Catholic pastor elevated to Monsignor

The Rev. Jack Gist, pastor of San Jose Catholic Church in Lockney, and St. Alice Catholic Church in Plainview, has been named new Prelate of Honor for the Diocese of Lubbock. A Mass was celebrated in recognition of the papal honors, Sunday, August 26, at 5 p.m. at Christ the King Cathedral in Lubbock.

The liturgy, included a presentation of the official Latin documents naming the Prelates of Honor to His Holiness, was followed by a reception hosted by

members of St. Alice parish. Speaking of the decree from Pope John Paul VI, Sheehan commented: "Our Holy Father has honored Father Gist with the title of Monsignor. We thank God for his longterm service and very successful ministry."

A native of Lubbock, Gist was ordained to the priesthood there in 1965. He pastored Our Lady of Guadalupe parish in Lamesa from 1965-68, Blessed Sacrament parish in Amarillo from

1968-71, St. Ann's parish in Canyon from 1971-82 and has been at St. Alice since 1982.

Gist says he is appreciative of the honor and noted that his present pastorate here and in Lockney "has been a very wonderful and challenging assignment."

He has a Saturday evening Mass in Plainview and a total of four on Sundays at the two churches.

Gist is a member of the Plainview Ministers Association.

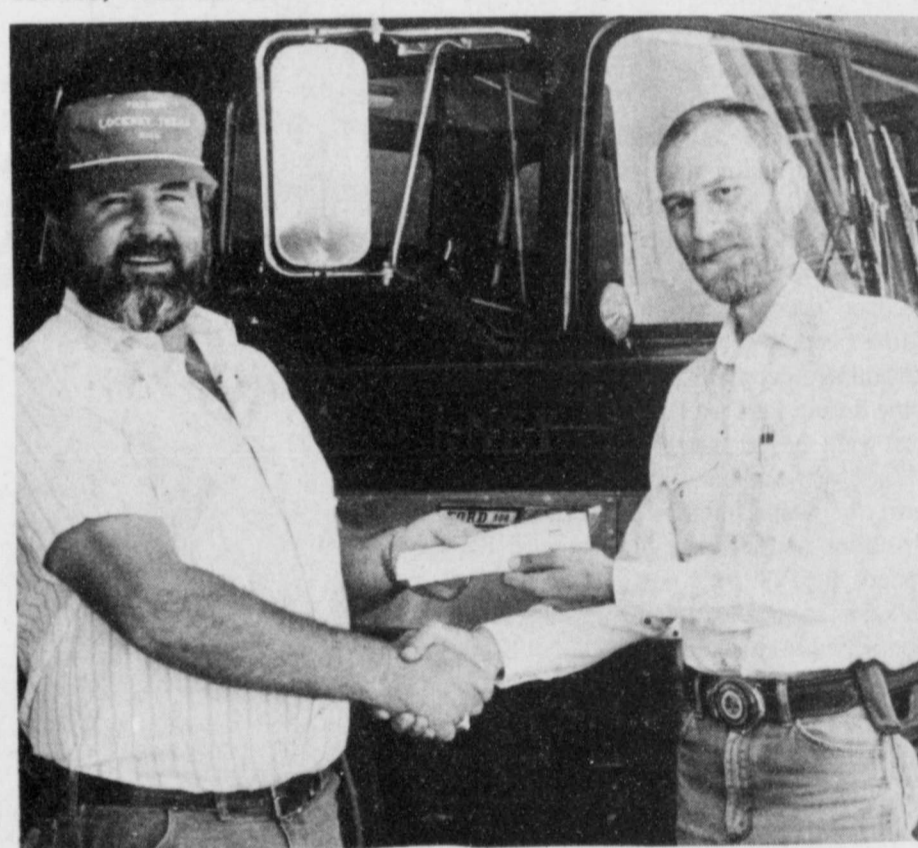
State law requires all of us to stop for any school bus that has flashing red lights. This law is being ignored by some.

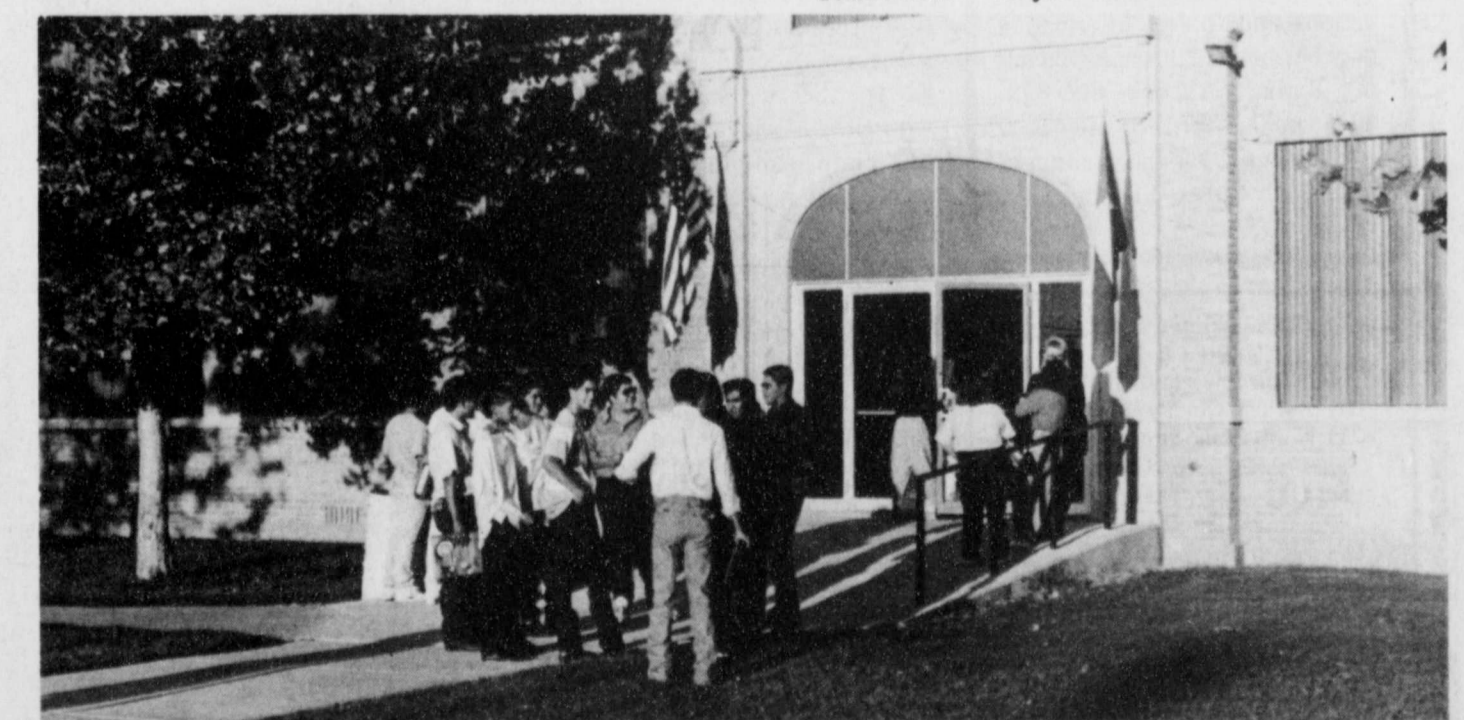

We can not thank these people from Floyd County enough for their delightful pictures, music and entertainment.

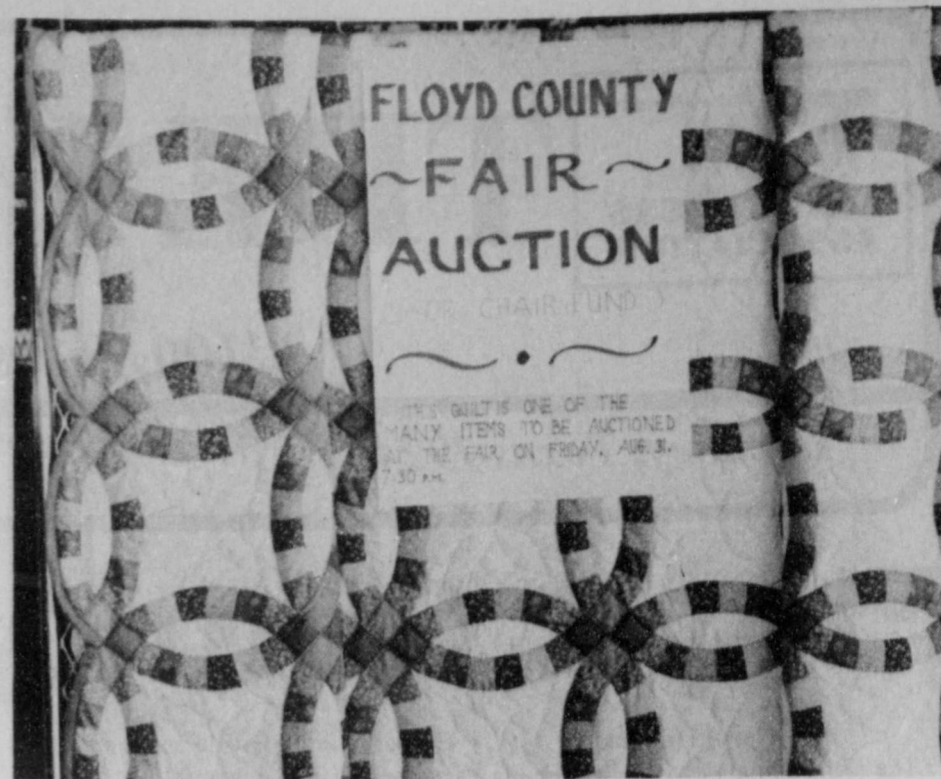
Permanent Chairman of the Group, Mr. Chuck Guemelata and his wife,

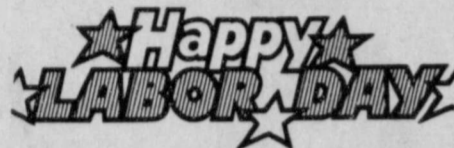
There were people from 14 states, California, Vermont, Washington, Pennsylvania, Florida, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Delaware, Wisconsin, Illinois, Texas and Ohio. Almost half of those present were from Ohio. Two men live in Amarillo and this was their first 45th reunion.

It is amazing, forty-five years later, how much fun we had during the war. No one seemed to remember any hardships, pain and loneliness, only the good fellowship and fun with side lights of accomplishment.

The 45th ADG served as a supply depot for aircraft parts. Our base was a temporary storage area for B-16 bombers enroute from the States to the combat groups. We were an assembly distribution base for liaison planes (shipped over in crates; flown out by the army). We did long-range modification on P-51 fighter planes, so they could escort the big bombers over Berlin and other long missions. We also did repair work on planes which limped into our base from combat missions.

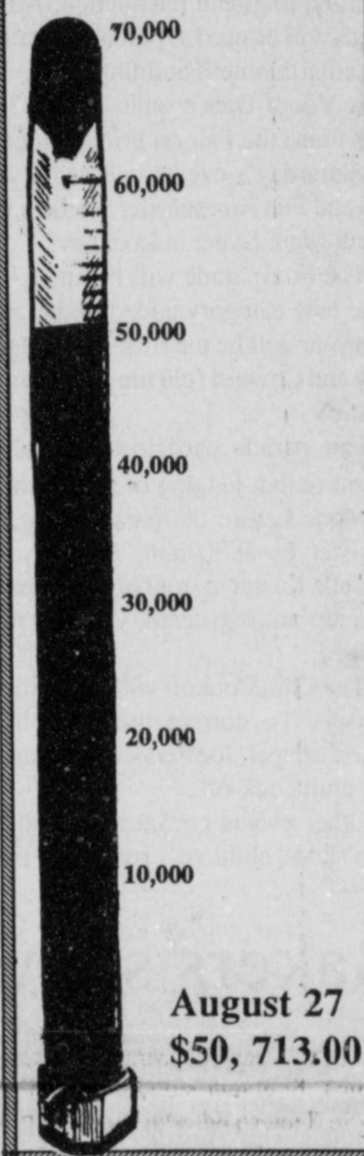

DPS urges caution for travelers this Labor Day holiday

The Texas Department of Public Safety has estimated that as many as 40 persons could be killed in traffic accidents across the state during the 78-hour Labor Day holiday period.

"Last year during this end-of-the-summer holiday, 48 persons died in traffic accidents, with another four persons dying later of injuries received during this time," said DPS Director Col. Joe E. Milner. "Our estimate for this year is below that final count of 52, and we hope the actual number of deaths this year will be much lower than this estimate."

The holiday counting period begins at 6 p.m. Friday, August 31 and continues until midnight on Monday, September 3. As it does each Labor Day, and on certain other major holidays, the DPS will have all available Troopers on the highways to ensure that motorists have as safe a holiday as possible.

"Since drinking and driving, along with speeding, are the leading causes of traffic fatalities, we hope we can hold the Labor Day deaths down by our increased presence on the highways," Milner said. "We certainly don't want to discourage people from having a good time during the Labor Day holiday, we just want motorists to drive safely."

Last year's Labor Day statistics support the Department's concern over drinking and driving and excessive speed. In 1989, 62 percent of those killed in Labor Day holiday traffic accidents died in mishaps connected either to alcohol or driving too fast.

Social Security News

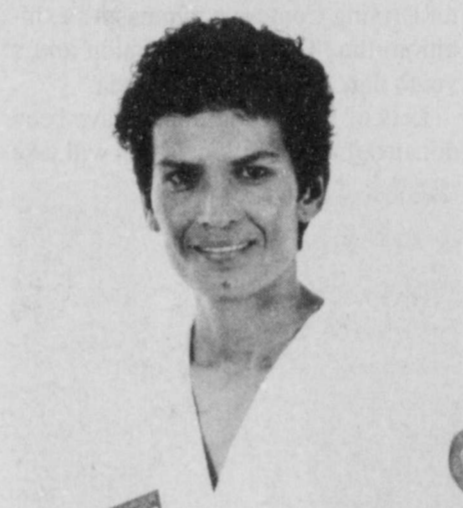
Women who have changed their names through marriage or divorce during their working careers should be sure to check their Social Security records to verify that all their earnings are credited correctly.

Married women who are self-employed need to check their records carefully too. According to the Internal Revenue Service, some married women who filed a joint tax return and were self-employed under their maiden names may not have their earnings recorded correctly.

Name changes should be reported to a person's employer and to the Social Security Administration so that a new Social Security card can be issued. The new card will have the same number as the old card.

Although these steps should insure that a woman's earnings get recorded correctly, it is still a good idea to send for a review one's earnings statement every three years. Errors can usually be corrected if they are identified early.

To get an earnings statement, call Social Security and ask for Form SSA 7004. Complete the form and mail it in. The statement will be sent in a few weeks. And the service is free. Social Security's phone number is 1-800-234-5554 (1-800-234-5772)

1 1/3 c. flour
1/3 c. Wesson oil
3 T. of cold milk





Pack a safe school lunch

More than 23 million American children will start taking their lunches when school opens soon, and whether the food is safe to eat may depend on how it's prepared.

A nutritionist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service says that food-borne illness is a bigger problem than most people think. Between 24 and 81 million cases of this disease are reported each year.

"The best defense against food-borne illness is safe food handling practices," Dr. Mary Kinney Sweeten said. "This means taking precautions every time food is prepared."

Sweeten advises those who pack lunches for school, work, trips or other events to follow these tips:

- * Keep everything that touches food clean. Stop and wash utensils, bowls and counter tops — everything that touches food — in between working on each dish.

- * Use a fork, not your hands to mix meat, macaroni, egg, tuna or green salad. Your hands continually pick up bacteria and other germs that get into fingernails and in the creased skin of the hands. Only vigorous washing with hot, soapy water prepares hands to safely deal with food.

- * Cook food thoroughly. For complete safety, raw meat, poultry and fish should be thoroughly cooked, following package or cookbook directions.

- * Refrigerate lunch fixed the night before. Pack your bag with perishables — meat or poultry sandwiches, hard-boiled eggs — and refrigerate it. Add chips and cookies and cold drinks the following morning.

It is always best to refrigerate your lunch, but since most children have no way to refrigerate their lunch at school, Sweeten suggests following these tips to keep food cold:

- * Put something cold in the lunch bag. This could be a frozen cold drink, a small, plastic refrigerator dish filled with water and frozen, or one of the new commercial gels. Also, some lunch boxes now come with freeze pack inserts.

- * Freeze sandwiches. This works best with coarse, textured breads that won't get soggy when thawing. The sandwich thaws in time for lunch, and it keeps everything else cook in the meantime. Sandwich extras — lettuce, tomato and mayonnaise — don't freeze well. Pack them separately.

- * Use a thermos to keep milk or juice cold, or try the new fruit juices in wax paper cartons that need no refrigeration.
- * Keep your lunch in the coolest place possible. Never leave it in direct sun or on a warm surface.

Sweeten said some foods are safer to take along for lunch than others. Commercially prepared and ready to eat meats, such as corned beef, salami and bologna, are good lunch box choices because they keep well.

"Canned meat and poultry, which can be opened and eaten immediately, are also good choices," she said. "Before you buy these, make sure the cans are properly sealed and not rusted, bulging,
