

## Patridge earns top 4-H honors at banquet

Lance Patridge, son of Greg and Susan Patridge, took top honors at the 4-H Achievement Banquet Saturday night, when he was presented with the Gold Star Award.

The Gold Star Award, which is the most prestigious award from 4-H, is presented each year to the 4-H member in the county who has been involved in numerous projects in the county and held leadership positions in their clubs.

Patridge has been a 4-H member for seven years. He has been extremely active in all aspects of 4-H and is currently serving as an officer of his local 4-H club. He has been a junior and teen leader in his main project as well as with many other projects and activities.

Some of Patridge's main projects are Electric Energy, Citizenship, Safety, Photography, Foods and Nutrition, and Recreation. He has attended Electric Camp, Texas 4-H Round-up, Texas 4-H Congress, and hosted the Missouri interstate exchange group.

Patridge was also recognized for his achievement as the National Recordbook winner. Only one of six 4-H'ers in the United States receives this honor, which includes an expense paid trip to Chicago and a \$1,000 scholarship.

Two outstanding leaders were recognized at the banquet, for the hard work and service to the 4-H program. This Silver Spur Award, which is sponsored by Lighthouse Electric, was awarded for the first time to Vikki Yeary and James Cage.

"Yeary has led projects, gone on trips, hauled 4-H'er's, hosted 4-H'er's and worked all night at the Floydada 4-H's Spook House," said Larry Ogden, who presented the award for Lighthouse.

"Cage, is always there in the background doing a lot of the work, but seldomly taking any of the credit. He has helped with the shooting sports project and the stock show, and hosted a youth from Missouri."

The Lockney City Council and Herbert Dudley were recipients of the Friend of the 4-H Award.

These individuals and the organizations they represent are recognized for the time and resources they devote to the 4-H program and for their unselfish service to 4-H.

Lockney City Council was commended because of their concern about the Lockney 4-H club, which caused them to write personal checks for the rent on the Lockney Community Center to pay the rent so that the club could have a place to meet. The council members, of last year, included: Dee Copeland, Ronnie Aston, Dan Smith, Kenneth Wofford, Gary Marr, Sam Fortenberry, and Attorney Paul Lyle.

Herbert Dudley was recognized for his countless hours "ensuring that the youth in our county are successful in their swine projects. He has assisted youth, donated animals and shared his expertise with many."

Amy Turner and Brad Emert were recipients of the "I Dare You Award." This award is sponsored by William H. Danforth, and is one of the most prestigious awards presented to an individual in any youth organization in the United States.

This award is presented annually to two Floyd County 4-H'er's who exhibit excellence in character, well-balance personal development and leadership potential.

The Rookie of The Year Award went to Mandi Yeary and T.J. Allen.

This award goes to two first year 4-H members who were very active in 4-H. Yeary and Allen both turned in recordbooks, entered animals in the stock show, worked on floats for the Fair and Old Settlers parades, plus a number of other projects and activities.

Outstanding Recordbook Awards went to: Mandi Yeary, for her Outstanding 1st Year Recordbook; Wesley Hunter, for his Outstanding Junior 1 Recordbook; Mark Terrell, for his Outstanding Junior 2 Recordbook; and Lance Patridge for his Outstanding Senior Recordbook.

Four-H Sweetheart Awards were presented to Kristy Hinsley, of the Floydada Club, and Lila Booker from the Lockney Club. These girls are selected by the clubs to represent them at the Floyd County Junior Livestock Show in the queens contest. These sweethearts, along with FFA Sweethearts, sell memberships to the stock show association as the primary fund raising activity of the association. Kristy went on to sell the most memberships and won the title of Floyd County Junior Livestock Show Sweetheart.

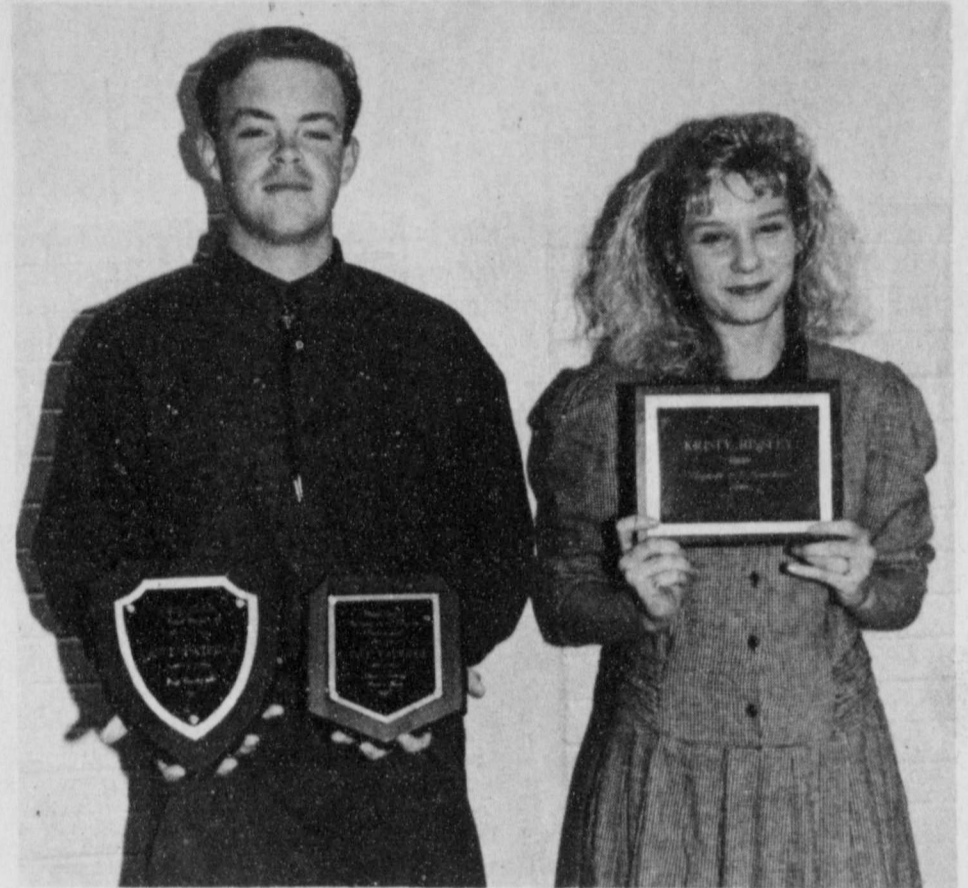

## Servicemen remembered on Veterans Day

Editors Note: Veterans Day observance is set for Sunday, November 11. In view of the involvement of American servicemen in the middle east, The Beacon is honoring two local men stationed in Saudi Arabia. One was recently home on leave and gave a first-hand account of his experiences.

### 'I'D DO IT AGAIN'

Chris Rodriguez, Airman 1st Class, won't be spending his Veteran's Day in Saudi Arabia, but you can be sure that the desert and the comrades he left behind, will be weighing heavily on his mind.

Rodriguez returned home, to Lockney, October 12, after two months in Saudi Arabia. He is on a 30 day leave before being relocated to a base in Hahn, Germany, where he will be stationed for three years.

Rodriguez, 22, a graduate of Lockney High School, was born and raised in Lockney. He is the son of Toribio and Amelia Rodriguez, who own the Las Camadres cafe in Lockney. He and his wife, Virginia, have been married for 2 1/2 years and have two children; Brandon, 7, and Brian Adam, 5.

Chris joined the Air Force, in November, 1988. He was sent to Saudi Arabia, in Operation Desert Shield, August 15, where he worked as an air craft techni-

cian.

The West Texas compared the desert heat to that of South Texas. "It reminded me of Galveston, but twice as humid," said Rodriguez. The temperatures got up to 115 to 120 degrees during the day. It was about 15 degrees hotter where I worked, because of the engine exhaust. In October the temperature had dropped down to the 90's.

"We were told to drink a quart of water an hour. We had to drink bottled water from somewhere else, because of the diarrhea epidemic the Saudi water caused.

When asked if he met any other Texans where he was, Chris smiled and said, "No, but when I was leaving I saw a tent with a small Texas flag draped on the outside. I didn't get a chance to find out who it was, but if I go back, I'm going to try."

"I missed my family and food the most," said Rodriguez, about his desert stay. "We were lucky in that we got to eat two hot meals a day, breakfast and dinner because we had a kitchen where we were. A lot of people were eating a lot of ready-to-eat dehydrated foods."

"Everyone over there loves to get care packages from home. They go crazy for it and always share with everyone else. Everyone knows how important it is to get something from home."

Chris is not sure what the future holds for him. He will be leaving soon to try and find housing in Germany for his family. Because of the waiting list of base housing, Chris will have to look elsewhere for his wife and children.

After relocating to Germany, Rodriguez does not know if he will be sent back to Saudi Arabia. "I don't want to go back," said Chris, but it's my job."

Asked if he would enlist again, knowing what he knows now, Chris said, "I'd do it again if I have to, to defend my country."

### ABEL BALLEJO ASSIGNED TO DESERT SHIELD DUTY

Cpl. Abel Ballejo, 29, is serving his country as a part of Operation Desert Shield in the middle east at this time. He is a member of the U. S. Army Infantry.

Ballejo, son of Dora Esparza of Lockney, was born in Lubbock, raised in Petersburg, and attended school in both Petersburg and Lockney. He enlisted in the Army in 1987.

Ballejo has two children from a previous marriage, Deborah, age 11, and Timothy, age 9.

According to Mrs. Evans, "There will

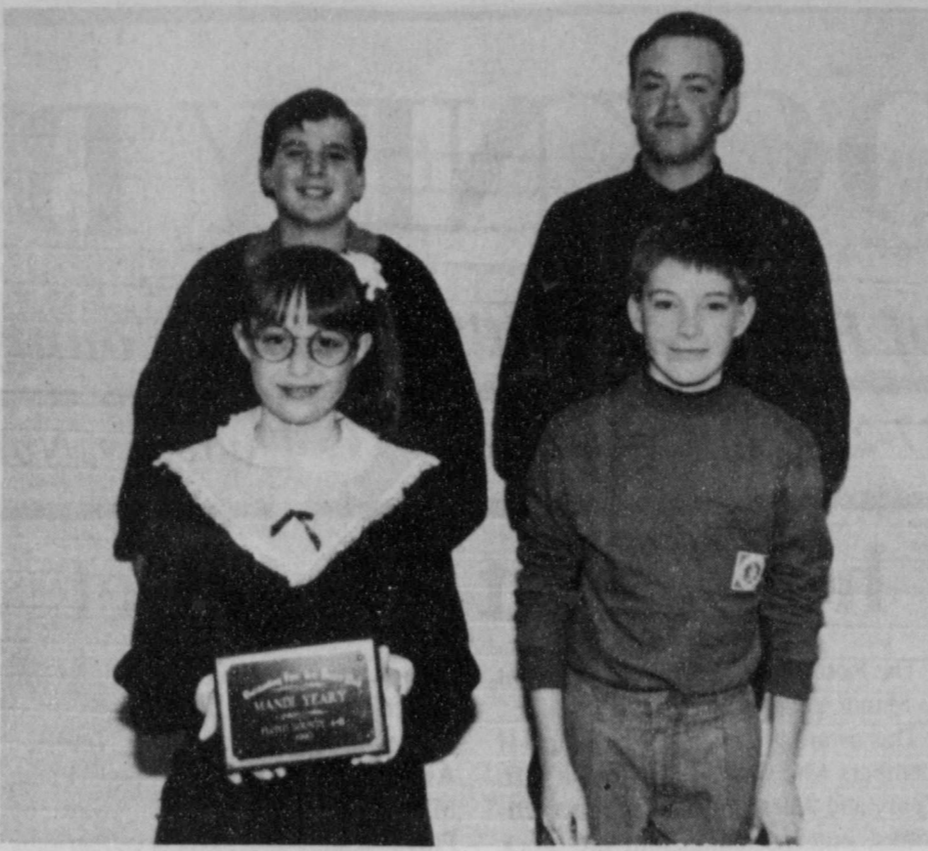

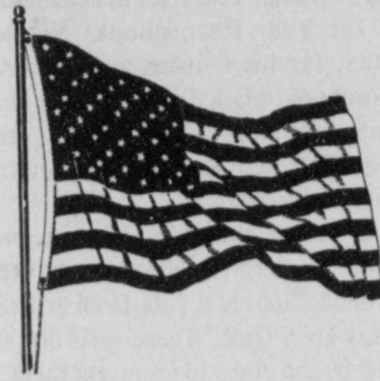

other health professionals should be immunized against influenza to avoid spreading the disease to their patients, according to recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control.

"TDH and the American Lung Association already have reminded health professionals and others in close contact with high-risk people to be immunized, both for their own protection as well as for others," Crider said.

"As early as July we advised physicians to offer vaccine to their patients during routine clinic visits, beginning in September and throughout the influenza season—typically December through April," he said.

Crider explained that all unimmunized residents of chronic-care facilities, such as nursing homes, should be immunized immediately. In addition, high-risk persons who are hospitalized any time from now through March and members of their households are encouraged to be vaccinated, he said.

He added that influenza vaccination is necessary yearly, because immunity declines with time. Also, since flu strains and vaccines against them differ from year to year, only the vaccine for the current season should be used.

The vaccine for the 1990-91 season is designed to combat the A/Taiwan, A/Shanghai and B/Yamagata strains.

## "High Risk" persons need flu vaccine

With flu season near, officials at the Texas Department of Health (TDH) have urged anyone who may be at high risk of infection to seek immunization. People most at risk of the potentially deadly disease, are those 65 or older, persons with chronic respiration, or heart problems and children weakened by disease.

"Influenza, which occurs most often from December through April, kills about 20,000 individuals in the United States each year—most of them in high risk categories," said Robert D. Crider Jr., director of TDH's Immunization Division. Crider said that persons 65 or older constitute one of the risk groups hardest-hit by influenza and its complications.

"Fewer than 30 percent of Americans in high-risk groups received the recommended annual injection of influenza vaccine," he added. "We believe that one reason older people fail to be vaccinated is their unfounded fear that the vaccine can actually cause influenza. The truth is that a vaccinated person may still contract some strain of flu, but not from the vaccine. If that happens, though, the vaccine usually helps lessen the severity of the case."

High-risk categories include the following people who are most likely to develop complications from influenza:

- \* Persons 65 years old and older.
  - \* Residents and employees of nursing homes and other facilities treating chronically ill patients of any age.
  - \* Adults and children with chronic heart or lung disorders, including children with asthma.
  - \* People under medical care for chronic metabolic diseases, kidney or blood problems or weakened immune systems.
  - \* Children, 18 and younger, who are receiving long-term aspirin therapy, which can place them at risk of developing Reye syndrome after influenza.
- "We strongly recommend influenza vaccinations for all people in these high-risk groups, especially if they are pregnant women or international travelers," Crider advised. "People infected with the human immunodeficiency virus (the virus which causes AIDS) also may be at increased risk for flue complications."

# Terrell tours New Zealand schools

This past summer, Linda Terrell, Lockney Junior High School teacher, participated in a three week study tour of New Zealand schools. Sponsored by the Graduate Program in Reading and Center for the Study of Childhood Education at the City University of New York in association with Texas Tech University, this unique educational experience included twenty-four teachers from Texas and New York.

The tour included visits to a number of schools and the opportunities for in-depth study of classrooms and dialogue with New Zealand educators. Observation included city and rural schools. Linda's internship was at Bayfield School in Auckland, NZ.

New Zealand students have among the highest literacy attainment rate in the world, due in part to Marie Clay's Reading Recovery Program and the extensive writing children do as they learn to read.

New Zealand schools are structured on language-based learning, an educational theory based on the principles: that reading, talking, writing are inter-related; that the foundation of learning and literacy are laid in the early years; that reading for meaning is most important; that books for children should use natural idiomatic language; and that a combination of techniques is needed to learn to read and write.

"Analyzing New Zealand's high level of literacy attainment is the most exciting aspect of my professional career. I had read about their whole language approach to learning, and I had read about their reading recovery program. However, I was not prepared for the moment I stepped inside the New Zealand classroom. I was awe-struck! I was overwhelmed! Art work, considered an expression of literature, was everywhere—even hanging from the ceiling. Student publications, research reports, charts, experiments, and books were everywhere! There was an electric enthusiasm for learning. Students are not only taught to read, but they are taught to love to read."

"In New Zealand there is no fear of failure for the teacher or student because there are no standardized tests. In fact, no grades are given. Portfolios demonstrate individual progress. Measuring a child against himself promotes independence and responsibility to himself and to others."

"Classrooms are student-centered. For example, the teacher designates the theme of study. The students carry it to where it will go."

"Reading Recovery is designed to help those six year-olds who are not reaching their potential. It's quick burst

of one-on-one instruction. I got to see two Reading Recovery sessions. It was incredible."

"Students are involved in many group activities. Learning is developed through cooperation rather than competition. Also, students are placed in vertical grouping classrooms. For example, 11-12-13 year olds are in one room. It's magic!"

"Reading instruction focuses on sharing rich literature. Vocabulary and spelling are learned in context. An awareness of current events is evident in classrooms at all levels. Emphasis is placed on learning that relates to real life and the real world."

"Most resources for learning are made. Teachers do not spend a lot of money to stimulate children. Sometimes their best resource is a guest—sometimes it's the child himself."

"Students call teachers by their first names. There is much parental involvement. EVERYONE has a morning tea break at 10:00."

"Everything is so positive. At the end of each day at Bayfield School, students gathered, and volunteers shared what had been good about their day."

"How has it affected me as a teacher? I'm still teaching the basic skills of punctuation, capitalization, spelling, etc. I'm still teaching the 8th grade level essential elements—but I'm just approaching it in a different way. In the first three weeks of school, I used two new ideas in my classroom. I know I have the responsibility to allow students to generate ideas and to use thinking skills. I know that I must make them responsible for discovery and for learning."

"We've written New Zealand pen pals in christchurch, New Zealand, and have just received letters from them. Students brainstormed Beginnings, my

classroom theme. They selected to re-search cartoon beginnings. We're just finishing that. We're using Thesaurus this week to reword Black Attack Is Back slogans on varsity football players' shirts. Then we'll display our renditions to the players before the Abernathy football game. This is learning to use Thesaurus, but at the same time, it relates the skill to something real. I believe this is more meaningful than doing a Thesaurus worksheet."

"We just finished constructing glasses with rose-colored lenses. We observed the outside world and wrote about it. Writings had to use a simile, metaphor, or personification. During this writing, students discovered six new words to add to their vocabulary."

"We're writing business letters to real companies that give away free materials. Also, Davis Lumber has supplied us with advertising brochures to use in writing."

"The last fifteen minutes of Monday-Wednesday-Friday, we have Sustained Silent Reading. Research has proven that silent reading increases vocabulary usage. The first day I let them lie on the carpet remnant in my room or sit on the floor to read silently, it was like a silver silence."

"We have a seven foot dead tree in the room this year. That's not a New Zealand idea, but one I came up with to promote reading. Each student gets to add a leaf to the tree for each book he reads. After 9 weeks of reading, we have

124 leaves on the tree! With only 53 eighth graders, that's incredible. I love to see them chuckle as they read or to hear them tell someone about their book. They brainstormed and voted on the name of our tree. Festus McGraw won; the runner-up name choice was Buger! I could have even "lived" with the name Buger-if it meant fostering a

love for books and creating a thirst for life-long reading.

"My eighth graders are true adventurers. They always amaze me. I love to see that look of accomplishment as they feel good about their writing and about themselves. I will admit that as I relate learning to the real world, I'm not always the expert. Sometimes a thirteen year old can know more about a subject than I. I believe that through cooperative learning, short-term memory is transferred to long-term knowledge."

"The New Zealand study tour gave me what I've always been looking for in education. Plus, my students this year have wonderful enthusiasm for learning. As a teacher, I'll never be the same."



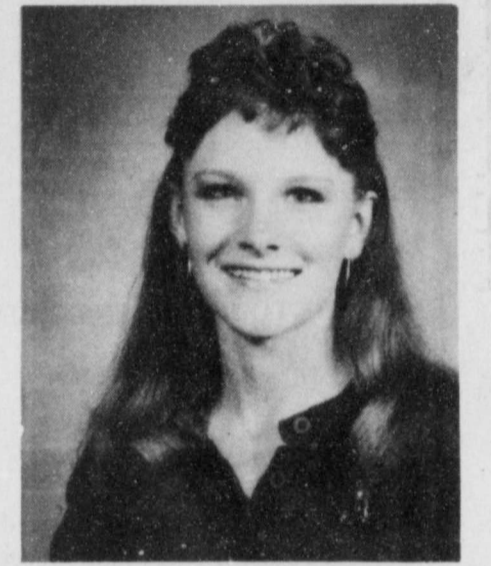

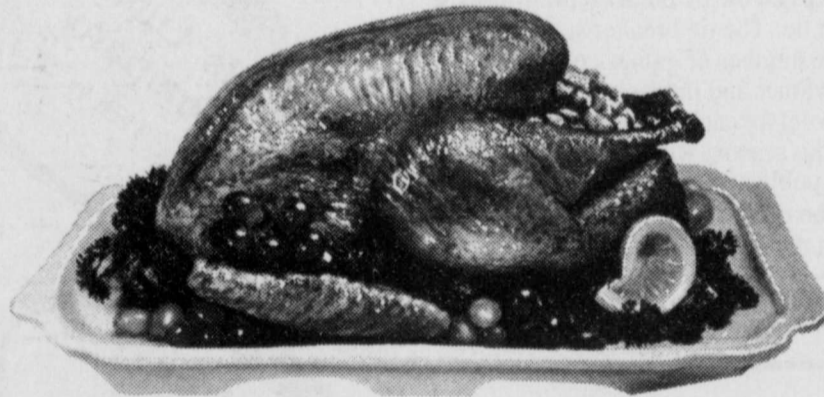
## Happenings at LHS

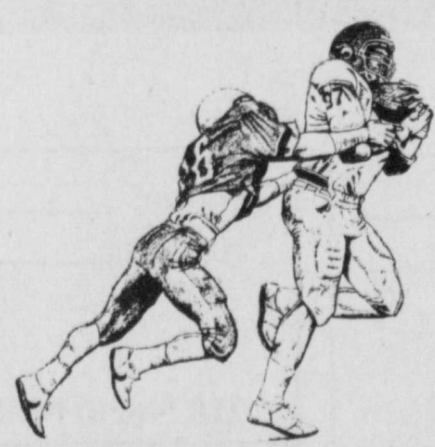
