

Goal reached, ambulance ordered

The Lockney ambulance fund has reached its goal and the ambulance has been ordered according to Jimmy Kemp, fire marshal for the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department.

The drive for a new ambulance was begun the first of February of this year and donations have come in from local businesses and individuals. Many of the gifts were given as memorials. The ambulance fund was within \$2,000 of reaching the goal set.

D.M. Cogdell Jr. presented the ambulance fund with a check for \$20,000 on Monday, October 1. The money will be used for extra equipment and for repairs to the ambulance as needed in the future.

Lockney Mayor Dan Smith commented, "We would like to express our appreciation to D.M. Cogdell Jr. for the generous contribution from his family."

Cogdell is chairman of the board of the Martha Ann Cogdell Hospital Trust. The trust was created by the Cogdell family in 1953 in memory of Martha Ann Cogdell, who died at the age of 13. It was created for the purpose of making donations to religious, charitable and educational institutions in the State of Texas. For approximately the last 20 years all donations have been made in this immediate area.

Funds were provided for the construction of the Cogdell Clinic in Floydada, the Cogdell Clinic in Lockney and the

Briscoe County Clinic in Silverton, the purchase of an ambulance for Silverton, the purchase of an ambulance for Quitaque, \$60,000 to the Caprock Hospital Ambulance fund to supplement the money given by other donors to purchase a new ambulance in Floydada. Donations to the ambulance funds are to be used to assist in the purchase of equipment for and making repairs to the ambulances.

Tutorials slated for LISD students

Tornado sighted over Lockney Friday

An unusual fall phenomenon, a tornado, was spotted in clouds directly over Lockney on Friday afternoon. Lockney Police Officer Ellis Butler reported the tornadic activity at approximately 2:15 p.m.

The fast moving storm produced heavy rain and small hail as it passed over the city.

The tornado which was seen by many residents appeared to be hanging directly over the city. The thin, elongated cloud never touched the ground but the sight did send residents scurrying for cellars and safety.

After the sighting from Officer Butler, Lockney City Hall was notified and the tornado siren was activated. Apparently, because of the time of year and despite the heavy rain and hail, many residents believed the siren was a mistake and failed to seek shelter.

Students in the elementary school practiced their first tornado drill as they were filed into hallways for safety. Lockney High School and junior high also heeded the alarm and sought shelter in the hallways.

Because of a slight problem with the tornado alarm, an all clear siren was not sounded as soon as it could have been, and city hall was besieged by callers wondering if "it was clear yet."

According to reports, the National Weather Service in Lubbock was called and asked why there had been no warning of the cloud from their radar. Callers were told that the cloud was seen on radar but that it was "a low pressure cloud and was not dangerous."

Many Lockney citizens commented that, "They would have broadcast it and rung the siren if it had been seen in Lubbock."

Second measles immunization may be needed

The Texas Board of Health adopted new requirements on June 30, 1990 for the immunization of students in public schools, private schools and children in child care facilities.

Beginning on January 1, 1991 students, whose 12th birthday occurs on or after September 1, 1990, will be required to have two doses of measles vaccine or provide evidence of measles immunity.

The two doses of measles vaccine must be administered at least thirty days apart; proof of the second dose will not be required until the child's 12th birthday.

Mrs. Ulmer, nurse for the Lockney school system, asks that if a student has turned 12 on or after September 1, 1990 and has had only one dose of measles vaccine that the student make arrangements to have the second immunization given before January 1, 1991. Also Mrs. Ulmer asks parents of children who have had the second immunization be sure that the information is added to the student's record at school.

But the most unusual cap Broseh has collected comes

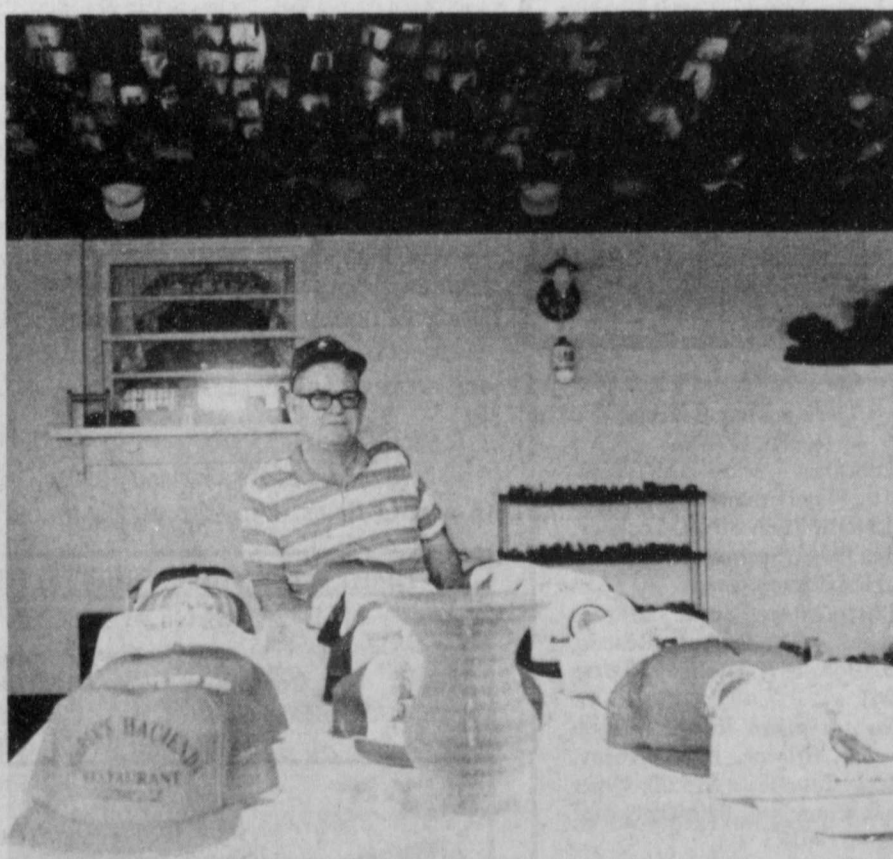

Widener competes with Bergstrom AFB team

In the dim light of dawn, two pilots anxiously guide their jet aircraft a scant 300 feet above rugged terrain. Anxiety builds as they go on afterburner, racing toward their targets. One shot is all they'll get, every movement must be precise. Approaching their targets, they slam their throttles forward, making a high-speed pass, firing quickly and accurately. Seconds later, they race upward and into the cover of distant craggy hills.

Neither jet was armed with weapons, but with advanced technical cameras. The pilots and their reconnaissance teams were vying for top honors in the third biennial series of the U.S. Air Force's Tactical Air Command International Reconnaissance Air Meet (RAM), held at Bergstrom Air Force Base, in Austin, Texas.

Airman First Class Joseph T. Widener, son of Ernie Widener of Lockney and Phyllis Settle of Plainview, was a member of the Bergstrom Air Force Base team.

The competition featured 12 teams representing the United States, Australia, Great Britain and the Federal Republic of Germany, to promote tactical reconnaissance by focusing on procedures and techniques used by allied units. Teams composed of aircrews, imagery interpreters and maintenance personnel provided necessary support for each team to be successful in the

meet. "I'm a fuels specialist. I service jet fuel for aircraft and ensure quality, accountability and speed to support the mission," said Widener.

However, during the meet, the job can differ from what is done at their normal duty station. The workload and environment may not be what airmen are used to on a daily basis. With each team required to perform 12 missions; mutual support, photo coverage requirements and maintenance workload must be weighed to determine how many aircraft to launch per mission.

"Working on the reconnaissance team was more challenging than my everyday job. The work wasn't different, but my workload increased a lot. The teams that participated worked in record times. To support them, I had to be on the flight line longer hours than I'm used to," said the 1986 graduate of Lockney High School.

"My role in the competition was important because I had to ensure fuel was transferred quickly and efficiently for aircraft to be prepared for another flight," he said.

The competition also played a critical role by giving everyone a chance to improve their skills and perform in a more stressful environment which prepared them for a 'real world' situation. But the Air Force plans to implement a more sophisticated satellite reconnaissance system, the need for air crews and maintenance personnel will be reduced.

"RAM helped us pull together and work with our foreign allies to accomplish a mission. Everyone was able to work as a team and improve job performance, giving us confidence should we be called on a real reconnaissance mission," said Widener.

Widener and his wife, Annette, have a 17-month-old daughter, Ashley.

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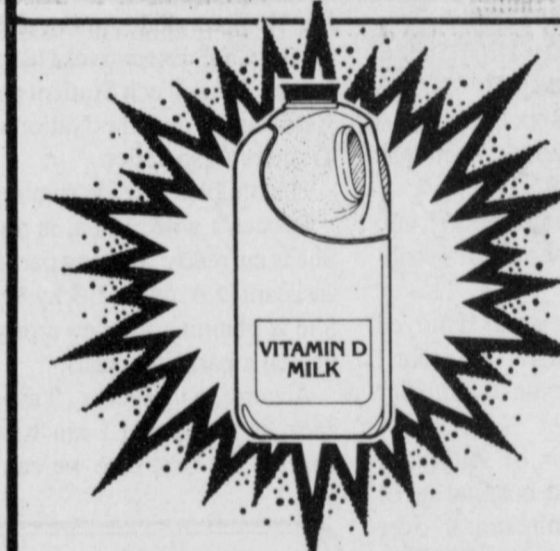

Students in the third grade at Lockney Elementary School have received the gift-book entitled "Feeling Good About Me." It is a handsomely bound book of stories about learning traditional values and self-esteem.

"Feeling Good About Me" contains eight stories about realistic problems young people might encounter and how, using traditional values, they are resolved.

Each story has a full-color illustration and teaches such lessons as right and wrong, appreciation of family, what it means to be a good citizen, living up to one's full potential, and why (and how) to stay away from drugs.

In the first story, "A Day With Granddaddy," young Wendy is mad. The most popular girl in school has invited her to a slumber party but she has to go to her grandparents house on the lake, a visit she usually enjoys. During a conversation that takes place as Wendy fishes with Granddad, she learns the relative

importance of the party and the visit (her values are put into perspective) and she feels good about herself and visiting her grandparents.

Other stories involve the meaning of friendship, family relationships, respect for others, loyalty and the importance of being your own unique self, lessons not always covered in school curriculums. They reflect positive influences that build a child's self-esteem.

Each story is accompanied by a teacher's guide, which covers discussion starters, lesson objectives, and follow-up applications. The purpose of the lessons is to teach young people good values and encourage discussion of values between children, their parents and other family members in a home setting.

In "Real Heroes," a war game among a dozen boys and girls results in several broken windows at school. At the

principal's office the youngsters learn from an Army veteran that being an American hero isn't something that must happen on a battlefield, but also occurs by being a good citizen, doing whatever they can for their country.

In another story that takes place in a video arcade, Brian and Darrick must weigh the chance to get free games dishonestly against the effects of such action. With the help of a lesson learned from Darrick's dad, honesty wins out.

These beautiful books are made to last and are likely to become keepsake editions for the students. DPS runs ATV safety program throughout state

The Texas Department of Public Safety hopes to reduce the number of people killed in accidents involving all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) through a training program now administered by the Department.

"In the seven-year period from 1982 to 1989, 75 persons died in ATV accidents in Texas," said Linda Cox, DPS Coordinator of the ATV Safety Program. "Over the years, the Department's efforts to reduce other forms of traffic deaths in Texas have paid off, and we believe this new program will have similar successful results."

The Texas Legislature enacted a law

in 1988 requiring that all operators who ride ATVs on public land complete a safety training class. The Department of Public Safety was assigned the program in 1989.

The state program has adopted national ATV RiderCourse, developed by the ATV Safety Institute, a non-profit corporation funded by four leading distributors of ATVs in the United States. The one-day course is available free to anyone who has purchased an ATV since December 30, 1986. Some purchasers are also eligible for cash incentives by the manufacturers.

Students completing the course will receive a DPS certificate which must be

carried by operators when riding on public lands. The law also requires that all operators on public land annually register their ATVs and pay a safety fee.

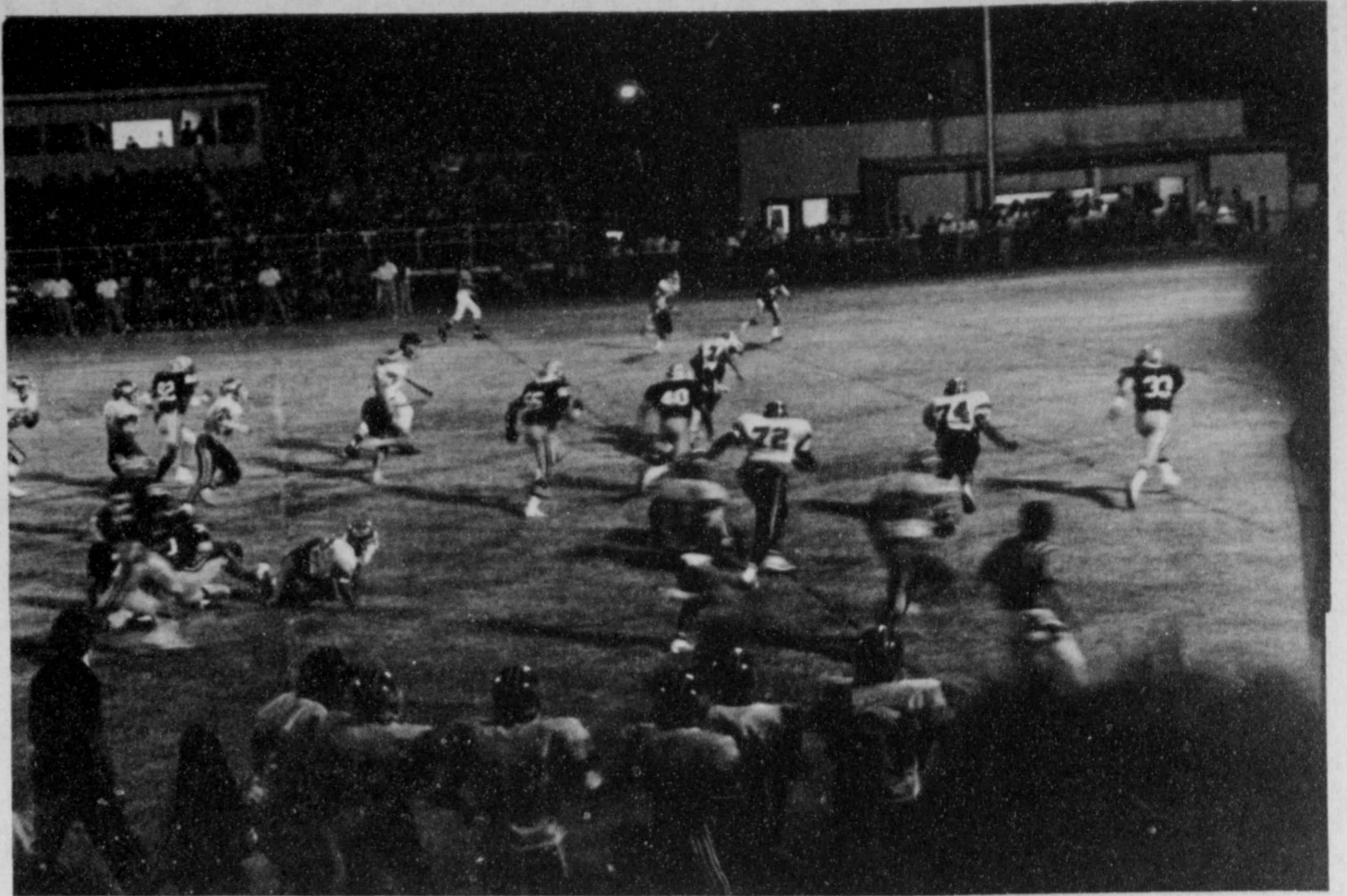
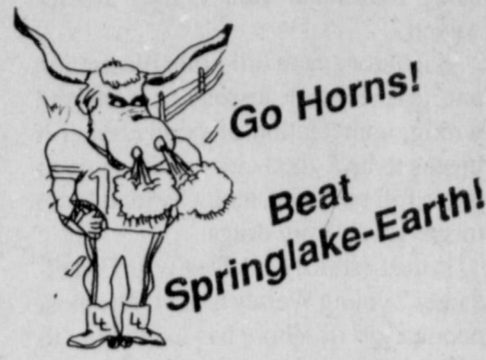
