

## City council votes for 7.51 percent tax increase

The Lockney City Council, meeting during their regular July 5 session, voted unanimously to raise the tax rate 7.51%, to 37¢ per \$100.00 valuation.

According to the 1990 tax roll, this will generate funds of \$88,329.79 (less corrections). "If we want the services this town provides," said Mayor Dan Smith, "this tax rate is necessary."

After a lengthy discussion the motion was made by Councilman Copeland and seconded by Councilman Marr, to raise the tax. The motion carried.

Because the increase is over 3%, the

council will be required to have a public hearing (which will be announced at a later date); however since the increase is under 8% they will not be subject to a roll-back.

Martha Edwards, with the Department of Agriculture, appeared before the city council to present them with the different options of recycling. Edwards is the district director out of the South Plains office of TDA, located in Lubbock.

She stated the reasons to recycle were: "to save money, preserve your natural

resources and save your landfill space."

She quoted that days market price on the following items (per pound) that can be recycled: aluminum cans, 33¢ - 36¢; glass, .05¢; car batteries, 75¢; newspa-

per, \$5.00 per ton; computer paper, \$20.00 per ton; high grade paper, \$100.00 per ton; cardboard boxes, \$5.00; tin cans, .01¢.

Edwards offered her services to the

council whenever they decided to set up a recycling center in the city. "I'll be glad to help ya'll anyway I can."

Mayor Smith informed Edwards that the city had been looking into recycling

for a long time, but did not want to set up any kind of program until "the EPA issued their final rules to all the small communities."

After Edwards left the councilmen agreed among themselves to start contacting people now and looking into different programs, since they felt it was inevitable.

Because of the new baseball program to be implemented at Lockney High School, the council voted unanimously to allow the school to use Bickley Field for their games. Since the field would probably be watered a great deal the

## Eddie Garza saves woman's life

The quick thinking and action of Eddie Garza of Lockney is credited with saving the life of Tandra Talley of Roosevelt, Oklahoma.

On June 6th Trooper Michael Strain of the Oklahoma Highway Patrol was dispatched to the scene of a traffic accident four miles south of Hobart, Oklahoma on highway #183.

When he arrived he found that Eddie Garza, who was driving a Cargill Seed Company grain truck, and Bill Bailey, a retired Lawton police officer, had met Ms. Talley's vehicle at the time of the incident, stopped at the scene and rushed to aid the young woman.

She was not breathing when she was removed from the vehicle and was becoming cyanotic. Garza administered CPR until an ambulance arrived on the scene. He stated that she was "purple" when they got her out of the car.

Investigation revealed that Ms. Talley had passed out while driving, swerved several times into the oncoming lane of traffic, ran off the roadway for about 200 yards before coming to rest on a dirt embankment at a county road intersection.

She was taken by ambulance to the Elkview Hospital and has since recovered.

Trooper Michael Strain, Hobart Detachment, Troop M, Oklahoma High-

way Patrol Division of the Oklahoma Department of Public Safety, has written a letter of commendation to Cargill Seed Company of Lockney stating, "Mr. Garza's quick action that afternoon played a key role in saving Ms.

Talley's life. Although I thanked him while we were at the scene of the accident, I would like to take this opportunity to let you know what your employee accomplished and again thank Mr. Garza for his help."

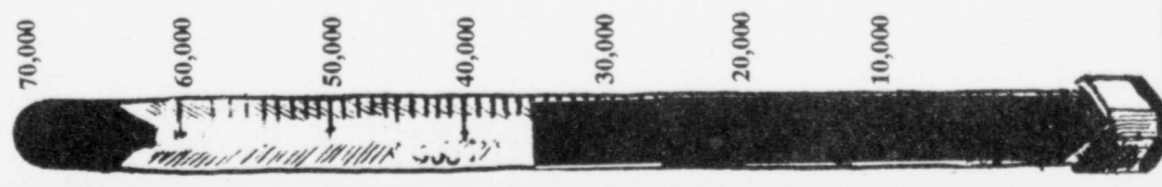

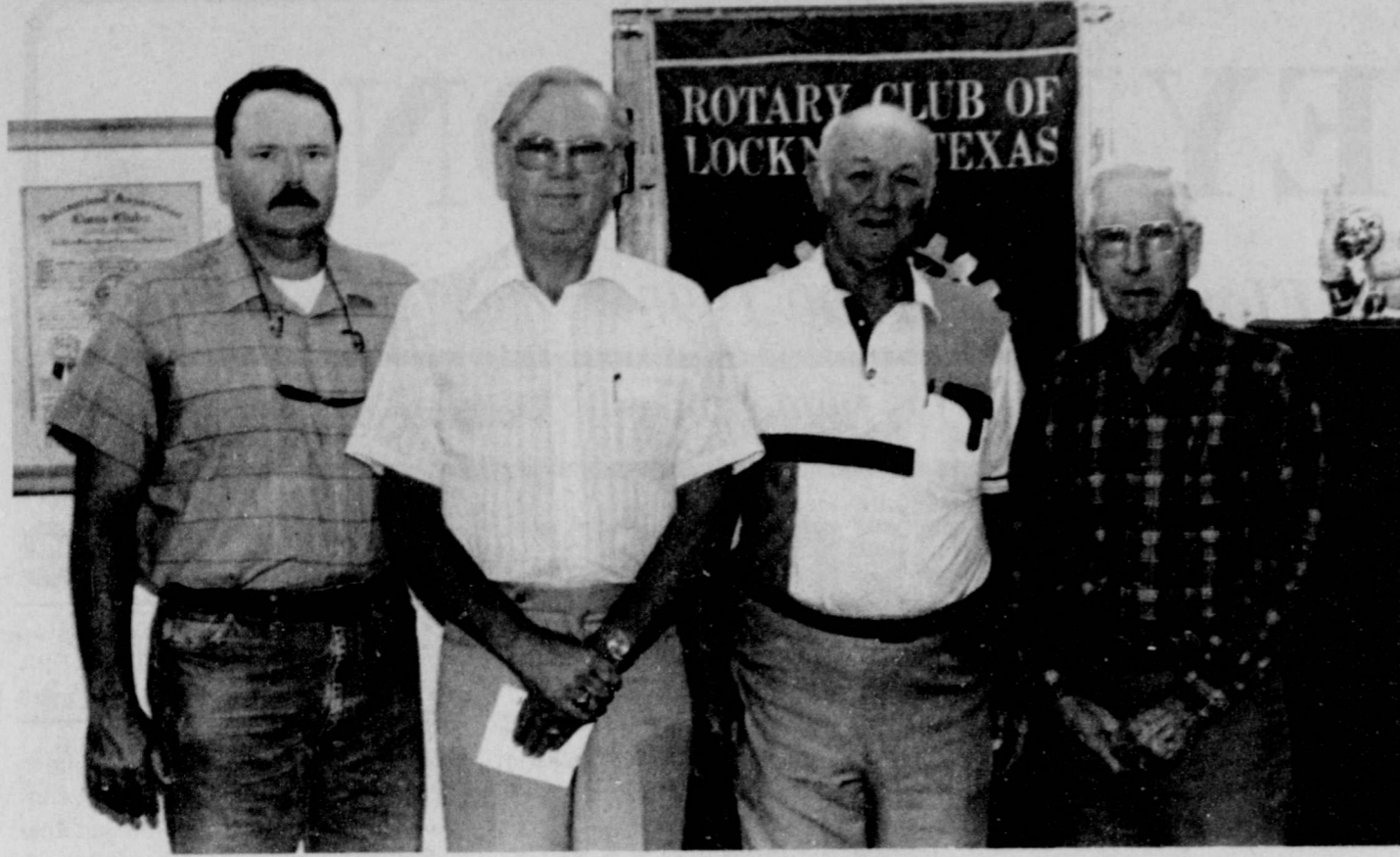

## 1990 Census activity continues

Although most people believe that activity for the 1990 Census is complete, this is far from true.

A field operation called "Post Enumeration Survey" is being conducted in which over 2,000 interviewers will call on 150,000 addresses that were counted earlier in the census process. They compare the answers that they receive with those that were given earlier. These figures are used to measure the completeness of the census.

The "Vacant-Delete" operation has enumerators calling on addresses that originally were listed as vacant or as non-existent, duplicated, converted to business or other non-residential uses or to make sure no one lived there on April 1, 1990.

Another operation known as "Failed

Edit" has interviewers contacting addresses and having residents complete questions that were not answered on the original form that they returned.

By December 31, 1990 the total of

housing and population figures must be delivered to the president of the United States. These data are used to determine how many members of congress each state will have.

councilmen agreed to let the school use it if the water and utilities were paid.

The councilmen also considered an application for a permit from a man that wanted to go door to door selling bibles and educational material. His company had submitted a \$500 surety bond to the council. His request was granted for two weeks.

Dickie Lambert came before the council and told them that there had been some complaints about the brakes on the street sweeper. The estimate he

had gotten for a repair was between \$750-\$900, and then they weren't sure if the problem would be fixed. The matter was tabled by the council until local mechanics looked into the problem.

The councilmen paid all bills to come before them and reviewed the financial statement.

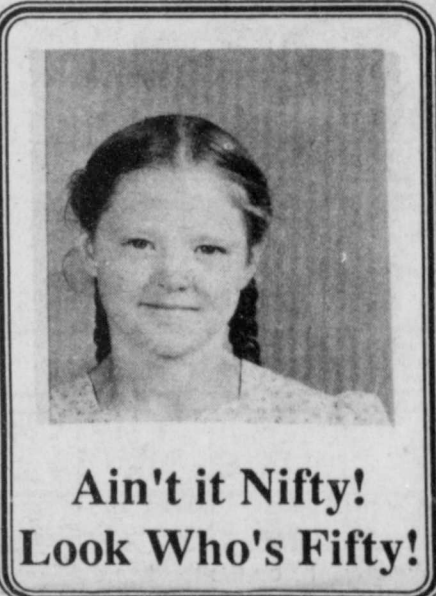

The Bulletin describes how correct pruning techniques can be utilized to reduce the height of a large tree without topping. It also shows how utility companies can carry out line clearance pruning in a way that avoids topping and maintains the natural form of the tree at decreased costs.

"Sometimes pseudo experts use different terms for the malpractice of topping. These include stubbing, heading, heading-back, stubbing-off, hatracking, topping-off, dehorning, and lopping," Rosenow said. "No matter what you call it, tree topping is mutilation. It should be stopped."
