Race Across AMerica routed through Lockney

The first entrants in the Race Across America came through Floyd County on Monday afternoon. Bob Wieland bicycled through town on his specially built bicycle ahead of the racers. He is a double amputee from stepping on a land mine in Vietnam and is a seasoned veteran in ultra-endurance events, e.g., Hawaii Ironman, New York Marathon, RAAM '89 and a four year journey of "walking" across America on his hands/arms. Wieland departed from Irvine, California on July 20, on his specially designed, arm powered, bicycle, and hopes to arrive in Savannah, Georgia around August 12 to 16.

For the ninth consecutive year the Race Across America has drawn together the top ultra-marathon cyclists in the world to begin a cross country odyssey. The cyclists mounted their bicycles on August 5 at 9 a.m. at Irvine, California, on the west coast of the United States, and are pedaling almost around the clock for 2,922 miles to the finish line at Savannah, Georgia.

The cyclists will travel through Texas on approximately August 8-12. They will come through Plainview, Aiken, Lockney, Floydada, Cone and on to Ralls.

Since the speed of bicycle travel is greatly affected by weather, estimated times of arrival at specific locations across America is impossible to predict. The spread from the first to the last rider will increase as the riders move eastward.

Race Across America 1990 is featuring a strong and "wide open" field of riders. The men's division consists of 27 riders and the women's division consists of six.

Unlike traditional cycling events, as in the Tour de France, the RAAM riders cannot ride in packs. They must maintain at least 100 meter splits, follow a prescribed route, and abide by all state vehicle code laws. In essence each rider must ride solo the entire distance which makes the race physically and mentally among the toughest athletic events in the world.

Each rider is accompanied by a personal support crew of 4 to 12 people who follow in mini-vans and motorhomes. Eating is done on the bike and they only sleep 90 minutes to 2 hours per day. There are no required stops, so riders must plan their own riding and sleeping schedules.

Lockney Police investigate burglary at Tastee Burger

Any person found guilty of unlawfully carrying a weapon is guilty of a Class A misdemeanor and can be punished by confinement in the county jail for up to one year, a \$2,000.00 fine, or both imprisonment and the fine.

Gant named World X-Strut champion at Notre Dame

Tandi Gant recently participated in America's Youth On Parade National and World Twirling Championships. The event was held July 24-27 at Notre Dame University in South Bend, Indiana.

Miss Gant placed in the top six of her advanced 16-plus solo group at the state competition to qualify for the national competition. The state competition was held in Grand Prairie in June.

Miss Gant has been twirling for 14 years and has won numerous titles. She is the current Texas State Intermediate 16-plus X-Strut Champion.

At the national competition she won the title of Intermediate X-Strut Champion. She was competing against 40 twirlers in the 16-plus division. She also placed second in "All-American Girl" Modeling and third in the World Show Twirling Championships. In the modeling division she competed against 71 contestants.

Miss Gant competed in the Advanced Solo and 2-Baton Championships. She garnered 5th place in the Advanced Solo and 3rd place in her 2-Baton. She placed 5th in Over-All Two Baton.

She brought home three trophies and three medals.

This is the fourth year that Miss Gant has competed in the National and World Competition at Notre Dame.

In 1987, at the 22nd Annual event, she placed 2nd in the Intermediate X-Strut; 3rd in Show Twirling with 1, 2, and 3

batons; 2nd in Beginner 2-Baton and 17th in Advance Solo.

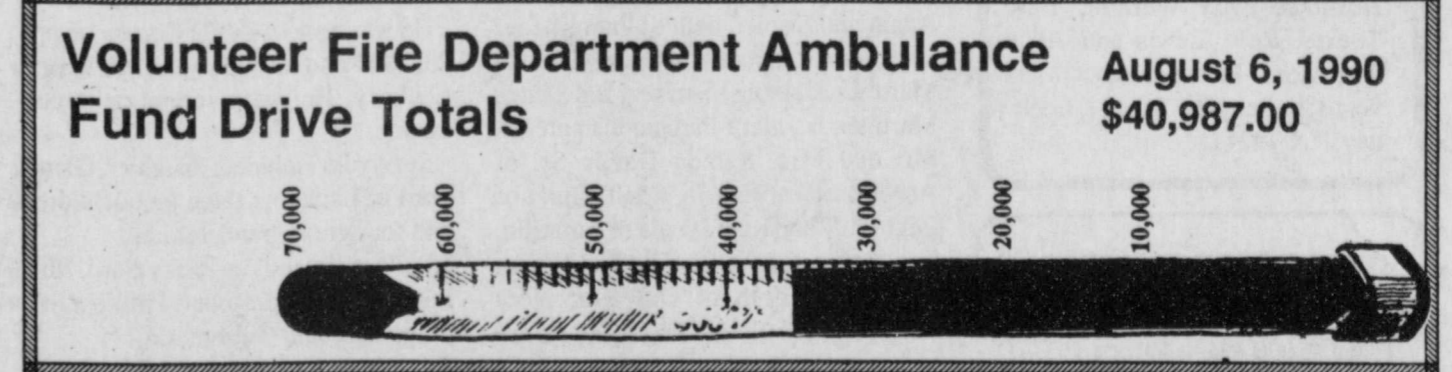

In 1989 she placed 2nd in Advanced 2-Baton; 5th in Show Twirl and 7th in Intermediate X-Strut.

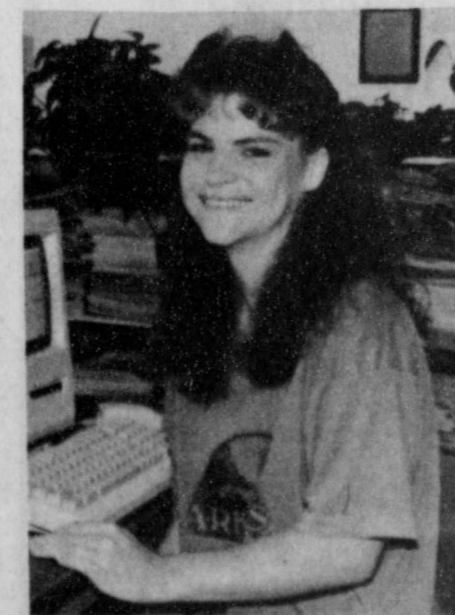
Miss Gant is the daughter of Ray and Lynda Gant and is the feature twirler for the Lockney Longhorn Band.

Lockney girls attend Rotary Camp Ryla

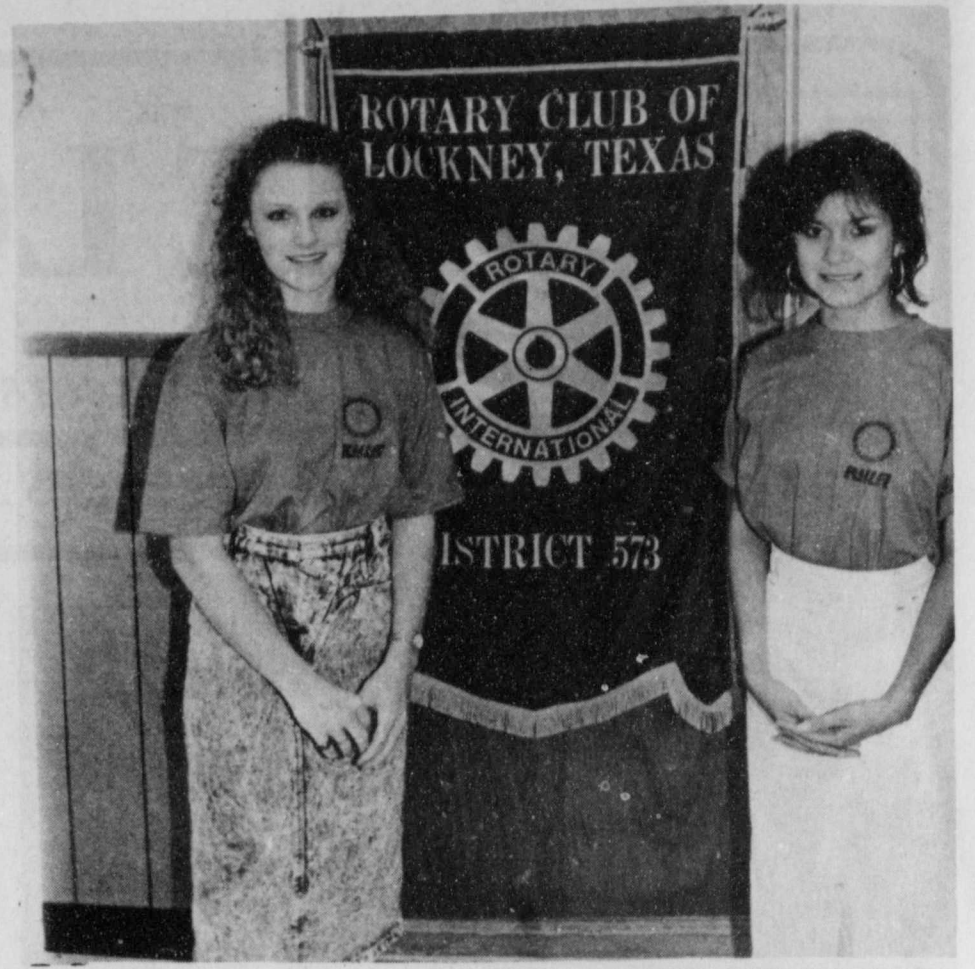

David Frizzell of Lockney landed a 3 pound, 10 ounce large mouth bass at Lake Mackenzie on July 27. He was fishing on Cope Creek using an artificial rattletail.

Other catches at the lake included a new lake record for blue catfish. Delores Rossi of Tulia caught the record breaker, a 10 pound 5 ounce specimen on July 26. She was fishing with dough bait on Tule Creek.

Two notable catches were reported on July 28. James Steffy of Spade netted a 1 1/2 pound large mouth bass using

minnows off the second boat ramp and Susan Hardage of Plainview landed a 10 pound 6 ounce striper using a Big "O" on the north side of the big island.

Scott Winebrinner of Silverton reported catching a 2 pound 4 ounce sand bass on July 29. He was fishing from the second boat ramp and using minnows for bait.

Crappie are being caught at the mouth of the creeks on minnows at a depth of 18 to 24 inches according to lake officials. The current water temperature is 78 degrees and the lake depth is measuring 106 feet.

Volunteers needed at Baylor College

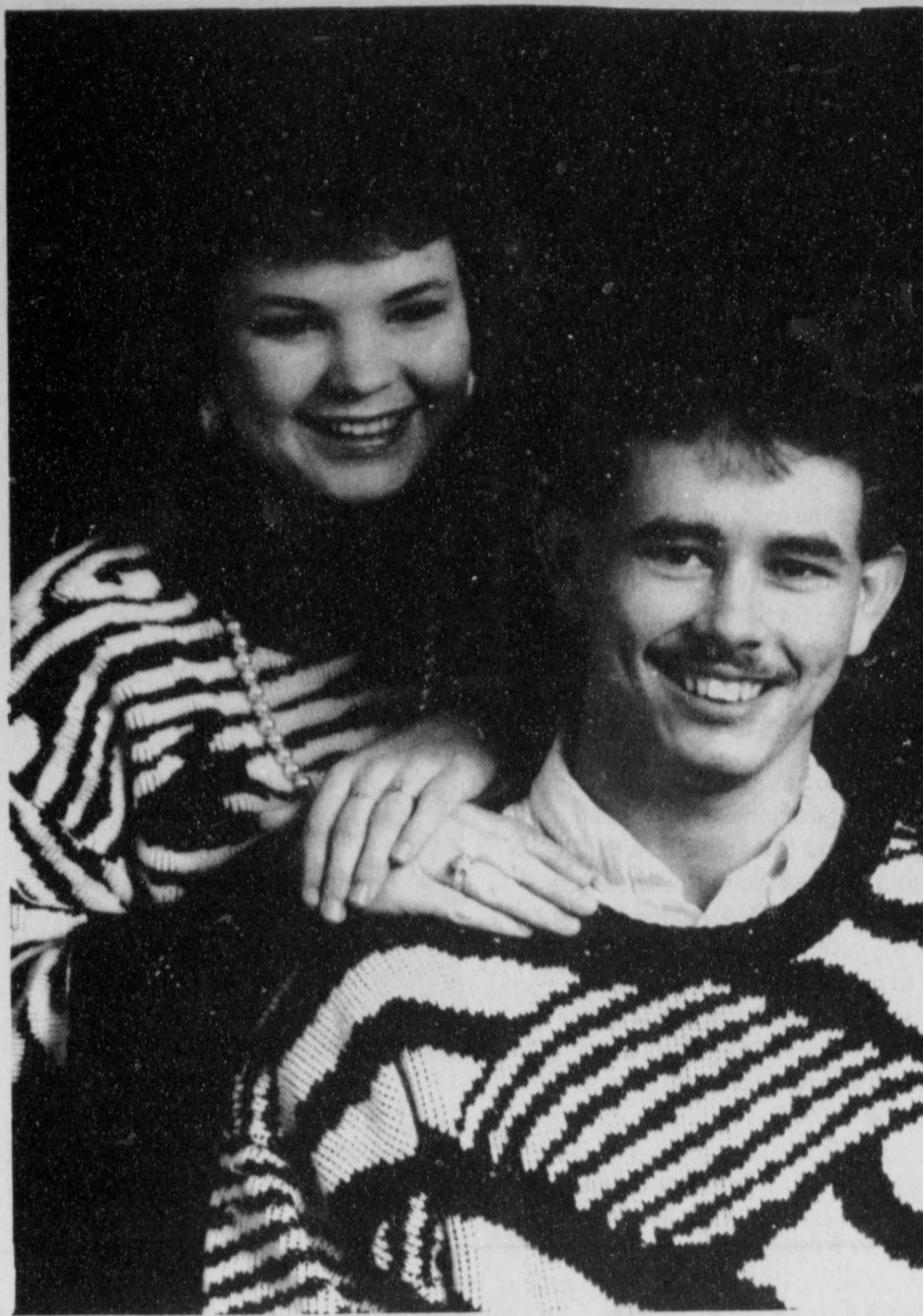
Volunteers are needed at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston for drug tests which may help with the devastating memory problems that accompany Alzheimer's disease.

Salt and butter substitutes how do they compare?

When trying to cut back on calories, saturated fat and sodium, it may seem smart to buy a butter or salt substitute. But just how smart is it, and are imposters any safer than the real thing?

According to Cindy Rowell, R.D., outpatient dietician at Methodist Hospital, butter and salt substitutes are safe, although they have no nutritional value and limited uses.

"Butter substitutes are not good for frying and do not make a very tasty spread. Butter substitutes are best when sprinkled on hot, moist food," Rowell said. "One-half teaspoon (the recommended serving size) of a butter substitute has four calories. Two teaspoons of butter or margarine, which contain 70 calories, are needed to equal the taste of a substitute."

Salt substitutes contain potassium chloride, which is a potential health risk for kidney and heart patients. Large amounts of potassium also may irritate the gastrointestinal tract and cause bleeding.

Rowell suggests using more spices and herbs for seasoning rather than a salt substitute and limited amounts of margarine instead of butter.

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Efficiency in operating your auto can save maintenance and money

Operating your automobile efficiently not only saves energy but also saves money and reduces car maintenance. The following no-cost or low-cost tips can save fuel if practiced regularly.

The first step in saving fuel is regular maintenance. Check the air pressure in the tires. Often tires are inflated 8 to 18 pounds per square inch (psi) below the rated pressure. Fuel efficiency improves when pressure is maintained at about 30 psi. You should check the air pressure at least twice a month.

Checking the oil regularly is another good habit. Check the oil level every time you fill the tank with gas. Have both the oil and oil filter changed at the manufacturer's suggested time.

When adding oil, remember that thick oils increase friction and reduce flow, thereby increasing fuel consumption. However, a good multi-viscosity oil (like 10-W-30 or 10-W-40) will improve gas mileage compared to single-grade oils. Also, consider the new "slippery" oils that increase mileage from 3 to 8 percent.

The next step in saving energy in your car is to choose the appropriate fuel. A higher octane gasoline, which is more expensive, is not always the best kind for your car. You should choose gasoline with an octane level just high enough to stop engine knocking. Higher levels do not improve a car's mileage.

Driving habits also affect fuel efficiency. Most people do not think twice about car warmups, idling time, or "pedal pushing," but these types of second-nature actions can greatly affect your vehicle's fuel consumption. When starting the engine, a 30-second warm-up is usually enough. Drive at slower speeds for the first few miles to completely warm the engine. And remember, excessive idling wastes fuel. For example, a car idling for 3 minutes uses

enough gas to drive one mile.

If you find it difficult to maintain an even speed, a cruise control device could be helpful to you. The cruise control is designed to maintain a set speed so fuel is not wasted by increasing and decreasing the driving speed.

Here are a few more fuel-saving tips.
* **Combine trips.** The average household makes five to six short trips every day. By making one long trip and planning the routes to take, you can save time and gas.

* **Remove "dead weight."** Unneeded items in the car reduce fuel efficiency. If necessary, added weight should be placed inside the car (rather than the trunk) to balance the weight.

* **Consider alternate means of transportation.** Try walking or biking short distances. Car pooling and transit systems are useful for traveling longer distances.

Finally, when selecting a new automobile, keep in mind several points about the vehicle itself that affect fuel

efficiency. First, the type of engine in the vehicle determines the fuel efficiency possible. For instance, diesel engines can get 25 percent better gas mileage than other types, but they can cost more to repair. In addition, manual transmissions generally are more efficient than automatics, though driving skills can affect their efficiency.

Second, certain features affect fuel efficiency. Radial tires can give 3 to 7 percent better mileage than non-radials. And, power options (i.e., air conditioning, power steering) use more gas.
