

ORIENT'S NEW MASTER.

Discussing the recent great naval battle The Dallas News correctly, we opine, gives Japan the future say so in the Far Eastern Waters. The News says:

"Admiral Togo made practically a clean sweep. That he should have destroyed or captured such a fleet, fresh from an up-to-date navy yard, officered with men supposed to be highly educated, experts in naval science, without serious loss to his own fleet, is one of the miracles of naval warfare. It is the more wonderful in that the Russian Admirals were fully informed concerning the equipment, methods, energy and skill of the enemy whom they went forth to meet.

"Admiral Dewey claims that we hold the record, in that the destruction and capture of the Spanish squadrons in Manila Bay and below Santiago was complete; but Admiral Dewey will be the first to agree that if he had met squadrons like those of Rojstvensky and Nebogatoff the results might have been vastly different. The Spanish squadron encountered at Manila was hardly fit to be called a squadron when compared to the fleet of Rojstvensky. Even the fleet of Cervera was entirely weak, worn, out of the rating when compared to the fine battleships and cruisers which were lost in a few hours in the Straits of Korea.

"Of the twelve warships lost by Rojstvensky six were up to date monsters of the latest and best type and equipment. The loss of such battleships on the one side without any corresponding losses on the other side may well make the warriors of other nations wonder as to what the results might have been if the invading fleet had been the battleships of his own country. If the Japanese navy as it stands can deal to the Russians such havoc without serious damage in return, what could the greater Japanese navy, when the Russian ships are added thereto, do to the navy of any other nation?

"The Japanese are at home on the sea. Theirs is an island apparently fashioned by nature for purposes of naval warfare. They are stolid, unshakable, infallible. They are clear of sight, strong of mind and tenacious of purpose. Their expert natures impress one with some vague idea of the supernatural. They are prestidigitators who show us unexpected and startling evidences of their skill and acumen. Give them the power, and what are they going to do with it? Make their navy as great as the best, and what other nation is going to dispute

THAT'S NO JOKE.

The Amarillo Herald, ever mindful of the uncertainty of chance and with an eye open to possibilities not altogether favorable to that town, sounds the following note of warning with reference to Santa Fe plans:

"The developments in regard to the Santa Fe system are such that it will pay the people of Amarillo to keep their ears close to the ground and be ready to take care of their interests. Few people realize the possibilities of the future in connection with this road, and it will not do to be careless in the matter."

No joke about that citizens of Amarillo!

In these days the town, great or small, that listlessly moves along trusting to what some folks term "natural advantages" and to luck, usually "get left" and more, richly deserve to be. This is not only applicable to Amarillo but to Canyon City, to Hereford or any other place.

To be too sure of anything—so sure that you know you are going to get it without effort on

your part, is always a dangerous practice to pursue—especially if the thing sought is valuable and there are others reaching for it.

This has reference to what a town expects from a railroad as well as most anything else. Now that the Santa Fe has determined on the Belen Cut-off and the contract, involving an expenditure of nearly seven millions, has been let, bringing to this section of the State, as it does now, the certainty of a great through line with a division somewhere in the Panhandle and most likely on the Plains, it well behooves every town with anything like a living chance to do its utmost to cinch it.

To be plain, this division is the plum which the Herald has in view for Amarillo. Canyon City and Hereford are also looking in that direction, but all may rest assured that it won't be had simply for the asking. The town that gets it must go after it good and strong.

This possibility of the future—a Santa Fe division with shops etc.—is within reach of Canyon City as well as Amarillo and The News has good reasons for believing that it can be had for this town if proper efforts are made in that direction. The question is up to our people, as at Amarillo, are we going to get "ready to take care" of our interests?

This office printed Reunion advertising on envelopes all day Monday. Nearly every business house in town was supplied. A few more left if you desire any.

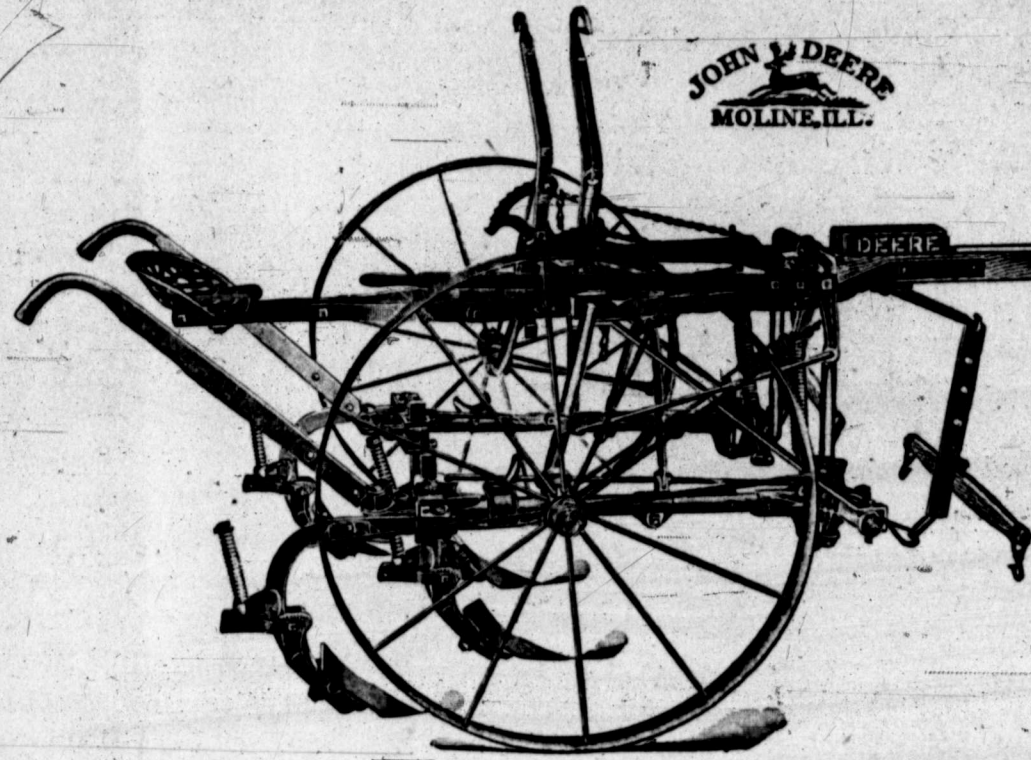

SCHOOL BOARD NOTES

Ordered that a manual, containing the rules, regulations, and course of instruction of the Public School of Canyon City, be printed at an early date.

That the fall term of school commence the first Monday in September, and continue nine months.

That for graduation, another year's work be added to the course of study to take the place of the post-graduate course which was in force the past session.

That a committee of three, W. C. Baird, E. A. Upfold, and R. W. O'Keefe, be appointed to inspect the school building, and report on the same as to the condition in which the building had been kept the past session.

Said committee, after inspection of each room and the halls, reported same to have been kept in a careful manner, neat, clean, and free from abuse or mutilation.

From the above action of the school board it will be observed that we are to have in the coming session eleven grades and a nine months term.

This will place Canyon City, so far as schools are concerned, on a par with any town of the Texas Panhandle. It gives us school facilities as good as the very best and when we look at the settings, the fine drainage of the town which gives us freedom from sickness, the advanced culture and high moral character of our citizenship, we may well ask where in the Panhandle or even in Texas can you go to beat it.

Some of the first cutting of alfalfa is being hauled into town. The cutting now is general on both creeks and the output is of fine quality and the yield will be bountiful. It is estimated that there is some six thousand acres of this sub-irrigated alfalfa land in Randall County and there is no better time than now to purchase some of it.

Last week The News received a letter from John Wiggins telling of his travels from here to Midland. He speaks of the good country between here and Lubbock—our beloved Plains—and then relates his experience and troubles through the sand from there to Midland. It is an interesting letter but comes at a time that we can't well spare the space to publish it.

Official Route of Epworth Leaguers to Denver.

Official announcement is made by the State Chairman of Transportation that for the 7th International Epworth League Conference to be held at Denver July 5th to 9th, the Fort Worth & Denver City Railway ("The Denver Road") has been selected as the "Official Route" from Texas and that in connection with that line arrangements have been perfected for Special Service leaving Fort Worth at 9:55 A. M. July 4th, the schedule being such as to put Delegates and friends in Denver early the following afternoon.
