POTATO CROP HERE WILL NET \$150 THOUSAND

The News is raising its ante on the local spud crop this week, and we're using County Agent Monroe May as authority.

The Irish potato crop in Castro County is being oug this week. Both the yield and the quality are good, as well as the price.

Agent May made a tour of the community about 12 miles northwest of Dimmitt this week, and this is what he reports, after an interview with the several growers and those at the processing plant where the spuds are made

ready for the buyers. All figures used as estimates:

Nine growers, 511 acres, one district. processing plant, yield 150 sacks
