City council discusses ordinance

Several Lockney citizens met with the Lockney City Council at the regular September meeting to discuss the mobile home ordinance.

Harley Workman, Missy Minick, Susy Smith and Bob Pinner brought questions to the council on the proposed mobile home ordinance being proposed by the council.

Mayor Dan Smith explained to the group that the ordinance will not affect those mobile homes already on lots in the city limits.

Workman asked about homes that are moved in after the ordinance is in place. The councilmen explained that a mobile home could not be moved in until a variance had been applied for at City Hall and the unit was inspected and all the regulations of the ordinance had been met.

"We are trying to create a standard for mobile home parks within the zoning ordinance," stated Smith.

J.D. Copeland made the motion to accept the mobile home ordinance as it is written and the motion was seconded by Kenneth Wofford.

Discussion was held on changing the fiscal year of the city from April 1 to

October 1. The council agreed that by October 1 they knew what the taxes owed would be, if there would be an insurance increase, the amount of the Lake Mackenzie payment and could come closer to budgeting the needs of the city.

Edd Henderson, C.P.A., told the council that if they changed the dates of the fiscal year that they would be required to do a six month audit in addition to the regularly yearly audit.

The council voted to table the issue until a later date.

Edd Henderson and Edd Henderson Jr. presented the audit report for the city.

Henderson Jr. told the council that, "Lockney is one of the cleanest operations we work with and prepare audits for."

He reported that with the General Obligation Bonds paid off that "Lockney is in a very positive position for a city to be in and at the present time is \$30,000 in the black."

The insurance for the city employees will increase 20 percent over the amount being paid this year. The council voted to keep the insurance now in force and to pay the increase.

Eleven job applications for the position of assistant water superintendent

were received. Each was discussed. The qualifications for the position asked that an applicant be a high school graduate and have a GED. The applicant selected must work towards a water plant license and the courses must be completed in two years.

The discussion was tabled until the council could interview the applicants who qualified for the position.

The council members took care of the regular affairs of the council; the minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved, bills were paid and the financial statement reviewed.

South Plains cotton crop being estimated near 2 million bales

Cotton farmers here in the South Plains region, where half the state's crop is grown, are keeping an eye on the sky and sweating out the critical 10 weeks left until harvest, hoping to make the best of an already bad situation.

If the weather cooperates, the 25 counties around Lubbock should produce between 1.8 million and 2.2 million bales of cotton this year, said two cotton experts associated with Texas A&M University.

But that's still a major "if," especially if the long hot, dry spell continues, causing the cotton plants to shed many small bolls, agreed Dr. James Supak, a cotton agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and Dr. John Gannaway, a cotton breeder for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

If farmers can make the high end of the harvest estimate, the 2.2 million bales

will just equal the region's average annual cotton production for the 1980s.

That's not the way things started out in the spring, when farmers in the region planted 3.2 million acres and hoped for

a yield of almost 3 million bales.

Drought and a prolonged period of hot weather in May and June was the first big setback.

Lockney adult education courses scheduled to begin

Tuesday, October 2, will be the beginning of the adult education classes in Lockney. Classes are free for anyone 16 or older, not in school, or for any person who did not get a high school diploma. Also, persons just wanting to refresh his/her memory in specific skills areas are welcome.

If you would like to come, the sign-up time is at 7:00 p.m. on Oct. 2, at the Lockney High School. Last year, classes were at the elementary building, but this year the classes for GED, ABE, and ESL will all be at the high school so that the JPTA computers can be used. This is a program that individualizes instruction in reading, math, language, and bilingual education. Persons receive immediate feedback from the

computers on the appropriate level of difficulty. Fast fairs are common on Job Partner Training Activity computers.

Basic education classes have been offered in Lockney for many years. Last year, three people completed their GED and others attending raised their skills levels significantly.

Mrs. Castro and Mrs. Kidd will be teaching again this year. Mr. Terry Ellison is the supervisor.

Tuesday's and Thursday's will be the regular meeting nights. Persons may begin at anytime, but one's progress is better he or she begins and continues on a regular basis.

No child care is provided since the classes are for adults 16 years of age or older.

Reecer retires from Post Office

Donald Reecer, Rural Route Two Carrier, retired from the Lockney Post Office on August 31, 1990 after 37 years and 7 months of government service. This time includes two years of military service during the Korean conflict and credit for unused sick leave.

Reecer started his career with the postoffice as a substitute clerk on March 14, 1956. He stated that he was to have started on March 13 but that he was delayed because of the birth of his son. Richie was born on that day.

When Tom Marr retired on March 5, 1981 Reecer transferred to Rural Route Two which also included Route One out of the Flomot post office. He served on Route Two until his retirement.

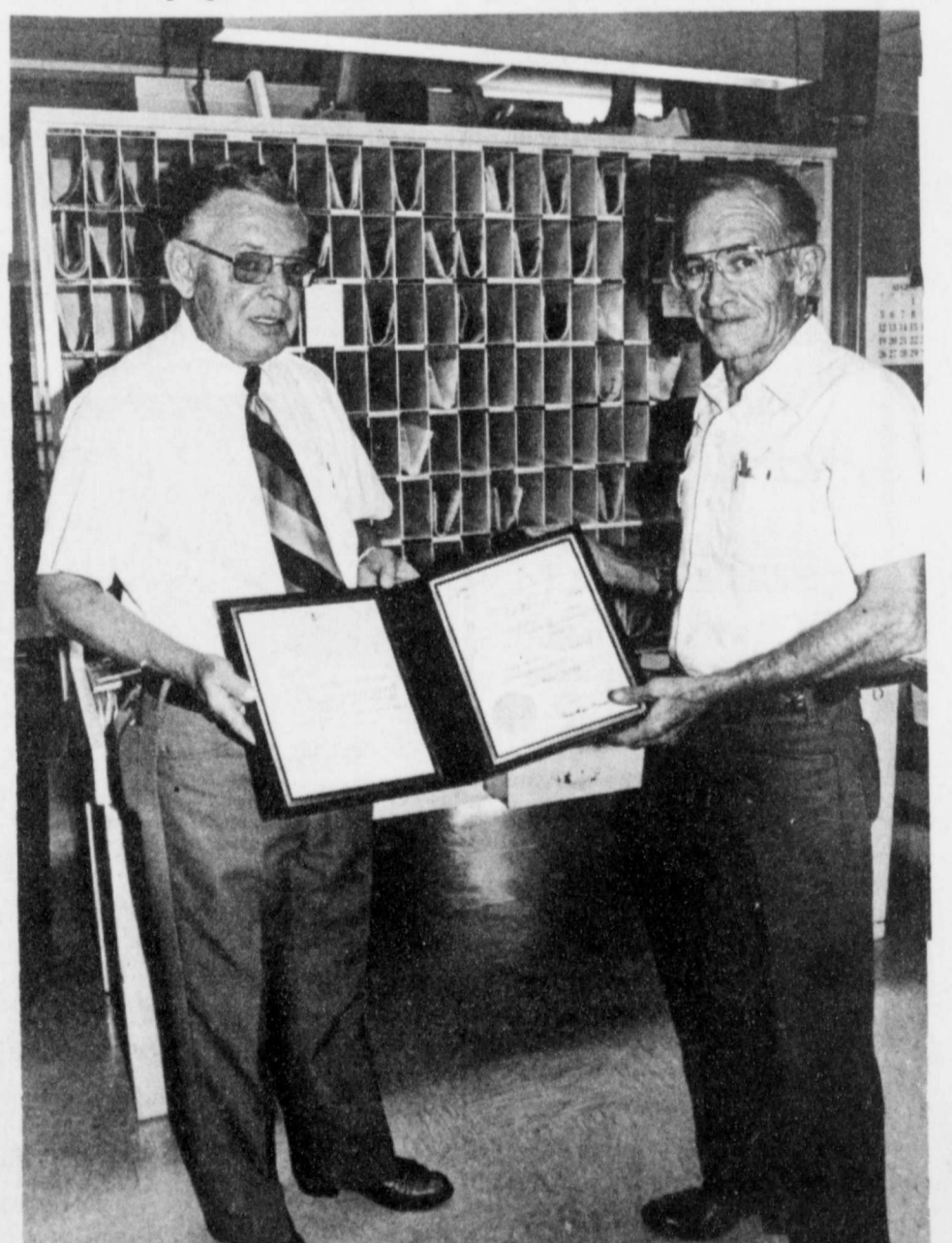

The Mothers Rule

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following was taken from "The Mother's Rule" The Right and Wrong Way of Disciplining Children; Edited in 1857 by T.S. Arthur.

BE PATIENT WITH CHILDREN.
 "Ye have need of patience!" Nothing can be more true than this, and nothing is more applicable to those who have to do with boys and girls. There are so many provocations which demand endurance, so many faults which require correction, so much carelessness which provokes rebuke, and so much perverseness which calls for firmness and control that "teachers of babes," if not of a temper absolutely angelic, need to have "line upon line - line upon line, precept upon precept - precept upon precept," to aid in the work which has fallen to their lot.

There are so many temptations and accessories to impatience, too. It is easy and so natural for the strong to tyrannize over the weak! Absolute power is too frequently abused; and the power which a parent or teacher exercises over the child, is so far absolute that immediate resistance can be rendered unavailing. True the parent has parental tenderness and love to restrain the impetuosity of impatience, but the teacher has not; and if parents are often, in spite of natural barriers, impetuous, what wonder that teachers are so too.

It is less trouble, so far as the present time is concerned, to blame and scold, and punish a child for negligence, stupidity, or misconduct, than to explain, reason, and instruct. It takes less time to box a boys ears for being mischievous, or to push a girl into a bedroom "all by herself," for being idle, or talkative, or troublesome, than it does to investigate intentions and motives, or to inquire into causes; and we do not wonder that the patience of the most patient sometimes gives way. But it is not the less to be deplored when it does give way. In one hour - in less time than this - in *one minute* - evil may be wrought which will undo the work of months, or which years of judicious treatment will not obliterate.

Do we say then that children should be indulged and pampered, and their faults overlooked? No; this again seems easier to the indulgent and self-indulgent parent or teacher than the wearying work of constant watchfulness and wise circumspection. But patience is as much required in the avoidance of false indulgence, as in the banishment of undue or injudicious severity. It is easier, for the moment, to yield to the wishes and dispositions of children, than to oppose or regulate them. But notwithstanding this, "Patience" should "have her perfect work". O ye parents and teachers of the young, "ye have need of patience."

And not patience only. In the proper exercise of discipline, discrimination and keen perception must be united with it, or even patience will fail. Perhaps no two children in any given number are precisely alike in formation of mind, disposition, and general capacity. One will be timid, another bold; one sensitive, another obtuse; one quick, another slow. In different things, and at different times, the same boys or girls may exhibit almost contradictory qualities, and yet there shall be nothing in all of this that ought to be construed into a fault, or that should call for even a rebuke. Patience here will be lost in a maze, to which discrimination alone can furnish the clue. And that not always, for we have the word of inspiration to inspire us that "the heart is deceitful above all things;" but in general, perhaps, the heart of a child may be pretty correctly read by those who do not, idly or contemptuously, neglect its study.

At all events, it is better to be credulous than incredulous - better that a child should ten times escape the just punishment of a fault through an excess of patience, than be once unjustly punished through want to discrimination. The memory of the injustice will rankle in the soul, and produce worse fruits there, tenfold, in after years, than will spring from the consciousness of having committed faults innumerable with impunity.

Teachers or parents never will or can deal wisely with a child, unless they dispense with impulse, and scrutinize, in every possible way, what appears worthy of condemnation; and the best way to follow out this scrutiny is mentally to change places with the offender - to be a child again - to divest one's self of all but a childish judgement and capacity - to throw back one's self upon childish views and feelings - and to submit to be guided by childish reasonings; and then, after all, if there be a doubt, to give the child the benefit of the doubt.

But, O, what a deal of trouble in all of this!
 Very well, —, we are not thinking about your trouble, but about the child's good. Though, as to the trouble, the best way of doing anything is the least troublesome way in the end. But by trouble you mean pains-taking, time and attention, and regard to the ultimate object. Now can anything in the world, worth doing, be well and properly accomplished without these?

Trouble! Shame upon those who, under the selfish, but vain plea of saving themselves trouble - present trouble - make trouble for others in after years!

Need it be said, that in the years to come patience returns in abundant reward.

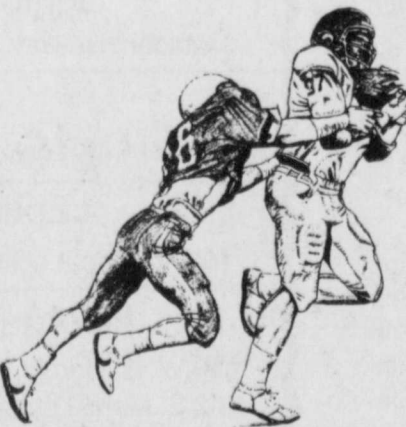
