



More About The Hospital Bond Election

The Commissioners' Court of Castro County has received a legal petition requesting that an election be called to determine whether or not Castro County shall be authorized to issue not more than \$80,000.00 of bonds for the purpose of erection or purchase of County Hospital facilities, and authorizing the Commissioners' Court to levy a sufficient tax to pay for the bonds and interest and for the operation thereof.

After talking with Local Hospital Authorities, Officials of neighboring Hospitals, Bondsmen, and our County Auditor it would appear that it would be necessary to increase State and County taxes approximately 20 to 25%.

For example if your State and County Ad Valorem taxes for 1953 are \$100.00 then your taxes under the above program, if carried, would be \$120.00 to \$125.00 for the tax year 1954 and each year thereafter until the Bonds have been paid off. The 20 to 25% increase is based on a bond program of 10 to 12 years duration and the necessary tax increase will be exclusively on State and County taxes.






