Their apparent disappearance is explained thus: Long periods of dry weather are unfavorable to the weevil. When two or more dry years follow each other, the weevil becomes perceptibly scarcer. Recent droughty ter says: "The weevils have not left Nucces county or that vicinity. Moreover in Mexico, where the pest has been known for nearly three quarters of a century, no indications of its dving out have been observed in any locality that it has once reached. In the light of our present knowledge there seems no possibility that the Texas cotton planters are ever to be aided by a migration of the pest." Therefore it is the part of wisdom for farmers to ponder deeply the subject of crop diversification. There are many crops that can be grown that are more profitable than cotton, and surer to produce under unfavorable conditions.


