The "returning county judge". of this representative district, Hon. Sam Merrill of Potter, bas notified our County Judge, and in all probability all other coun ty judges in said representative district, that he shall order an election to be held in Raulall county on February 15, for the purpose of choosing a Repre sentative to fill the unexpired term of Hon. W. B. Ware who, to put it mildly, abandoned us for more congenial associations.

Judge Merrill has the letter of the law behind him in this call, but just where the good sense for action comes in under it. The News at present is igno ramous.

To respond to this call means just the same as to order a general election.
