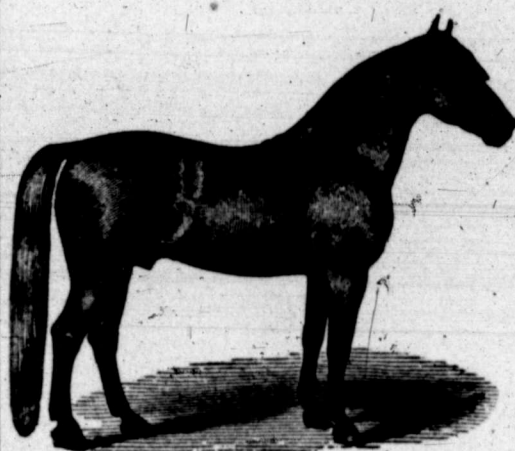

Plenty of Cyclone Clouds.

The Banner-Stockman of Clarendon, ruminating on storm conditions below the Plains, in its issue of last week says:

"People of this section have been 'seeing things' in the shape of storm-clouds and cyclones of late until the dreams of many are badly disturbed thereby. On Wednesday afternoon a number of Clarendon people witnessed the passing of a genuine cyclone some ten or twelve miles to the north of town. The cloud was seen to form and swoop down with all the vigor as pictured in the destruction wrought by the funnel shaped twisters. Phone messages from Jericho said the storm struck ten miles northeast, but so far we have not heard of any damage.

Last Sunday John Molesworth, of this city, and W. H. Craven, of Childress, were driving in a top buggy near Pampa in Gray county when a storm struck them, wrenching the buggy top off, stripping the horses of harness, breaking the vehicle up and throwing the occupants violently to the ground. The wind was described as a genuine twister.

Several belated citizens report having seen a tornado pass over town Tuesday night about eleven o'clock. Messrs. Bagby and Tucker had a plain view of the cloud, and say there is no doubt of its being a twister, and that Clarendon is indeed lucky in that the cloud did not take a notion to dip on us. The night was clear, and the cloud made its appearance and passed over, leaving the sky again clear, within the space of about three minutes."

We of the "Plains Country" are practically free from such disturbances. It is possible, in fact highly probable that destructive winds are formed on this big plateau and that here their electrical force is chiefly gathered, but their cyclonic demonstrations so far have been confined to lower altitudes. Clarendon is just below the caprock and so can always count on a sight of them if nothing else.

SMALL FARMS BEST FOR THE COUNTRY.

C. D. Lyon, in Farm and Ranch of May 5, speaking of small farms and staying with them and what they do for the country mentions a 165 acre farm in Tennessee, upon which the present owner has resided for over 36 years. The place was originally bought at \$8 per acre, has served as a home for a good sized family; has on it a \$1700 house, a \$700 barn and many other substantial home like improvements; the children have been fairly well educated and the first settler, now well along in life, not only has a comfortable home in which to pass his remaining years, but also a good bank account and all of it growing out of this little well-kept farm. As Mr. Lyon well says, "one such man as this is worth more to any country than 100 men who simply buy as an investment, sell out and move on, no matter if they do invest ten times as much as he is worth."

The same writer referring to this State, says:

"Cut the farming part of Texas up into 100 acre farms, and put a family on each farm, with the understanding that, life permitting, this family was to remain there 15 years and to improve the land, and the wealth of Texas would be increased more than 100 fold. This would mean more schools, churches, factories, mills, good roads, railroads, telephones, mail routes and everything that goes to make up a country that is worth living in. Just as long as people change their location every year or two, there is bound to be an unsatisfactory condition in that section. The man who only intends to stay a year is not going to join in a movement for good roads, a new school house or a church at 'the corners,' for what is the use of his spending money in a place that he intends to get away from? The smaller the farm the better, just so it is large enough, and fertile enough to provide something better than a mere living for its owner and his family. The smaller the farm the better

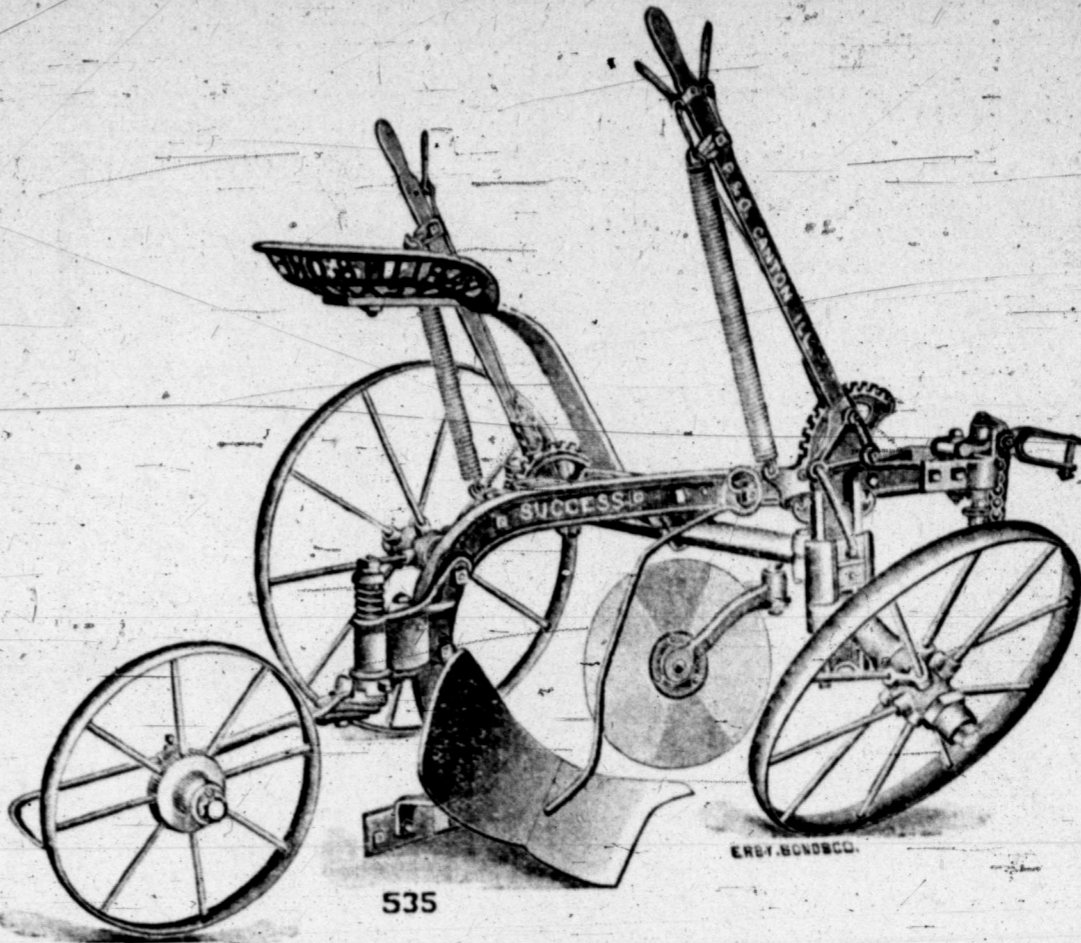
STRANGE BEDFELLOWS.

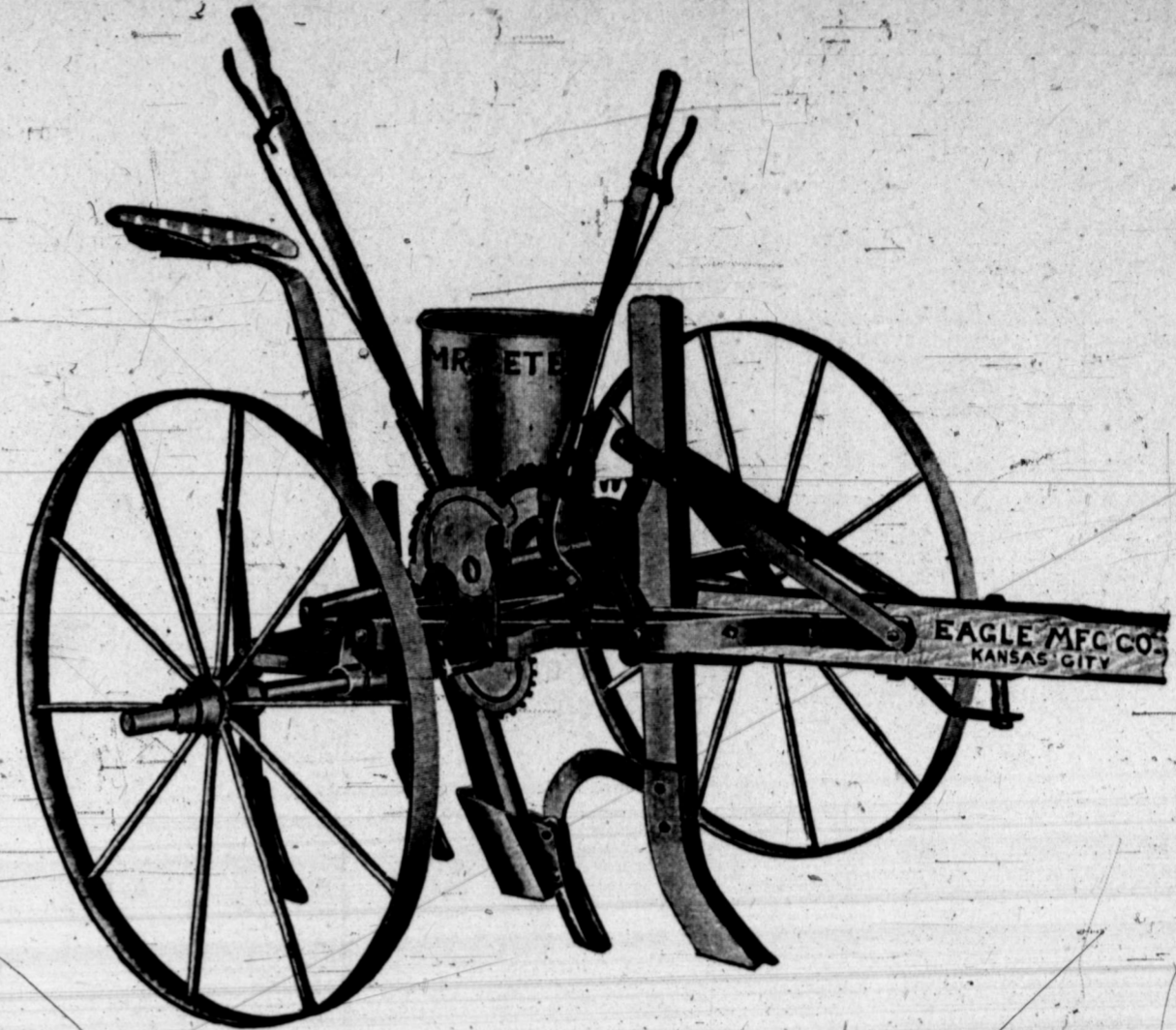

Amarillo Herald Sold.

Last Friday The Twice-a-week Herald and all property of the Amarillo Publishing Co., was sold to P. E. Boesen, of Fairfield, Iowa. The Herald here will practically continue under the new as under the old management. Mr. Brooks will be a member of the new firm in the capacity of business manager. Mr. Webb will remain as a member of the staff, while Mr. Boesen will conduct the editorial columns and superintend the mechanical end of the business.—Amarillo Herald.

Hereford vs. Canyon.

In the double header played Monday between the senior base ball teams of Hereford and Canyon City, Hereford got the worst end all the way through.

In the first game, Hereford made 9 to Canyon 15 and in the second game, 7 against Canyon 23.

Nearly all the business houses closed up during the games and almost half the town was present.
