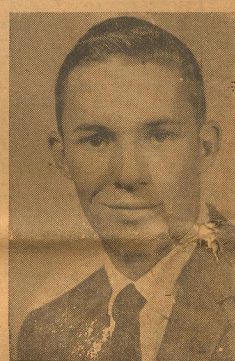

Weeds In Wheat Should Be Sprayed Now

Quite a few wheat fields in the county are heavily infested with the yellow flowering tansy mustard and pepper weed according to First State Bank farm representative, Edd C. McLeroy.

"In most cases, the wheat has outgrown the pepperweed," Mr. McLeroy said, "however, the tansy mustard is still competing with the wheat. A number of farmers have inquired about the possibility of spraying these weeds before they go to seed."

"According to the Amarillo Experiment Station," Mr. McLeroy said, "if the wheat is fully tillered and the weeds are higher than the wheat, spraying with one third to one half pound of 24D per acre could be of some benefit and will not hurt the wheat. In many cases the tansy mustard may be too far advanced to prohibit it from making some seed. However, caution should be used because 24D is deadly to broad-leaf plants and this includes trees."

"If your field is heavily infested with pepper weed and tansy mustard, and you feel that spraying is not practical, then consider planting row crops on your wheat acreage next year," Mr. McLeroy said.

Miss Gloria Bacon, 15-year-old junior high school student here, was reported by Castro County Hospital officials as in satisfactory and improving condition Wednesday morning following a gunshot wound received Monday.

The accidental .22 caliber shot struck Miss Bacon in the abdomen. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Swindle, who farm 5 miles west and 2 miles south of Dimmitt. The accident occurred about 5:15 p.m. Monday while Mr. Swindle was working in the fields and Mrs. Swindle was in town on a shopping trip.

A younger sister, Sally, 9, said that her sister decided to clean the rifle shortly after the girl's mother left for town.

Gloria reportedly picked up the rifle and went into the bathroom at the rear of the home and Sally went outside to play. The rifle was considered unloaded by the two girls and Sally failed to hear the shot when it occurred.

Mrs. Swindle returned a short time later, found the front door locked and went to the rear of the farm house where she heard the girl crying.

Gloria was rushed to High Plains Clinic in Dimmitt by Edd Wilson, farmer. She was later transferred to Castro County Hospital where she underwent surgery.

2,500 Acres On 87 Farms In Soil Bank

Farmers who have put land in the Soil Bank's 1958 Acreage Reserve should remember to control noxious weeds and otherwise take care of the "reserved" acreage, Charley Hill, chairman of the Castro County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, reminded growers this week.

There was 2,440.8 acres on 87 farms presently committed to the acreage reserve in Castro County.

Under the Acreage Reserve agreements, Mr. Hill said, the producer agrees to take such steps as may be required by the County ASC committee to prevent the Acreage Reserve from spreading noxious weeds. A list of weeds designated as "noxious" in Texas is available in the County ASC office.

Mr. Hill added that the farmer must also be careful about meeting such other program requirements as preventing wind or water erosion or planting a protective cover crop on Acreage Reserve land, when these steps are required by the County ASC committee. Failure to meet any of these provisions could mean loss of the payment the farmer could otherwise have earned for putting his land in the Acreage Reserve.

There is no reimbursement under the Acreage Reserve agreement for practices such as controlling noxious weeds or preventing erosion on designated land. Chairman Hill pointed out, and payments for carrying out conservation practices under the Soil Bank's Conservation Reserve program are not available for land designated under the Acreage Reserve program.

However, farmers may be able to obtain Agricultural Conservation Program cost-share assistance in carrying out certain conservation practices on Acreage Reserve land. Information about the possibility of receiving ACP assistance on Acreage Reserve land may also be obtained at the County ASC office.

Car, School Bus Involved in Mishap

A highway accident six miles south of Dimmitt Tuesday resulted in minor damage to a Dimmitt School bus and a dented fender for a 1947 Chevrolet driven by Harley Jack Clark of Route 1.

Charge were filed against Clark for passing another vehicle within 100 feet of an intersection. The accident occurred on Highway 51 about 4:05 p.m. Driver of the school bus was Earnest Earl Buchanan. No one was reported injured.

Dimmitt Eligible for Low Rent Federal Housing Program

Dimmitt is qualified for a federal low-rent housing project, according to Mr. William Collins, Regional Economist in the Public Housing Administration.

This program is set up to eradicate slum areas within the cities of the United States and rebuild better, more comfortable and sanitary homes at a reasonable rent for the occupants of those slums.

During the past ten years Dimmitt has slowly developed what might be called a semi-slum area. It is in East Dimmitt where low rent homes are little more than crude shacks and these houses, cheaply built in the first place, are rapidly deteriorating.

There are also good, solid homes in East Dimmitt, privately owned. The federal housing program would not be concerned with these.

The way this program works is that the government loans or builds a series of clean, modern homes, preferably in slum areas, and turns them over to the city to operate. The city then rents the homes at a low rate to house people living in the slum area. Eventually this rent is to pay the cost of the homes. The government has in mind the removal of a slum living unit for each new home built.

Presently the agencies studying possibilities of a federal housing program are the City Commission and Chamber of Commerce.

The need in Dimmitt arises from a combination of several factors. In the first place, there are segments of the local population whose wage earnings are insufficient for payments of rent on satisfactory dwellings. Secondly, those that are available for what these people are able to pay are sub-standard, without the minimum luxuries such as bathtubs, indoor toilets, or in some cases, indoor plumbing.

Through the federal govern-

ment's plan, these shacks, dug-outs, and other eyesore buildings can be replaced with something better at little or no eventual cost to the taxpayer.

Families living in these public housing developments pay rent on their financial abilities. A man with four children pays less rent than one with three; a space for children; lawns and man with a slightly higher income pays slightly more and so on. Every family living in a low-rent housing development must pay its monthly rent or face eviction. The rent is roughly one-fifth of the family's income.

It is also planned that areas of filth and squalor will be con-

demned or permanently cleared and the new units erected on the same sites if possible.

Local or state taxes will not be raised to pay for low-rent housing. Rather, the Housing Authority gives the City money, in the form of "Payments in Lieu of Taxes." This is equal to shelter rent paid by the low-income families. Public Housing Administration payments in lieu of Taxes, in most all instances, greatly exceed the taxes previously paid on the slum shacks which were eradicated.

According to the Housing Authority, low-income families find a new life in public housing; play clean kitchens; more progressive

environments and generally higher ambitions of the residents.

In Dimmitt as in other cities, most criminal activities center in the slum areas. This is especially true for habitual offenders. Locally, bootlegging, fighting, gambling, excessive drinking and other law violations center in East Dimmitt. Negroes are usually predominant in Castro County Jail and, most times, the balance is made up of other East Dimmitt residents.

While neither the government nor anyone else concerned will make the claim that public low-rent housing will ever bring crime to a halt, it has been pro-

HONESTY AND INTEGRITY

The past few years have brought dark clouds of dishonesty and corruption in our state department, and I for one, if elected you State Senator, propose to do my part to see that the people of Texas shall once again have confidence in our government.

WARMING

I believe in a broadened "Farm-to-Market" road program, by trying to get an additional \$50,000,000 per year to the amount now spent, for more farm roads.

I believe in a much broader rural electrification and rural telephone program so that every farmer will benefit.

I would like to see a state supported experimental farm to be located in the heart of the vegetable growing district, for experimentation in the growing of vegetables.

I would support a program to conserve our surface water supply by the state expending money for the construction of dams on all rivers and draws where needed. (In doing this we would also have places for recreation right here in West Texas.)

I would amend the present employment law so that the TEXAS EMPLOYMENT COMMISSION would bring into any given area suitable labor to be used on the farm where said labor is not locally available at the time when this labor is most needed by the farmer.

I would vote for and support a stronger seed regulation law in order to put this state on a par with other states in seed regulation. I will always oppose

any legislation to unionize farm labor.

SCHOOLS

A stronger emphasis on the teaching of the basic subjects of reading, writing and arithmetic in the lower grades, and on mathematics and science in high school, so that we can better equip our students to preserve our leadership as a nation in the world.

Better pay for all school teachers, and more money for better school plants from the state. (I think teachers should receive salaries equal to other professions of similar education and training.)

I think we should have a state supported Junior College near the center of the district so that buses can run from the various towns carrying students to said college.

BUSINESS

I would abolish the State Store Tax, State tax levied on stores that sell cigarettes and charge the collection of all taxes and cosmetics, etc., now collected by the merchant to that of the manufacturer who makes them. (In fact I think the merchant, farmer and all retail businesses should be taken out of the business of collecting taxes for either the state or the federal government.) It is about time the small business man got a break in this government of ours.

The present "Hot Check" law should be amended so that when any person gives or passes a check whether for cash, to pay a bill or to receive merchandise, he or she may be handled by the proper

court if said check is not honored at the bank for payment.

Any person who makes a bill for groceries, clothing or drugs, same being necessities, the merchant should have stronger laws than we now have for the collection of said debts.

LOAN SHARKS

I would vote and support a law to place all loan companies under the same regulations as the Banks are now under.

CITIES AND TOWNS

I believe that all cities and towns in the state should be given aid from the state, based on population for use in building streets, alleys and for the purchase of highway rights-of-way through their cities and towns. (As you know all this expense is now carried by the property tax payer who already has all the burden he can carry.)

PROFESSIONS

I believe that the present laws regulating the illegal and unethical practice of law, medicine and healing arts should be strengthened so that the public may be better protected, and any professional person or so called professional person who, either in private, in public, or in print, willfully misleads the public to obtain a client or a patient should be prosecuted by law for so doing.

WELFARE

I would give additional aid to all persons under the welfare program where need can be shown to exist. (Any increase in pension checks, etc., would help our economy because they spend their money on the necessities.)

OFFICIAL NOTICES AND CITATIONS

I would vote for an amendment to the present law on official notices and publications to provide that all official notices and citations now posted at the court house door be published in a newspaper in the County so that the public will be properly informed, and that individual citizens affected will not be deprived of their just rights under our laws.

FREE PRESS

Our laws should be amended so that all government records and all government meetings shall be open to the press so that the people may be informed on all happenings and acts of the government of state, county and political subdivisions.

TAXES

The State Comptroller has estimated that by January 1, 1959, the State shall be about \$100,000,000 in debt, thus the next session of the Legislature will be faced with the duty of getting the state out of the "red." I think that this can best be done by the abolishing of needless jobs and the elimination of duplicate functions of various state agencies, none of which render any service to the tax payer. With times getting harder economy should start at Austin.

I would abolish the State Property taxes as the property tax payer now has too great a burden to carry in supporting our school, cities and county governments.

I am not supported by any clique or clan, nor am I fighting any group or individual in this campaign, but if elected your State Senator, I will be your State Senator in fact and in truth, and the fighting that I will do will be on the floor of the State Senate, fighting for your interest.
