Pact to bring digital switching to Lockney telephone system

Lockney will receive the latest in telephone digital switching as part of an agreement approved by the Texas Public Utility Commission and Southwestern Bell Telephone.

Southwestern Bell Telephone will install the switch as part of an accelerated program which will help boost the Texas economy and provide customer benefits worth more than \$1.2 billion over the next four years.

A timetable for installing Lockney's, as well as 195 other switches statewide over the next four years is not yet available, according to Jim West, external affairs manager of Southwestern Bell.

"Telephone customers all across the state were the big winners today," said West. "With this bold, decisive action, the PUC has not only approved more than \$1.2 billion in customer benefits, it has moved to put Texas at the forefront of telecommunications in the U.S."

"The negotiated settlement was a product of months of intense discussion among the PUC staff, Southwestern Bell and 23 separate intervening groups," said West. "This is an example of a broad base of diverse interests joining with the PUC and Southwestern Bell Telephone with a common goal to improve the telecommunication infrastructure of Texas."

The settlement includes the largest rate reductions and most ambitious modernization of the telecommunications network in Texas history.

Consumers will see the customer credits and rate reductions starting shortly, according to West. "And we

will begin work immediately on the network modernization program."

Other highlights of the agreement include:

- * A four-year cap on basic local telephone service rates.

- * A one-time refund of approximately \$8.75 for residence and \$10 per access line for business customers.

- * Reductions in Southwestern Bell's long distance, WATS and 800 Service rates.

- * Reduced access charges to long distance companies in Texas. These savings will flow through to customers.

- * A four-year, accelerated program to ring digital technology to 196 communities now served by older, less versatile equipment.

- * Eliminate party-line service and mileage charges for more than 300,000 rural customers residing outside "local calling areas." The upgraded service will not increase customers' monthly bills.

- * Expanded optional toll-free calling to 32 cities around Austin, Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio.

- * Touch-tone rate reductions of 60 percent for residences and 33 percent for business customers at the end of four years.

- * Residential service connection charge reductions from \$60 to \$38.35.

- * A Lifeline program for eligible low-income customers.

"The telecommunications industry has changed dramatically since the Bell System was broken up, and our system of regulation has to keep pace with those

changes," said West. "This settlement is worth roughly \$1.2 billion in direct customer benefits over a four-year period."

"The agreement provides an incentive to build a telecommunication network that should attract new businesses and jobs to Texas without increasing telecommunications costs to the Texas ratepayers," said West.

West said Southwestern Bell will be allowed to earn 12.06 percent return on investment (ROI). Half of all earnings from 12.06 percent to 14.5 percent ROI will be returned to customers. Earnings above 14.5 percent ROI will be returned to customers in full.

According to West, a number of states, including California, have adopted similar progressive regulatory approaches to telecommunications. "Now Texas can join other states in trying to attract the burgeoning number of companies which use advanced information networks."

"What's really exciting is the chance to bring the most advanced communication technology to parts of Texas where, without an incentive, the present rate of growth would not justify this kind of investment for years to come," West said.

According to Coach Jim Clark, "Lockney finished the year 5-5 in regu-

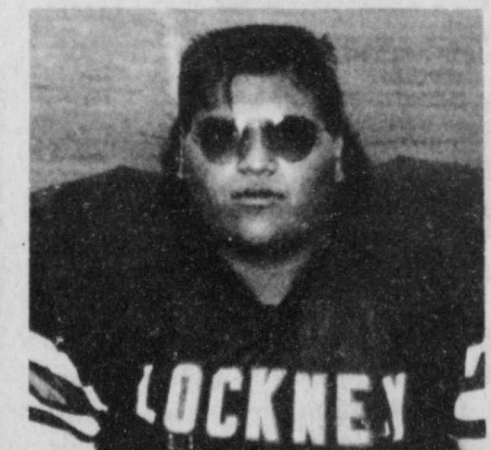
lar play and 4-3 in district."

He continued, "We are proud of the 'never give up' our players had this year. We will miss the 13 seniors that played on this years team. Their hard work and determination made a big difference."

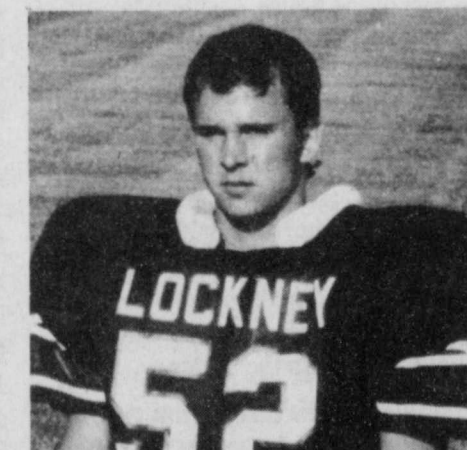

101st Airborne soldiers set 46th annual 'Gathering of the Eagles'

Airborne soldiers of the 101st Airborne Division who helped to shape history on Operation Desert Shield in Saudi Arabia, at Normandy, Bastogne and in Holland during World War II, and in Viet Nam, will have their 46th Annual "Gathering of the Eagles" of the 101st Airborne Division Association in Sparks, Nevada.

Hosts for the reunion are the Northern California and the Southern California Chapters of the Association. Reunion Chairman is Clark Heggeness of Long Beach, California, who served in the 506th Parachute Infantry Regiment of the "Screaming Eagle" Division in World War II.

The 46th Annual Reunion will be in Sparks (near Reno), Nevada, August 15, 16, and 17, 1991. John Ascuaga's Nugget will serve as the headquarters hotel. Attendance is expected to be 1,200 to 1,500.

National headquarters for the 101st Airborne Division Association is 101 East Morris Street, Sweetwater, Tennessee 37874, phone (615) 337-4103. All records of the association and its members are kept at this location.

The 101st Airborne Division Association has more than 5,200 active members from all 50 states and six foreign countries. Many of the members served in the Division in World War II and dropped behind the German held beaches of France make an airborne assault on southern Holland, held fast at Bastogne to stop the last German offensive in The Battle of the Bulge, continued the offensive into Germany and captured Hitler's Eagles Nest in Berchtesgaden, Austria.

A large part of the membership are veterans of the war in Viet Nam. Men who fought with the "Screaming Eagles" at Hamburger Hill, Dak To, in

the Tet Offensive, and other important engagements with the North Vietnamese Army. They never lost a battle.

The Association also has a number of active duty members who are assigned to the 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault) over 17,000 strong, in Saudi Arabia as part of the multinational task force that makes up Operation Desert Shield.

Every individual who served in the 101st Airborne Division and wore the "Screaming Eagle" airborne shoulder patch can be a regular member of the Association. Those who did not serve in the division but have a special interest in the 101st are associate members.

Tips for increasing fireplace efficiency

As winter approaches, many Texans will begin using their fireplaces again. The snap and crackle of a warm fire is comforting on cold, winter nights, but a fire is not a very efficient heat source. For those of you planning to use a fireplace, try the following tips from the Texas Energy Service to have the warmest, most efficient fire possible.

*** Reduce heated air loss.** Lower the thermostat setting on your central heating system to 50 or 55 degrees F when the fireplace is in use. By doing this, the furnace will not use a much fuel while the fireplace is in use.

*** Provide a fresh air source.** Close all doors and warm-air supply ducts into the room where the fireplace is located, but open a window near the fireplace about 1/2 to 1 inch high. This will allow combustion air to be drawn from the partially open window instead of from

the rest of the house.

*** Adjust the damper as the fire burns.** Dampers help control the combustion process in wood by limiting the amount of air to the fire. To facilitate the burning process, the damper should be fully open at the start of the fire, and about half open after the fire is burning well. When a fire is not burning, the damper should be closed so heated air will not be lost up the chimney.

*** Build the fire directly on the firebox floor.** Building the fire directly on the firebox floor prevents excess air from burning the fire too quickly. Grates allow continued air circulation under-

neath the fire, which cools the fire temperature and makes the fire burn quickly. Other devices, such as air circulating grates, usually do not increase efficiency because they also decrease combustion temperatures.

Although fireplaces are not efficient heating sources, their aesthetic appeal keeps their popularity high. For more information on efficient use of fireplaces, call the Texas Energy Hotline at 1-800-643-SAVE. Ask for your free copy of the Texas Energy Extension Service factsheet "Fireplaces."

Lockney ISD has three administrators and a counselor, all of whom have masters degrees.

W.H. Hallmark, Superintendent - 14 years, ME degree, 31 years experience, 22 years in administration.

Joyce Evans, Principal, K-5 - four years, ME degree, 16 years experience, 11 years in administration.

Terry Ellison, Principal, 6-8 - five years, ME degree, 20 years experience, 13 years in administration.

James Poole, Principal, 9-12 - 13 years, ME degree, 24 years experience, 14 years in administration.

Charlotte Mitchell, Counselor, K-12, 2 1/2 years, MS degree, nine years experience, 2 1/2 years in administration.

Phil Cotham, Administrative Assistant, K-12 - one year, ME degree, eight years experience, one year in administration.

Lockney Public Schools consists of a high school, junior high, elementary, and vocational building. Several years ago, the Lockney School Board put in force a plan for continuous upgrading and renovation of our buildings.

Lockney High School

Lockney High School is a two-story building that was completed in 1929. This building can comfortably serve 350 students. For the school year 1989-90 there was an enrollment of 165 students. The decline in enrollment is attributed to the depressed agriculture economy. The high school building has had a complete face-lift over the last several years and is centrally heated and air conditioned. Classroom renovation for high school was accomplished during the 86-87 school year.

Lockney Junior High

Lockney Junior High was completed in 1957. This building is connected to the high school. This building consists of classrooms, a gym, and a band hall. The gym and band hall are used by both high school and junior high students. Like the high school, junior high has had a complete face-lift. Junior High was built to serve approximately 300 students, and for the school year 1989-90 enrollment averaged 184 students. Junior High also has central heat and air conditioning.

Lockney Elementary

Lockney Elementary, the newest of the facilities, was completed in 1964. This building was built to serve approximately 400 students. For 1989-90, the enrollment averaged 407 students. This building consists of classrooms, a cafeteria, gym and music room. Central heat and cooling is also in the elementary building.

Transportation System

The Lockney Public School transportation system consists of seven (7) bus routes. All buses are kept in top condition. Our bus drivers are extremely safety conscious, and this is indicated by our safety record. It has been ten years since we have had any type of bus accident.

School Improvements

Improvements to the school during the 1989-90 school year included: 200 new chairs in the elementary school, 75 new desks in both the high school and the junior high school, 2 computer rooms in the high school were remodeled, and air conditioning and heater units were replaced in the elementary school.

Paperwork Reduction

With all of the new requirements of HB 72 came an increase in the amount of paperwork required of the school and faculty. The administration conducted inservice with the teachers to explain ways to make lesson plans and document mastery of essential elements with the least amount of paperwork. With the help of the aides, the office staff and the building principals monitoring and constant reminder of what was necessary, paperwork was held to a minimum. Continued effort will be made to minimize the paperwork burden.

Finance

Lockney ISD can take pride in its financial condition. The school board had always been conscious of its responsibility to the student body as well as to the taxpayer. With the help of the new finance bill passed by the legislature, the financial condition has improved even more than anticipated.

State aid will increase or decrease based on enrollment. A two-year example indicates the amount of state aid received, number of students and the amount of state aid received per student.

In 1988-89 the average daily attendance was 713, the budget expense was 2,698,664, which was 3,784.94 per student.

For 1989-90 the average daily attendance was 742, the budget expense was 2,899,643, and 3,894.39 per student.

The district has been fortunate to maintain a fund-balance—the board has seen the need to provide a safe balance for emergency situations. A two-month operating fund balance has been the rule of thumb to try to maintain. Because of increased state funding, our fund balance has grown. The extra funds are being used to upgrade staff development and programs offered. Listed below are the fund balances for the last two years.

1988-89 - \$1,022,428; 1989-90 - \$877,379

All services for taxes and collections are completed by the appraisal district. Lockney's share of the appraisal district's budget is \$21,681. The tax base for Lockney ISD is approximately \$78,178,604 with a tax rate of 75 cents. Total tax dollars generated amounts to \$568,749.

The wealth of the district will increase or decrease on agriculture production, businesses opening or closing, and new construction. District wealth per student population based on the tax base indicated above is \$105,362 per student. Based on this figure, our district wealth is below average, we qualify for extra state funds called Equalization opportunities similar to those provided by the most affluent districts.

Baby shower honors Owens

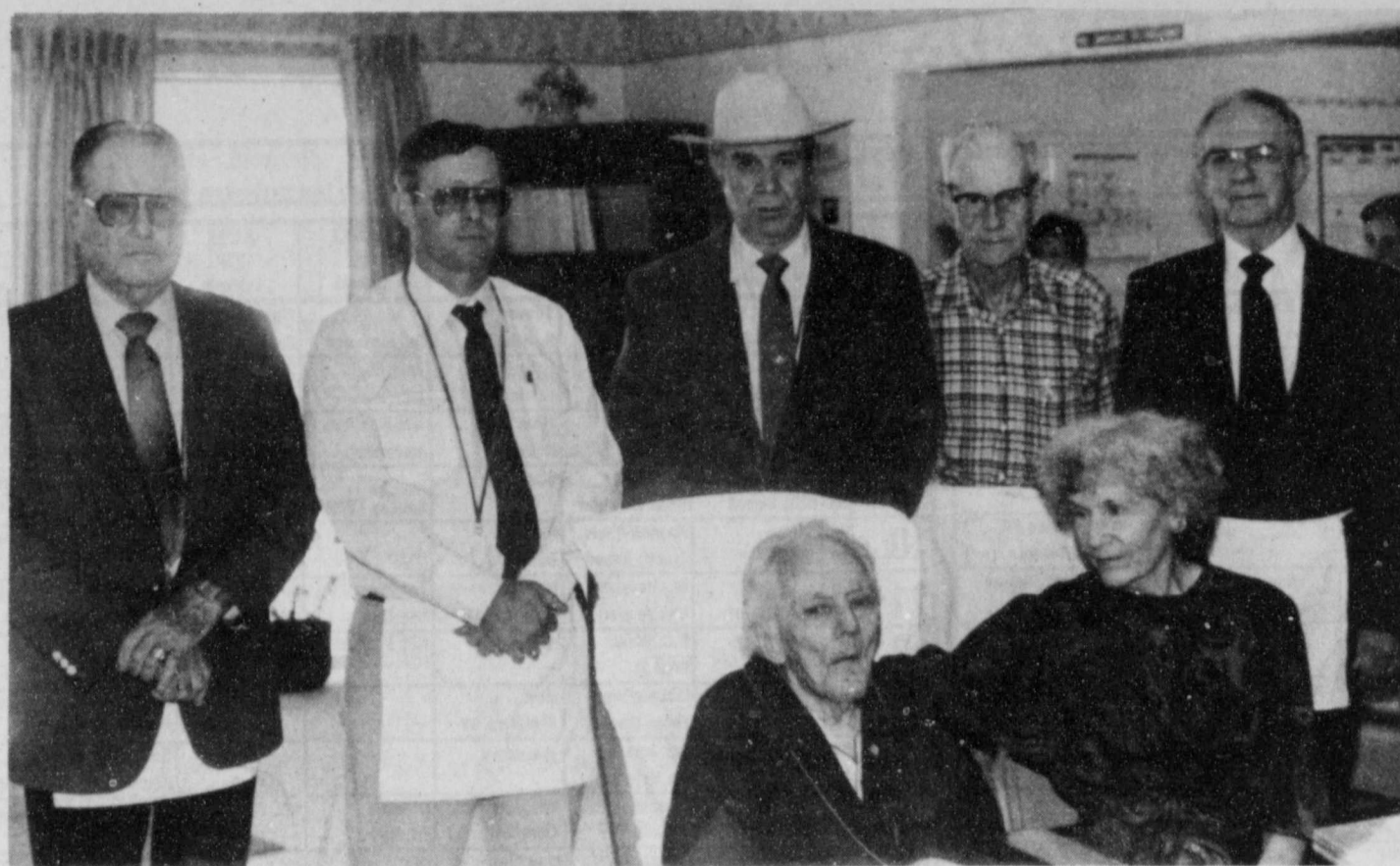

Want to add some Christmas cheer to your holiday cards this year? Why not get your Christmas card (s) specially postmarked from the North Pole,

Alaska? This year — like every year — the North Pole, Alaska post office is postmarking thousands of cards and holiday letters with their special town cancellation. Cards are already starting to arrive from around the world.

To get your North Pole postmark, insert your holiday envelope or envelope, addressed and stamped, inside another envelope or container. Include a note to have the mail inside be either machine or hand cancelled with the North Pole postmark. Then send it to the following address:

Mark Lamoureaux, United States Postal Service, North Pole Branch, 500 E. Fifth Ave, North Pole, AK 99705-9998.

Cards and letters must be received at the North Pole by December 10, for delivery before Christmas.

If you want a container of cards postmarked and returned to you, and not entered into the mailstream, include sufficient return postage and your return mailing label. Indicate this with a note and make sure each envelope inside is stamped and addressed. Because of the North Pole's high volume of Christmas mail and the distance involved, it's best to send your box of cards there by priority or express mail to ensure ultimate delivery before Christmas.

Postal Service offers holiday mailing tips

Sleigh Bells may not be ringing yet, but for the U.S. Postal Service, it's beginning to look a lot like the holidays.

The Postal Service has these two suggestions to get your holiday mail to its destination on time: **Mail Early and Address Completely.** Here are some helpful holiday mailing tips:

Americans can help send their holiday mail with more efficiency by using complete addressing. Make sure you have correctly spelled name, current address and zip code (even the nine-digit zip code if you have it). Print or type the address in the middle of the envelope. Black ink is preferable — to add contrast.

Pay particular attention to correct street and apartment numbers; directionals like East, West, North and South; address numbers and locations such as street, avenue, road, place, drive or circle. Use abbreviations for directionals, street locations and the state but don't punctuate. Use all capital letters. Put the zip code on the last line next to the city and state. Make sure your return address is in the upper left portion of the envelope.

Holiday parcels and packages can be mailed which weigh up to 70 pounds. Packages should not exceed 108 inches in length and girth (thickest part of the package) combined. In preparing your package, use strong box or container that has enough room for the object being mailed plus newspaper, styrofoam or other material to provide a protective "cushion". Seal the package securely using strong, pressure-sensitive packaging tape (not masking tape). (These items can be torn in mail processing equipment.)

When addressing packages, print the address in the lower right-hand corner of the package and your return address in the upper left-hand corner on one side only. Include this information on a piece of paper inside the package. Use indelible, black ink.

Most mail travels throughout the United States by air and surface transportation. The best prevention against possible delays caused by winter snow storms is mailing your package early in the holiday season, preferably by the end of the first week in December.

Kitchen safety especially important during holidays

With the holidays approaching and all family members pitching in to help with cooking and kitchen cleanup, home economists urge consumers to take extra care to avoid kitchen accidents. They remind parents that they should never let young children operate or play with appliances — nor leave youngsters unattended in the kitchen when the units are operating.

Most of us know that surface units or burners and ovens are hot; that steaming food can burn; and that water in dishwashers is very hot. But did you know that if you put too much weight on the open door of an oven that it can overbalance the range and cause it to tip forward?

In fact, any free-standing or slide-in

range that isn't attached to the floor or a wall stud, and a set-in or drop-in range that isn't properly attached to the surrounding cabinets can tilt forward if too much weight is applied to the open oven door. While the range typically swings back into place once the weight is removed, there is a potential for serious burns from hot food and utensils falling from the range top or bodily injuries from the tipped range.

At especially high risk are young children who may climb onto the edge of an open oven door, or older adults who use the door for support when bending, stooping or kneeling. And anyone, regardless of age, can stumble over an oven door that's left open.

Whirlpool home economists urge consumers to follow these safety rules:

* Never use an oven door as a step stool, a seat or a support for either body weight or a large, heavy object.

* Always keep the oven door closed, opening it only for normal use with cooking and cleaning.

* If you allow your children to assist you in the kitchen, educate them about the proper use of appliances. Stress the safety rules and supervise them as they help you.

* Check a new range (free-standing or slide-in model) to see if it's installed properly with an anti-tipping device that's securely fastened to the house structure (floor or wall stud), or is properly attached to adjacent cabinets (set-in or drop-in unit).

* For an older model range, check with the manufacturer, dealer or authorized service company for information on obtaining and installing an anti-tip device on it.

* Read the use and care materials that came with your range for detailed safety information that applies to our specific model.

Mail early urges Stapp

Lockney OIC Belinda Stapp reminds us to mail early this year to insure those holiday greetings arrive on time. The holiday mailing season is considered to run from the week of Thanksgiving until the end of the year. That period this year covers from Saturday, November 17 until Monday, December 31.

How much mail nationally was handled last year during the holiday season? During the 1989 holiday mailing season, the postal service processed and delivered more than 3.5 billion holiday cards, letters and packages. This was in addition to the normal everyday volume of 540 million pieces. Mail volume for this year's holiday season is projected to be around 4 billion cards, letters and packages.

On a national basis, mail increases on an average of 5 to 10 percent. The biggest jumps are first-class personal cards and letters, and fourth-class parcels which constitute around 15-25 percent.

Stapp cautions, most holiday mail is processed the week before Christmas. The biggest mailing day of the year is usually the Monday of the week before Christmas. Last year that day was December 18, when the postal service cancelled 200 million cards and letters, and delivered over 5 million parcels. Peak mailing day this year is expected to be Monday, December 17. According to Stapp, we are encouraging customers to mail early and avoid the possibility of

delay due to volume increase. For most overseas destinations it's best to mail before December to insure delivery before the holidays. In the U.S. there are no real deadlines, but the postal service is encouraging Americans to mail as early as possible, or preferably by the end of the first week in December.

What about mailing the last minute? Stapp reminds customers that they can mail parcels at a priority/first-class rate, with 2-3 day delivery service, to all U.S. locations. Express mail service, with overnight and next-day service, and delivery on Christmas Day, is also available to most destinations in the United States.

Please check with our local post office to assure timely delivery of your holiday mail, and be sure to mail early, Stapp said.

Juan Vargas contributed 8 points with four field goals.

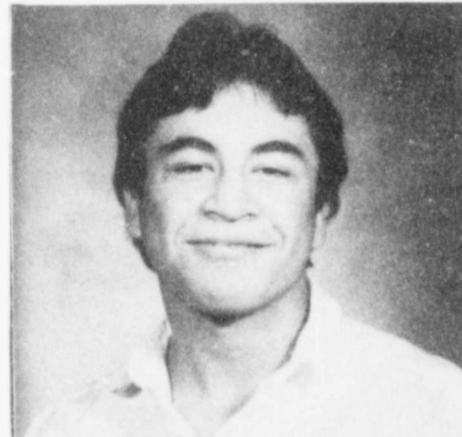

Almadena Basaldua made two points with a field goal and Erin Adrian shot 1 free throw for one point.

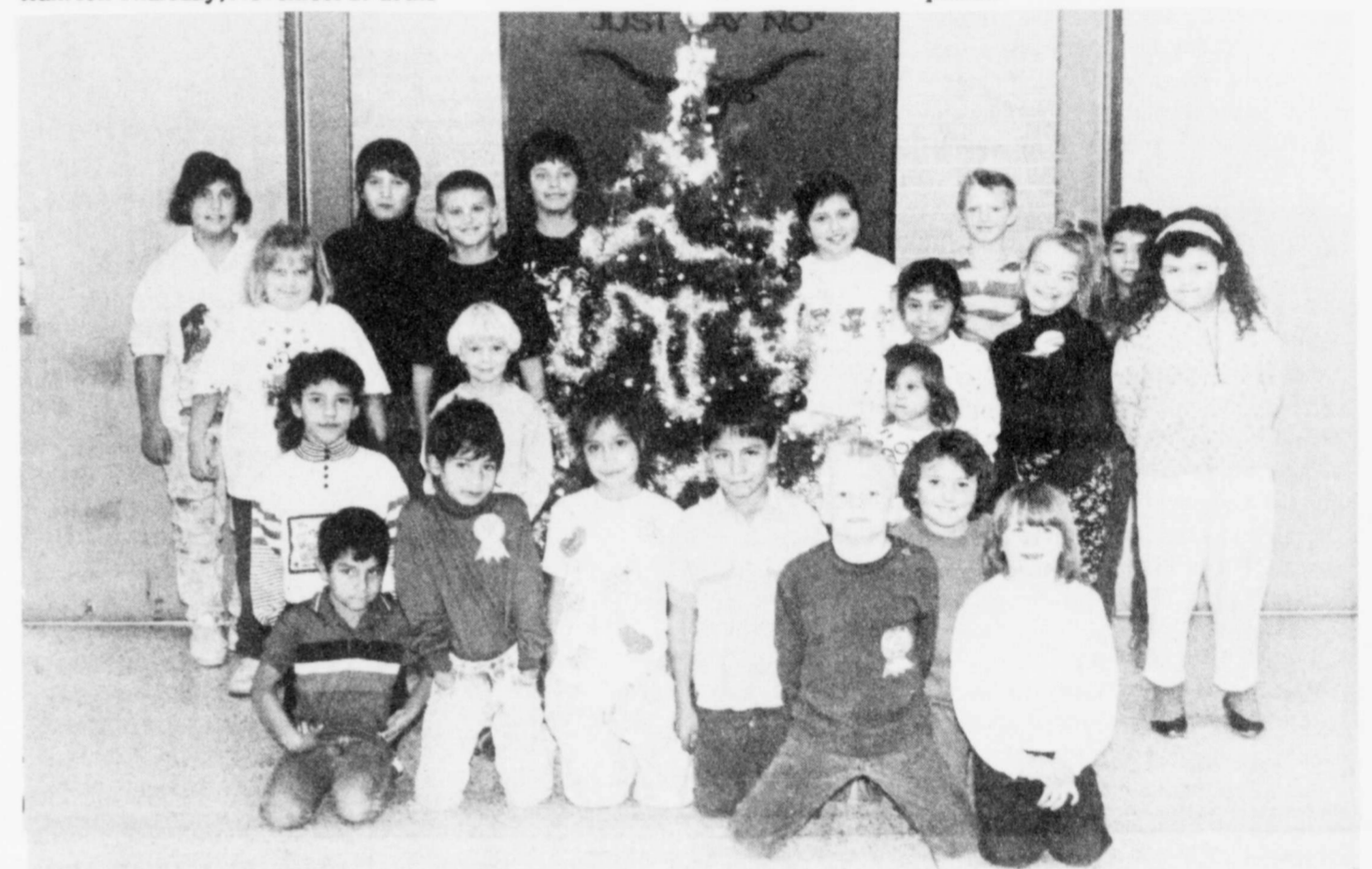
