still would not have power to traffic in these lands. The secret plan that was afoot was a plan to use an old 1949 surplus property law under which GSA Administrator Larson had signed an order in April delegating authority to Secretary of Interior Chapman to dispose of oil and gas on the continental shelf. The Secretary of the Interior had gone so far as to submit the plan to oil company representatives and testified that these representatives had told him that they would be satisfied with such plan and would accept leases thereunder. All of this information and the tactics and scheming indulged in had been kept from the Congress until Senator Holland made some charges on the Senate Floor on July 9th. After these charges had been made, the entire picture began to unfold and the opposition built up so strong and so fast that the Secretary of the Interior advised the Senate Judiciary Committee last Thursday that he and the President had abandoned the design to use this old law. It is getting to the place up here that you can't even take a night's sleep without wondering what will happen while your back is turned.

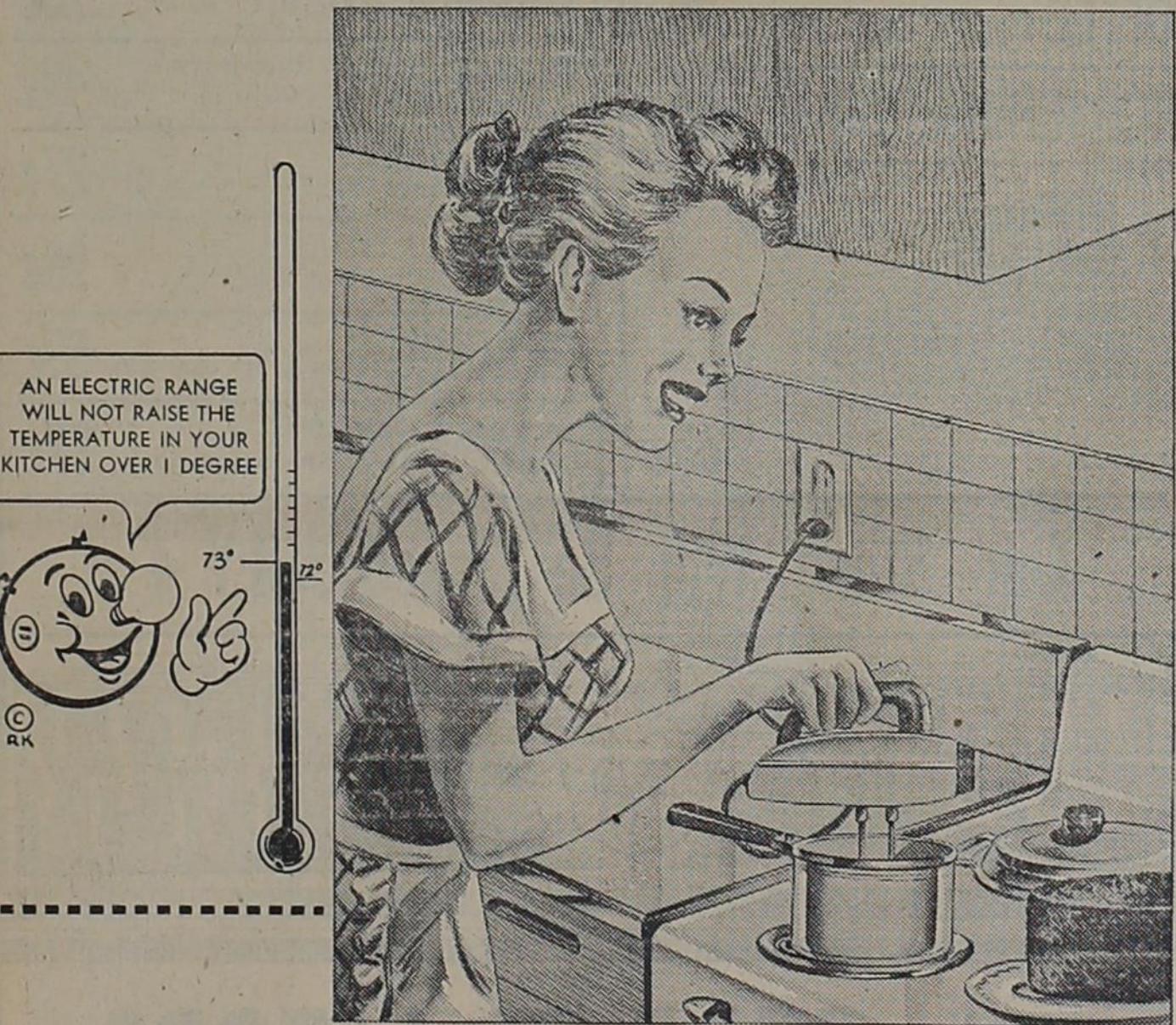

Mrs. Axe gave a devotional for the fifteen members present.

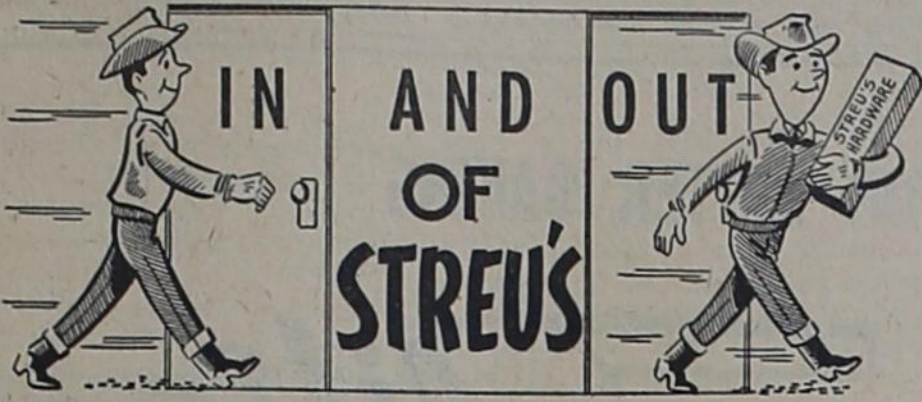
