**PROFITABLE CATTLE.**

To get profitable cattle we must have a good basis to begin on. This can be secured in almost any of the improved breeds. The Hereford, Shorthorn, Red Poll, Aberdeen, Angus and Galloways are all good and all have fast friends among successful breeders and feeders. Having tied on to one of these breeds, as a foundation for production, the herd, small or great, should be kept in a thriving condition. There is here as with all animal kind a law of nature that under normal conditions "like begets like." This being the indisputable rule is it not unreasonable to expect a good calf from diseased or poverty stricken parents? No matter what the breed the result in a case like this is always a puny thing without stamina—a "doggy" if you will. And once a doggy always a doggy. Of course they can to some extent be brought out of it, but as a rule it costs twice as much to put a pound of beef under the hide of a doggy as under that of a good healthy calf. This class of cattle—the doggy—is a loser, any and every where.

To get profitable cattle it is not only necessary to have a good calf but to keep it so until ready for market. This is the kind that it pays to feed, and this is the kind that when fed right and liberally makes the "choice fed stuff" that always brings top prices and *always* puts profit in the pockets of its owner.

But our people say that prices are "way down" for good young stuff. The reason is obvious to any judge of cattle on visiting our shipping pens. A great deal of it is too bullish in appearance, not a desirable market feature. Much of the heifer stuff, while good, is altogether too thin, and no small proportion of the shipments of calves are "Simon pure" doggies. These "thin heavies" are now being forced on an unwilling market as butcher stuff or as feeders when they ought to be fed and finished on our abundant crops and put on the markets as hardened choice-fed beef.

Query—If northern feeders can come down here, pay stiff prices for our No 1 young stuff and shipping them to Iowa or Illinois, make good money finishing them on corn at 90 cents per hundred pounds, why can't first hands—the people who raise them here—do as much on maize at 40 cents or even less per hundred?

Ground maize and kaffir is almost as great a flesh and fat producer as corn; the Plains country abounds in both grains and mixed with good forage, all so plentiful here, and run into a proper machine—a well-bred and thriving plains calf of yearling—the result would prove a combination that could not fail
