Harvest Labor Problem Is Eased

The harvest labor situation seems to be pretty well in hand but there is still a great need for tractor drivers. some 15 tractor drivers were placed last week and calls were made for that many more. Farmers who are in need of labor are again urged to go to the county agents office and state their needs, there are several people with combines who have inquired about comming into the county but the county agent states there is no one on file asking for this type of help and tho the men with the combines are afraid to risk a long move without guarantee of

To date some 50 laborers have been placed by the county agents office in all parts of the county. There seems to be enough trucks in the county at the present time and anyone in need of it should make their wishes known stated county agent May.

There is a large demand for year round workers but none of this labor has come into the county or seems to be available from any

Social Security Applicants Urged Give Proper Ad'rss

"Many individuals mailing applications for social security account numbers to the Amarillo field office show as their address only the town in which they live,' according to Dewey Reed, Manager of the Amarillo Social Security Board Field Office.

Post Office regulations require that a complete address be shown on all mail, and with the increased volume and the large numbers of new residents in each locality, it is especially important now that this regulation be followed and that each person furnish a definite address showing box number, street and number, or "General Delivery", as the case may be.

Amarillo Social Security Board Field Office replies to all applicants for original account numbers within twenty-four hours of the receipt of the applications, but because of indefinite addresses furnished a substantial number of people either fail to receive their cards or their delivery is delayed. In order to cooperate with postal officials, it is requested that each individual give a definite return address so that these replies will be received as soon as possible and in order that we may aid the post offices in the delivery problems during these rush times.

When a woman worker gets married one of the first things she should do is have her name changed on her social security account number. This will be done by any Social Security Board office without charge.

Old-age and Survivors Insurance is not based on the amount of taxes paid by the worker and his employer. Benefits are entirely on the amount of wages credited to the wage earners social security



A person is very fortunate to own a pre-war cooker and it should be given the best of care. The lid should never be lifted by be placed upside down so that water will run into the gauge. Home makers and home economists have wecomed the news that 275,000 pressure cookers are going to be manufactured this year. So already have been shipped into Texas and have been sold.

Of course it will take some time to manufacture and distribute the 275,000 cookers, so likely Texas won't get all of its quota until time for late fall canning. Canning circles, other groups, and individual families can apply for a cooker at the office of their farm rationing committee.

And here is another reminder about canning. . . . You can use Ration stamps 15 and 16 in your War Ration Book No. 1 to get sugar for canning. Each stamp is good for 5 pounds. And if you should need even more sugar than that, you can apply to your local war price and ration board. There is a limit of 25 pounds per person.







To Prevent Heat Cramps Use Salt

Austin, Texas,- To help prevent heat cramps, salt should be added to the drinking water of those persons whose work is such as to Dr. R.F. M'Casland cause excessive perspiration, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises in an attempt to forestall a possible increase in the number of heat victims as the Texas thermometer hits 90 degrees and above

Laborers, mechanics, farmers, and white collar workers whose work causes them to sweat profusely are in danger of having their body salt content become deficient, with resulting heat cramps or heat fag. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat; the body may lose as high as forty to fifty | Plainview, Texas grams of salt during hot days. Workmen whose duties require muscular exertion should be especially careful to add more than the usual amount of salt to what they | SEES | S eat and drink.

In industry a method of preventing heat cramps is to take a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. However, salt deficiency may be prevented by taking salt in various ways. Where prepared salt tablets are not available, a pinch of table salt may be added to each drink of water. Milk is a source of salt and will help to make up for the deficiency caused by sweating. Alcoholic drinks should be avoided.

Heat cramps are characterized by pains in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases, by neausea and vomiting. The body temperature remains about normal, likewise the pulse rate. Body salt losses occur without the knowledge of the individual until there is a deficiency; then the abdominal muscles begin to cramp.


