STOCKRAISING, PAST--PRESENT.

In the eighties and early nineties and prior thereto, stockraising in Texas, southwes west and northwest of the Stat Capitol was a problem far differ ent from what it is today. Then areas of territory covered with the native nutritious grasses in their primitive perfect statethose days. Texas, or a va portion of it was indeed "turne loose" and the more stock you graze them. Tbe rule then was as in the time of Abraham and Lot-the stockmen divided up the country as though they were owners of it in fee simple and none dare say them nay. What pader or old regime was once tree the grass-we now bave to bur and it don't pay to feed the scrub as compared to the im proved breeds. The ordinary Texas range cattle and horses the scrubs if you please, ar strictly grass animals; made so by natural conditions and it don't begin to pay to monkey with them when grass land passes the dollar mark. And, when it comes to putting the scrub at the trough alongside of a well-bred anjmal of the same
