

## Air Force balloon and equipment package lands in local farm field

Early Wednesday morning, Oct. 24, Richard Sanders reported seeing a parachute with a large box attached come down close to the Caprock, east of Cedar Hill.

Sanders stated that he did not see it when it hit the ground but was able to find it after driving towards the site.

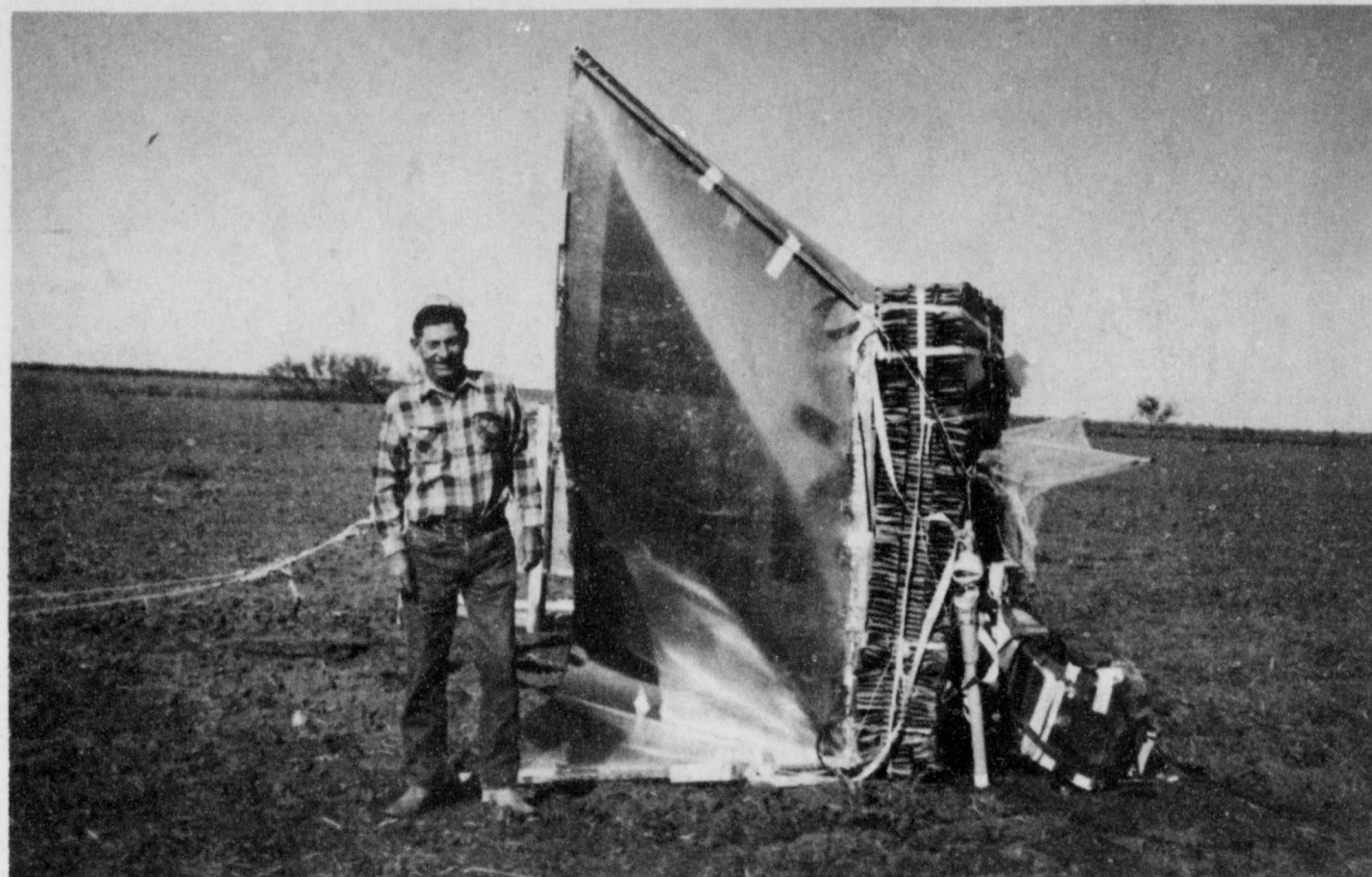
He said that the box was fastened to an orange and white parachute. The parachute was about 50 foot across. At the

crash site, vapor was escaping from the box. He added that a plane circled the site for several minutes before leaving the area.

At about the same time, Bill Staniforth of the South Plains Community was calling the National Weather Service in Lubbock to report what he thought was a weather balloon that had come down in one of his fields.

Larry Toombs, a member of the staff at the weather service, told Staniforth that the balloons was not one of theirs.

A call to the U.S. Air Force answered his question. The balloon, parachute and box was theirs and came from the base at Alamogordo, N.M. According to the Air Force representative, they were working on altitude and descent when the balloon was lost.

## Junior High named outstanding school for 1989-90 TEAMS test performance

Principal Terry Ellison and Superintendent W.H. Hallmark each received letters from the Texas Education Agency and the State Board of Education congratulating the students at Lockney Junior High for their performance on the 1989-90 Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) test.

Lockney Junior High was one of 754 schools that will be recognized throughout the state of Texas.

The selection criteria include the following categories:

**EXCEPTIONAL ACHIEVEMENT:** School with 90 percent or more of the students tested mastering all TEAMS tests taken; or

**EXCEPTIONAL GAIN:** Schools with at least 30 percent or more students mastering all tests taken than mastered in the previous year.

Lockney Junior High was selected in both categories.

Monte Hasie, chairman of the State Board of Education, stated "The outstanding performance by your students

on the 1989-90 TEAMS test is to be commended. Their performance is indicative of strong instructional leadership, quality teaching and support from parents and community.

W.N. Kirby, Commissioner of Education commented, "The Board is proud of the academic success enjoyed by your campus. Please extend our congratulations to your staff, students and parents for their continued commitment to educational excellence."

A certificate for each of the criteria was sent to the school. The first certificate reads "For Exceptional Achievement on All Sections of the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills" and the second certificate reads, "For exceptional Gains in Mastery on All Sections of the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills."

Some of this year's topics included health care for the uninsured, anxiety and panic disorders, allergies, chronic viral infections and a host of other pertinent presentations.  
Headquartered in Kansas City, MO,

the AAFP is the national association of family doctors representing more than 69,000 family physicians and medical students. It was the pioneer among medical organizations in requiring its members to take continuing medical education. AAFP members must complete 150 hours of mandatory continuing study every three years.

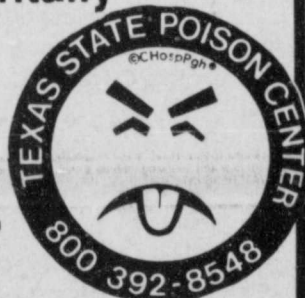
## Story teller captivates audience

**Cotton Unlimited wraps world with new product**

"We are going to wrap the world in West Texas cotton," Joe B. Pate Jr., warehouseman and cotton farmer, said Friday at the grand opening of the new Cotton Unlimited, Inc., manufacturing plant in Post.

Working with Paul Muncrief, a Post inventor, Pate and other investors have spent the past few months retrofitting a former textile mill to manufacture an insulation product made principally from cotton fibers. Research and devel-

opment of the product and organization of the start-up company have been in progress for more than four years.

The aims of the project are to capture a share of the United States' \$20 billion-a-year insulation market and to create a new market for Texas cotton.

The insulation product, manufactured on a combination of conventional textile equipment and a new type of bonding oven developed by Muncrief, will have similar insulation properties to fiber-

glass but will require far less energy to manufacture.

The Texas Tech University Textile Research Center assisted the project with product development research, and the Texas Department of Agriculture assisted with market research. The Post Economic Development Corporation provided business planning and other resources, while Smart Machines and Mid-South Textile Machinery Co. provided technical assistance on manufacturing processes.

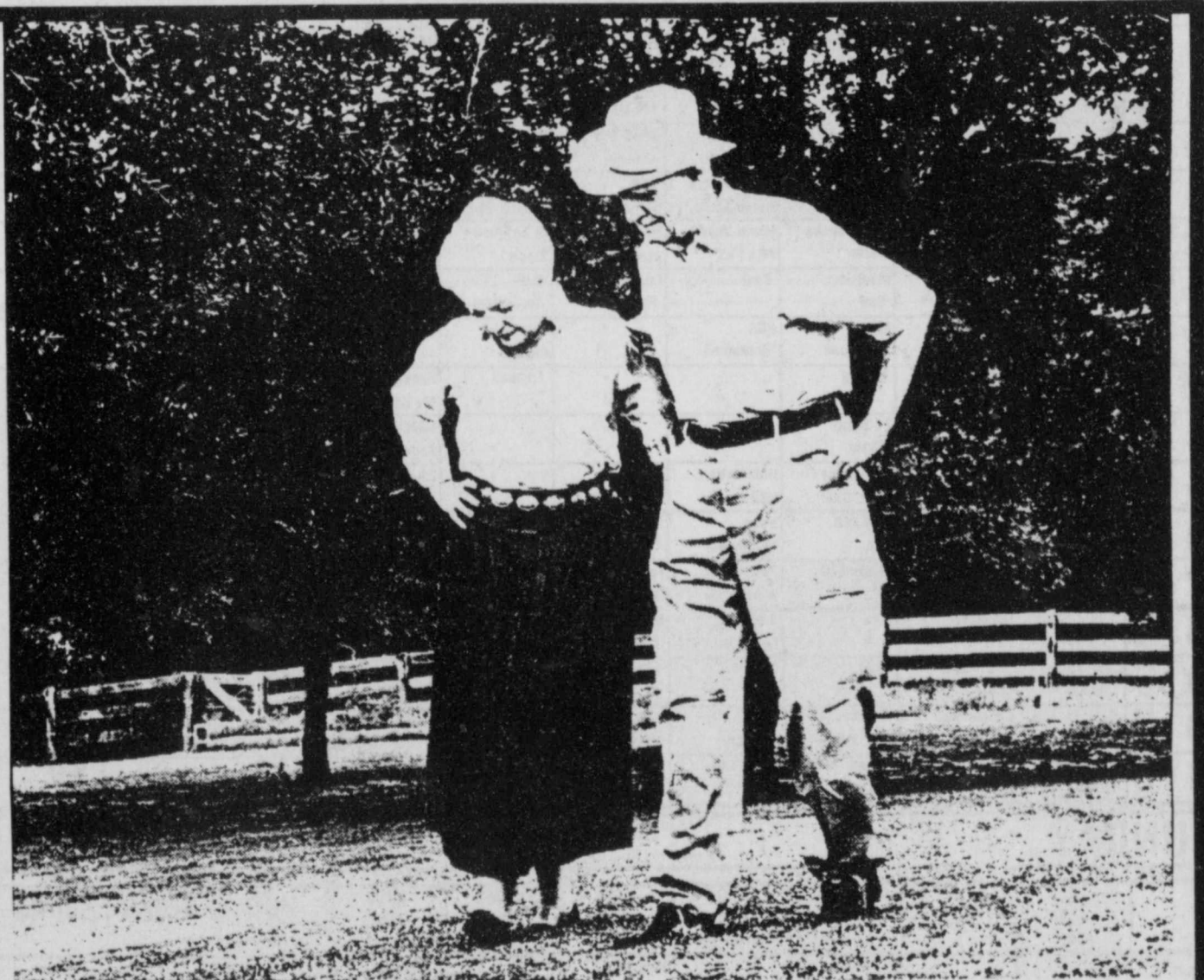

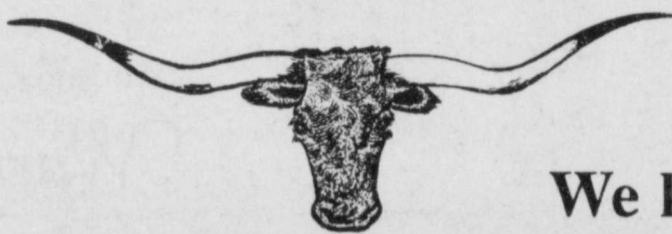
