## Reprentative Election Farce.

The "returning county judge" of this representative district. Hon, Sam Merrill of Potter, has notified our County Judge, and in all probability all other coun ty judges in said representative district, that he shall order an election to be held in Rauial county on February 15, for th purpose of choosing a Repre sentative to fill the unexpired term of Hon. W. B. Ware who, to put it mildly, abandoned us for more congenial associations Judge Merrill has the letter of the law bebind bim in this call, but just where the good sense for action comes in under it, The News at presént is jgno ramous.
To respond to this call mean just the same as to order a gẹ eral election. It means tha every polling booth in Randal county must remain open one tull day, with a complete set of election officers; who, of course must be paid by the county aud for what? Nothing, absolutely nothing, unless to gratify som embryo stateman's, at this time thoughttess ambition.
What in the wide world do we need a Representative for in this stage of the game? Is it to overbaul and make over the claimed "no count" election law? No, it can't be that for seem disposed to give the pres ent Legislature another dig there nor does he any wher else for that matter. What do we want him for the
body say! Quick!!
But why dwell on this matter tis plain to every sensible thinking citizen that the elec tion of a Representative under the present circumstances would be a farce.

The News has faith in the good common sense of our Coun. ty Judge. He is not compelted by law to call this election and thus incur needless expense to the county and The News doesn't believe for a minute that be will do it. Let Potter and other counties in the district do as they please in this matter; elect whom they please, it won't burt Ramdall, either directiy' or indirectly, and then our citizens, after the play is over, can have the satisfaction of knowing that they were not parties to it.
Concluding this article The News desires to say that if any citizen of Randall county can offer one good reason for holding this election it, The News will gladly give it publication. Since the above article was put in type, it has come to The News, by way of the esteemed Amarillo Herald, that Governor Lanbam on being "reliably advised" that the vacancy exists, has "requested" the returning officer, Judge Merrill, to order an election "to fill said vacancy." And further from the same source, "The Herald," The New's perceives that J. R. Bowman Esq., an excellent gentlemán by the way, and a good lawyer, is being groomed for the place.
Now. The Newe wishes it jection to Mr. Bowman, in fact
favors him for our next Representative, but it does object now at this time in incurring the useless expense of a gener al election for Mr. Bowman or any other man who can be of no
