JOINT RESOLUTION.

Amending Article 6, Section 2, o Constitution of the State of Texas requiring all persons subject I fly, From boozer-ee to boozerto a poll tax to have paid a poll tax they offer to vote at any election in was consumated here Saturday this state, and fixing the time of payment of said tax.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 6, Section 2, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter

read as follows: Sec. 2. Every male person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceeding an election and the last six months within the district or counin which he offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector and every male person of foreign birth subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who not less than six months before any election at which he ofintention to become a citizen of the United States in accordance with the Federal Naturalization laws, and shall have resided in this state one year next preceeding such election and the last six months in the county in which he offers, to vote, shall also be deemed a qualified elector; and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence; provided, that electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which said county is attached for judicial purposes; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before he offers to vote at any election in this state and hold a receipt showing his poll tax pail before the first day of February next preceeding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. 
