Registration deadline for 5K & Fun Run is today

Three days of Fair events to delight county residents

Several regular events will again take place at the 1990 Floyd County Fair. The Floyd County Fair is scheduled for Thursday, Friday and Saturday, August 30, 31 and September 1.

PARADE

The annual Floyd County Fair Parade will be held in downtown Lockney at 10:30 a.m. Saturday. It will begin at the north end of Main Street and proceed south.

Cash prizes will be awarded on community clubs, commercial floats, school and youth groups. First places will receive \$35, 2nd places \$25 and 3rd places \$15. High school bands will receive \$25 and junior high bands \$15. Ribbons will be presented to the Best Decorated Bicycle and the Best Clown Costume. Trophies will be awarded to 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners of riding clubs and antique cars.

Floats will be judged according to Following the Fair Theme, Attractiveness of Float, and Originality. All entries must stay in line until after passing the Main Street Church of Christ. Floats need to be in line 30 minutes before parade time and bicycles will be judged before the parade begins. Ribbons to the winners will be handed out immediately after the judging.

Kana Kennedy is parade chairman and the announcer will be Dimas Garcia.

Judging this year's parade will be John Robinson, Karin McKay and Abner Euressti from KCBBD, Channel 11 News.

CHILI COOKOFF

The traditional chili cook-off will be held on Saturday east of the fair building and will be open to anyone. There will be a \$15 entry fee which will be collected before 11:00 a.m. on Saturday.

Each entrant will be required to cook a minimum of ten pounds of meat and there will be no electricity available. Each entrant will be responsible for their own heat. All ingredients are to be prepared on the spot.

Judging will take place at 5:00 p.m. on Saturday by three local judges. The entrants will be judged on chili, and showmanship.

During the day there will be jalapeno eating contests and various other con-

tests.

After the judging the chili will be sold at \$2.50 per bowl served with Texas condiments.

Wayne Taack is chairman of the chili cook-off.

WASHER PITCHING CONTEST

The fourth annual Floyd County Fair Washer Pitching Contest will be held on Saturday, September 1, beginning at

1:00 p.m. This is a double elimination contest. The entry fee will be \$20 per team or \$10 per person. Entries will be taken until 1:00 p.m. Saturday and prizes will be presented to the top placing teams.

Garry Burson is chairman of the event and he is assisted by Tim Cooper.

TRACTOR DRIVING CONTEST

A tractor driving contest will be con-

ducted on Friday of the fair at 5:00 p.m. north of the rodeo arena.

The contest will consist of Part III "Two-wheel Driving Event" of the official Texas 4-H Tractor Operator Contest. The contest will be judged on the basis set down in the 4-H contest manual. Copies of the manual will be available at the county agents offices, fair office and from each member of the contest committee.

The competition will be arranged in four divisions: grade school age (8th grade and below); high school (9-12th grades); above high school age, men and women.

First place plaques will be awarded in each division and ribbons will be given for 2nd and 3rd places.

Lindan Morris is chairman of the tractor driving contest and Aaron Wilson is the assistant.

Jim and Carol Huggins are chairmen

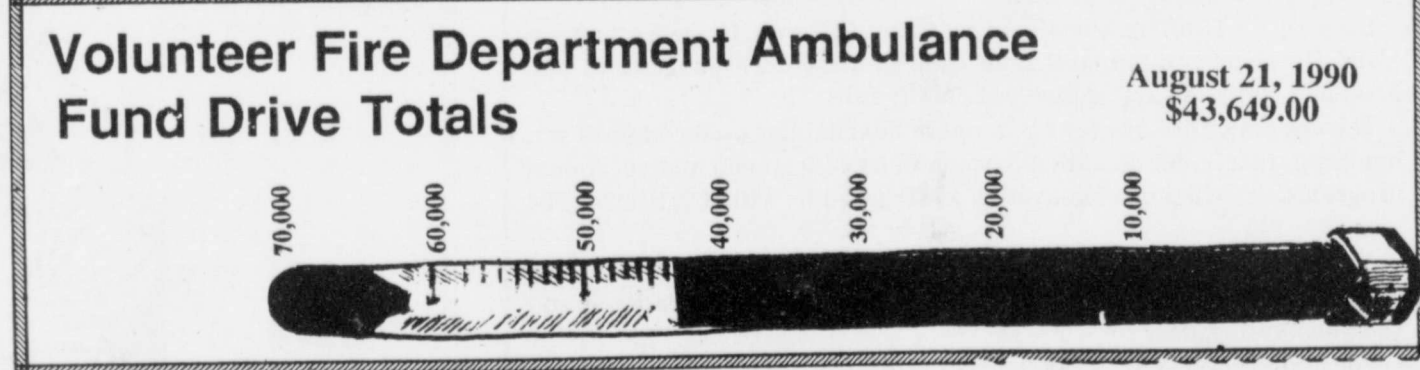
of the square dance and they invite everyone to come out for a good time.

Watch out for school kids!

It's that time of year again, when vacations end and back to school for school children. "Unfortunately, this also means an increase in traffic accidents involving school children," state Major Vernon Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety. "Most of these accidents are caused by drivers who fail to follow safe operating procedures, as well as laws pertaining to passing a school bus," Major Cawthon stated.

State law requires drivers on the same roadway as a school bus that has stopped to load or unload school children to stop and remain stopped until one of three things happen. The bus driver signals you to go on by or they turn off the flashing red lights, or the bus itself goes into motion. This law applies whether

you are meeting the bus or whether you are going in the same direction as the bus. It also applies inside the city limits, as well as outside the city limits. The only exception to the law is that drivers on the other side of a divided highway (roadways separated by a physical median) are not required to stop. Motorist who fail to stop for a school bus could be fined up to \$200.00.

"We, as drivers, should realize the dangers involved and do everything possible to prevent these needless deaths and injuries involving our school children," Major Cawthon stated.

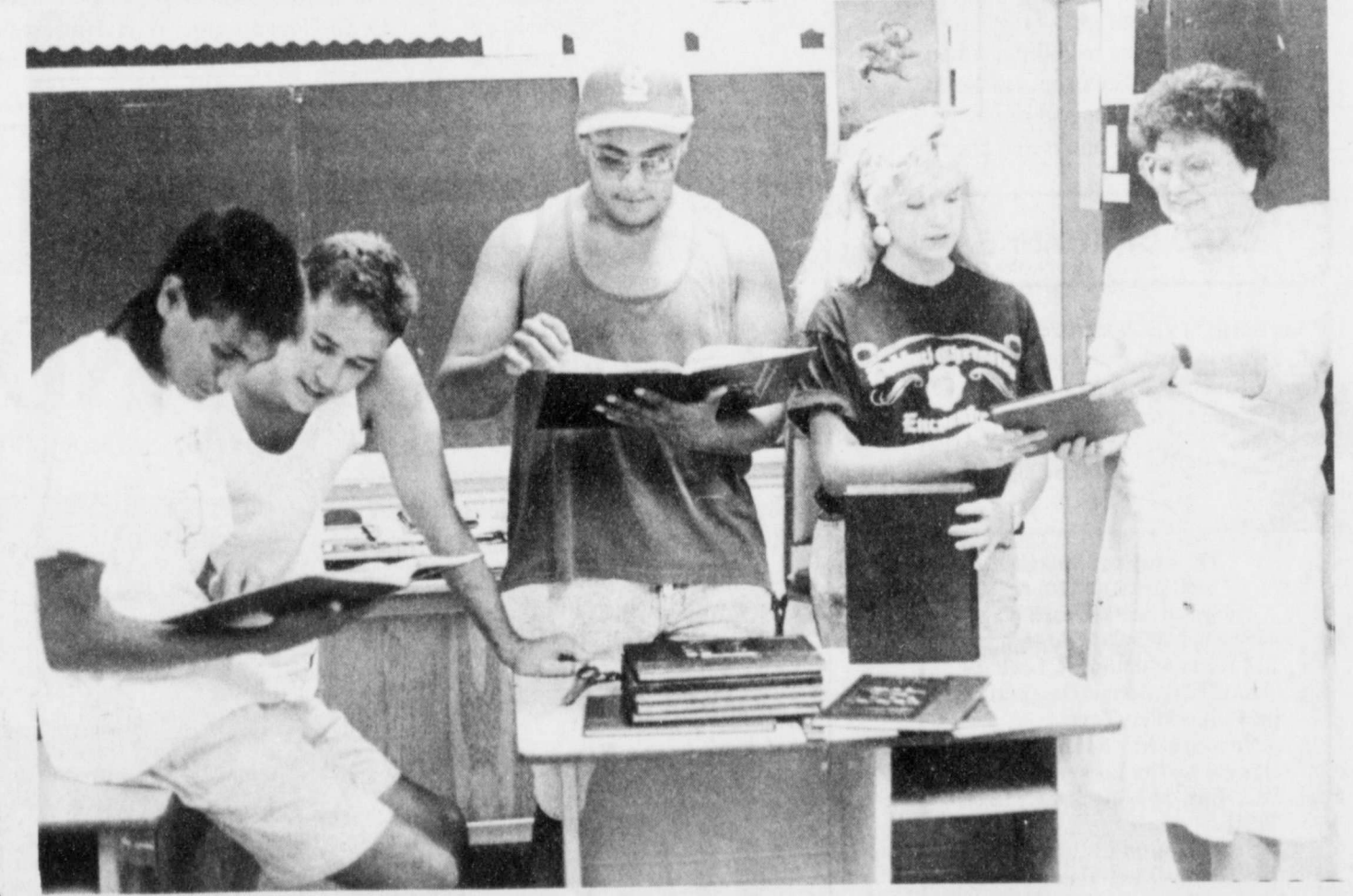
Band boosters plan workdays

Aston and Ellison attend state in-service

Trenea Aston and Julie Ellison, vocational home economics teachers at Lockney High School participated in the State Inservice for the professional development of vocational home economics teachers in Dallas August 13-16, 1990, at the Hyatt Regency DFW Hotel. More than 2800 teachers from school districts all across the state attended the three-and-one-half day conference.

The Conference focused on research and strategies to maximize performance expectations of students and teachers. It was coordinated by the Vocational Home Economics Division of the Texas Education Agency. Twenty-four concurrent sessions provided teachers the foundation to effectively include the new concepts in all areas of instruction in home economics education. Emphasis was placed on effective ways in which to help students build healthy self-esteem, youth leadership, teaching the gifted and talented, educational practices that are effective in teaching special populations students, and entrepreneurship. Other sessions addressed current trends in families, particularly the aging family member. Teachers previewed new videos on how to help students develop a healthy self esteem and on developing youth leadership. The videos were developed by the Home Economics Curriculum Center at Texas Tech University.

Nationally known experts highlighted the four general conference sessions. Dr. Patricia Moody from the University of South Carolina keynoted the conference with "The Ten Commandments for Teachers" in which she discussed maximizing the teacher's effectiveness in the role of teacher. Marilyn Harris, of Cincinnati, Ohio, a food consultant, columnist, radio personality and author addressed the changing societal patterns and how home economics skills and professionals will impact innovation and change to the advantage of individuals, families and society.

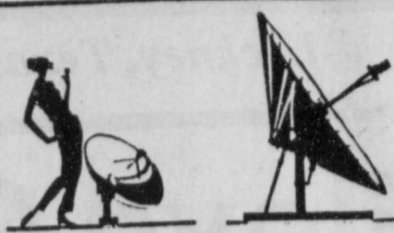
during the session was Kaye Johns, Executive, Director, The Center for Slower Learners in Richardson, TX, who outlined how curriculum can be modified for the slower learner without "watering down" education.

Dr. Victoria Bergin, Deputy Commissioner for Curriculum and Professional Development, Texas Education Agency, closed with conference Thursday morning with "Who Will Rock the Cradle?" Bergin addressed the many

demands facing family members today in their home lives as well as in their roles as members of the community and world of work.

"Vocational home economics hardly resembles the homemaking classes of just a few years ago," said Dr. Eleanor Rogers, president of the Vocational Home Economics Teachers Association of Texas (VHETAT). Rogers said that today's vocational home economics includes courses in life management skills, advanced food science and nutrition, apparel design, consumer economics, interior design, family finance, parenting education, child development, to name a few of the areas of instruction. In addition, vocational home economics teachers train students to enter the working world by giving them skills in jobs such as fashion design hospitality services, child care, and entrepreneurship. Students also learn how to manage the dual role of wage earner and homemaker. "Vocational home economics

teaches "skills for a lifetime," said Rogers. A video by the same title, "Skills for Lifetime" has been produced by the association to help the public better understand that home economics for the '90's is a new curriculum.

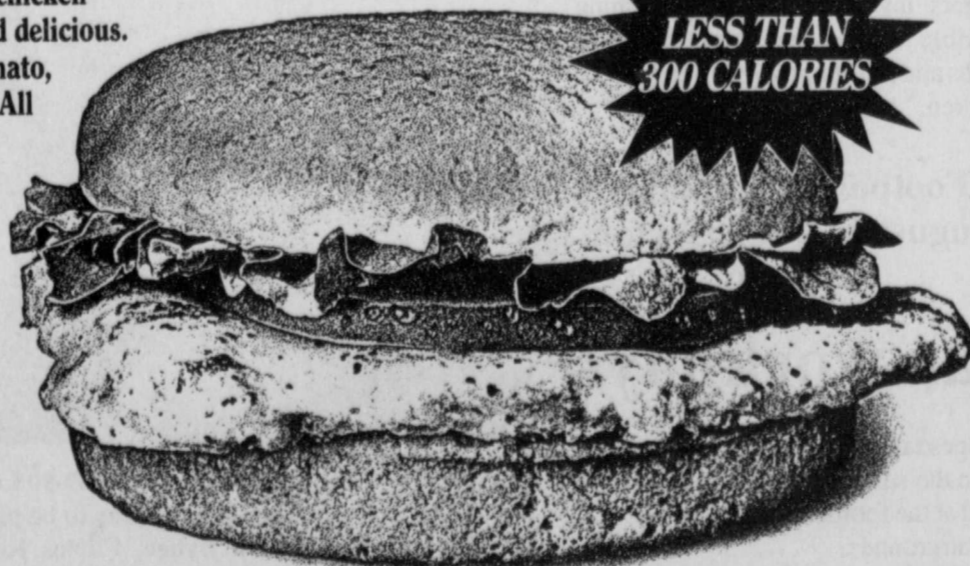

Sales tax payment down 3.46%

The City of Lockney received a check totaling \$5,348.92 from the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts. This check was down 3.46 percent from the money received last year at this same time. The check in 1989 was in the amount of \$5,540.67.

To date Lockney has received \$32,937.36. This amount is down 30.61 percent from the \$47,468.39 that the city received in 1989 for the same time period.

The check received by Floydada was in the amount of \$12,650.31. This amount is up 5.29 percent over the \$13,356.65 that was received in 1989. To date Floydada has received \$75,194.16. This amount is down 1.85 percent from the \$76,608.87 that they received in 1989.

This month's checks include sales taxes collected on June sales and reported in July by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

Merchants collect the taxes and send them to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its 6 percent share and each month sends cities and counties their portion of the sales tax.

All local sales taxes must be approved by local voters and may be used for any legal city expense. The City of Lockney

puts the money they receive in their General Fund and use it for operations such as the fire department, law enforcement and maintaining streets and alleys.

Crosbyton received a check totaling \$12,929.68 which is up 105.35 percent over the \$6,296.31 that they received in 1989. To date they have received \$35,652.42 which is up 36.55 percent over the \$48,681.93 that they received in 1989.

Ralls received a check for \$6,436.69 which is down 2.78 percent from the \$6,620.55 that they received in 1989 for the same time period. To date they have received \$38,616.97 which is up 1.80 percent from the \$37,934.70 that they received in 1989.

Silverton received a check in the amount of \$2,266.84 which is up 16.29 percent from the \$1,949.28 that they received in 1989. To date they have received \$13,179.22 which is up 6.28 percent over the \$12,400.57 that they received in 1989.

Hale Center received a check in the amount of \$3,998.36 which is down 26.74 percent from the \$5,458.06 that they received in 1989. To date they have received \$25,579.11 which is down 40.18 percent from the \$42,759.29 that they received in 1989.

Plainview received a check this

month for \$220,451.64. This is down 6.40 percent from the \$235,531.64 that they received over the same time period in 1989. To date Plainview has received \$1,376,103.15 which is up 2.83 percent over the \$1,338,258.74 that they received in 1989.

Lubbock has received a check totaling \$1,718,953.20 which is up 3.16 percent over the \$1,666,298.88 that they received in 1989. To date Lubbock has received \$10,505,711.43 which is up 2.40 percent over the \$10,259,365.69 that they received in 1989 for the same time period.

DPS sets date changes for test

Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety in Lubbock has announced a change in testing dates for those persons interested in becoming a State Trooper. Entrance tests will be administered on every second and fourth Wednesday of each month at the Department of Public Safety offices in Lubbock, Amarillo and Wichita Falls. Persons interested in a career in Law Enforcement should contact your local DPS trooper or go by any DPS facility to pick up an application. A completed application and birth certificate are required prior to beginning the testing process. Testing will begin at 8:00 a.m. and will take most of the day to complete.

Requirements for becoming a State Trooper are: (1) 20 to 35 years old, (2) good moral character, (3) in excellent physical condition, (4) a U.S. citizen and (5) sixty (60) semester hours of college or equivalent military or police experience.

Major Cawthon advised the monthly pay scale while attending the recruit academy is \$1,622.00, \$1,869.00 upon graduation and \$2,362.50 after completion of the twelve month probationary period.

Dear Friend,

Your letter of January 8 has been rec.d. and noted. Glad to hear from you again. This leaves us well, hope same to you and yours. Well, we had a fine Christmas and had a big time while it was very cold and that made the fire feel good. The gas worked fine. We couldn't tell that the cold had any depressing effect on it. Of course when we need more heat we just turn on more gas. The heat is fine and there is no fumes or smell about it. We have no pipe to carry off the fumes as there is none. However on cold mornings the windows are covered with ice and there is considerable dampness on the doors when it is very cold around here (Zero) but the same occurs with the coal heaters but worse with the gas.

As for cooking it is also fine. We have a Quick Meal Gas Range, 4 burners and simmer and one burner for the oven, also a self-lighter that burns all the time. When we want one or all four of the burners just press the button to light one or all four of them. We did not get a range with the register on it. They are \$10.00 higher but I think they are worth the price, the register I mean, they regulate perfectly for all purposes.

We only have one heater and one range cooker and our fuel bill was \$2.70 for one month and that was a cold month too, some zero weather. Regular heat all the time. After the room is warmed turn it off with just a blue blaze and the room is comfortable until bed time then turn it off and all the kindling that is necessary is one match. Strike the match and turn on the gas and it is all over for the day or as long as you want it to burn. Well, we think it is the best thing to come our way.

We have not felt any bad effects from burning gas, neither in the house or in the kitchen. We set up every night until nine or ten O'clock reading the Star-Telegram and some good novels, etc.

The minimum price is \$1.50 per month whether we use that much or not. It cost me \$24.00 to get my house piped. I had to run 50 feet with the one and one quarter inch black pipe then ten feet with one inch pipe. We only had to put in two openings. Our gas costs us 67-1/2 cents for 1000 ft. If I were you I would certainly have the gas. I bought a six burner heater and a Quick-Meal Range. I got my range and heater at cost. The heater cost me \$14.50 and the range \$38.50. The heater sells for \$22.50 and the Quick-Meal Range sells for \$63.50. If they have a cut of them here in the store I will send you one.

Well the new Ford is not up to what people expected. The Chevrolet better than advertised. The other small cars are all ahead of the Ford I think. Yes, I am still running my Oakland and it runs as good as it did when it was new.

I don't think the cold has hurt the wheat up here, we have season enough to run up into March then if we can get a very good season we will be okay. If our higher-ups would let the farmer alone he could adjust his affairs all okay. Our oil business did materialize on account of two or three leasing their land. I am returning your papers, also deposit slip and statement from Mr. Byars. He said he would have a small remnant left. The weather is fine and the gins are running full time for the last two or three days.

LETTER TO HOUSEHOLD

National School Lunch Program/School Breakfast Program

Dear Parent/Guardian:

The Lockney Independent School District takes part in the National School Lunch Program/School Breakfast Program. Meals are served every school day. High School students may buy lunch for \$1.00, Elementary Students for 90¢ and Breakfast for 50¢. Meals are also available free or at a reduced price.

- If you now get Food Stamps or Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) for any of your children, those children can get free meals.
- If your total household income is at or below the amounts on the Income Chart, your children can get free meals or reduced-price meals for _____ cents for lunch and _____ cents for breakfast.
- If you have a foster child, that child may be eligible for benefits regardless of your household income.

HOW TO APPLY:

To get free or reduced-price meals for your children, carefully complete the application and return it to the school. If you now get food stamps or AFDC for any children, the application must have the children's names, your food stamp or AFDC case number and the signature of an adult household member. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all your children, the application must have the names of everyone in the household, the amount of income each household member now gets, where it comes from and how often it is received, the social security number of either the primary wage earner or the household member who signs the application or the word "none" if the member does not have a social security number and the signature of an adult household member. An application that is not complete cannot be approved.

OTHER INFORMATION:

- VERIFICATION: Your eligibility may be checked by school officials at any time during the school year. You may be asked to send information to prove that your children should get free or reduced-price meals.
- FAIR HEARING: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of the verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. You can do this by calling or writing to the following official:

ADDRESS _____

- REPORTING CHANGES: If your children get meals based on income information, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals based on AFDC/food stamp information, you must advise the school if you no longer get AFDC or food stamps for your children.
- CONFIDENTIALITY: The information you give on the application will be used only to allow your children to get free or reduced-price meals and to verify eligibility.
- REAPPLICATION: You may apply for free and reduced-price meals at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change, such as a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, fill out an application then.
- In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.
