POSTAL EMPLOYEES WORK OVER TIME

"Postal employees are going to do their best as always to see that the Christmas mails are delivered on time," said Ambrose O'Conne 1 First Assistant Postmaster General, in charge of postal personnel. "Postmasters already have done splendid work in calling the unpre cedent problem to public attention through newspapers and radio, and in preparing to meet the rush of

mailings. "But this year deliveries on time are impossible unless the public mails its parcels earlier than ever before. We have reduced the age limit for extra personnel from 18 to 16, but the thousands of persons being hired are inexper ienced and relatively slow in hand ling mail. And there are already many thousands of inexperienced workers in the service, replacing men who have gone into the Army and Navy."

In case you are considering canning some chicken fried, don't waste the chicken by trying to do so. You might turn out a good product, but the chances are against you. Fat in the cans may become rancid, spoilage may occur, or the meat may taste bitter if the fatty acids break down. Fat also makes the meat hard and may issue certificates authorizdry.
