

Community reaches goal, New ambulance scheduled to arrive in October

Thanks to the benevolence of the citizens in Floyd County and Algur H. Meadows and The Meadows Foundation, enough money has been raised to purchase a new ambulance for the Lockney community.

The fund raising drive for the new ambulance began in February, 1990. It was spear headed by the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department and was kicked off with the first donation by the City of Lockney for \$5,000.00.

Numerous fund raisers have been conducted by the fire department since that time. They have included: collecting over \$700.00 worth of aluminum cans for recycling, memorials, contributions by businesses, organizations and individuals, and the Chamber of Commerce's "Ol' Fashioned Saturday" which raised \$3,000.00 alone.

In March of this year the City of Lockney also applied for a \$43,000 grant from Algur H. Meadows and The Meadows Foundation.

The City of Lockney was notified last week that a \$20,000 grant had been approved by the Meadows Foundation to be used toward the purchase of a new ambulance.

The Meadows Foundation was created in 1948, by Algur H. Meadows and his wife Virginia, to benefit the people of Texas.

Born in a small town in Georgia, Al Meadows built General American Oil Company of Texas into one of the nation's most successful independent oil and gas production companies. This success enabled him to accumulate sig-

nificant personal wealth that he generously shared with charitable causes during his lifetime.

Meadows often stated that his own life had been greatly enriched by giving. He established the Meadows Foundation so that his philanthropy would

continue after his death, under the guidance and direction of family members and trusted advisors.

Today, the Meadows Foundation benefits programs throughout Texas in health, education, arts and culture, social services, and civic endeavors. Over

1,350 institutions and their subdivisions have received grants since the Foundation's creation. Operations, programs, endowments, capital projects, and research have all been funded by Meadows Foundation grants.

The Foundation has been particularly interested in imaginative, innovative ways to solve community problems; in projects leading to organizational self-

sufficiency; in capital plans which enable programs to flourish; and in ways to alleviate pain, ameliorate social ills, and promote better human relationships.

The Meadows Foundation is one of the largest private foundations in Texas.

Adding the grant of \$20,000 to the \$42,000 raised through other donations gives the city \$62,000 toward the purchase of a new ambulance.

"The ambulance has already been ordered," said Jimmy Kemp, Lockney Fire Chief. "It is scheduled to arrive the first of October."

"The ambulance is \$55,710 and the radio will cost \$3,500. We will still be taking donations because we still need to equip the ambulance. Any remaining money will be used to overhaul the old ambulance."

Stennett is the son of Jimmy and Theresa Stennett. He is a 1979 graduate of Lockney High School and received a B.S. degree in Zoology in 1983 from Texas Tech University in Lubbock where he graduated Magna Cum Laude.

Stennett graduated from Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center School of Medicine. He completed three years of residency training at John Peter Smith Hospital in Fort Worth in June of 1990. Stennett specialized in Family Practice and became eligible for A.A.F.P. (The American Academy of Family Physicians).

He began training as a respiratory

therapy technician while still in high school. At that time he was working as an orderly at Lockney General Hospital and took his respiratory training under the supervision of Dr. Ivan Barber, who at that time was associated with the Respiratory Care Associates.

While working as a respiratory technician Stennett also began working as a medical lab technician for Bryan Building Medical Lab in Plainview. He continued to work part time in respiratory

therapy while in college and became associated with the Respiratory Care Services at Highland Hospital in Lubbock under the supervision of Dr. Philip A. Sanger.

Due to his association with the Respiratory Care Association early in his career he has worked at various hospitals where needed. He has worked at Lockney, Amherst, Nichols Hospital in Plainview, Floydada and Lubbock.

During the summer of 1981 Stennett was employed to organize as respiratory therapy department at the Caprock Hospital in Floydada.

He has made numerous ambulance runs in the past years in the capacity of E.M.T. for the transfer of patients from the various hospitals.

During his employment with Respiratory Care Services Stennett was selected to assist in all "Emergency Life Saving Procedures which might become necessary" throughout the course of the Myasthenia Gravis Clinic in Hale Center.

Stennett received a Pre-Medical Scholarship from the Lubbock-Crosby-Garza County Medical Society and Arts and Science Scholarship for the academic year 1981-82 and for the 1982-83 academic year he received the Margaret Stuart Pre-Medical Scholarship.

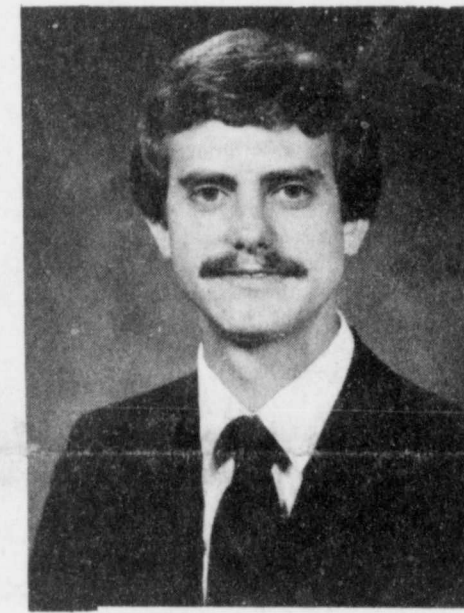
He made the Dean's Honor Roll all semesters from his freshmen through senior years and the National Deans List in 1979-80, 1980-81, 1981-82, 1982-83.

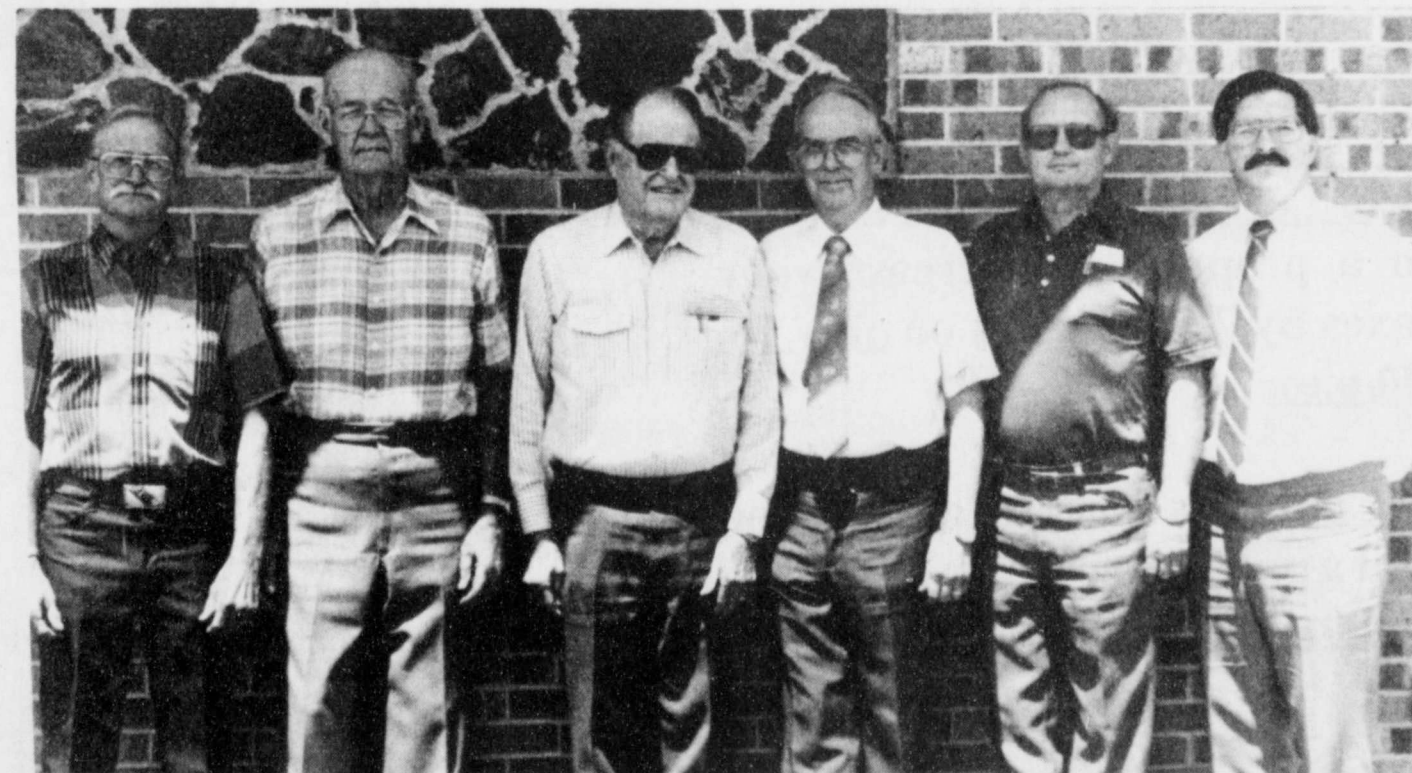
The entry fee for this years pageants will be \$10.00 and the deadline for entry is August 22.

The Lockney Lions Club will hold their annual Broom and Mop Sale Day Saturday, August 11, at Main and College.

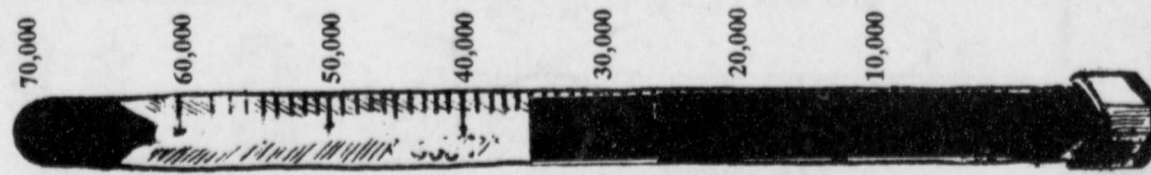

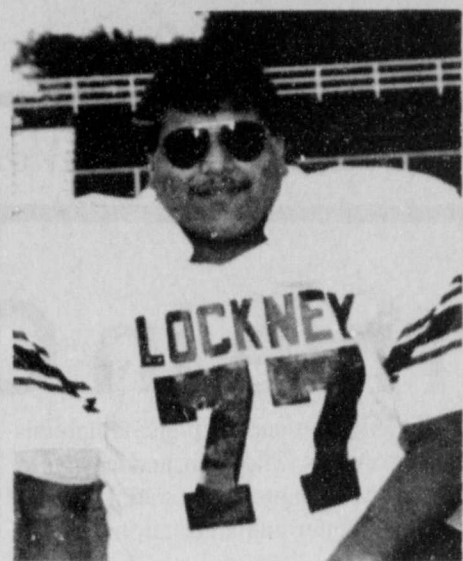

Descriptions of different allergies

First it's tree pollen. Then grass pollen. Then ragweed.

What it all adds up to is sneezing, itching and congestion for a lot of people. And, in temperate climates, people can experience allergy-irritating substances almost year-round.

"In some areas, seasons run together. For people in such areas, there are relatively few times in which some pollen count or another is not high," said Dr. David P. Huston, associate professor of medicine and of microbiology and immunology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

In a temperate area, Huston said, tree pollens start heavily in March and are succeeded in the coming months by a series of other pollens. January and February can be relatively irritant-free for many areas.

According to Huston, people who suffer from seasonal allergies are not helped by the air pollution that plagues metropolitan areas.

"The air pollution present in many cities is an added burden to allergy sufferers," Huston said. "It is unlikely they would be allergic to any of the chemicals in the air; however, the chemicals and smoke can definitely aggravate their symptoms."

Another group of people who suffer from allergies linked to temperate climate are those afflicted with perennial allergies.

"These are the people allergic to things which, unlike a specific pollen, are present in their environments year-round," Huston said.

Topping this list of irritants are pets, dust-borne contaminants and molds.

Many people are allergic to the dander of animals they keep in their homes, Huston said.

Others have what is commonly called a dust allergy but is infact a reaction to contaminants found in dusts. Roaches and mites contribute heavily to this.

Molds are also common causes of allergic reactions, Huston said. Air conditioning systems and air ducts frequently harbor these allergy villains.

What to do? "Avoidance is clearly the best of all alternatives," Huston said, "but we have to be realistic. Avoidance is not always possible."

Over-the-counter relief is available for allergies that cause runny noses, itchy eyes and congestion, he said. Most commonly used are antihistamines, but they can cause drowsiness.

Prescription drugs, including new antihistamines that do not cause drowsiness, are also available through physicians.

"Allergy shots are not necessarily the first line of therapy," Huston said. "The shots do help some people, but they should be reserved for patients whose allergy symptoms cannot be adequately controlled through other means."

Huston said allergies and allergy-like reactions can be the result of conditions other than pollens and perennial irritants. Foods, for example, can be a source of allergies, and some dyes and other substances can cause allergic-like reactions.

Careful screening by allergists can help patients pinpoint the causes of their suffering. Once that is accomplished, the right form of therapy can be recommended.

Varsity cheerleaders attend camp at ENMU

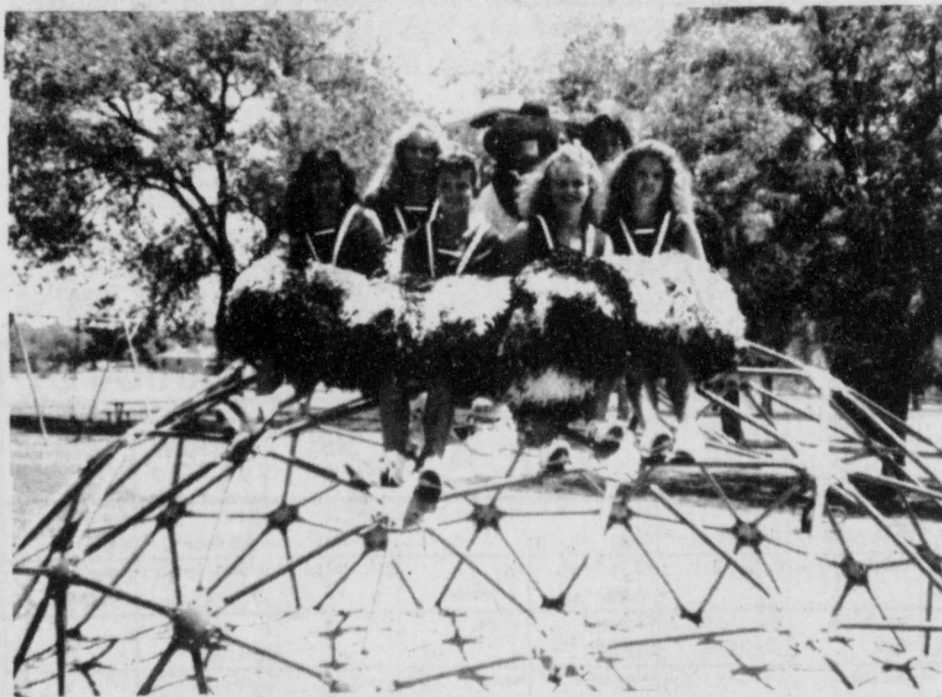

Television viewing can harm children

Too much television can have a negative impact on children, especially during the summer when school is out, warns the Texas Medical Association.

That negative impact can take several forms, particularly violent behavior and obesity, as well as early sexual activity and alcohol and drug abuse.

Parents can help prevent or counteract the negative influence of television in a variety of ways:

Hypothermia also a threat in the summer

Hypothermia isn't just for winter anymore. According to the American Hospital Association, jumping into cold water for a quick summer cooldown can be more shocking to the system than a cold northerly wind.

Caution must be taken when swimming or even wading in cold streams or lakes.

Always swim with a companion, keeping an eye out for signs such as shivering, slurred speech, mental confusion, drowsiness and weakness.

Fast action to get out of the water and into warm surroundings is imperative for recovery.

"What children see on TV, they imitate in life," said Fortunato O. Sunio, M.D., a Cleburne pediatrician and TMA member.

Television's influence on children is partly a function of how much time they spend watching it. According to recent Nielsen data, American children 2 to 5 years old watch commercial television 25 hours a week, children 6 to 11 watch 22 hours a week, and youth 12 to 17 watch 23 hours a week.

Heavy television viewing reduces the time children spend in other activities, such as bicycle riding and playing outdoors. Consequently, as research has shown, these youthful "couch potatoes" tend to gain weight, especially because frequent soft drink and food commercials encourage between-meal snacking.

What children see on the screen also is a critical factor. For example, violence in children's programs, such as Saturday morning cartoons, rose from 18.6 violent acts an hour a decade ago to about 26.4 violent acts an hour now. Each year American children also see an estimated 14,000 sexual references and innuendos, only 150 of which deal with sexual responsibility, abstinence or contraception.

One reason is that children spend only about one-fifth of their viewing time watching children's programming. Most of the viewing time is spent on programs designed for an older audience, such as music videos, soap operas, and sitcoms.

- * Limit children's viewing to one or two hours a day. Encourage children to play outdoors, read, play games, and engage in hobbies.

- * Set guidelines about what children may watch, and don't assume cartoons are OK. Encourage children to watch educational programs.

- * Watch television with your children. Use depictions of violence, sexual activity, alcohol and drug abuse, and ethnic stereotypes as an opportunity to intervene and convey your values.

- * Talk about commercials, as well as programs.

- * Be sensitive to the impact any program, including the nightly news, can have on children. For example, the explosion of the Challenger space shuttle was extremely disturbing to many children who were watching the live lift-off.

- * Avoid the habit of leaving the television on all day from morning to night. When used as a ritual, television replaces or reorganizes what children learn from parents, school and church.

- * Call or write advertisers and television managers to express your views about the kinds of material being aired.

is limited to 600 barrows.

Exhibitors may enter as many as three barrows each and the entry deadline is

Aug. 20. A non-returnable entry fee of \$10 must be paid for each animal entered.

It is a "terminal" show and Lewis said there will be no "take home" barrows. Hogs will be divided into lightweight, mediumweight and heavyweight classes in each of the four divisions (Duroc, Hampshire, purebred and crossbred).

Judge Ray Dean Sites of Mountain View, Okla., will name champions and reserve champions in each division before selecting a grand champion and a reserve grand champion for the show.

The show's grand champion will take home \$1,250 and a trophy while the reserve grand champion will earn \$1,000 and a trophy. Division champions and reserve champions will pocket \$150 and \$100, respectively, both will also receive a banner.

Joining Sites as show officials are David Kight, superintendent, Gary Patterson, assistant, and Seth Ralston, assistant.

Medic Alert bracelet can save lives

Individuals who have a special medical condition that a doctor should know about in an emergency should consider wearing a Medic Alert bracelet. Critical information is engraved on the Medic Alert emblem, along with a 24-hour emergency Medic Alert phone number which provides more information.

According to the American Hospital Association, one out of four Americans has a condition that may not be obvious

to medical personnel in the event of severe illness or injury. This condition could affect treatment. These problems include chronic illnesses such as diabetes and asthma, visual or hearing disabilities, allergies, bleeding disorders, heart problems and dependence on special medication.

Today almost two million people are registered with Medic Alert in the

United States, but many more should be registered. Medic Alert is also recognized internationally, with one million members in 21 other counties.

Persons interested in joining Medic Alert can call 1-800-ID-ALERT for more information. Lifetime membership in Medic Alert, including the bracelet or neckchain and an annually updated wallet card, costs \$25.

Rabies in humans is preventable

The recent death of a 22-year-old South Texas man from rabies could have been prevented if he had sought immediate medical treatment, say experts with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas Department of Health.

Medical records show the Hidalgo County man was bitten by a rabid bat about 47 days before his death earlier this month.

All types of animal bites should always get prompt medical attention, said Dr. Bruce Lawhorn, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. Keith Clark of the Texas Department of Health, Austin, said if the latest victim had sought immediate treatment for the bite, the death could have been prevented.

Clark said treatment to prevent human rabies cases includes quickly administering immune globulin to the bite victim followed with a series of five anti-rabies vaccinations over a month's period.

"The incubation period for human rabies can vary from 14 days to several years," Clark said.

He said the human rabies case this

month was the first recorded in Texas since 1985. One also was confirmed in 1984.

The 1985 case involved a 19-year-old man who had migrated to Abilene from Mexico, according to health department records. The 1984 case occurred in a young Houston immigrant who succumbed to a rare strain of rabies that she had acquired in Southeast Asia more than four years earlier.

Lawhorn said that contrary to popular belief, rabies can and do occur in all seasons and in all parts of the country.

Clark said more than 500,000 persons are bitten by animals each year in the United States, and about 30,000 of these victims require anti-rabies treatment.

Lawhorn said rabies is a virus disease of the central nervous system. It can be transmitted by the bite of a rabid animal through saliva contacting a skin break.

"All warm-blooded animals, including humans, are susceptible to rabies," Clark said. "In Texas, skunks, bats, foxes and raccoons are the most commonly affected animals."

Lawhorn said rabies is spread by the bite of a rabid animal that infects one or more dogs or cats during a fearless invasion into a community.

"The disease develops in the domestic animals and they bite and transfer the infection to other pets and perhaps humans," Lawhorn said.

"Children, because of their close association with pets, are most often the human victims," Lawhorn said.

Control of rabies depends on immunization of pets and other domestic animals, Lawhorn said, and on alerting the public to the signs and hazards of the disease.

"Enforcement of animal control regulations also is important," he said.

Lawhorn said any time a dog, fox, skunk, cat or bat bites a human, there is a danger that the animal may be rabid. He recommended that these immediate precautions be taken:

- * Identify the biting animal by kind, size, color and location. Caution children to seek the help of a policeman or other adult.

- * Have the animal caught. Immediately report the incident to animal control officials or police and keep the biting animal in sight until it is apprehended. Trying to catch the animal without professional help will risk multiple human exposure.

- * Wash the wound thoroughly with soap and hot water. Rinse well and disinfect with alcohol, iodine or other disinfectants. This lessens the chance of contracting rabies by removing or inactivating virus in the wound.

- * See a physician as soon as possible for a decision on the need of anti-rabies treatment.

- * If possible, have the biting dog or cat tested for rabies or placed under observation. If it is alive and normal after 10 days of observation, the animal was not infective at the time of the bite. A veterinarian should monitor all aspects of this confinement and observation period. The 10-day period of observation is valid only for dogs and cats.

- * Wild animals, such as skunks, bats, foxes or raccoons, should be submitted immediately by a veterinarian for laboratory rabies examination.

Exposure increases risk

About 400,000 new cases of skin cancer, the most common form of human cancer, will be diagnosed in the U.S. this year. According to health officials, most of them will result from repeated overexposure to the sun's rays.

If scientists are correct, because air pollution has begun to destroy the planet's ozone layer, skin cancer may be even more common in the future. Therefore, the Texas Department of Health (TDH) urges Texans to take special precautions.

Dr. Patti Patterson, TDH Acting Associate Commissioner for Personal Health Services, said, "Texans are used to the outdoors, and they sometimes accept sunburn as no more than temporary discomfort. But each sunburn contributes to permanent radiation damage that may go unnoticed, sometimes for years."

Dr. Patterson stressed that repeated ill effects from the sun are cumulative. "Every individual has his own tolerance for how much of the sun's ultraviolet light he can stand in a lifetime." She explained that children and older people, especially those with light skin, generally have a lower tolerance to overexposure than people with dark skin. She added, though, that even dark-skinned people have their limits.

Dr. Patterson said that the likelihood of skin cancer increases with age. Warning signs include sores that do not heal or any unusual skin condition, such as a change in size or color of a mole or birthmark.

The American Cancer Society recommends a monthly skin self-examination for symptoms. Teens and adults should use a full-length mirror and hand mirror to study the whole skin carefully for overall condition and tiny changes, including the skin of the scalp and between toes. Parents also should thoroughly examine their young children.

Any noticeable change warrants a medical opinion.

To reduce the risk of overexposure to the sun, Texans are advised to:

* Wear protective clothing, including hats, long sleeves, even gloves.

* Choose — and use — sunscreens which are best suited to skin sensitivity. Apply a waterproof sunscreen (rated 15 or higher) at least an hour before going into the sun, and reapply after swimming or heavy perspiration.

* Avoid sun exposure between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m., when the sun's ultraviolet rays are most intense.

* Do not use sunlamps, booths or tanning pills.

* Be especially cautious of sunlight when using prescribed drugs, since some tend to increase the skin's light sensitivity.

"These precautions and plain common sense can help most people avoid skin cancer. And when people do develop skin cancer, they will find it early, if they routinely examine themselves," Dr. Patterson said.

She added that with early detection most cases of skin cancer can be cured.
