

38th Annual Richardson is Angus Cattleman's Round-Up

The 38th annual Cattlemen's Round-Up for Rehab sale was Tuesday at Abilene Livestock Auction gave the West Texas Rehabilitation Center a \$139,036 shot in the arm. Cattlemen from throughout the area donated 87 head of livestock that went through the ring fetching \$62,048. 



White-Tailed



Deer are an important component of renewable natural resources in Texas. The whitetailed deer is the major game species, measured by hunter participation and money spent on the sport. In recent years, hunters have harvested more than 450,000 head each year. Perhaps no wildlife species has more universal appeal than the white-tailed deer.







Pay Phone Rate Cap Lifted

The Public Utility Commission last week changed pay telephone rules in Texas to conform with requirements of the Federal Telecommunications Act of 1996.

Starting Oct. 8, the PUC will allow pay phone owners to charge pay phone users more than 25 cents per local call.

Texas has more than 150,000 pay phones, including 86,000 owned by Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. Kate Lowery, a spokeswoman for Southwestern Bell, said a raise in the charge for a local call is in the works, the Austin American-Statesman reported.

However, Scott Pospisil, executive director of the Texas Payphone Association, said a dispute between the private pay phone industry and the long distance companies at the Federal Communications Commission probably will delay increases in local call charges.

San Saba County Producers **Prepare To Meet Karnal Bunt**

San Saba County wheat producers are preparing to meet one of the greatest challenges in their farming careers. Karnal bunt was found in wheat samples from that county on September 9th.

Karnal bunt is harmless to people and livestock, but hard on prices because of the "fishy" odor it gives flour. It also means the infected fields will be quarantined, causing a further hardship for the producers and associated agri-business.

Only 11 producers representing an estimated 1,100 acres have been quarantined due to positive Karnal bunt grain samples, said Roy Waiston, County Extension Agent. Officials from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service are currently determining exactly what fields are affected, he said.

The USDA-APHIS mandated quarantine keeps producers from planting wheat or triticale, a wheat-rye cross, for a one-year period. These fields can be planted without restrictions.

Producers in the surrounding surveillance area may plant wheat, but will have to have their wheat tested at harvest to prevent the possibility of spreading the disease.

Walston said farmers in that county have many questions - such as who will harvest their crop if custom harvesters fear contamination of their equipment, or whether that harvest will be delayed due to regulators. If their wheat is harvested, producers also wonder if they will find a market for it.

"Producers are weighing their options now because much of the county's wheat crop, especially that which is grazed, should be planted by the end of September to catch fall rains," Walston said.

San Saba's outbreak is the first confirmed U.S. instance in hard red winter wheat, according to Dr. Dave Marshall of Dallas, professor of small grain breeding and pathology with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Until now, the spore has been confined to durum varieties used in pasta making.

The San Saba incidence also is the first domestic incidence of Karnal bunt completing a full growing cycle in Texas, Marshall said.

In other areas of the U.S. where Karnal bunt has been confirmed, grain samples are routinely tested and affected wheat is heat-treated and converted to feed.
