Red Ribbon Week kicked off by Mayor

Mayor Dan Smith has proclaimed the week of October 19-26 as Red Ribbon Week in Lockney. The theme for the week is "Proud To Be Drug Free."

Under the direction of Charlotte Mitchell, counselor for the Lockney Independent School system, several activities have been planned which include both the students and citizens of Lockney.

The Lockney Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts will be decorating car antennas with red ribbons.

Buttons have been donated by the Girls Athletic Booster Club for junior high students and they will be in charge of a release of red balloons at the Longhorn-Mustang football game on Friday night.

Lockney Elementary School has planned several activities for the week. They will hold a drug-free march, making banners for the football game, and posters for the downtown area. Pay-N-Save has donated grocery sacks for the students to decorate, which will then be returned to the store. The sacks will be distributed throughout the area as they are filled with groceries.

Lockney churches will be passing out ribbons to their members on Sunday, Oct. 21.

The Lockney 4-H Club has collected donations and signatures from concerned citizens for an ad in the Lockney

Beacon.

The Lockney Lions Club will be sponsoring the "Proud To Be Drug Free" ribbons to students in elementary school and the community.

Il Penseroso Study Club is also sponsoring red ribbons and have donated "Proud To Be Drug Free" buttons to the students in high school.

The Lockney Rotary Club is sponsoring a poster contest for fourth and fifth grades. The posters will be displayed in downtown Lockney.

The Lockney Volunteer Fire Department will have the new ambulance on display at the ballgame and it will be decorated with banners made by the elementary students.

Citizens of Lockney are asked to decorate their homes, businesses and vehicles with red ribbons and signs to encourage the community to work towards a drug free society.

New ambulance now in service

It was announced at the Lockney City Council meeting on February 8 that the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department was starting a fund raising drive for a new ambulance and after eight months the new ambulance is here.

In February, Fire Chief Jimmy Kemp stated, "We are in need of a new ambulance. The one we have now is a 1979 Ford Econoline van and it is in need of a complete drive train overhaul. The backup ambulance is a 1968 Oldsmobile Station Wagon and all we can use it for is transporting people."

The new ambulance is a 1990 Ford F-350 diesel, mounted with a modular box that can be removed complete and mounted on a new cab and chassis when the need arises.

The Lockney City Council made the first contribution and the firemen stationed a cotton trailer across the street from the Lockney Gin and asked the citizens of Lockney to donate their aluminum cans. The trailer has been emptied twice and has brought in approximately \$1500.

Terry Keltz donated an original oil painting of the Caprock area to the fire department to be raffled off. Tickets were sold on the painting for several months and Dr. W.J. Mangold's name was drawn at the Floyd County Fair.

Eight members of the fire department underwent several months of classes and intense training and received the Emergency Medical Training (EMT) certificates. The members receiving certificates were Jimmy Kemp, Ricky Kellison, Johnny Dorman, Barry Hooten, Lonnie Hooten, Zach Zachary, Archie Jones and Darrell Rascoe.

The money for the ambulance came in through contributions from individuals,

businesses, memorials, the Terry Keltz painting and the sale of the aluminum cans, along with a grant from the Meadows Foundation and a donation from the Cogdells. Every donation, whether it be one can, one dollar or thousands of dollars is appreciated.

The ambulance was picked up on Thursday and brought to Lockney. It was then taken to Plainview to have two-way radios installed. Members of the fire department spent Saturday and Sunday placing the newly purchased equipment in its place. Tuesday the unit was taken to Lubbock and inspected before receiving the necessary license.

Jimmy Kemp, fire chief, stated, "Bill Aston was instrumental in our receiving the grant from the Meadows Foundation

and in selecting the ambulance we needed for our community. Without his help we would probably have spent more money on the ambulance than was necessary. He knew what we needed in the way of equipment and what was not necessary.

"We appreciate all the work he has done for us and all the suggestions he has made."

Aston is the son of Ray and Lue Aston and a 1969 graduate of Lockney High School.

Aston is Executive Director of the Harlingen Community Emergency Care Foundation, Inc. He has held several appointed positions on Ambulance, Air Ambulance, Medical, Disaster Planning and Guidelines and Rules Committees.

Several of these committees are part of the Texas Department of Health and several are area county committees.

Aston has been a leader in the field of emergency medical services for the past 20 years and his work has been recognized throughout the State of Texas.

The Foundation of which he is Executive Director covers nine cities which makes up nearly 250 square miles and serves a population of 125,000 and answers over 8,000 alarms per year. The area is covered by a fleet of eight vehicles and staffed by paramedics.

The State of Texas presented him with the "Administrator of the Year Award in 1986 and the Harlingen Foundation with the Public Education Information Award for 1989.

Jackson appointed to school board

Lockney Independent School Board met for a regular monthly meeting, Oct. 11, and appointed D.K. Jackson as a trustee to fill the vacancy left by trustee Lisa Mosley's resignation.

"Jackson was chosen," said Superintendent Dub Hallmark, "because of his familiarity with the board. It will be an easy transition."

Jackson will serve out the remainder of this year. During the regular school board election next May, someone will have to run for the position and be elected to fill out the remainder of Mosley's term, which will be one year.

Jackson has previously served on the school board and resigned last May. During the meeting, Jim Bob Martin presented Mosley with a plaque in appreciation for her service to LISD.

Mosley, who has been a trustee from

1987-1990, resigned because she is working on a college degree and felt she did not have the time to devote to the school board.

The board members also discussed the need for additional classrooms at the elementary school. It was the general consensus of the trustees that classroom space would have to be built and that it should be done this summer. The members agreed to continue to look into this matter.

James Poole, the high school principal, presented the trustees with a list, provided by the state, of school sponsored activities. These were approved by the board.

Board members also approved the textbook committee.

Early dismissal was approved for Oct. 29, at 2:15 p.m. The time will be used for

an inservice for teachers and aides, an effective school practices. It will be taught by Region 17 service center.

Because of the larger enrollment than expected, Sharon Kleypas was hired as a new 5th grade teacher. Mrs. Kleypas' husband will be the new Lutheran preacher. They are moving here from Temple.

The school board received six bids on the Calloway property next to the old concrete construction plant. Two of the bids were highest, at \$3,000. These two people will be asked to bid again.

The school board will also be advertising for bids, on Lots 8.9, and 10, Block 2 of the Tuttle Addition.

Lance Patridge receives national 4-H honors

Lance Patridge was notified Friday by Mary True, Floyd County Extension agent, that he had won a \$1,000.00 scholarship with his "Electric Energy" recordbook at the National 4-H contest. He had placed first on the county level, first at district and first at the state competition.

Patridge is the 15 year old son of Greg and Susan Patridge and the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Dan Kimball of Edmonson and Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Patridge of Plainview. He has a sister Chelsea.

According to Mary True, "You only get one chance to win the State and National Recordbook contest. Lance's

recordbook is one of six national winners in the "Electric Energy" project out of a possible 52 state winners." He will receive an expense paid trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago November 30 to December 6.

Patridge has participated in 4-H for seven years and he has turned in a recordbook for the last five years. He won the Danforth "I Dare You" award last year.

Patridge and Lila Booker did a method demonstration this year entitled "Happy Is The Heat Pump Home" and won 2nd place at the State 4-H contest held at College Station. He has attended Junior Leadership Camp at Levelland two years and the 4-H Electric Camp at Scott Able, New Mexico two years. This year he and Michelle Delgado attended the 4-H Congress in Austin.

In his "Electric Energy" project he has hooked up VCR's for neighbors, installed ceiling fans, light fixtures, assembled four plug extension cords and taught lamp making to 794-H'ers at county camp. He also interviewed employees of several electric utility

companies.

He participated in the 4-H Youth Exchange program this year and hosted a boy from Missouri for five days. According to his mother "He hopes to go to Missouri next year as an exchange 4-H'er himself. He loves meeting new people and making friends."

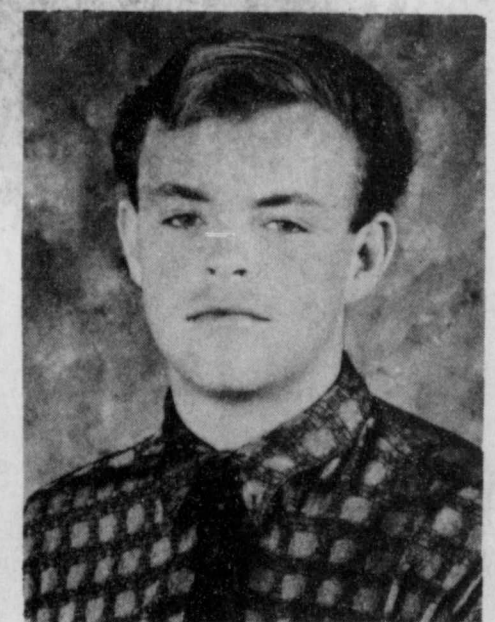
His other 4-H projects include Recreation, Citizenship, Safety, Photography, Foods and Nutrition, Home Environment, Leadership, Public Speaking and Horticulture.

Lance was Salutatorian of his 8th grade class and he has been on the honor roll for 4 years. Last year he was named to the Who's Who Among American High School students. He participates in the Gifted and Talented program and in band, football, basketball and track. He has had a perfect attendance at school for five years, highest average in Math four years, Outstanding Science Student for 3 years; and Outstanding English student for one year; FFA one year, 1st place Creed Speaking, and 2nd place in Land Judging at the District FFA contest.

He is a member of the Main Street Church of Christ where he helps with Vacation Bible School, church dinners, Youth Rally, and Christmas caroling for church senior citizens.

Patridge has helped with the Floyd County Fair for five years and partici-

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LHS graduate receives presidential teaching award

A Lockney graduate, Patricia Thornton Killingsworth, daughter of Owen and Kathleen Thornton, was the recipient recently of the 1990 Presidential Award for Excellence in Science and Mathematics Teaching.

Patricia, who is now a math teacher

with Carver Math and Science Magnet School in Arkansas, was nominated by the Little Rock Arkansas School System as the top elementary school math teacher.

That nomination was then sent to the Arkansas State Board of Education, where she competed against all the nominated teachers from the state of Arkansas. Four teachers were then chosen, two from the area of math and two from the area of science, to be recipients of the Presidential Award. Patricia was the only math teacher from any elementary school from the whole state of Arkansas, chosen for the honor.

Killingsworth, a teacher for 20 years, was chosen because of her program that teaches elementary students how to use scientific calculators to figure the distance to the moon and her Young Astronomers program that teaches youngsters to discover other ways in which man and science relate.

Each award recipient (100 teachers from across the United States) was honored October 2 at a White House

ceremony. The honorees were treated to a dinner at the state department, a concert at the Kennedy Center, a cruise and dinner on the Potomac River and a dinner and reception hosted by National Geographic. The week long program also included seminars and lectures.

Patricia also received a \$7,000 National Science and Math Foundation grant that will be used to promote their programs at school.

Patricia attended school in Lockney starting in the first grade and graduated from Lockney High School in 1965. She then attended West Texas State University and majored in Elementary Education with a minor in math.

From there she went to Bentonville, Arkansas and taught for eight years before going to Little Rock to teach at Carver Elementary. According to Mr. and Mrs. Owen Thornton, "Patricia's principal was asked to start a magnet school and she asked Patricia to come with her. The school was all black at the time, but the principal said that she wanted Patricia to come because she did

not see the color of the children's skin. "Now it is called the Carver Math and Science Magnet School. Patricia is the math specialist in charge of the Math department. The reputation of the school is so good now that everybody wants in. Now a lot of the teachers and children are anglo.

"They have to have PTA meetings twice a week to accommodate all the parents who are involved in the school. One father comes to Patricia's class to learn with his son, because he is so impressed with the way she teaches. There is currently a waiting list of about 500 who want to attend the school," according to Patricia's proud parents.

For the last two summers, Patricia has studied Math at the University of Chicago and will go back in February for two more weeks. Purdue University has also recently asked her to come up for three days (expenses paid) and help them implement a Math program.

Patricia, who has been married to Jim Killingsworth for 22 years, has three children and one grandchild.

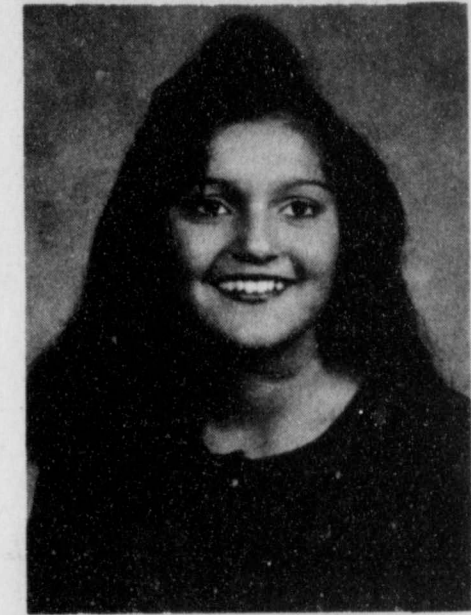

BBB warns against pregnancy scam

Your BBB has received information about someone calling businesses requesting information about their pregnant employees. There have also been calls from pregnant women themselves saying they had been approached by a man to be in a maternity style show or to do modeling.

The latest calls have been regarding a man that stated he was purchasing The Stork Shop in Lubbock and wanted names and phone numbers of a South Plains area business's pregnant employees. He stated he was having a style show and that he would pay these ladies \$250 each plus give them a 15% discount on purchase of maternity clothes at The Stork Shop. He told the business that he was from Sacramento, California, and his company there is called LaMadonna.

A quick check with the BBB in Sacramento revealed that there is no company by that name listed with the county offices as a business and the Bureau has no file information on a company by that name. A check with The Stork Shop revealed that they are NOT selling out to this man or anyone else. Unfortunately, it appears that this man has nothing to do with a maternity style show or any company of that nature. Your Better Business Bureau advises EXTREME CAUTION. Please remember that legitimate style shows or modeling agencies go through established advertising/modeling agencies. ALWAYS check the reliability of a company by calling your Better Business Bureau.

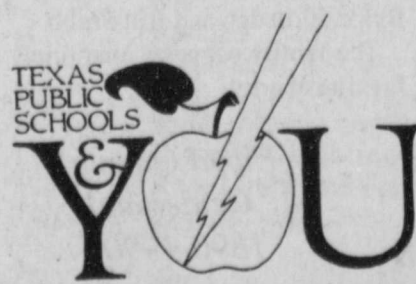

Collins participates in the 1990 ADT London Marathon

London is a great place for a race. We arrived Tuesday before the race, and spent a not so leisurely week traipsing all over the city seeing the sights, with side trips to Dover, Canterbury, and assorted castles. Each morning, I got up for an easy four or five through Hyde Park. Somehow, running by Kensington Palace, the home of Prince Charles and Lady Di, is lots more exciting than running by the Hunt's place at White Rock Lake.

Finally the great day arrived, and I dragged my stiff (from walking) bones out to board a bus bound for the starting line. Although the week had been mostly sunny, race day dawned damp and cool. I was assigned to the Blue start, one of three starting areas out in Greenwich. At the staging area, 30,000 runners huddled in four small hospital tents trying to stay warm. No sooner did I stash my rain suit in my bag, put it on the bus, and headed for the starting line, than the heavens opened.

Standing in the rain with 30,000 other fools waiting for the start wasn't so bad. After all, we were all pretty much packed together, seeded so that the faster runners (with lower numbers) were at the front, and there was enough body heat to keep from getting too chilled. Unfortunately, I squeezed in right behind a short gentleman with a big grin and a cap with two little flags on sticks bearing the legend "Solidarino", or something to that effect. I don't usually have a problem with

people making political statements during a race. It's just that he kept looking up at the clouds and poking me in the eyes with his little flagpoles. I tried to point this out, but he just gave me a toothy grin and a vigorous nod, poking one of his flags into the ear of the guy next to him.

Finally the race started. 30,000 runners at the Blue start, and I made it across the starting line in less than three minutes. No baby joggers, no pets, and everyone lines up according to their number. Amazing.

The support the people of London show this race is really overwhelming. I don't know how many people it takes to line a 26 mile course on both sides, but they were all there, cheering the whole way. In places the crowd was so thick that they spilled out into the street and the runners had to slow down as the course was restricted.

About every quarter of a mile, someone in the crowd would yell out "Oggi Oggi Oggi", and all the runners would yell "Oy Oy Oy". I asked another runner what that meant, and he told me it was an old Welsh chant.

At six miles, the course winds through the cobblestone streets of downtown Greenwich, right under the bow of the Cutty Sark sailing ship. There were so many spectators cheering that there was only room for a couple of runners abreast, and the race slowed to a walk for a bit. The cheering was non stop and almost deafening.

I was wearing a Dallas Cowboys T-shirt over a long sleeved running shirt,

intending to ditch it somewhere along the way. It was soaked through and heavy before the start, but I kept it on because so many people recognized it and cheered me on. One woman at about 8 miles yelled out "Dallas Cowboys! Aye likes yew, luv!" That encouraged me to pick up the pace for a couple of miles.

At about 12 miles the race goes up and over the Tower Bridge, the famous landmark you see on all the post cards. Now the race really gets down to business, as you run along the Thames through the dockyards. At 22 miles you pass back under the Tower Bridge and run right in front of the Tower, passing by Traitor's gate where condemned prisoners used to be brought for execution. At this point I was starting to feel pretty condemned, as the lack of training started to take its toll. I passed one guy who had it worse, though. As you leave the Tower you run up a fairly steep grade that is only 20 yards or so long, but is paved with cobblestones. One wheelchair competitor was stuck on a cobblestone, too exhausted to make it the rest of the way up the hill.

The race continues along the Thames, passing among office buildings in the business district. I finally decided to take off the Cowboys T-shirt, and ran for a mile or so looking for an enthusiastic youngster. When I saw a kid cheering up ahead, I pitched the shirt in his direction, and said, "Have a souvenir, son". Poor guy picked that moment to look away, and wound up with a wet, sweaty T-shirt draped across his face. That encouraged me to pick up the pace, but only for a couple of hundred yards this time.

At 24 miles, I saw my wife. She had

time to sit in bed and watch Francie Larriou-Smith finish second in the women's division, than catch the subway over to meet me on the course. Well, I didn't say I was fast.

Finally, the course winds around past the palace and down a broad avenue through a park. Tens of thousands of cheering spectators line both sides of the street cheering for those of up in the pack just as much as for the elite runners that had gone by an hour before. Despite all the encouragement, I finally pulled up and walked for a bit, just to enjoy the spectacle of ten thousand screaming

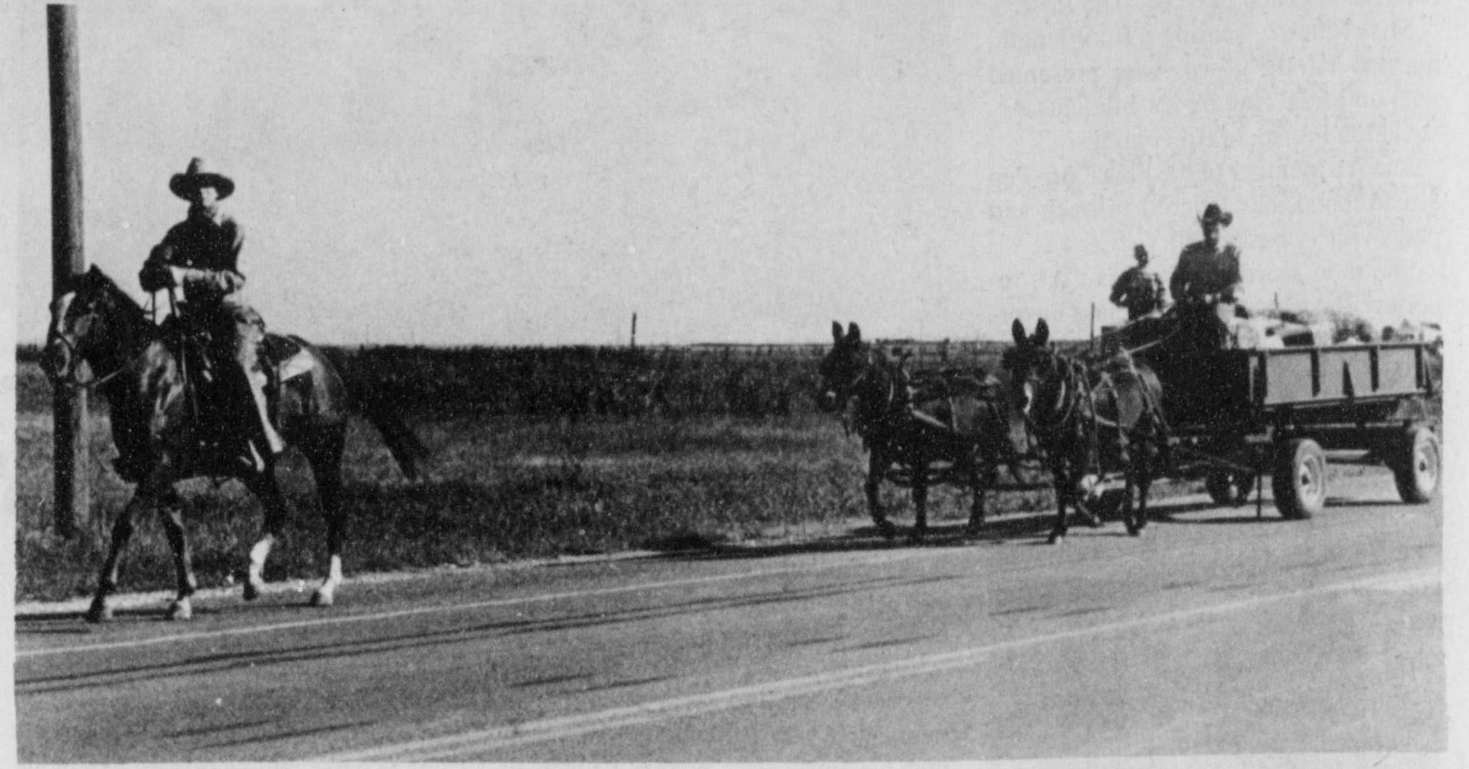
fans, with Big Ben looming overhead. Okay, so I walked because my legs were killing me, but I enjoyed the sight just the same.

The finish area was something of a mess, with thirty thousand runners all packed into one small area, trying to climb onto the busses to retrieve their bags at the same time. At least an area was provided for meeting family, with areas A through Z marked by large placards. Since I was wearing my trademark Kamikaze bandanna across my forehead, my wife had no trouble spotting me.

All in all, this was one of the most enjoyable races, and vacations, I have ever had. Travel to London is surprisingly reasonable, and a race like the ADT London Marathon is an experience you simple can't find in Dallas. Now if I could just figure out where to go next year...

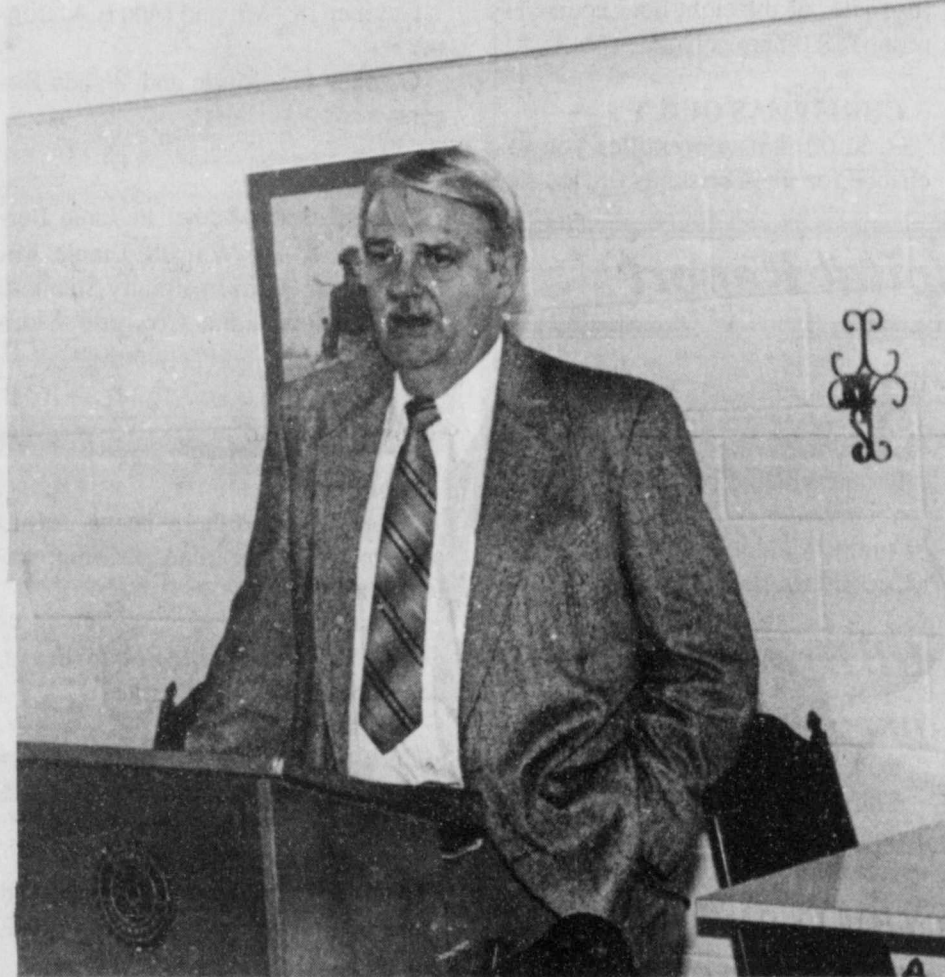

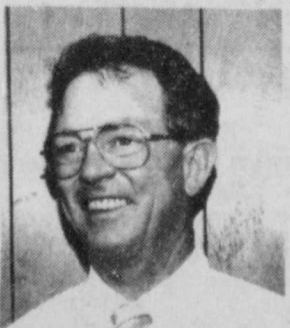

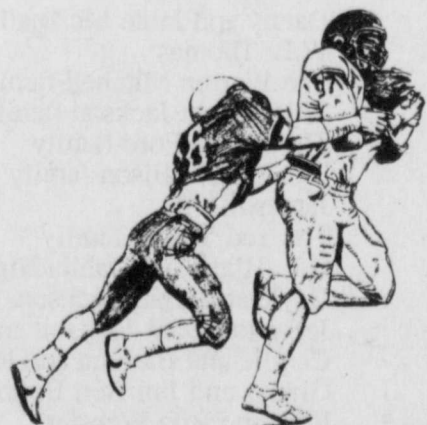
