Morales advises elected officals of upcoming computer conversion

Texas Attorney General Dan Morales advised elected officials across the state that the Attorney General's child support program is preparing to implement a new automated computer system which will greatly enhance child support colection and enforcement activities. Of the eight largest child support programs in the country, Texas will become the first, and perhaps only, program to implement the federallymandated system by the October 1, 1997,

deadline. The new system provides automated tools for managing cases and sharing information with other public

and private agencies. The current child support system simply stores and retrieves data. The new computer system uses the data to generate letters and court documents automatically, schedules case work on case workers' calendars,

and directs case work. Morales notification to elected officials is part of a comprehensive statewide communica-. tion effort to inform custodial parents, elected officials and other affected parties of the new computer system and to minimize the impact of the massive conversion process.



New Immigration laws affect exchange students programs

Many people are concerned about new laws which are a part of the Immigration Reform and Immigrant Responsibility Act of 1996. This new legislation requires exchange students on F-1 or I-20 visas to reimburse public school districts for the cost of their education before they are allowed to enter the United States. In most areas, this can amount to several thousand dollars per year.

It is important to note that students who participate in formal exchange programs offering J-1 visas, will not be affected by the new law. One such program, the American Intercultural Student Exchange, offers its participants the security of monthly contact with a representative of the program, comprehensive medical insurance, parties and get-togethers with other exchange students in the area, educational trips around the U.S., and many other amenities.

An increasing number of Americans have friends or relatives in foreign countries whose teens would like to spend time studying in American high schools. To participate in such an exchange, these students should explore their options before paying tuition at an American public high school. Programs such as AISE have years of experience, and their caring staff members can offer students and their host families advice and support during the exchange

Billion dollar stamp hike getting thumbs down

Los Angeles-Portraying it as unjustifiable and unmitigated gall, newspapers across the nation have taken editorial positions opposed to the Postal Service's plan for a billion

dollar stamp increase. The Postal Service filed a request with the Postal Rate Commission (PRC) to increase stamp prices to 33-cents. Every penny is another billion dollars in revenue to the Postal

Service. A survey by the Coalition to Make Our First Class Mail FIRST CLASS found harsh criticism for this latest increase, just a little more than two years since first class mail rates jumped by \$3 billion-a-

"Not a penny more" demanded the headline above the editorial in a newspaper that takes the Postmaster General to task for saying two years ago rates wouldn't go up until the year 2000.

"Now the Postal Service is pleading poverty, claiming it needs a onecent increase to continue operating in the black," the editorial said. "This doesn't add up.

"The USPS reaped a \$1.6 billion surplus in 1996 and is expected to enjoy another large surplus this year. So how in the name of Marvin Runyon can the service be strapped?"

With the example of the small Dallas suburb of Addison where the six zip codes within 4 1/2 square miles have made "mail delivery a nightmare for residents and mail carriers alike," a certain newspaper editorialized, "The Postal Service just doesn't get it... It needs more sense, not more cents."

A newspaper in Springfield, IL attacked the Postal Service's advertising spending, which surpassed \$230 million in 1996.

"This would be fine if the Postal Service were a private corporation," the editorial explained. "But it's a government-protected monopoly...and it pays no corporate income tax, sales tax or property tax."

Be on the lookout before serving fat-free

foods. Houston -- Parents should read the label carefully before buying "Fat-Free" foods for growing children.

"Sometimes, even though the dietary fat has been reduced, each serving may have a high-calorie level, said Dr. Janice Stuff, at the USDA/ARS Childrens nutrition Research Center. "Children may eat extra servings, which may cause them

to gain weight." Fruits vegetables are fat-free snacks. Reduced fat yogurt and skim and two percent milk are also good.

"Children need fat in their diets. especially during growth spurts," said Stuff, an assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of medicine. "The energy fat provides helps them maintain normal bodily functions, and supports increased growth in muscle, skin, and bone.

Dietary fats also contain two necessary for brain development.

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

AUSTIN - Texas may lose millions of dollars in federal funding if it restricts minors' access to birth control and other prescription drugs, an official with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services warned in a letter presented at a hearing last week.

Federal regulations state that funding will be denied to programs that discriminate on the basis of age in providing services, wrote Dr. James Randolph Farris, regional administrator for the U.S. Health Department.

State District Judge Scott Mc-Cown took the case under advisement after listening to arguments from Planned Parenthood of Houston and Southwest Texas and the attorney general's office, the Dallas Morning News reported.

The state Legislature attached a rider to its 1997 budget stipulating that "no state funds may be used to dispense prescription drugs to minors without parental consent." The rider was aimed primarily at the dispensation of birth control pills. Planned Parenthood filed suit, asking the judge to invalidate the Legislature's action.

State Sen. Steve Ogden, R-Bryan, who sponsored the rider, attended the hearing. "As a matter of policy, I believe parents ought the 76th Texas Legislature, which

to always have an opportunity to consent on whether their children are receiving prescription drugs," he told the Morning News.

Rollback Amount Is Questioned Texas would benefit from a \$555 million insurance premium rollback in 1998 under a plan announced by the state Department

of Insurance. The rollback would reflect the insurance industry's cost savings that have come about since 1995 laws limited frivolous lawsuits and capped civil damages.

But, a consumer advocacy group testified last week at a public hearing that Texans were overcharged \$1 billion in 1996 by insurers who failed to pass on savings from legal reforms brought about by the 1995

D.J. Powers of the Center for Economic Justice and a former general counsel for the Department of Insurance, said the reforms have not provided savings for Texans but are "providing a \$1 billion windfall for insurers."

"If the rates were reduced as they should have been, consumers would have paid \$1 billion less than they did. That averages out to a \$100 per car overcharge in 1996 alone. That overcharge will be even bigger in 1997," he said, adding that the next rollback should be \$1.5 billion for automotive liability coverage and \$2 billion for all types of coverage.

Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer disagreed with Powers' figures and took the testimony under advisement. Bomer said he will announce later whether he will adopt the department's recommendation of a \$555 million rollback or set his own amount, according to an Associated Press

Bullock Names More Panels Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, who is retiring Dec. 31, 1998, continued to name Senate interim committees to get a head start on the agenda for convenes in January 1999.

He appointed panels to study issues regarding air emissions, public schools, state finances and accountability in handling taxpayers money, and the funding of higher education, including the cost of tuition and other concerns that affect students' ability to earn degrees.

Bullock requested that each committee submit a progress report by March 1, 1998 and a final report by Oct. 1, 1998.

Other Capital Highlights

 Comptroller John Sharp has assembled a 10-member team to study high unemployment, low wages and pollution along the Texas-Mexico border. Sharp's "per formance review" is intended to dissect, analyze and make recommendations to remedy the border's persistent problems.

■ Attorney General Dan Morales last week unveiled the state's new computer system for processing child support payments. The system, which was to be operational in early 1993, has cost \$68 million, so far. Six months of staff training are needed before the system is fully operational, Morales said.

Comptroller Sharp, a Democratic candidate for lieutenant governor, said he won't accept a \$1,000 a month raise in the new budget that became effective Sept. 1. Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry, a Republican candidate for lieutenant governor, said he would accept the raise.

■ Texas Secretary of State Tony Garza announced that astronauts will be allowed to cast votes via "electronic mail" to NASA, which would forward the encrypted ballots to county election officials. The procedure is authorized under a law signed by Gov. George W.

■ The Texas Supreme Court reversed an opinion from Attorney General Morales, ruling that its telephone and telecopier records are not subject to the Texas Public

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
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

CASH DISCOUNTS: **SHOULD YOU USE THEM?**

Many businesses offer cash discounts to their customers for prompt payment of invoices. Whether you are the buyer or the seller, you should understand cash discounts and be able to calculate their cost or benefit to you.

As the Buyer

Consider this example. You purchase supplies and are invoiced for \$1,000. The invoice states that if you pay within ten days, you can subtract a cash discount of 2%; otherwise the full \$1,000 is due within thirty days. To calculate the annual rate of interest for the value of the discount, use this formula: Interest = Discount : [(Invoice - Discount) x (Days :

Days represents the number of days between the final discount date and the date full payment is due. Putting the numbers from our example into the for-

mula gives you: Interest = $$20 \div [(\$1,000 - \$20) \times (20 \div 365)]$ As a buyer, this discount offers you a 37% annualized return on your \$980 (you are earning \$20 in 20 days on the \$980 paid). Unless you can get a higher return on your money somewhere else, you'd be wise

to pay early. Even if you must borrow to pay within the discount period, you're ahead by the number of points between 37% and the borrowing rate. Another factor is that prompt payment will earn you pre-

As the Seller

ferred customer status and a good credit rating.

If you were the seller in the above example, the discount would cost you 37%. If you can obtain funds from other sources at lower rates, perhaps you shouldn't offer the discount. However, other factors may make offering such discounts worth-while. Perhaps they are expected in your industry, or perhaps they help promote the sale in the first place. Offering discounts will probably accelerate the cash flow in your company and keep more of your receivables from sliding into the bad debt category.



Newspapers win temporary injunction, action delays accident record measure

on Aug. 25 won a temporary injunction prohibiting enforcement Sept. 1 of a state law that would have restricted public access to motor vehicle accident reports.

Lawyers representing more than 500 Texas newspapers and the state attorney general's office agreed to the order temporarily banning enforcement of section 13 of Senate Bill 1069. That provision of the law required police jurisdictions in Texas to restrict access to accident reports unless the requestor of such information already possessed detailed information about the accident.

"At least for now, Texas newspapers and other media may continue to report the news of these accidents as they should," said Dolph Tillotson, editor and publisher of The Galveston County Daily News. Tillotson and Roy McOucen, publisher of the Snyder Daily News, were co-chairmen of the Legislative Advisory Committee that represents the Texas Daily Newspaper Association and the Texas Press Association.

State District Judge Paul Davis of the state's 200th District Court approved the agreement in open measure dealing with accident re-

60 days before the judge rules on making the order permanent.

David Donaldson of the law firm of George, Donaldson and Ford represented the newspapers. Assistant Attorney General Nancy Trease represented the attorney

general's office. First Assistant Attorney General Jorge Vega, acting as spokesman for Attorney General Dan Morales, said he believes the press should have "appropriate access" to the accidents reports and that the injunction gives Morales' office more time to consider any unintended consequences of the law and reconcile them with the state's barratry

"We were very pleased with the outcome," Tillotson said. "If the newspapers of Texas had not chosen to fight this, the measure would have become law, and all the state's citizens would have lost their rights to access to these important public records. We believe our case ultimately will prevail, and we're prepared to see the matter through to its conclusion."

State Rep. Toby Goodman, R-Arlington, first introduced the court. A full hearing will be ports as House Bill 399. Supporters

AUSTIN - Texas newspapers scheduled sometime in the next of the bill said it was intended to stop unwanted commercial contact with accident victims from lawyers, chiropractors and others. Members of the newspapers' legislative committee fought the bill and ultimately succeeded in getting Gov. George W. Bush to veto it.

Newspaper spokesmen said the law was overly broad and there were better ways to prohibit such contact by commercial interests. For example, they cite barratry laws which were strengthened during the 75th session of the Legislature.

"We believe if this kind of contact is objectionable, there are ways to control it without discarding the Texas Constitution and the First Amendment," Tillotson said.

Newspapers maintain that the same objectionable language was "log-rolled" into an unrelated bill, Senate Bill 1069, and the governor signed it into law. Gov. Bush said since that he did not know the accident records provision was attached to SB 1069.

"My intention was to veto to allow full disclosure. When I learned that some wording had been attached to another bill that would circumvent my veto, I didn't like it," the governor said.

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



Thursday, September 4. 1997 Fighting for our youth

by Attorney General Dan Morales

In 1995, the Office of the Attorney General joined with prosecutors and law enforcement in proposing many revisions to the laws in the Texas Family Code that govern the way we handle juvenile crime. The 74th Legislature adopted a tough new attitude toward young criminals, and enacted broad reforms.

While we have no firm data yet to evaluate the impact of the recent reforms on juvenile crime rates, I expect to improvement in the future. Punishment is a limited deterrent, however. We owe our children more.

Intervention and Prevention

I am absolutely convinced intervention and prevention play a vital role in our efforts to reduce juvenile crime. many There are excellent local programs across the state. Some provide supervised after school

Resources For Youth We support public private partnerships such as TYC Industries Project Reintegration Offenders (RIO). These programs help juvenile offenders develop job skills and make the transition back into society. Among other uses, the juveniles' earning help pay restitution to crime victims and child support payments, if any are owed.

Last winter, our juvenile Crime Intervention Division organized a Youth Resources Fair at the Texas Commission's residential facility in Giddings. Our purpose was to

make incarcerated youth aware about the many states and local programs designed to help them keep their lives on track after release, including dealing with drug problems, acquiring job skills, and continuing their education. We believe that

many young offenders are willing to turn their lives around but lack practical information about how to overcome obstacles like addiction inadequate education. So we provide them with

information about how to attain a General Equivalency Diploma (GED) or learn a skill through a trade school.

We face unacceptable situation, but not an overwhelming one. We don't have to have more drive-by gangs, shootings, guns in schools or throwaway children. Because of our tough new laws, the days when a juvenile could break the law and receive a slap on the wrist are over. Yet we also have to give young people a chance to become productive citizens.I commend local law enforcement on their many creative successful community programs. We must keep working together. Together, we can send juvenile crime rates into a downturn.


