An extensive advertising campaign has been in progress for the past several days and it is believed here that the crowds attending the Fair this year will exceed by far the attendance of any previous year.

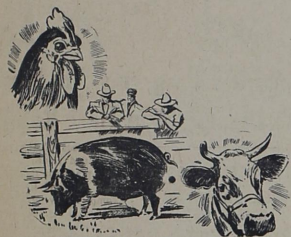
Bobcats down Lockney; Tackle Dumas Friday

*tions, other than the commission paid solicitors.*

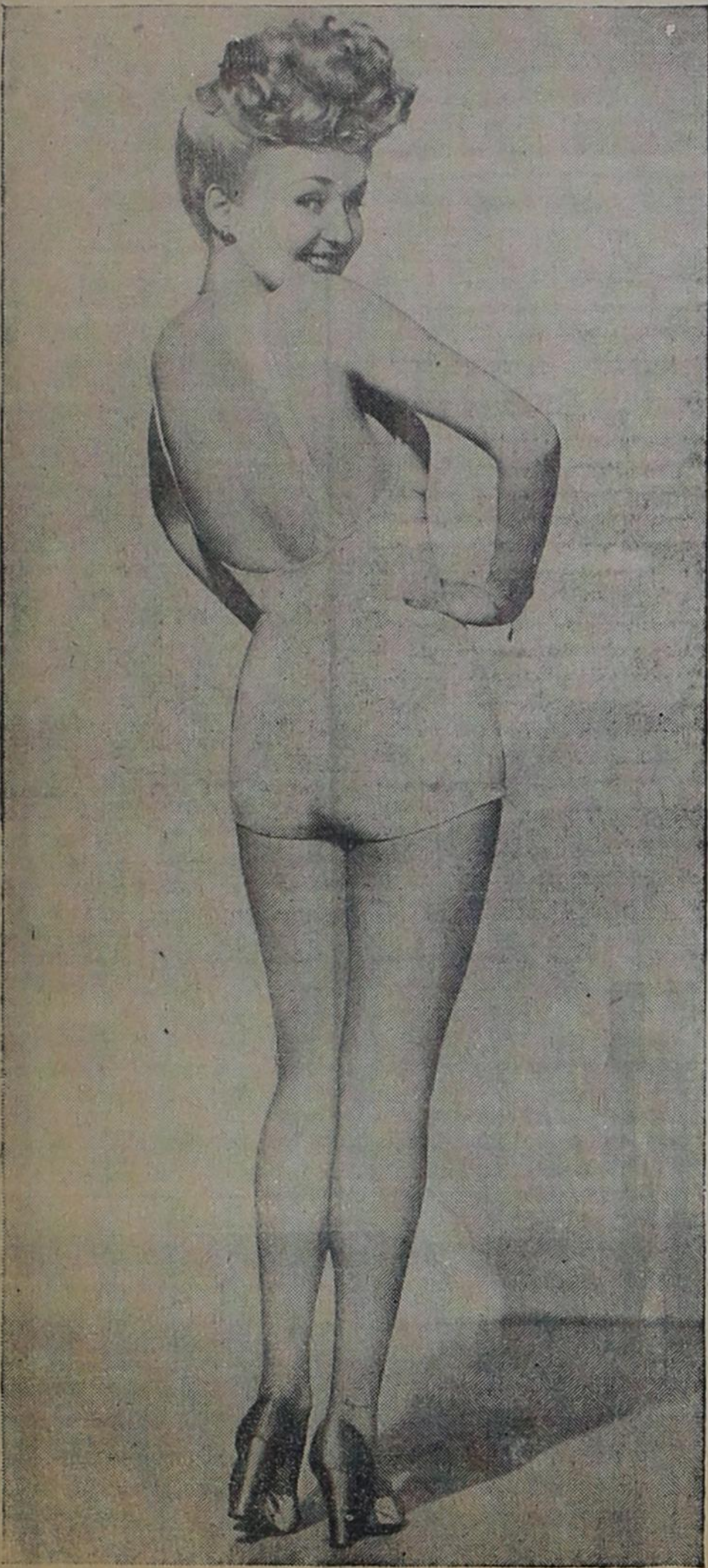

## News In The World of Religion

(by W. W. Reid)  
 Mrs. Mary Williams Hemingway of Washington, D. C., for forty years a missionary of the Congregational-Christian Church in China, is retiring from active service. But her daughter, Miss Winifred Hemingway, born in China and speaking the language fluently, has been accepted as a missionary to that same country. Miss Hemingway, a graduate of Oberlin College and for two years a teacher in Shansi Province, China, is the daughter, granddaughter, and great-granddaughter of Congregational missionaries, and her maternal great-grandfather was the Rev. Stephen R. Riggs, a noted missionary to the Indians of the Dakotas.

Prof. Francis P. Jones, of Dodgeville, Wis., Methodist missionary and head of the English department of the University of Nanking, China—an institution now "in exile" in Chentgu, West China, & Miss Stella Graves, of the faculty of Gingling College, who holds the degree of Master of Sacred Music from Union Theological Seminary, New York City, are the founders of the newly organized Chengtu Church Music Society. This Society brings together most of the Chinese and western choir directors and leaders of church music in Czechuan Province and is working for the promotion of better church music, choir work, and for annual choir festivals. Dr. Jones has published a large number of Christian anthems, using western music and

translating English and other words into Chinese. Miss Graves is furnishing the technical musical guidance.

Commenting on recent zoot-suit difficulties in Los Angeles and vicinity, Superintendent Veron M. McCombs, of the Methodist Latin American Conference in the southwest, says that no "pachuco" (prankster) has come from among the thousands of boys and young men connected with the Mexican Protestant Missions and churches on the Pacific coast. He urges all churches in the area to widen their program of education and recreation for youth so as to help develop character. "A fifth freedom is involved in this situation—the freedom of play," says Dr. McCombs. "These boys need equipment for play and competent leadership at Watts, Cal., for example, must furnish it. Our Mexican has a full program of activities but no outside playground. Yet Watts Parish, with 22,000 Mexicans, is a major haunt of gangs. These two facts are closely related."

The Indian Army, now serving alongside British and American units in Asia, for the first time in its history has a Chaplain's Department. Provision has been made to provide Indian Christian padres (pastors), for both India and overseas, "wherever there are 120 Roman Catholic or Protestant Christians in any unit, formation or station," on the recommendation of the head of the denomination in the area concerned. Where there are not enough Christians to justify the appointment of a chaplain, the National Christian

Council of India will secure the service of some local church to minister to the troops.

Word comes from England that Dr. Harold Moody, a Jamaican, for many years president of the League of Colored Peoples, has been made chairman of the London Missionary Society one of the great free church missionary societies of Great Britain, with missions and missionaries all over the world. To the League of Colored People, Dr. Moody writes: "I now go forward with your blessing and prayers. I represent you and pray God my occupancy of this position will do much to help to improve relationships between black and white and hasten the day when for all appointments, either of the church or the state, the question will not be 'What is his color?', but 'What is his character and ability?'"

"The demand for realism cuts both ways," says Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick of New York. "On the one side it makes the Sermon on the Mount seem to some an idealistic fantasy, shown up by the hideous necessities of our era as naive, impossible idealism. But the demand for realism leads others in precisely the opposite direction. The Christian way of life impractical?—they think. Do we suggest then that what is going on in the world today is practical? This domestic regime of anti-Christianity—would we call that economically practical, in terms of human happiness practical, in terms of hope for the kind of world our children will have to live in practical? Rather, this world disaster, with all the voices of its need, cries out that unless we can achieve the hard headed realism of

the Christian ethic and put it into practice, we are personally and socially sunk."

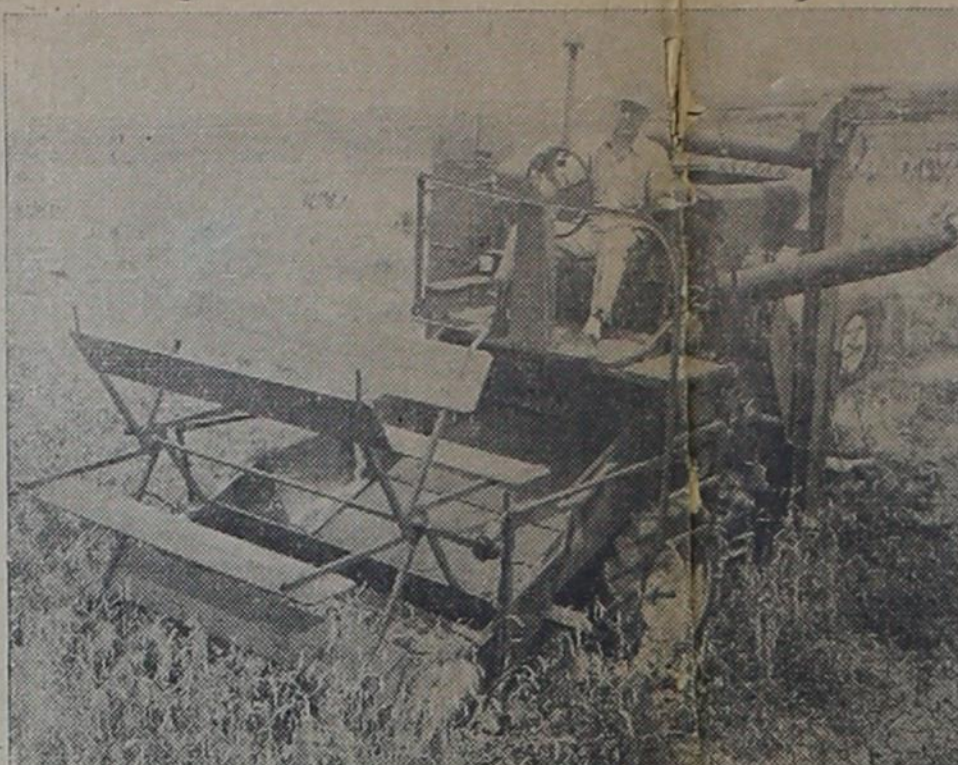
