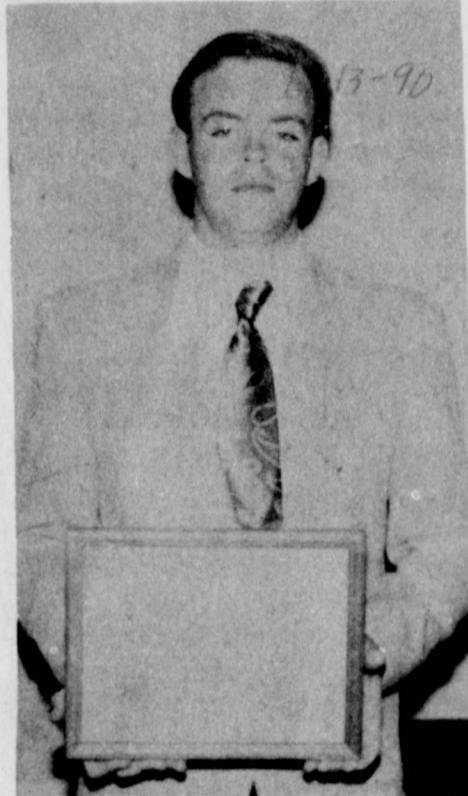


## Lance Patridge wins scholarship

We encourage young people to take ownership of their lives, to choose what they want to do and to develop themselves to their fullest potential. We are pleased to award one of our scholarships to Lance Patridge, an outstanding 4-H'er and a future leader."

Patridge was one of six 4-H'ers to receive national 4-H electric energy scholarships, courtesy of Westinghouse Electric Corporation. The winners were selected by the Cooperative Extension System and presented with their awards during the 69th National 4-H Congress in Chicago, December 1-5. Awards are arranged by National 4-H Council.

Patridge received the award for progressive personal and skill development over the period of his enrollment in the electric energy program. As part of his 4-H work, Patridge conducted seminars with nursing home employees and residents about the various types of light bulbs and their efficiency. He developed wiring skills by installing a ballast in fluorescent light fixtures and gave elec-

trical demonstrations to youth groups. This year he did research on heat pumps and gave a demonstration explaining the cost savings of heat pumps versus conventional heating and cooling. The seven-year 4-H member served as teen leader for 60 young people in the electric project.

"Working with my dad and grandpa has helped me to learn a lot about electrical safety," Patridge said. "It seems to me that as soon as I learned to walk, I was tagging along with them and discovering more about the wonderful world of electricity at every moment."

This summer Patridge led a workshop at county 4-H camp on lamp making.

"This experience taught me to be a little more sympathetic toward my dad when he complains about his job," he said. "I found it takes that certain something called patience to be able to handle such responsibility."

He organized an electrical lamp safety check for 58 individuals, developed an electrical energy project promotion for 130 county 4-H members and donated plug covers to 31 children at a local day care center.

## Hunter education course held recently in Lockney

Twenty-one students from Floyd County ranging in ages from 14 to 52, successfully completed a mandatory Texas Hunter Education Course, Dec. 6, under the instruction of Lockney Police Sgt. Jerry Edwards.

Edwards recently became certified as a Hunter Education Instructor, after completing a 24 hour instructor course. Edwards then volunteered his time to teach others about hunter safety.

Hunters whose date of birth is on or after September 2, 1971 must attend a Hunter Education Course to legally hunt in Texas, unless accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years or older.

If your date of birth is before September 2, 1971, you are not required to take the course. However you may choose to take the course to learn more about hunter safety. People also take the course if they plan to hunt in other states

that may require everyone to complete this course.

At this point the course is 12 hours in length and is mostly concerned with hunting safety and ethics. "Everyone who attended the school seemed to really enjoy the course," said Lockney Police Chief Lennie Gilroy.

"We had some very good volunteer instructor's who shared their expertise, including: Billy Joe Turner who taught the black powder section; Danny Smith who taught the bow hunting section; Ray Macha taught the modern guns, including pistol, rifle and shotgun and John Dea taught ethics.

"The game warden, Trent Anderson discussed hunting laws," said Gilroy.

The fee for the course is \$5.00, which pays for materials. If you would be interested in taking this course contact the Lockney Police Department, for more information.

## City council holds regular session

The Lockney City Council met for their regular monthly meeting, Thursday, December 6.

First on the agenda was the consideration of approval of a sales permit from a salesman representing Watches Eastern Company of N.Y., which sells "custom jewelry." The salesman wanted a permit to sell within the city for 2 or 3 months. The normal length of time for city permits is up to 5 days.

The councilmen decided to table the vote on the permit until they could ask

the salesman for references and have them checked out.

Mayor Dan Smith next asked the council if they would like to reconsider a previous vote concerning who would pay the water bill at Bigley Field, during the school's use throughout the new baseball season.

The councilmen had originally voted to let the school use the field but had decided that the school should pay for the water.

Mayor Smith stated that he had been

approached by Superintendent Dub Hallmark asking the council to reconsider because of all the work the school had put into fixing up the field.

"The school has done a tremendous amount of improvement that wouldn't have gotten done without them," said Dan. "The field is also used by the whole community."

The councilmen then voted unanimously to keep paying for water usage at Bigley Field.

A variance was granted to Mrs. Gibson concerning a garage addition she was putting on to her house. The eaves would be no closer than one foot to the property line. Since there was no objections from the neighbors the variance was approved.

The council also approved the Record Management Ordinance, that is required of all city governments. This ordinance pertains only to record keeping within the city office, setting up guidelines and committees.

Councilman Jim Doucette made the motion which was seconded by Councilman Copeland to reappoint Mike Mooney as the City Judge for another two years.

Mayor Smith then brought a proposal before the council which had been sent to the city by SPAG (South Plains Association of Governments). Mayor Smith stated, "Each region of each state has now got to have a solid waste management plan. SPAG has obtained an engineer from ADR Engineer Inc., to draw up a regional solid waste plan for the South Plains Region.

"To pay for this engineer," said Smith, "SPAG is asking for 17¢ per residence, which is \$370.77 in Lockney. The state provides 50% of the funding and SPAG is asking to local governments to help match those funds.

"They are going to do it anyway," said Smith. "SPAG told me, that if everyone did not chip in, they may have to come back and get more money."

After a lot of discussion the council voted to pay the \$370.77.

However they council was advised by their attorney Paul Lyles to join the SPAG board and have a say so in the solid waste management plan. "After everything ya'll been through," said Lyles, "I advise you to appoint someone to get on that board so the interests of Lockney and this county is not overlooked. This could be where the big decisions are going to be made, you never know."

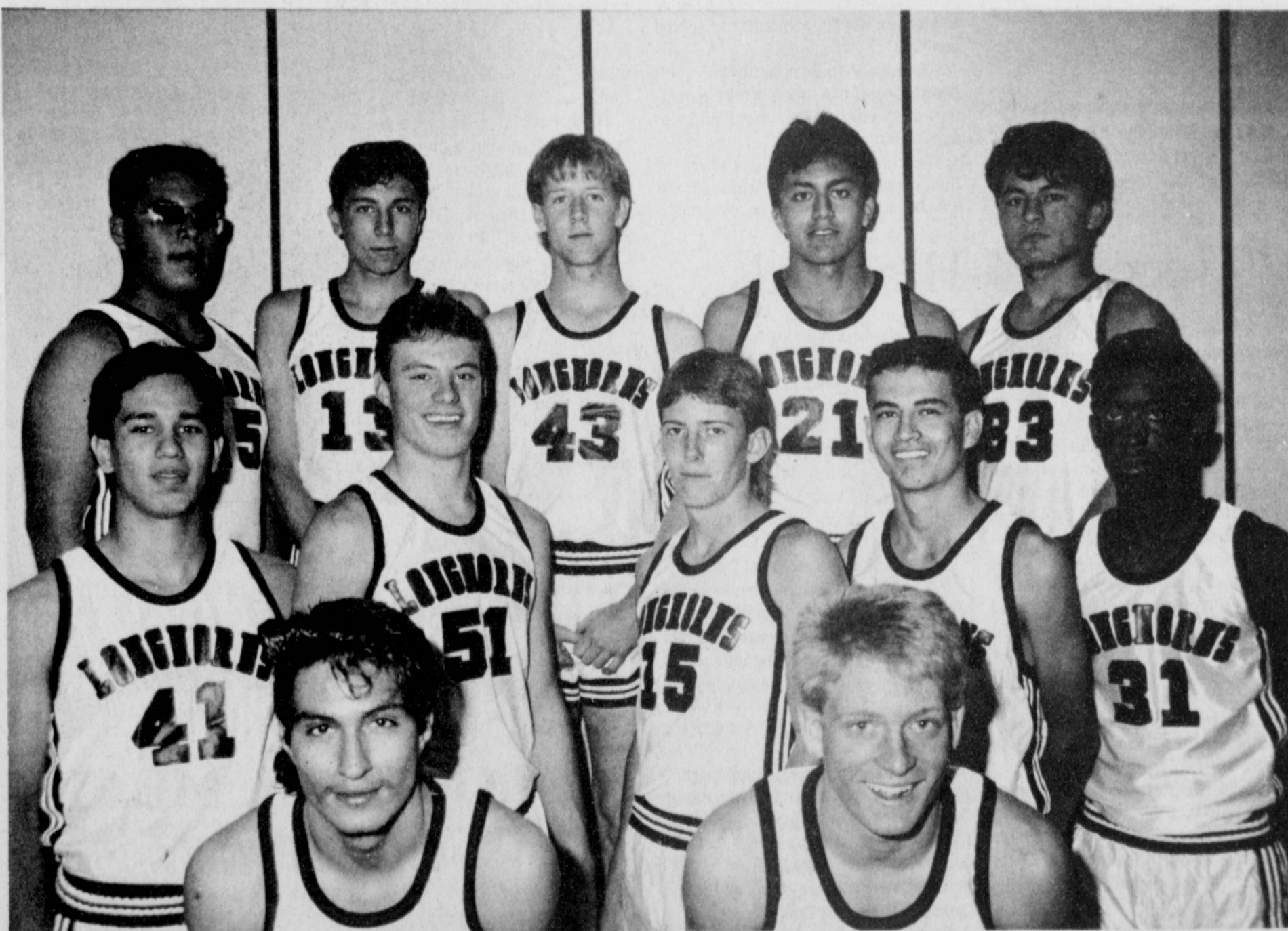
The council members thanked Lyles for his comments and agreed to think on who would be best for the position.

## VA Questions and Answers

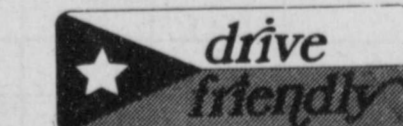

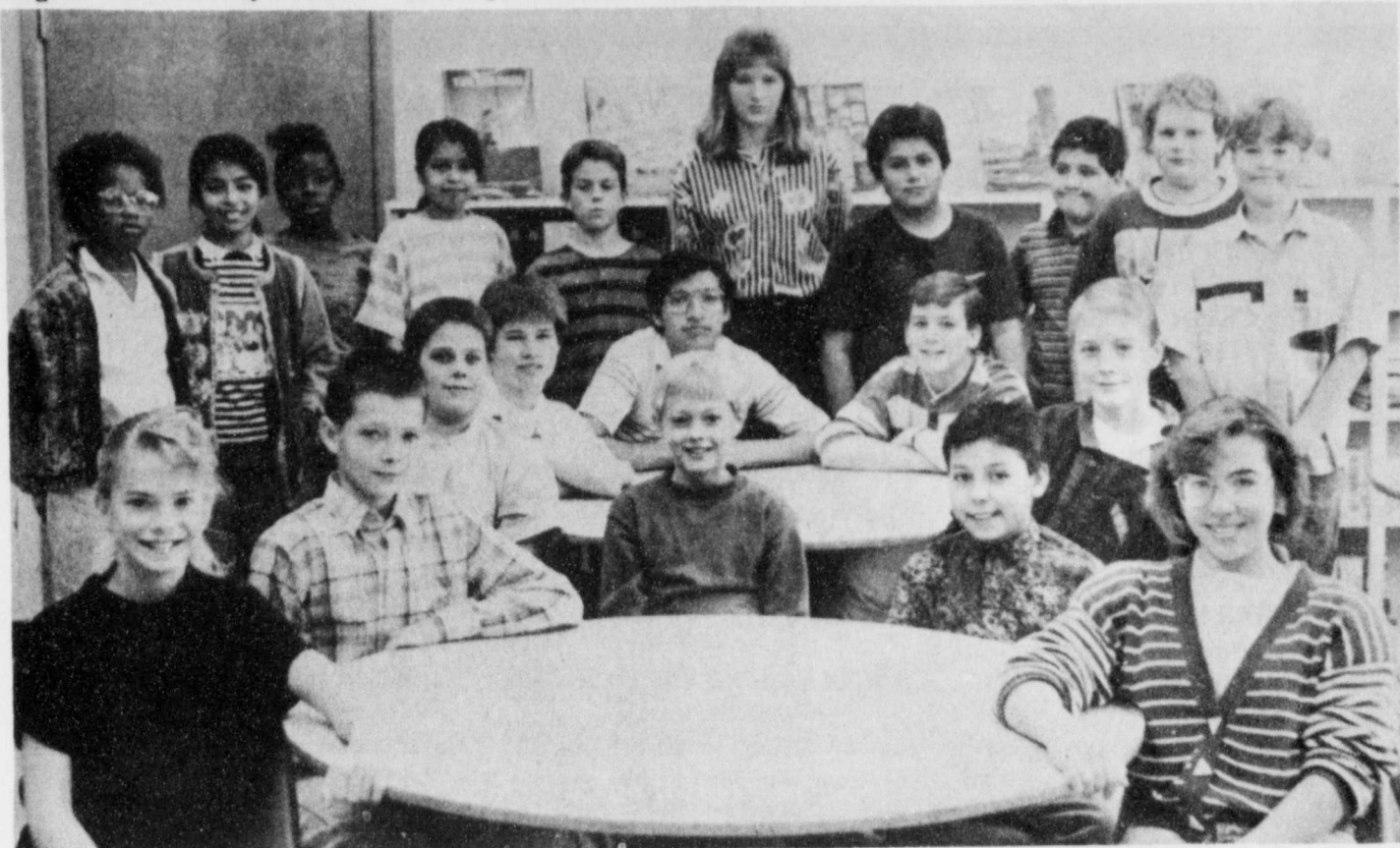

## Cargill sponsors 200 rural scholarships

The Cargill Foundation will again sponsor 200 scholarships of \$1,000 each for high school seniors from U.S. farm families.

The Cargill Scholarship Program for Rural America is open to all high school

seniors who graduate next spring and come from families that derive at least half of their income from farming. Candidates must enroll full-time next fall at an accredited two- or four-year college, university or vocational-technical school.

The program was established in 1986 to recognize and encourage the academic achievements, accomplishments and talents of rural youth.

Gladys Tripp, program administrator, said the National FFA Organization will manage the selection process, which is based on academic records, leadership, extracurricular accomplishments and financial need.

"The FFA was chosen to manage the selection process because it has a long history of administering scholarship programs for many agriculturally based companies. In addition, because it is a national organization that is part of the educational program in many rural high schools, it is ideally suited to administer and promote the program," she said.

Tripp emphasized that applicants do not have to be FFA members to qualify and that judges will not give preference to scholarship applicants who are FFA members.

Information and application forms can be obtained at any Cargill office or high school FFA department. Students also can request forms from the Cargill Scholarship Coordinator, National FFA, P.O. Box 5117, Madison, WI 53705-0117. Application deadline is March 1, 1991.

## Twenty seven named to Who's Who

A total of 27 students from Lockney have been included in the 24th Annual Edition of Who's Who Among American High School Students, 1989-90.

Who's Who, published by Educational Communications, Inc., Lake Forest, Illinois, is the largest high school recognition publication in the country. Students are nominated by high school principals and guidance counselors, national youth groups, churches or by the publishing company based upon students' performance in scholarship award contests or extracurricular activities.

Final selection is determined on the basis of criteria which include high

achievement in academics and leadership in school activities, athletics or community service. Traditionally, 99 percent of Who's Who students have a grade point average of "B" or better and 97 percent are college bound.

The 24th edition of Who's Who, published in 15 regional volumes, features over 650,000 students, or 5 percent of the nation's 12,000,000 high school students. They represent 18,000 of the 22,000 public, private and parochial high schools in the country.

Who's Who students also compete for over \$65,000 in scholarship awards and participate in the publication's annual opinion poll of teen attitudes. The book

is distributed to 15,000 high schools, colleges, universities, and public libraries throughout the country.
