The nventor of the new piece of nechanism believes that if there as been no destruction of the echanical devices in the ear and no paralysis of the auditory nerve, the deaf person can be made to hear
The apparatus differs Trom others previously tried in the use of a battery to intensify the sound, and in the construction of a transmitter collects and transmits sound waves. the bat eiver delivers them to the ear it a well-known fact that nany deat people can receive nessages by telephone which hey cannot hëar as well astherwise.
The experiments thus far made seem to have been with the young, and it is probably the child who will reap the reater benetit from the new discovery if it is perfected for
